With energy costs going up...

Adams Township sees aid requests increase

Adams Township Trustee John Patrick reported an increase in the number of township residents requesting energy assistance. Patrick said the persistent cold weather is beginning to financially strap area residents.

Patrick indicated during the month of December his office recorded the largest dollar amount in aid that he has experience during

his term as Adams Township Trustee. Patrick said, "Normally the months of January, February and March are our largest months."

"The cold weather has electric meters spinning and I've seen propane prices increase overnight 40 cents to \$1," said Patrick.

Duke Energy reported a new winter usage peak of 7,214 megawatt-hours was set Monday, Janu-

ary 6 in the hour ending at 5 p.m. That exceeded the previous record of 6,975 megawatt-hours set on Jan. 15, 2009.

Amerigas President and CEO Jerry Sheridan issued a statement on the company's website indicating the demand for propane was at the highest recorded level during this past November and December. This was followed by extreme cold in late December and Janu-

ary, impacting the majority of the nation.

Citizens Gas reported their company distributed one billion cubic feet of gas on January 6 and January 7, the highest two-day distribution in 20 years. Chris Braun, Vice President Energy Operations said, "This historically high use of natural gas will ultimately be reflected on customers' February bills. We want to inform custom-

ers now, so they're prepared when they receive their bill in the mail."

Temperatures are expected to remain well below normal with forecasted lows of -13 to -15 degrees through the middle of next week.

Candidate filings pick up slightly Interest in mass transit increases in Noblesville

The number of candidates filing for the May 6 primary election picked up slightly as the week ended.

As of 4 p.m. Friday the following individuals were added to the list of more than 100 who have now filed in the Republican primary.

Judge Wayne Sturtevant declared his candidacy for re-election to the Superior Court #5 bench. Thus far he is unopposed in the primary.

Chad Garrard joined the growing number of candidates (now at 13) seeking to be elected to the

first Fishers City Council. He is running in the Northeast District.

Meredith Carter retiring from the County Council has now filed for a seat on the Clay Township Board becoming the fourth candidate for three seats.

Edmund Fouse has filed for White River Township trustee setting up a contest there. He will challenge incumbent Jamie Rulon.

And, Lisa Flanders has filed for a seat on the White River Board, while Ron Stone has filed for the Adams Township Board, and Jim Peyton has declared for re-election to the Washington Township Board.

Attitudes have changed in Noblesville about the use of mass transit.

The City of Noblesville conducted an anonymous Citizen Survey in 2010 and 2013, both of which were done by the National Research Center. Since the 2010 Citizen Survey, the 2013 Survey results on transportation show significant increased interest among Noblesville citizens in using mass transit.

In both surveys, respondents were asked custom questions about transit options.

Persons that took the survey in 2010 were asked the following question: "If a ground level, commuter train service was established running from Noblesville south to Greenwood (with multiple station stops in Indianapolis) how often, if at all, would you use this service?"

Thirty-six percent of respondents said they would not use a commuter train service, with 23 percent saying they would use it once or twice every other month. Twenty-two percent of those surveyed said they would use the service once or twice a month, with three or more times a week getting 12 percent of the vote. Those that would use it once or twice a week totaled seven percent.

From that, the survey concluded that 59 percent of those surveyed would never or rarely use a commuter train service, 22 percent would use it monthly, and 19 percent would use it weekly.

The 2013 question was different in scope, but had the same general idea. The question was, "If the following mass transit options were established running from Noblesville south into Indianapolis, how

Discouraging underage drinking among Kenley's legislative priorities

Preventing alcohol-related tragedies is one of the major issues that State Senator Luke Kenley (R-Noblesville) is tackling this legislative session.

Kenley said the Indiana Senate Majority Caucus "is working to reduce the number of underage alcohol-related tragedies in" Indiana. The statistics he listed about underage drinking are disturbing.

"More than one in five high school students has reported binge drinking," said Kenley. "And sadly, more than two dozen Hoosiers under the age of 21 have died of alcohol poisoning in the last 10 years."

The caucus is considering proposals to discourage underage drinking. Among them are:

Senate Bill 28, which makes it a crime to knowingly provide property to minors to enable them to drink; and Senate Bill 227, which expands Indiana's Lifeline Law by providing legal protections to minors under the influence of alcohol who call to report a medical emergency or a crime.

"The Lifeline Law makes it clear to young people throughout Indiana that our priority is to get professional care to those who need it, no matter the circumstances," said Kenley.

Meanwhile, Kenley is working on several legislative proposals, which include:

Senate Bill 1: Boosts Hoosier job and economic growth by reducing the state's corporate income tax and business personal property tax.

Senate Bill 159: Creates a charter school designation for adults who did not complete high school.

Senate Bill 225: Enacts emergency administration of state government services if the General Assembly ever fails to pass a budget.

"As your state senator, it's my job to advance ideas and legislation that will improve our state and our local communities," said Kenley.

often, if at all, would you use each of the following types of services?"

The two options presented were light rail and rapid transit bus. The light rail proved to be more popular, with 42 percent of respondents saying they would use it monthly. Thirty-two percent would not use it, while 26 percent said they would use it weekly.

As for the bus, 49 percent of those surveyed said they would not use it, 33 percent would use it monthly and 18 percent would use it weekly.

Once the polling was calculated, the City came up with the following observations:

- Residents report that they prefer light rail to a rapid transit bus service.
- Residents are now much more likely to use mass transit as compared to 2010. In 2010, 59 percent said they wouldn't use or would rarely use a service. In 2013, that was significantly reduced to 32 percent for light rail and 49 percent for rapid transit bus. In other words, fully two-thirds of our residents would now use light rail and approximately half would use rapid transit bus.

- While the question doesn't compare the two services in 2010, it was understood at that time that the proposal was for light rail. For light rail in 2010, 41 percent said they would use mass transit at least monthly. In 2013, 68 percent responded the same way.

The citizen survey was a collaborative effort between the National Research Center and the International City/County Management Association.

Another 50-under game

Noblesville basketball coach Dave McCollough pretty much hit the nail on the head when late this week, in comments for a preview story on the upcoming Millers’ game with Westfield, said, “We’re playing good defense.”

That, in a nutshell, is what Noblesville did last evening at The Rock in Westfield as the Millers defeated the host club, 54-38.

Noblesville held an opponent under 50 points for the seventh time in the last eight games.

It was a defense which allowed Westfield just 16 points in the first half. It was a defense which limited Westfield to a 9-of-24 shooting night. Nearly half of the Shamrocks’ points (16 of 38) came from the charity line.

The Noblesville offense? A little different story. It was up and down, hot and cold. Very inconsistent

But, arguably, you can credit some of Westfield’s defense to some of Noblesville offensive woes.

Still, the inconsistently stood out huge for the Millers.

Junior guard Jake Mills provided most of the offensive punch. He came out hotter than a firecracker, notching a dozen points in the first half. He was the Millers’ only double digit scorer, finishing with 18 points.

Justin Pegues notched eight points. John Kiser and Jack Trittipio each contributed seven points.

Noblesville was just 17-of-41 from the floor. The Millers took advantage by canning 16-of-23 free throws, including hitting 10-of-15 charity shots as Westfield fought to get the ball down the stretch.

Ty Osswald scored a third of Westfield’s points. He got 13. Osswald had scored 30 earlier in the week in a Westfield loss at Kokomo.

“We wanted to keep someone in Osswald’s face,” said McCollough

“We tried to keep players on the court with different strengths.”

McCollough used a bunch of Millers, 12 in all. Nine scored.

Westfield coach Eric Rauch also used 12 players, including some Shamrocks from what appears to be a very good sophomore class.

With Kiser leading with seven boards, Noblesville outrebounded Westfield 22-14. Westfield did not collect an offensive rebound in the game.

The game never really had an opportunity to catch the crowd’s attention, mainly because of 40 fouls being called. The Millers shot 23 free throws and Westfield 20.

The victory was a big one for Noblesville because it was a Hoosier Crossroads Conference win. The Millers remained in the chase, now with a 3-1

conference record. Overall, Noblesville is 8-4, and the Millers have won four straight and six of eight. They will get a shot at Brownsburg, another HCC contender, next Friday at The Mill. On Saturday, Noblesville will host Muncie Central in a makeup game.

Meanwhile, Westfield’s struggles continue. The Shamrocks fell to 2-10 and now have lost eight straight. They, too, have a back-to-back weekend challenge coming up, hosting Harrison on Friday and playing at Lebanon on Saturday.

McCollough, following the game, wouldn’t answer the question that many of the Noblesville fans who attended the game were asking. Why was 6-8 Tyler Scott seated on Noblesville’s bench? Scott is the 6-8 center who played last season and hasn’t suited up this year. He has been practicing.

“It’s a long story, which will play itself out,” said McCollough. For now, no comment from the coach.

‘Hounds still perfect in MIC

Carmel continued to roll on Friday, taking care of Pike 62-45 at Eric Clark Activity Center in what is now a Metropolitan Conference game.

The Red Devils may be a new MIC face, but the Class 4A No. 2-ranked Greyhounds used their tried-and-true ways to win: Get out to the early lead, play good defense and shoot the ball well.

"We did things we had to do to be successful tonight," said Carmel coach Scott Heady. "We contained their penetration and we didn't give them second shots."

The 'Hounds led 11-4 at the 4:35 mark of the first quarter, and eventually held a 16-9 advantage at the end of the period. That became 22-9 early in the second, with Ryan Cline scoring four points and Keegan Culp making a putback.

It seemed like everybody got their turn during the game. Preston Flamion's 3-pointer pushed Carmel up 28-14 midway through the second quarter. Flamion's subsequent free throw gave him four points for the half, on his way to six points for the night. He grabbed four rebounds as well.

The Greyhounds enjoyed a 31-16 halftime lead, and that quickly became 40-19 in the third quarter. Zach McRoberts scored six points in that 9-3 run, interrupted only by Cline's second '3' of the game. McRoberts made a couple jumpers, then finished the run with a crowd-pleasing dunk.

Pike began making its own run late in the period, cutting Carmel's lead to 45-31 at quarter's end. The Red Devils would get as close as 51-39 before a quick eight-point surge put the game out of reach.

Flamion, Cline and McRoberts each made a pair of free throws, with Culp helping out on a rebound basket.

Culp was the leading scorer with 18 points, with McRoberts all over the stat sheet: 16 points, nine rebounds, five assists. Cline scored 13 points and also handed out four assists. Parker Bernhold had some good minutes as well, also handing out four assists to go along with his four points.

"Overall, I thought we were pleased with how we played," said Heady.

Carmel is now 4-0 in the MIC and 10-1 overall. The Greyhounds will go from one big game to another tonight, as it hosts Bowman Academy at 7:30 p.m. tonight. Bowman is ranked No. 2 in Class 3A, having moved up due to the success factor after winning a 2A state championship last year and reaching the state finals two years ago.

Lighthouse shines brightly at Sheridan

Gary Lighthouse as yet isn't eligible for the IHSAA post-season tourney. Likely, in Sheridan's mind, that's a good thing for teams playing in the tourney this season.

The private school, which can draw from anywhere, rolled into Larry Hobbs Memorial Hall Friday evening and took a poke at the host Blackhawks, beating Sheridan 90-54.

"We were not sharp enough tonight to play against their superior strength, speed and quickness," said Sheridan coach Cory Dunn.

Sheridan discovered that early in the evening as Lighthouse rolled to a 25-15 first

quarter advantage. It was a 44-26 game at halftime and things got worse for Sheridan in the third quarter, being outscored 28-12 in the period.

Cort Christy scored 21 points to lead Sheridan's offense, while Brock Kitchel tossed in 12 and Chris Roberts added 11.

Roberts, the young sophomore, had a great night with a double-double, collecting 11 rebounds. Christy had seven boards.

Sheridan hit 19-of-40 shots; canned 5-of-13 shots from 3-point range and connected on 11-of-17 free throws.

Kitchel was 3-of-6 from long range.
