



Fire victim identified

The victim of a house fire Monday in Cicero earlier today was identified as 66-year-old Linda Miessen, who was the resident of the house at 2469 Lincoln Drive in Cicero.

The body was recovered Wednesday morning. Hamilton County Corner Thurl Cecil stated that the cause of death was an acute myocardial infarction and smoke inhalation pending any further information from the toxicology reports.

“This is the first time in my career that I have had to stop and resume the search a second day,” said Tim Murry from the State Fire Marshall’s office.

Efforts to recover the body started as soon as it was safe to enter the structure. Due to the number of agencies involved and resources needed to overtime the extreme weather conditions, it was determined best to suspend he search effort Tuesday evening and start again at first light on Wednesday morning when additional resources were brought to the scene.

Temperatures had dipped down to 13 degrees below zero during the incident and remained bitter cold all day Tuesday.

Family members were kept informed through the incident and were supportive of the recovery effort.

The Cicero Fire Department was dispatched at 10:57 p.m. on Monday, Jan. 6. Neighbors called 911 and reported that heavy smoke was coming from the roof. The first arriving fire crews found he house more than 50 percent involved in fire with flames coming from the roof and two side windows of the structure.

Due to the advance nature of the fire and structural collapse, firefighters were unable to make an effective entry into the residence until the fire was out. Initial reports indicated that the home was occupied at the time of the fire. The Cicero Department contacted the state Fire Marshal’s office.

Thirteen more candidates file for May primary election

John Cline sworn in as Merit Deputy

Another 13 candidates filed their intentions Friday to run in the May primary election.

The first Democrats have filed. Running for U.S. Congress are Allen Davidson and David Ford.

The remainder of filings today were Republicans including incumbent State Sen. James Buck, and two incumbents, Eric Turner in District 32 and Todd Huston in District 37.

Current county councilor Amy Massilamany filed for re-election in District 2.

Two more candidates have declared for Fishers city office: Brad DeReamer filed for city council in the Northeast District, and Rich Block filed for council-at-large.

Township filings included Peggy Pfister running for re-election to the Noblesville Township Board; Brian Baehl and Dan Rieke for township board in Fall Creek, Marilyn Schenkel for the Delaware board and Carl Steele for the Washington board.

After a two-day delay caused by the weather, Sheriff Mark Bowen administered the Merit Deputy oath to Hamilton County’s newest officer, John Cline. A native of Indiana, Cline graduated from Indiana University in 1993 with a degree in Criminal Justice. He was then hired by the Cincinnati Police Department where he attained the rank of Corporal. During his 15 year tenure with CPD, Cline’s duties

also included a time in the Investigations Division. He left the department in 2009 to return to Indiana with his family and became a certified fraud examiner.

Cline fills a position left vacant by a recent resignation at the Sheriff’s Office. He will face several weeks of classroom training to transfer his law enforcement certification from Ohio before he begins the Field Training program.

Tigers nip Shamrocks down the stretch

In a battle as close as the Fishers-Westfield game Friday at Fishers, a little spurt over a short period of time can settle the issue. That’s the way it was as the host Tigers (4-7) outlasted Westfield, 63-51, in a Hoosier Crossroads Conference tussle.

Westfield led 15-14 after one quarter. Fishers went to halftime with a 33-31 edge. Fishers carried a 42-40 advantage to the fourth quarter.

Bingo. Coach Joe Leonard’s Tigers made their run. On a pair of buckets by Mr. Offense, Devein Chaudion, and a free throw by sophomore standout Cameron Wolter, Fishers sprinted to a 47-40 lead, and the Tigers never looked back.

Chaudion scored 19 points. Wolter, in his best offensive effort of the season, led Fishers with 20 points.

It was a 1-2 explosion which finally nailed Coach Eric Rauch’s upset-searching Shamrocks.

“I’ve seen Fishers play six times this season,” said Rauch, “and that’s the best I’ve seen Wolter play.

“Matt Kinney played a great game for us,” Rauch continued. “He was really active. He played his role well.

“We’re still learning,” said Rauch. “We had two freshmen and a sophomore out there tonight.”

Westfield was led in scoring by Ty Osswald with 12 points and Kinney added 10.

Wolter, with his 20 points and four rebounds, probably was the difference on this night. He hit 7-of- 10 shots and gabbed four rebounds. Chaudion led Fishers with seven rebounds, but the Royals were outboarded by the Shamrocks 24-20.

“Wolter made himself available and we got the ball to him,” said Leonard. “I kept telling our guys to swing the basketball, and when they did we hit three consecutive shots.

“We allowed Westfield to stick around, but that was to their credit. They played their tails off.

“We’re slow on our feet. We don’t move latterly,” Leonard said. “We’ve got to move quicker. If we don’t, that will kill us in the sectional.”

Chaudion was his ever-tough self for Fishers. Along with 19 points and seven rebounds he also had seven assists.

Westfield, now 1-6, tonight (5 p.m. junior varsity start) will host two-time defending state champion and No. 1 ranked and undefeated Carmel Greyhounds. Carmel’s scheduled game last evening with Center Grove was postponed.

Fishers, winner of three straight, is idle until next Friday when the Tigers travel to Lafayette Jeff.

Golden Eagles split doubleheader with Chatard

Friday night's boys basketball game at Bishop Chatard could have been a classic trap game for Guerin Catholic.

The Golden Eagles are dealing with one key player's illness, and another one's injury. Also, Class 3A No. 5 Guerin would soon be traveling to Louisville to take on Kentucky's No. 1 team...something that would make it easy for the players to look past the Trojans.

But the Golden Eagles didn't look past the Trojans. No way. And they shrugged off the health problems to stomp Chatard 55-35 in the first game of a boy-girl doubleheader. The game was tied at 2-2 in the first quarter, but Guerin Catholic (11-2) then scored 18 straight points to take a 20-2 lead in front of a capacity crowd.

"We got off to a really good start," said GCHS coach Pete Smith.

Guerin's twin towers led the way, with Matt Holba scoring 14 points and Aaron Brennan adding eight. Brennan played remarkable despite battling illness; since the game was in hand by halftime, Smith gave Brennan the second half off.

"He played most of the first half, but by halftime he was just completely worn out," said Smith.

Chatard played the second half closer, but Guerin's 26-10 halftime lead was too much to make up. Holba scored another nine points, including a dunk. Cris Burrough added seven points; he finished the game with 10. Whit Rapp handed out nine assists.

Royals roar big time

After seeing their eight-game game win streak snapped by Marion and Mooresville in holiday tourney action, Hamilton Southeastern returned to the court Friday evening and simply chewed apart Harrison 91-57 at West Lafayette.

While doing so, Coach Brian Satterfield's Royals took another step in their bid for a Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship. The Royals now are 9-2 overall and 4-0 in the conference.

Southeastern will return to action this evening, hosting Muncie Central. Junior

varsity starting time is 4 p.m., with the varsity game to follow.

Southeastern never gave Harrison a chance on the Raiders' home floor, leaping to a 28-12 first quarter advantage and leading 41-23 at halftime. HSE ended the evening with a 20-9 fourth quarter run.

The winners shot 56 percent from the field, canning 35-of-63 shots. They were 13-of-27 from 3-point range and 8-of-11 shooting free throws.

Guerin's team will leave for Louisville in the morning, then take on Ballard at 7 p.m. tonight in Louisville's Freedom Hall. Ballard will also come into the game with a victory, as it defeated Louisville Waggener 87-70 Friday night.

The girls game was a reversal of the boys, as 3A No. 6 Chatard beat Guerin 76-43. The Trojans came out blazing, out-scoring the Golden Eagles 29-10 in the first quarter.

Guerin Catholic found itself in the second period, cutting the lead to 43-30 by halftime. Sarah Yount's five second-quarter points included a 3-pointer, while Kristy Thiem added four.

But Chatard held Guerin to four points in the third quarter, and only allowed GC nine in the fourth. Kristen Schneider led the Golden Eagles with 10 points; both she and Thiem pulled down five rebounds.

"They got a lot of easy layups because they sprinted the floor," said Miller. "We gave up easy layups because we walked up and down the floor...jogged instead of sprinting the floor."

Guerin is now 7-7, and travels to New Palestine tonight for a 6:30 p.m. Game.

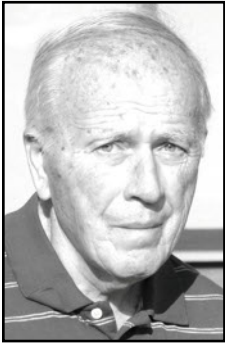

Which face will the Millers show tonight?

The 2013-14 boys basketball season is nearly at the halfway mark, and we really don't know a lot about Noblesville's Millers.

Really; not a lot. So far, Noblesville has been a team with different faces.

The Millers came out of the gate smoking, averaging 72 points a game in wins over Northwest and Howe, arguably the weakest foes on Noblesville's schedule. The Millers won both games by big margins.

Then came back-to-back losses to sectional foes Carmel and Hamilton Southeastern. Carmel, of course, is the two-time defending state champion and the Greyhounds currently are undefeated and ranked No. 1 in the state. Southeastern has lost two games and is ranked No. 7 in this week's Class 4A poll.

So, there you go. Two wins, followed by two losses.

Then came two mores. Noblesville blew out Lafayette Jeff, which, arguably, is one of the two worst teams in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference. Noblesville won at Hamilton Heights, a good Class 3A team.

Are you keeping score? Two wins; two losses; two wins.

You got it; two more losses. Noblesville was beaten in its own Holiday Tourney by Bloomington South and Kokomo, two teams which know how to play the game. Noblesville, arguably, should have, could have won those two games.

So, two wins; followed by two losses; followed by two wins; followed by two losses.

Last week Noblesville beat up on Merrillville. Tonight (5 p.m. start for junior varsity), the Millers will entertain a very good McCutcheon team. It's a HCC outing in The Mill.

If the 2-2-2-2 pattern continues, Noblesville will win tonight.

Although I don't like writing about must wins this early in the season, the game tonight is a must win if Noblesville hopes to challenge for a conference crown. Currently, Southeastern and Brownsburg, two very good teams, are leading the way with 3-0 marks. McCutcheon is third at 1-0, followed by Noblesville and Westfield at 1-1.

We ran the first Hamilton County stat leaders of the season in Friday's Reporter. Noblesville's numbers were interesting. And, like the season has gone, the numbers were a little confusing.

Noblesville's overall shooting isn't bad. The Millers are hitting 50 percent of their shots. That's fourth-best in Hamilton County behind Carmel (53%), Southeastern (51%) and Sheridan (51%).

Noblesville is hitting 36% of its 3-pointers. Carmel (47%), Southeastern (45%) and Sheridan (41%) have been better than the Millers.

Some basketball lovers believe 3-point shooting is like fool's gold. I'll buy that, unless, of course, you're Carmel. The Greyhounds can shoot it from long range. So can Southeastern.

Noblesville doesn't have anyone who game after game has gone out and put up big numbers. Nobody like Brebeuf's Aaron Brennan. (25.2) or Sheridan's Cort Christy (24.8). But, on a given night, Jake Mils, Jack Trittipo, John Kiser, Justin Pegues and Sean Wilson can put some numbers on the scoreboard.

Trittipo is big and strong. Mills and Wilson can shoot the pill. Kiser is one of the better sophomores to come down the pike. Pegues might be the most improved Miller from last year, and he's getting better.

The key to Noblesville's getting better, arguably, is at the charity line. No, it isn't that Noblesville can't shoot free throws. The Millers are hitting 71 percent of their free throws. That's pretty good.

The Millers' problem has been not getting to the line. In nine games, Noblesville is averaging about 13 free throws a game.

Pegues has done the best job driving the ball to the bucket and getting to the line. He's 20-of-30. Trittipo has shot 25 free attempts. Kiser is 21-of-23.

Noblesville needs a good performance tonight.

The road ahead is a tough one. At Avon and then at home against Muncie Central and then on the road at Westfield and at home against Brownsburg, the schedule won't get any easier.

This will be the last scheduled game for the Millers against McCutcheon. The Mavs are leaving the conference. Same goes for Lafayette Jeff and Harrison.

With all the changes going on, Noblesville still needs one game for next season. The Millers will face Northwest, Howe, Fishers, Peru, Westfield, Hamilton Heights, Merrillville, Muncie Central, Zionsville, Carmel, Southeastern, Brownsburg, Mt. Vernon, Pike, Lawrence Central, Avon and Lebanon.

Peru and Pike and the still-to-be-added 18th team are the new opponents, replacing the Lafayette group.
