Cicero residents will pay hydrant rental fee

Cicero residents will begin paying a user fee for fire hydrant rentals, the result of an ordinance passed by the Cicero Town Council at a meeting last week. The fee will be \$3.92 to each resident.

State law requires the Town of Cicero to pay the water department for water used by the fire department for fire service, as the water department purchases, installs, maintains and provide water to the hydrants.

This fee now is being passed on to residents.

"This has been paid out of the general fund and now is being transferred to a user fee," Clerk Treasurer Jan Unger explained the reasoning to The Reporter. "The amount is established by taking the number of hydrants times the rate, not divided by the number of users."

State law allows for the Town to do this, and, Unger said, many towns do. Unger, who researched the matter, reported to the Town Council that Cicero's rate is lower than many other communities.



Two Westfield women found dead, police treating case as homicide

Westfield Police Officers responded to a report of two females found unresponsive inside a residence at the Oak Park Subdivision in Westfield. After medical personnel arrived to assist, the two females were pronounced dead at the scene. The two victims were identified as mother, Marylyn Erb, 52, and her daughter, Kelley Erb, 23.

As a result of evidence at the scene, the case is being treated as a homicide.

Westfield Mayor Andy Cook said on Sunday that as the community comes together to mourn the loss of lives, the City and Police will not rest until the person responsible for the crime has been apprehended.

"My thoughts and prayers go out to the Erb family", says Cook. "Westfield prides itself on being a safe community and I am confident that the diligent work of our Westfield Police Department, and assisting agencies, will bring the person responsible for this heinous crime to justice in a swift and firm manner."







Cole, who played her high school basketball at Noblesville, led the Lady Milers to three straight IHSAA State Finals appearances, highlighted by a state title in 1987 and a state runner-up finish in 1988.

She is Hamilton County's all-time leading scorer with a career total of 1,869 and ranks 27th on Indiana's all-time list.

She competed at the varsity level in both basketball and golf at Indiana University. In two seasons of basketball for the Hoosiers, Cole scored 301 points and had 71 assists. She started in 22 games.

She excelled even more playing golf at Indiana. She earned All-Big Ten honors three different years and qualified for the NCAA Championship in 1993.

Ten members of the Silver Anniversary Team, including Cole, were members of the 1989 Indiana All-Star squad.




