Yes, it’s still cold. No, that’s not going to change anytime soon.
Temperatures dipped below zero Thursday morning across Central Indiana, with Carmel High School’s Weatherbug station reaching -4. It wasn’t supposed to get any

better Friday morning, with the low forecast to drop to -5. Hamilton County is also under a wind chill advisory until noon, with chills expected to be anywhere from 15 to 25 below zero. The high is supposed to be 19, but breezy conditions have prompted the wind chill advisory.

After that, the weather gets wacky. The temps go up after midnight, but with that rise comes some snow. Two to three inches are expected, along with gusts to around 35 mph, which increases the risk of blowing snow.

The snow ends on Saturday, with a high in the mid 20’s, followed by a low of around 5. More snow is forecast on Sunday, with highs in the lower 30s. It gets chilly again on Sunday night with a low of 3, then Mon-

day and Tuesday will see highs only up to 4 above, with the lows around -10.

All this snow and cold has affected road salt supplies around the area. Noblesville is no exception, although the city does have "a quantity of salt left," according to a press release sent by Cara Culp, Noblesville's manager or public affairs.

"However," the press release continued, "due to not knowing how many additional snow storms we will have the rest of the season as well as knowing there are little to no quantities available for sale, we are trying to conserve salt whenever possible."

Hamilton County's salt supply, meanwhile, is "fine," said Street Department public service representative Brandi Warner. The county has over 1500 tons remaining in its barn, and is receiving 600 additional tons tomorrow. It will get another 600 tons as needed.

While keeping the roads in good shape is a priority for the county, residents are trying to keep warm. Alison Deary, the owner of Ace Hardware in Noblesville, has proof of that.

"The heaters are in short supply," said Deary. "We're getting a few more every week from our suppliers, but they have

been hit really hard around the country. So supplies are limited."

But there is a good quantity of that other winter hardware staple.

"We are having good luck in getting plenty of snow shovels, plenty of ice melters" said Deary. "All things like that are doing well."

Automobiles are likely to get plenty of wear and tear due to the snow and cold temperatures. Josh Lane, the store manager at the Napa Auto Parts store in Noblesville, said that automotive batteries are the No. 1 seller there.

The Noblesville swim teams had a smashing Senior Night Thursday, as both the Miller girls and the boys got easy dual meets win against Cathedral.

The girls were victorious 128-55, taking all but one event (the 50 freestyle). Noblesville's boys won 136-34, sweeping all 12 events.

"It was good," said NHS coach Rich Wolfred. The Millers have three meets this week, and also had to adjust their training schedule due to the cold weather.

"So we're kind of getting a little bit of a taper right now," said Wolfred. "We got a lot of good swims tonight, which may or may not be good, but we'll find out next week and (in the) next four weeks."

Cam Gill and Alex Wolfred were double winners for the Miller men, with Gill getting first in the individual medley and butterfly and Wolfred sweeping the 100 free and backstroke. Other winners were Nathan Olberding (200 free), Isaac Tat (50

free), Ian Medley (diving), Jake Seyfried (500 free) and Zach Bleisch (breaststroke). Noblesville also claimed all three relays.

Eight different Miller girls won individual events. Meme Sharp led the way, setting a new six-dive record by scoring 299.40 points. Also victorious were Taylor Parrish (200 free), Emily Christophersen (IM), Kate Holtkamp (butterfly), Samantha Cripe (100 free), Julie Kaess (500 free), Taylor Seyfried (backstroke), Rachel Mackesey (breaststroke) and all three relays.

Seniors step up in Sheridan win

Sheridan seniors Amanda Summe and Hannah Roaten were honored at the Blackhawks' girls basketball game as part of Senior Night Thursday.

Then, the two honored the crowd with great performances in Sheridan's 55-37 win over Delphi. Summe scored 21 points, including three 3-pointers, while Roaten grabbed nine rebounds and had five steals.

The 'Hawks took care of business early, leading 14-5 after the first quarter and 28-11 at halftime, and that lead carried Sheridan through the second half. Payton Fleener scored 12 points and had four steals, while Brittany Welch added 10 points.

"We got off to a pretty good start," said Sheridan coach Jeff Guenther. "First half, Fleener really sparked us. I talked to the kids before we went out, and the only thing I said was 'Just make baskets. When you make baskets, everything is easier.'"

Welch and Summe each grabbed four rebounds.

Sheridan improved to 12-5 after the victory, which is its second in a row. The Blackhawks are scheduled to travel to Rossville Tuesday for a Hoosier Heartland Conference game, the first of three games for Sheridan next week. The 'Hawks host Clinton Prairie on Jan. 30 and travel to Muncie Burris on Feb. 1.

Millers, Shamrocks want a win

There are two reasons why both visiting Noblesville and host Westfield want to win a Hoosier Crossroads Conference match-up tonight at The Rock. Different reasons.

For Noblesville, the Millers must win if they want to remain in the conference chase for a championship. Currently, at the top, Southeastern is 5-0 and Noblesville and Brownsburg each is 3-1. No wiggle room for NHS.

Westfield, already out of the chase with a 1-3 record, certainly will want to knock rival Noblesville out of the running. That will happen with a Westfield victory.

The two teams currently are heading different directions. Noblesville is 7-4 and has won three straight. Westfield is 2-9 and has lost seven straight.

“We’d like to stay on a roll,” said Noblesville coach Dave McCollough.

“Noblesville is playing well, and we will have to focus on playing solid post defense and yet still recover on their shooters on the perimeter” said Westfield coach Eric Rauch.

“We will have to match their physicality on the boards.

“Dave (McCollough) does as good as anyone in the state at preparing his kids, so we will have to execute at a high level,” Rauch added.

Westfield’s only wins this season have come over Lafayette Jeff 58-55 in double overtime and Tipton 54-42 in overtime.

Earlier this week Westfield lost at Kokomo 80-63, a team Noblesville lost to 38-36 in a holiday tourney game at The Mill in Noblesville.

Noblesville’s other three losses have come to Carmel, Southeastern and Bloomington South. Carmel is No. 2 and Southeastern No. 3 in Class 4A basketball.

In Westfield’s game with Kokomo, Tyler Osswald pumped in 30 points. He is averaging 10.1 points a game, the only Shamrock averaging in double figures.

Much of Noblesville’s success this season has come at the defensive end of the court. The Millers are allowing just 46.4 points a game. Only Bloomington South (56 points) has scored more than 50 points against Noblesville in the Millers’ last seven games.

“I told our guys before the season started that our defense would have to be good for us to win this season, but I also expected us to do better on offense, to shoot the ball better,” McCollough said.

“We played some good defense this season,” the coach added.

The Noblesville defensive target will be on Osswald.

“He can shoot it,” McCollough said.

McCollough was not happy with the Millers’ Thursday practice.

“We had good practices on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, but we weren’t focused on Thursday,” he said.

There will be a change in Noblesville’s starting lineup. Austin Ginther, the football linebacker who missed some earlier games because of an injury, will start along wit John Kiser, Jake Mills, Justin Pegues and Jack Trittipio.

High school basketball coaches faced with back-to-back weekend games nearly always want to focus on the Friday game. First things first, you know.

That’s fine for high school basketball coaches. That’s what Hamilton Heights coach Chad Ballenger and Sheridan coach Cory Dunn are doing this week before they and their teams go head-to-head on Saturday at Larry Hobbs Memorial Hall in Sheridan.

On Friday, Heights has a Mid-Indiana Conference game at Eastern, while Sheridan will be at home to face Lighthouse.

You’ve got to think that Husky fans and Sheridan fans are more excited about the Saturday long-time Heights-Sheridan rivalry.

This Husky-Blackhawk matchup, as do all Husky-Blackhawk matchups, will place on the court some of the top-scoring players in the county.

Sheridan has Cort Christy, a senior who owns a 23.2 scoring average, and a good-looking sophomore in Chris Roberts, who is scoring at a 12.3 clip. Christy was held to nine points in a game at Elwood earlier this week. Hamilton Heights has a sophomore sharp-shooter in Hunter Crist (15.8) and an outstanding junior in Grant Weatherford (12.9). But, both teams have plenty of balance and players who on a given night can burn an opponent.

“This will be a good one,” Ballenger said in looking ahead to the Saturday clash. “It’s a nice rivalry.

“We need to play just for conditioning purposes. We have not played back to back games in a long time.

“Sheridan has put some points on the board, so we must be able to stop them. Cory (Dunn) is doing a nice job with these kids. They have lots of new faces,” Ballenger added.

“Heights is a very good team,” said Dunn. “They have one of the top guards in the area in Weatherford. He is shooting the ball very well and is physically strong. Crist is a threat from anywhere on the floor. Their size and strength will be tough for us to match up with. We need to make them take contested sots and limit them to only one each possession.”

Hamilton Heights is 6-3 and has not played since beating Lapel on Jan. 17. The Huskies’ only losses have been to Guerin Catholic, Noblesville and Warsaw.

Sheridan, after the loss at Elwood earlier in the week, is 3-7, and the Blackhawks have dropped four consecutive games.

“We have to worry about our big MIC game on Friday (at Eastern) before we look at the Saturday game,” Ballenger said.

Heights currently is tied with Peru for the conference lead, each with a 2-0 record. Western and Northwestern each own 2-1 MIC marks.

Eastern has beaten only Clinton Central in eight games.

“Eastern is struggling a little right now, but they are young,” Ballenger talked about the Comets. “They have a nice point guard in Braden Gibson. He works very hard and can penetrate to the basket and is capable of hitting the 3. Jacob Kinder is another player to worry about. He is a good rebounder and a great high post driver. They set a lot of ball screens and hand-off plays. We are going to have to play extremely disciplined defense.

“We are coming off a nice win over Lapel,” Ballenger continued. “We played well defensively until the end of the fourth quarter, where we got soft. We also did not shoot free throws very well, but I know we can fix that. I thought Crist and Weatherford did a great job defensively against Lapel’s guards. We shut them out shooting 3s until late in the game. Conley Hoover had a great game shooting the ball. We need that from him. He took great shots and was confident they were going in. Bo O’Laughlin stayed out of foul trouble. He has struggled lately, so that was nice to see. We are very good when he is on the floor. He does a lot of intangibles and hustle plays that don’t always show up on the stats.”

Sheridan, on Friday, will play one of two Lighthouse teams in Indiana. One is based in Indianapolis. This one is based in Gary and not yet is eligible for the IHSAA post-season tourney. The Lions, playing most of their games in northern Indiana, are 7-4 on the year. They have won three straight. They are averaging 70 points a game.

“Lighthouse is very quick and they want to play an up and down game,” said Dunn. “We are going to have to take care of the
