Thursday snow brings cancellations, memories of last week

Just when the snow from last week's winter storm had (mostly) melted, a few inches of the white stuff fell on Central Indiana Thursday.

While the snow wasn't significant enough to rival last week's snow, it did cause some annoyances, forcing all but one of the athletic events scheduled in Hamilton County to either be canceled or postponed.

Since it was so close to last week, it brought back fresh memories of last week's icy blast. The snow wasn't keeping people away from shopping in downtown Carmel Thursday, certainly not like the previous storm did.

Matt Stilger, an employee at the Main Street Barbershop in Carmel, said that the shop closed on Monday, the day of

the polar vortex's extreme cold. The shop re-opened on Tuesday with a partial staff, and then returned with a full staff on Wednesday. Stilger said the shop was busy the day the full staff returned.

The Barbershop is normally closed on Sundays, but Joe's Butcher Shop is usually open. Sunday, of course, was the day of the big snowstorm, when up to 13 inches fell on Hamilton County. People flocked to get food on the day before, and owner Joe Lazzara said his store was no exception.

"I would say we were up maybe, 25 to 30 percent for the day that Saturday," said Lazzara. "And then we had the courage to open on Sunday during the storm, thinking we wouldn't get any business during the actual snowstorm,

before the cold set in Sunday. We did probably 60 percent of the business that we do in a normal Sunday. So we were very surprised that people came in during the snow."

Like most of Central Indiana, Joe's shut down on Monday because of the Arctic cold. The shop re-opened up on Tuesday.

"We were really here more as a convenience for the neighbors than we were for the great sales," said Lazzara.

While nothing compares to the polar vortex, it will be chilly today. The high will be around 20, with the low dropping to 9. Another blast of cold air will come in early next week, with single-digit lows expected Wednesday and Thursday morning.

Richardson seeks nomination

Three more incumbent state representatives have filed for re-election in the Republican primary.

Kathy Richardson, longtime representative and House Majority Caucus Chair from

Noblesville will seek nomination in the May 6 primary in District 29.

Incumbent Rep. Steve Braun and Rep. Jerry Torr will run again in Districts 24 and 39 respectively.

Two more candidates have filed for Sheridan Town Council-at-large. They are

Sheryl Peters and Steve Fisher, both Republicans.

Joe Arrowood filed today for the Noblesville Township Board, making for a contest. Peg Pfister, James Cox and Jim Williams have filed. Voters will choose three out of the four to serve on the board.

And, for the first time in this election cycle, a candidate has withdrawn his candidacy. Robert Ware dropped out of the race for Clay Township Board, leaving incumbents Matthew Snyder, Mary Eckard and Paul Bolin as the candidates.

Millers get win heading into conference

With the Hoosier Crossroads Conference meet just two days away, Noblesville just wanted to wrestle.
The Millers got the chance Thursday, and made the most of it with a big 66-15 dual meet win over T.C. Howe at The Mill. That provided a big boost for a Noblesville team that will face some of the top teams and wrestlers in the state Saturday morning at Lafayette Jeff.

"I'm glad to get a chance to wrestle, first of all," said NHS coach Tom Knotts. Both teams were dealing with injuries.
"We had a kid sick, so we wrestled two kids that had never wrestled varsity before tonight," said Knotts. And so I thought we did all right. It's good to wrestle again. Saturday's going to be a tough day, we know that."
The Millers had seven victories by pin, with Vance Ellis being the first at 120 pounds.

"First time Ellis has wrestled since he got injured in the county meet, and so he looked good," said Knotts.
Noblesville closed with a flourish, getting the last six match wins by pin. In order, Derek Noon was first at 152, followed by Jacob Wormuth at 160, Mitch Mackesey at 170, Ben Elliott at 182, Ryan Leslie at 195 and Nick Harper at 220.

With so many ranked wrestlers...

Everyone will be tough at the HCC meet

The ranking numbers tell the story about how tough the Hoosier Crossroads Conference wrestling meet will be.

Eight of the 10 schools have at least one ranked wrestler. Thirteen of the 14 weight classes have someone ranked. And two of the schools are ranked in the IndianaMat.com Top 20 wrestling poll. Those rated teams are No. 14 Avon and No. 18 Westfield, who will lead the field at Saturday's meet, which begins at 9 a.m. at Lafayette Jeff.

The Bronchos, McCutcheon and Harrison are all leaving the HCC next year, so those teams will want to go out with a bang. The Raiders have three ranked wrestlers, while the Mavericks have one that could be a challenge for one of the Shamrocks. Lafayette Jeff has no ranked grapplers, but it has two of the top seeds.

Noblesville is in the same boat as the Bronchos - no ranked wrestlers, but two top seeds. They are Vance Ellis at 120 pounds and Mitch Mackesey at 170. Ellis is unbeat-

en at 15-0, and made a triumphant return to competition Thursday after being injured at the Dec. 21 Hamilton County meet. Mackesey is 22-4. Both received byes into the quarter-finals, as did all the top seeds.

Noblesville coach Tom Knotts expects his top seeds, as well as 152-pounder Derek Noon and 182-pounder Ben Elliott to do well. Both Noon and Elliott are seeded second in their respective brackets.

Knotts noted that seven of his Miller wrestlers are in the "pigtail" round, which means they must wrestle a first-round match.

"We got seven kids in pigtails, that means they have to win or their out of the tournament first round," said Knotts. "So that'll be tough."

Westfield has three top seeds. Evan Eldred is the leader at 132 pounds; he is also the state's sixth-ranked wrestler in the Panko Speed and Strength Individual Rankings. Eldred is 21-1 for the year, and could face the No. 7-ranked wrestler, McCutcheon's Seth Carithers, in the final. Carithers is the second seed and holds a 23-1 record.

Dillon Eldred is seeded first at 138 pounds, and is the only state-ranked wrestler in that bracket. Eldred is a perfect 27-0 and rated eighth in the state. Westfield's third top seed, Michael Steele, is also ranked eighth at 152 pounds, which is where he will wrestle on Saturday. Steele is 22-3 for the year.

Hamilton Southeastern has one top seed, 113-pounder Austin Holmes. Holmes is ranked 11th in the state, and has a 19-1 record. Fishers has one second seed, Kweisi Mak-Dawson at 152 pounds. Mak-Dawson is 13-3 for the season.

Avon also three top seeds, matching the Shamrocks. 160-pounder Brendon Helm is 12-1 coming into the HCC, and ranked No. 7 in the state. At 182 pounds, Evan Elmore is rated No. 8 and has compiled a 19-2 mark. Guy Henson is 16-2 at 285 pounds and ranked 14th. The Orioles also have a ranked 113-pounder: Brian Rassbach is 14th in that division. He is 15-3 and the second seed to HSE's Holmes.

Zionsville and Lafayette Jeff each have top two seeds. The Eagles have the highest-

ranked wrestler in the tournament: Preston Mantel is fifth at 120 pounds, but is wrestling at 126. He is 13-1 on the year. Southeastern's Jack Chastain is ranked No. 6 at 126, holding a 24-1 mark.

Zionsville's other top seed is Jacob Aven at 195 pounds. Aven is ranked ninth in the state and comes into the HCC at 25-1.

Lafayette Jeff is in an interesting position: No state rankings, but two top seeds. Dustin Miller is the first, top seeded at 106 pounds. Miller is 32-1, but could face two ranked wrestlers: Brownsburg's Nick Weaver (30-4) is 13th and Harrison's Daniel Davis (36-6) is 16th. Weaver and Davis are in the bottom bracket, so they could meet in the semi-finals. Davis is the second seed.

At 145 pounds, the Bronchos' Matt Grammer is first-seeded with a 30-3 record. The second seed is Harrison's Connor Armuth, who is state-ranked ninth and holds a 36-4 mark.

Harrison's Seth Meyers is the top seed at 220 pounds. He is ranked ninth and has a 36-4 record.

2 games this weekend...

Millers out to change the pattern

There are reasons, arguably, good reasons why Noblesville could lose a couple of basketball games this weekend.

Say what? One thing, there's that win two, lose two pattern. Noblesville, now 6-4 on the year, has won two, lost two; won two; lost two; won two. The Millers are on a two-game winning streak, coming off victories over Merrillville and McCutcheon.

Coach Dave McCollough will take his team to Avon on Friday for a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game. Saturday, the Millers will entertain Muncie Central at The Mill.

Another concern about this weekend, Noblesville hasn't in recent seasons done well against Avon or against Muncie Central.

The Millers edged Avon 46-41 at The Mill last season. Before that, the Orioles had defeated Noblesville four straight times. In that string of games, Noblesville was 0-2 playing at Avon. The last time Noblesville won at Avon was six years ago, 65-45.

The Millers have done a little better against Muncie Central, but the Bearcats have won three of the last five games against Noblesville.

McCollough has an answer to the 2-2-2-2-2 problem.

"It is a lack of consistency," said the coach. "And the lack of varsity experience hurt us in some of the earlier games, making our season hit-and-miss. But, we're getting better. We've improved on defense."

Noblesville is allowing just 46.6 points a game. The Millers haven't allowed any opponent more than 50 points since losing to Hamilton Southeastern 67-51 seven games ago.

"What concerns me most is us being able to take care of the basketball," McCollough continued. "We lost the Southeastern game because we couldn't do that in the second half. It was the same thing in our loss to Kokomo."

Avon will come into the Friday game with a 5-5 record. Last time out, in the championship game of the Hendricks County Tourney, the Orioles were bombed by Brownsburg, 67-41.

"They might have lost some confidence in that game," McCollough suggested. "I hope they did. They'll probably be out to regain that confidence on Friday."

Avon is 1-2 in the conference, with a 68-54 win over Harrison and losses to Brownsburg 59-51 and Fishers 73-68.

Noblesville is 2-1 in the HCC. The Millers lost the game to Southeastern. They beat Lafayette Jeff 63-33 and last week they defeated McCutcheon, 47-44 on a 3-point bomb by Jake Mills at the gun.

Avon has two big-time scorers in 6-4 senior Conner Funkhouser and 6-5 sophomore Brandon Peters.

The Muncie Central team which will come to The Mill on Saturday is 5-2, and, like Avon against Brownsburg, the Bearcats were beaten badly last time out, losing to Southeastern 60-32. They will play at Richmond on Friday before coming to Noblesville.

Muncie Central has a big man who is very, very good. Tyler Arens, a 6-8 senior, is averaging 15.3 points and 9.3 rebounds a game.

Muncie Central, now a 3A team, has beaten Muncie

South, Yorktown, Ft. Wayne Snider, Kokomo and Delta and lost only to a pair of Hamilton County teams, Southeastern and Guerin. Muncie lost to Guerin, 66-40. The Bearcats lost to

Kokomo in overtime, 54-53. Noblesville, in its holiday tourney, lost to Kokomo 38-36.

Jack Trittipio is the only Miller averaging in double figures. He is scoring at an

11.1 clip and averaging 6.3 boards a game. John Kiser has a 9.7 scoring average and Mills and Sean Wilson both are averaging 9.0 points a game.

Westfield, trying to shake a five-game losing streak and improve on a 2-7 season start, will have to do the job on the road this weekend as the Shamrocks travel to McCutcheon for a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game on Friday and then on Saturday journey to New Castle.

"I thought we played well at Fishers," said Coach Eric Rauch, "and obviously struggled against a great Carmel team."

Friday, Westfield will meet a McCutcheon team which is 7-2 on the year. The Mavs last week lost a HCC game to Noblesville, 47-44, on a last-second shot. With the loss the Mavs dropped to 1-1 in the

Westfield is 1-2 in the conference. One of the Shamrocks' two wins was a double-overtime victory over Lafayette. They have lost to Zionsville and Fishers.

New Castle is 4-5, with a game coming up Friday against Kokomo before the Trojans host Westfield on Saturday. New Castle has lost four straight. The Trojans' four wins have been against Blue River, Greenfield, Muncie South and Columbia City.

"This weekend does not get any easier (than last)," Rauch said. "McCutcheon and New Castle both are very good teams

"We are focused on going in and competing at the highest level and improving every day," the coach added.

Fishers, which started its Hoosier Crossroads Conference season with losses to Hamilton Southeastern and Brownsburg, this Friday will try to move to 3-2 in the loop with a game at Lafayette Jeff.

Last two times out, the Tigers have knocked off HCC foes Avon and Westfield. They will take a 4-7 overall record and a three-game win streak to Lafayette.

"Lafayette Jeff is very quick," said Fishers coach Joe Leonard.

"They are not real tall. What will be interesting in this game is who from Jeff will guard (6-7 sophomore) Cam Wolter, and who will Wolter guard?"

“We’ve won three in a row and would like this streak to continue” Leonard added

Fishers' recent string followed the Tigers losing four consecutive games. The streak started with a holiday tourney win over East Chicago Central.

Lafayette Jeff is struggling with a 2-8 record and a six-game losing streak. Jeff's only wins have been over Pioneer and Benton Central.

The Hoosier Crossroads Conference won't pass out the boys basketball championship trophy Friday when Hamilton Southeastern faces host Brownsburg.

But, if ever there was a showdown game, this is it.

Southeastern leads the conference with a 4-0 record and Brownsburg is second at 3-0. Noblesville, which has played and was defeated by Southeastern, is third with a 2-1 mark.

Overall, Southeastern is 10-2; Brownsburg is 9-1. The Bulldogs' only loss has been a season-opening, 54-41 setback dished out by Carmel. Southeastern's losses were back-to-back to Marion and Mooresville in holiday tourney play.

"This will be a very tough match-up," said Southeastern coach Brian Satterfield. "They just keep getting better each game."

They have a three-headed monster with their guards, Darrean Ringo, K.J. Walton and Trevor Lucas. Ringo is lightning quick and gets his hands on everything defensively. Lucas and Walton can knock down the 3-pointers or attack off the dribble.

“We will have to play very solid defense with all players on the same page in order to slow them down.

“This will be a big step towards the HCC crown for the winner,” Satterfield added.

Walton, a 6-3 junior, is averaging 20.3 points a game; Ringo 11.5 and Lucas 10.9.

Southeastern has its firepower, too, led by hot-shooting guard Eric Davidson with a 19.1 average. Tyler Jenkins is scoring at a 12.3 clip and 6-7 Zach Gunn is a step behind at 12.2. Also in double figures is Brendan Burns with a 10.9 mark.

“Last weekend was a very productive weekend for the team,” Satterfield talked about wins over Harrison and Muncie Central. We played extremely well defensively. We were able to take both teams out of their comfort zones and use our defense to create some offense.”

Brownsburg is ranked No. 3 in this week's Class 4A poll and Southeastern is No. 6.

Southeastern has beaten Brownsburg four consecutive times.

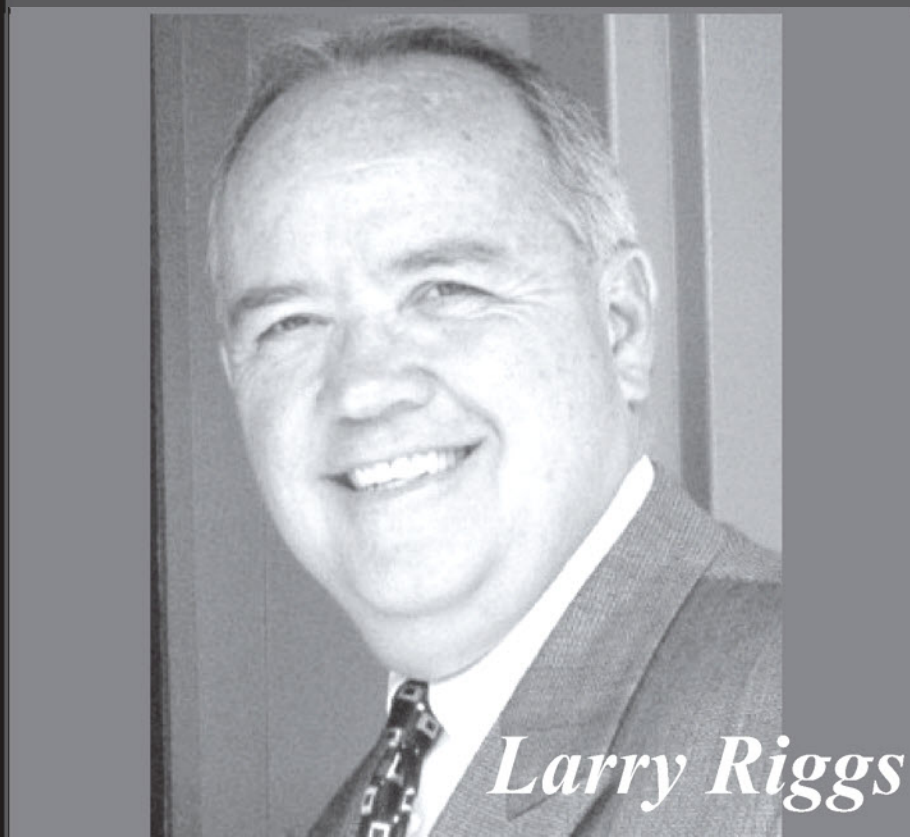
