Noblesville thanks public for patience, assures residents of quick work

The City of Noblesville sent the following message regarding the clearing of streets:

"The City of Noblesville would like to thank the public again for your patience during the continued aftermath of the winter storm.

The Street Department crews continue to run 24 hours a day. Due to blowing and drifting that occurred overnight Sunday into Monday, crews in many cases had to start over with plowing yesterday morning. Again, the priority is primary routes, then secondary routes, then alternate routes.

In addition, crews focused a great deal of attention yesterday working with the hospital and the police and fire departments to clear roads for emergency situations, dialysis patients and other patients with life threatening conditions who require treatment, people who were stranded without electricity and needed to move out of their house, etc. Today's focus for the crews will be the alternate routes (including cul-de-sacs).

Again, we are sorry that some people are upset with the speed at which the roads are being cleared. Please be assured that the Street Department continues to work as quickly and as safely as possible 24 hours a day."




Carmel reaching out to elderly, infirm
