A Veterans' Court...

Judge Hughes will ask county for \$38,500 funding

Hamilton County Superior Court No. 3 Judge William Hughes appeared before the Hamilton County Commissioners Wednesday to share plans for the establishment of a Veterans' Court in the county.

Judge Hughes will meet with the Hamilton County Council on Feb. 5 to request funding, and then, if funding is approved, he will present the plan to the state in early February.

"We'll ask the Council for \$38,500 to fund the court the first year," Hughes told The Reporter.

He said much of that funding will be returned in users fees.

"We're not looking at a new judge or more space (in the Judicial Center)," Hughes said. "The Veterans' Court will work like the Drug Court."

Judges will be appointed for each case. They will include the six judges from the six Hamilton County courts.

"I like the idea," Hamilton County Commissioner Steve Dillinger said. "At

first, I wasn't sure. But once I listened to John Hughes and got all the facts, it is something that I will support. Veterans deserve this, considering everything they've come through."

Hughes told the commissioners that the Veterans Court would be used for minor offenses, like minor battery, substance abuse, and theft.

Veterans' Court is not a new idea. The first was established in 2008 in Buffalo, New York, and has been used as a model for establishments of other such courts in other parts of the United States.

The goal of Veterans' Court is to allow the veterans to be rehabilitated to the law abiding citizen they were before their experience in the military and combat.

All who appear in a Veterans' Court must be a veteran of the United States military and faced with charges brought against them because of some relation to their military service.

Candidates filing slows a little

The flow of new candidates filing for political office this year slowed Wednesday considerably after the first rush of filings last week.

New filings have set up a contest for the GOP nomination for State Senate in District 31 where incumbent James Merritt will face opposition from Crystal LeMotte.

Merritt is a longtime legislator from Marion County. The district includes portions of southeast Hamilton County as well as some areas in Marion County.

For County Council in District 1, Andrew Dollard has filed seeking to take the seat held by retiring Meredith Carter.

Already filed there is Fred Glynn, so a contest is now set for the GOP nomination.

In municipal elections, Pamela VanHook has filed for town council in Atlanta, and Jeremy Sommerville has filed for Sheridan Town Council.

Paul Bolin, incumbent Clay Township Board member declared for re-election thus setting up a contest.

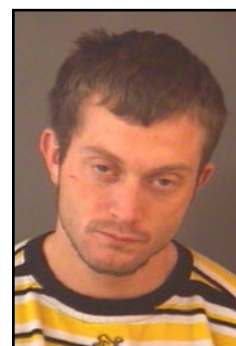
Already filed were Matthew Snyder, Robert Ware and Mary Eckard. Only three of the four can be nominated in the May primary.

Two burglary suspects apprehended

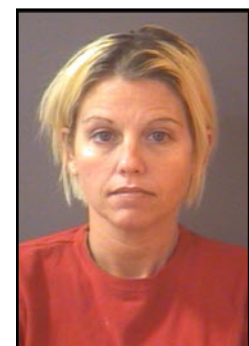
Over the past month the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office has been working

Sheridan High School Backs Alumna

If you have been anywhere near Sheridan High School over the past few months, then you have most likely seen or heard the phrase “Jenny, we’ve got your back.”

That’s because 1998 Sheridan High School graduate Jenny Roberts is facing a major spinal reconstruction surgery to help her cope with her scoliosis. Jenny was diagnosed with scoliosis when she was only a year and half old and has battled through it her whole life.

But it’s never stopped her from doing what she loves. Jenny started working for the Hamilton Heights School Corporation in 1996 as a teacher’s aide and became a kindergarten teacher nine years ago. Jenny never lost ties with her alma mater, Sheridan High School, where she was the girls’ sports athletic manager.

Saturday’s Sheridan girls basketball game was a big deal to Jenny and her family, one because her daughter Emily plays on the junior varsity team, and second, the school accepted donations and sold t-shirts to help the Roberts family with upcoming expenses.

Jenny is scheduled for two eight hour surgeries on February 3rd and 7th at Washington University Medical Center in St. Louis. Jenny said, “this is a new procedure that I have never had done before.”

It’s expected that she will be in the hospital for 7-10 days and stay in St. Louis for about a month for rehabilitation. If all goes as expected she will be able to return to work in about 12 weeks, a lot more comfortable.

Comeback bid is short as...

Millers edge Tigers

Fishers Tigers, like any patient Tiger hiding in the weeds while ready to make the kill, nearly took a bite out of Noblesville’s visiting Lady Millers in a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game Wednesday evening at Fishers.

Nearly was the key word.

Leading from start to finish, Coach Donna Keck’s Millers held on at the end, fighting off Fishers for a 48-46 victory.

Noblesville led 12-4 after one quarter; 24-18 at halftime; 37-28 at the end of the quarter, and then once in the fourth period the Millers led by 11 points.

Then, the Tigers struck as their leading scorer on the season, senior Alex Hochstedler poured in 15 points, all 15 of her team’s points in the final period. Noblesville’s defense, keyed by Jessica Kiser, had held Hochstedler to five points on just five shots through three periods. Hochstedler, who finished with a game-high 23 points, hit 13-of-15 free throws,

including canning 10-of-11 charity shots in the fourth quarter comeback bid.

“She is so good,” Keck said of Hochstedler. “You’re not going to stop her for 32 minutes. And, we put her on the line, which was something we didn’t want to do.”

Hochstedler scored half of the points recorded in the game by Coach Michael Gaines’ Tigers.

Noblesville got into foul trouble late in the game. Erin Wood fouled out after collecting 10 points. Kiser finished with four fouls.

Audrey DeFoe, who hit a trio of 3-pointers in the game, led Noblesville’s scoring with 13 points. Alexis Shannon notched nine. Combined, DeFoe, Wood and Shannon finished with 35 of Noblesville’s 48 points, although nine different Millers did score in the game.

“We have lots of kids who can score,” said Keck. “We don’t have any one player who leads us night after night. It’s a different player nearly every night.

“Rachel Shipman came off the bench tonight and hit a 3-pointer and Erin Flynn came in and hit two free throws,” the coach added.

Keck said Noblesville allowed Fishers to come back by missing some free throws in the fourth quarter and taking some 3-pointers while trying to protect the led.

Fishers hit 20-of-23 free throws.

The Noblesville win snapped an eight-game Fishers win string and left the Tigers 12-4 on the year and 4-1 in the HCC. Fishers will play another home court conference game Saturday against unbeaten loop leader Westfield.

Noblesville moved to 10-3 and the Miller now have won three of their last four and are 3-2 in the conference. They will host Avon in a conference game on Saturday.

‘Hounds nip Shamrocks in tight dual

It seemed pre-destined that Wednesday’s wrestling dual meet between Carmel and Westfield would come down to the last match.

The two teams clashed at The Rock, and it was a rocking, topsy-turvy endeavor that came down to the last match. The Greyhounds’ Karl Wilhelm won a 6-1 decision at 106 pounds to make the final score 31-28. That finished a meet two teams ranked in IndianaMat.com’s Top 20 poll: Carmel is No. 17 and the Shamrocks are No. 18.

"We were excited for our seniors," said Greyhounds coach Ed Pendski. "This is their last weekday dual meet that they'll ever get a chance to compete in."

Each team won seven of the 14 matches. Carmel helped itself out by winning three of its bouts by pins, all right in a row. Ben Kregre warmed them up by taking the 160-pound match in a major decision, then John Theriot (170), Jack Johnson (182) and Sam Hipple (195) each got a fall.

Other winners were Morgan Pruitt at 120, Eli Carlson at 152 (a 4-3 victory that stopped a four-match win streak by the Shamrocks), and Wilhelm’s clincher at 106.

Westfield started the meet with a 113-pound victory by Hunter Arndt. After Pruitt’s win, the ‘Rocks took the next four bouts on their way to a 19-3 lead. AJ Belden got a technical fall at 126, Evan Eldred (132) and Dillon Eldred (138) were major

decision winners, and Jeffrey Helm was victorious at 145.

Darin Milton halted Carmel’s win streak with a 5-3 decision at 220 pounds, then Austin Dollens got a 285-pound pin, tying the match at 28-28 before Wilhelm’s victory.

"It was a tight dual," said WHS coach Terry O’Neill. "And the difference in the dual meet is the bonus points. We gave up more pins.

"It was the situation of two hard-nosed teams, pretty evenly matched. They were able to get more falls than what we were."

In the latest Panko Strength and Speed Individual Rankings, Wilhelm is rated 14th at 106. Both of Westfield’s Eldreds are ranked: Evan is No. 6 and Dillon is No. 8.

Irish turn tables on Carmel

Cathedral ended Carmel's state-longest (Class 4A) winning streak Wednesday evening, and the Irish did it the "Carmel Way."

Cathedral did it with defense and Cathedral did it with free throw shooting ... two Carmel trademarks as Coach Scott Heady's Greyhounds won state championships the last two seasons.

The Irish hit 27-of-36 free throws while winning a head-knocking defensive battle, 45-41.

The loss ended Carmel's 18-game win streak, dating back to Feb. 7, 52-49 loss to Hamilton Southeastern last season.

Carmel now is 8-1 on the year. Cathedral is 8-2, having lost only to Tech and Columbus North, the latter coming in overtime.

Carmel hit 14-of-16 free throws, but the Greyhounds were just 3-of-18 from 3-point range.

There were 41 fouls called In the game, 24 against Carmel.

Cathedral's defense held sharp-shooting Ryan Cline to 12 points and Zach McRoberts to six points. Keegan Culp led Carmel's scoring with 14 points.

Only one Cathedral player scored in double figures. Justin Barker, who was 10-for-10 at the line, scored 18 points.

Carmel led 8-6 after one quarter and 21-18 at halftime, but then scored just five points in the third period.

McRoberts, although going just 2-of-9 from the field, had a strong overall game with five assists and five rebounds.

On Carmel's cold night from long-range, Cline was 2-of-6 and Culp 1-of-5 from 3-point territory

Carmel will return to action on Saturday, playing at Kokomo.

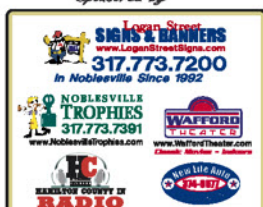
