Hamilton Heights adjusts school calendar for missed days

Hamilton Heights School Corporation has adjusted its 2013 -14 calendar to reflect the dates that will serve as makeup days for the school days missed this month. "It's rare to have five days in a row where we couldn't get to school," said Derek Arrowood, Superintendent, Hamilton Heights School Corporation. "If fact," noted Ar-

rowood, "this hasn't happened since a blast of winter weather closed schools for more than a week back in 1999." Heights traditionally builds in flex days to its school calendar to use as makeup days in case of weather cancellations. This year, make up days will be added to the end of the year (May 30 – June 5).

Heights was granted a 2-day winter waiver from the Department of Education that excused them when temperatures plunged below zero on January 6 and 7. Hamilton Heights School Board approved the application of its flex days (June 2–6) to adjust its 2013 -14 calendar. Additional

Part 3: Breaking down the county...

This is a safe place to live

As Hamilton County Commissioner Steve Dillinger, in his State of the State address, talked about government working together to do great things, his message came over loud and clear in the area of public safety.

Dillinger said the overall crime rate in Hamilton County has not increased the last five years. He pointed to Indianapolis where 130 homicides were committed in 2013. "Nearly half of the inmates in our county jail today are from Indianapolis," Dillinger said. "Bad guys coming to Hamilton County to do bad things end up in our jail." Dillinger credits the excellent law enforcement departments throughout Hamilton County. He praised Sheriff Mark Bowen and his officers. The Commissioner also gave much credit to Hamilton County Prosecuting Attorney Lee Buckingham.

"He has done a remarkable job," Dillinger said of Buckingham. "He has done much to curb crime in the county. Lee is just a great guy. You don't hear much about him because he is someone who doesn't talk much about himself. Every month, he brings in lunch, at his expense, to the court house and invites all the police chiefs."

Dillinger points with great pride to how the county has established a strong communication center, headed up by Michael Snowden, the executive director. "The old communication system was at the end of its life," Dillinger said. "There were multiple radio systems throughout the county and radio dead spots in some places. For example, an officer working in western Hamilton County had no way of communicating with the rest of the county." "Michael Snowden," Dillinger continued, "has helped changed all of this. At the direction of the Users board, made up of Police and Fire chiefs, he came here and coordinated three different

communication centers, Noblesville, Hamilton County and Carmel. He has blended together and now manages more than 70 employees. He did the hiring and the training. "Snowden manages a budget over \$7 million. "Not only is Hamilton County safer today," Dillinger said, "the new system has saved Noblesville \$1.1 million and Carmel \$1.8 million every year." The now county-wide command center received 259,000 calls in 2013. "We've ended up with one of the best dispatch centers anywhere," Dillinger said. "Things weren't going well when Snowden came here from of St. Louis and helped settle things down. Now, all of the departments are under one roof." The county will build four new communication towers, adding to the four currently operating. The new towers and radios will cost approximately \$9 million. Currently a work in progress is the Central Indiana Public Safety Training & Education Center. "Westfield purchased 98 acres on River Road and they want to add to that by the county buying another 67 acres," said Dillinger. The different cities and towns would share in the cost of nearly \$12 million. In 2013, approximately 2,800 students (fire/police/EMS, volunteers and US Army contractors) used the facility in various training exercises, accumulating nearly 14,000 training hours. "It's a great idea," Dillinger said. "In the past we have been sending people to Plainfield and to out-of-state facilities. That's costly. With the training center we can keep our people at home and at the same time bring in out-of-state business. That's good for the area, with hotels and restaurants and other local businesses." The plan is to have ability to accommodate multiple agencies on a single day at various locations on the property.

Water main break not caused by weather

The water main break that occurred at 141st and Marilyn Road in Noblesville on Wednesday, that left several residents without water, was not associated to the weather said Indiana American Water spokesperson Joe Loughmiller.
Indiana American Water supplies water to much of Noblesville. Loughmiller indicated most of the calls his office has received have been from homeowners. "We've received a couple hundred calls from residents indicating they do not have water; however, most have been due to frozen pipes or softners inside the home." Utility officials indicate a majority of water main breaks occur when the weather is frigid, and when both air and water temperatures drop. Air temperature at or below freezing causes the ground above a pipe to freeze, increasing external stress on a pipe. Loughmiller indicated water being delivered to Noblesville residents originates from wells. "That water typically stays fairly consistent in temperature versus water that comes from reservoirs and rivers that often fluctuates in temperature. The variation in temperature of the water can cause water main breaks," said Loughmiller.
Cicero Utilities Shaun Wilson said, "Most of the breaks we experience are

caused by shifting of the ground during extreme temperature swings.” Wilson said Cicero utilities has repaired with a few small leaks and has not had any main breaks. “I hope I’m not jinxing us, but we’ve been pretty lucky so far,” said Wilson.

Sheridan Waterworks Superintendent Mark Evoy indicated there have been three recent water main breaks in the Sheridan area. Evoy reported breaks at 9th/Main Street, Hudson north of 1st Street and 8th

Street in the alley between Park and Fanning.

Utility workers indicate after a main water break, residents need to let the water in their home or business for as long as it takes for the water to run clear and without any air pockets. This could take up to a minute or even a few minutes. They also suggest removing the aerator screens on faucets to allow any debris to clear that might have entered the line during the break.

Dropping a Class for a Life by the Numbers

As a college freshman, Becky Towle knew music was her calling. Little did she know then that she would retire as a high school math teacher in 2010. A computer glitch helped instigate Towle's change of heart, while her faith clarifies the real reason she changed paths.

I started college as a music major. I sang. I played piano and flute. I was going to become a music teacher or do something musically. I finished my freshman year. Classes were great. Everything was fine. However, there was an area that had to be filled with either a math or science class. I wanted to take a particular math class because everybody loved the professor.

I signed up for it, but the class was full. I went to the professor and asked if he would sign me into the class and his response was, "No, I can't because I have too many students who want to do that. But you can put my class down as an alternate, so if someone drops the class, you can be the one who comes in."

That fall when I got my schedule of classes, the computer had placed me in two classes simultaneously; one of them was the math class. I went to the professor and asked if he had an opening in the class after all and he said, "No, but since the computer put you in there, it's your choice. You can drop the class you want to drop." I dropped the other class and took his class. I loved that class. I loved the professor. It was so much fun, and it was through that class that I decided to become a math teacher.

Had I been a music teacher, one of two things would have happened: I probably would not have found a job because music jobs are very hard to find, or, had I gotten a

job, I would have burned out. Becoming a math teacher opened up so many things for me. As I look back I think how different my life would have been if I had not taken that one math class. I think it was the hand of God.

Right out of school I had two teaching opportunities. I took a job with Washington Township and taught there for two years. My husband and I were required to live in Hamilton County because of his job, so I wanted to move to a Hamilton County school. An opening became available at Hamilton Southeastern Middle School and I took it. I was there for four years where I met a friend who became like a sister to me. She lives in Arizona now, but when we see each other, we just pick up where we left off. She has been there for some really tough things in my life. Had I been a music teacher, I would have never met my friend Mary.

After teaching middle school for six years I wanted to teach at the high school level, and an opening came available at Noblesville High School. I taught there for 27 years. I look at the friends I made there, the students who touched my life, and the experiences that I had and think, it was all meant to be. It was a good career.

I'm very, very grateful that all those years ago, I ended up in that math teacher's class. I wrote him a letter once to thank him, and he was very complimentary when I heard back from him. As it turned out, my son also had him in college. He's been one of the favorite teachers at Anderson University for decades.

When it comes to my own children's choices, my husband and I have both tried to instill in them that God has gifted them and they need to follow the path He has for them because that's where they will be happiest. We never wanted to force them into a particular area. Actually both ended up in ministerial roles, roles that fit them well. (We joke that a police officer and a teacher raised them, so they didn't get away with much. They might disagree.)

I believe God presents us with opportunities. With those opportunities come choices. While it was my choice to take that class so many years ago, I believe God guided that decision. If we are trying to follow God's plan for us, He will guide us to make the best choice, even when we don't realize it. My faith wasn't as strong

then as it is now. However, one of the things that has helped it grow is looking back and seeing how incredibly blessed I've been, how even one decision made a huge difference in my life. I believe it helped me find the area where I was intended to serve.

I came to the end of my career loving education a lot more than when I started. However, I wanted to leave teaching while still on top of my game, not when students were saying, "When is old lady Towle going to retire?" I wanted to be the kind of teacher who knew when it was time to leave.

When I was eligible to retire, I prayed long and hard, and my husband and I discussed it. For six to eight months I really struggled with the decision. Then one day, in the middle of teaching my favorite class, I just got this sense: you're supposed to retire. I didn't hear an audible voice, but I thought, "There's a reason I'm supposed to retire. There's a reason to take this step of faith." So in 2010, I turned in my retirement notice. My friends and colleagues began saying, "What are you doing? I can't believe

you're doing this." But I knew it was time to retire.

Six months later, my dad fell causing major medical issues. We'd lost my mom a couple years before. My siblings were not nearby, so I was the one who needed to step in and assist Dad. Had I still been working I would have had to take a sabbatical to deal with everything. I realize that was part of the reason I was supposed to retire when I did.

I now have three grandchildren, so a couple of days a week I get to play grandma. I didn't get to be a stay-at-home mom when my children were young, but now I get to spend time with these little ones.

Life is filled with those little pieces and moments that change your direction, isn't it? I am a woman of faith and that side of my life is very important to me, so I look on it as the hand of God in my life. I truly do.

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As Millers, Bulldogs chase HSE...

There is no room for a loss

When playing in a conference (Hoosier Crossroads) in which one school (Hamilton Southeastern) has won 41 consecutive conference games, there isn't any wiggle room for losing more than one game for teams wanting a shot at the championship. That will be the situation tonight at The Mill when one of two very good teams, Noblesville and Brownsburg, will suffer a second conference defeat. The Millers and the Bulldogs are tied for second place in the HCC with 4-1 records; behind Hamilton Southeastern at 6-0.

That's only half of the treat this weekend for Miller fans at The Mill. Muncie Central will be in town on Saturday.

First things first, so the game tonight will be huge. Arguably, Southeastern isn't going to lose a conference game

this season. Still, second place in a 10-team conference isn't all that bad.

"We always prepare first for the Friday game," said Noblesville coach Dave McCollough. "Brownsburg is pretty good."

But, McCollough isn't taking the Saturday game lightly, either.

"Muncie Central (now 3A) has a very solid basketball program," said the Noblesville coach. "You don't just hang eight state championship banners in your gym doing nothing."

Noblesville will enter The Mill tonight with an 8-4 record and a four-game winning streak. Brownsburg will make the road trip supporting an 11-2 mark. Brownsburg's two losses have been to Carmel (54-41) and Hamilton Southeastern (62-40). Noblesville has lost to Carmel (51-33) and to Southeastern (67-51). The Millers also have lost to Bloomington South by six and to Kokomo by two.

"We're playing good basketball," McCollough said. "Early in the season we had trouble finishing a couple of games. I would like to see us put up more points."

Noblesville's defense has been its bread and butter. The Millers are allowing just 45.7 points a game, and only one team (Bloomington South with 56 points) has scored more than 50 points against Noblesville in its last eight games. On offense, Noblesville is scoring just 53.1 points a game. Brownsburg is scoring at a 66.3 clip and allowing only 45.6 points a game.

Last time out, Brownsburg won 53-47 at McCutcheon. Noblesville has defeated McCutcheon 47-44.

"I like Brownsburg's guards," McCollough talked about the Bulldogs. The (KJ) Walton kid probably will be a junior all-star this summer. (Darrian) Reino can attack the basket and (Trevor) Lucas can shoot."

Walton, a 6-3 junior, is averaging 20.1 points a game. Reino, also, a junior, is scoring at an 11.1 clip and Lucas, a senior, is averaging 10.7 points a game.

"I think our guys can match-up with Brownsburg," McCollough said.

"We'll have to match-up differently with Muncie Central," the Noblesville coach continued. "They are very solid and they have a good post player."

Playing in the post for the Bearcats will be 6-8 Tyler Arens, who is averaging 15.3 points a game. Marcus Dukes, a 5-11 sophomore, is scoring at an 11.9 clip.

Muncie Central is 6-3. The Bearcats, also, have lost to Hamilton Southeastern (60-32). They also have lost to Guerin Catholic (66-40) and to Richmond (50-32).

McCollough is still waiting for the Millers to show the type of offensive firepower which both Brownsburg and Muncie Central have displayed. The Millers haven't reached the 60-point mark since beating Lafayette Jeff 63-33 back on Dec. 20.

The only Miller scoring in double figure is center Jack Trittipio (10.3). Others are close, including John Kiser at 9.9; Jake Mills 9.6 and Sean Wilson 8.6.

Noblesville is Brownsburg's only game this weekend. Muncie Central will host Huntington North tonight before traveling to Noblesville on Saturday.
