Committee looks to balance enrollments at elementary schools

Due to large increases in enrollment at Promise Road and Noble Crossing elementary schools, the school board and district administration appointed a rebalancing committee to look at adjusting enrollment districts to accommodate the growth at those schools.

After careful consideration of enrollment and trends in the local housing market, the committee has developed a proposal for the rebalancing. The proposed plan includes moving the following neighborhoods:

Rivers Edge Apartments to North from Noble Crossing
The area bounded by Conner Street, Pleasant Street, 10th Street, and SR 37 from Stony Creek to North

Fox Glen and Arbor Grove from Promise Road to Stony Creek

Monarch Springs, Fishers Oakwood, and other students east of Promise Road and north of 32 or east of 37 and north of 186th St. from Promise Road to White River.

The proposal will be presented at forums at all seven elementary schools during January and early February to allow for patron feedback. It then will be presented to the school board at the board's February 18 meeting. At that time, the board could either adopt the proposal or request additional changes. Patrons are encouraged to attend the forums at their elementary schools, but may attend at other

schools if their schedules so require. The school board meeting also is open to the public.

"I have enjoyed this opportunity to serve the membership of the Noblesville Chamber the past 13 years," McMahon wrote in her resignation letter to Chairman of the Board Dr. John Paris. "I never felt that I worked at the Chamber, but for the Chamber. I have a great deal of pride in that this organization has weathered a post-Depression era economy, a World War, three major military conflicts and economic downturns during its almost 79 years of existence. I am pleased to say that I have striven to conduct myself both professionally and personally in a manner which reflects well on this organization. The input of you, the volunteers, has been crucial to the positive

growth of the Chamber and I would like to personally thank all of you for your professional counsel and expertise in leadership," McMahon added.

Her resignation, effective Feb. 28, comes after a 30-year career of a non-profit executive career.

"I have several things I want to do in my life," McMahon continued, "but right now I am ready to enjoy some time with my husband just resting at our condo in North Carolina. I'm looking forward to my work day not starting at 5:30 a.m."

"I am very much looking forward to 'catching up' with family and friends; working on DAR and church-related projects; renewing my fitness teaching credentials, and spending additional time at our condo in the mountains near Asheville, NC. I will also be in the process of writing a book (self published, of course) related to

Race for Fishers mayor heats up

A race within the Republican primary for Fishers mayor was assured yesterday when two candidates filed within minutes of each other.

Walter Kelly, former president of the Fishers Town Council and Marvin Scott, onetime candidate for Congress, are now on

the ballot seeking to be the first mayor of Indiana's newest city.

Incumbent Prosecutor Lee Buckingham made his bid for re-election official when he filed. So far he is unopposed in the GOP primary.

One Democrat, Greg Purvis, is the first candidate to file for elective office this year.

He is running for Fishers City Council in the South Central District. (A handful of other Democrats have filed for party positions.)

Four more Republicans filed for Fishers City Council. They are: Cecilia Coble, Rich Block and Mike Colby, all at-large, and David George in the Southwest District.

Four incumbent Republican township trustees filed yesterday for re-election including Christina Miller in Jackson, Jamie Rulon in White River, John Patrick in Adams, and Doug Callahan in Clay.

Two Delaware Township men, Michael Jordan and Ed Pierce, declared for the township board.

Sheridan resident discovers body in a field

On Monday, Jan. 13, the Boone County Sheriff's office responded to a 911 call indicating Sheridan resident Lonnie Phillips discovered a body in a field located on State Road 47 approximately half mile east of Boone County road 900 East.

In a news release the Boone County Sheriff's Department reported the body is believed to be a 43-year-old white male

with an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound. Sheriff officials indicted the identity of the body could not be released until notification of family members. The incident is currently remains under investigation by the Boone County Sheriff's Office and the Boone County Coroner. Boone County was also assisted by Sheridan Fire Department.

Arctic blast keeps troopers busy

The Arctic blast that paralyzed much of Indiana last week kept area troopers extremely busy on the roads assisting motorists, working crashes and slide offs.

While much of the motoring public made the wise decision to wait out the storm that passed through Indiana last Sunday, Monday and Tuesday many ventured out and fell victim to the deep snow, slick roads and extreme temperatures.

In preparation for the storm, the Indiana State Police suspended most officers' days off and had extra units working the roadways across the state. The state police setup a Crisis Action Center (CAC) in Indianapolis that was staffed 24 hours a day during the event. They tracked all major storm

related incidents where state police officers responded. The CAC worked directly with the State Emergency Operations Center (EOC) providing situational awareness and resource needs.

Locally, trooper's from the Indianapolis Post, which covers Marion, Hendricks, Boone, Shelby, Hancock, Hamilton and Johnson Counties responded to 21 personal injury and 237 property damage crashes. Troopers assisted with 322 reported slide off's that did not result in any damage and assisted 513 motorist's with weather related requests. Trooper's also responded to 300 calls for service during this time period of January 5-8th that was not weather related.

Firearms Public Safety Forum is Thursday at Fairgrounds

On Thursday, Jan. 16., Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen invites area residents to participate in a public education forum on Firearms Safety. This special meeting, to be held at the Hamilton County 4H Fairgrounds from 7:00-8:00pm, will focus on what gun owners can do to promote responsible weapon ownership. Led by Indiana Law Enforcement Training Board certified instructors and Sheriff's Office deputies, participants will come away with practical ideas and suggestions on how to increase safety around firearms.

Hamilton County has recently experienced the loss of two of its citizens due to incidents with charges of reckless homicide involving firearms. Gun ownership has steadily increased with over 450 permits issued each year in 2012 and 2013 by the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office alone. Recent estimates put gun ownership at more than 30% of the

population across the country. With the increase in gun ownership comes an increased chance of negligent discharges or accidents with firearms. In 2010, there were over 15,000 people injured and 600 deaths due to firearms related accidents in the United States. Research shows that half of gun-owning households do not lock up their guns. Many, if not most, of these tragic incidents could be prevented with education and practice in safety and responsibility.

There is no cost to attend the forum and no registration is required. The forum is designed for ages junior high school through adult. Free child care will be provided for pre-school and elementary age children. Free gun locks will be distributed while supplies last. Vendors will be available to show a variety of firearms safety products and classes. This is not a shooting course and firearms should not be brought to the meeting.



Haley reaches 1,000...

Some kind of cookie

Some kind of basketball cookie, this Haley Cook kid from Hamilton Heights.

In a 72-46 cakewalk Mid-Indiana Conference victory over visiting Lewis Cass Monday evening, Cook fired in 24 points to become the 22nd player in Hamilton County girls basketball history to reach the career scoring mark of 1,000 points.

Cook now has 1,001 points, joining former Lady Huskies Jessica Carr, Dakota Weatherford and Libby Ogden as Ha

On any other evening the star of the game for Heights might have been Caitlyn Hays, who hit six 3-pointers and scored 19 points. Or, Kiley Walters, who drilled 13 points, Or, even freshman center Taylor Boyd who, despite sitting out half of the game in foul trouble, scored eight points and pulled 11 rebounds.

But, not on this night. Star of the Game honors were reserved for Cook, the 5-5 senior leader who had three 3-pointers and 11-of-12 free throws in her performance.

"We talked a little about it, but it was no big deal," said Dawn Runner, the Huskies assistant coach who was filling

in for head mentor Scott Fernung, who had a death in his family. "We wanted to get the 1,000-point thing out of the way."

Cook got the job done on a pair of free throw in the fourth quarter.

The game was a no-brainer for the Huskies. They exploded out of the gate, taking a 27-10 margin in the first quarter behind four 3-pointers from Hays and a nine-point quarter from Cook. Heights led 46-19 at halftime.

"It was all about our quick start tonight," Runner continued. "Cass was never able to recover once we jumped out on them."

"It was a total team effort," said Runner. "Hays' shooting and Walters' point guard play were crucial in our win."

The blowout came on a night when Heights was in foul early in the game. Walters, Boyd and even Cook found themselves with some bench time because of fouls.

"Our defense set the tone early," Runner said, "but we got into foul trouble. We want to play defense, but we've got to play smart. On most nights we can't foul like that and win games."

Because of the weather problem, Hamilton Heights had not played since Dec. 27. Now, trying to play catch-up with

their schedule, the Lady Huskies will play three more games this week ... hosting Western on Wednesday, playing at Peru on Thursday and entertaining Eastern on Saturday. All four games this week are conference game, where the Lady Huskies stand 2-0.

Overall, Heights has a 4-7 record.





The remaining Mid-Indiana schools are Heights, Lewis Cass, Maconaquah, Northwestern, Peru, Taylor and Western. Taylor was also thought to be leaving the MIC and joining the HCC, but nothing official with that has happened yet.


