Senator Kenley votes yes...

Here come the buses?

The Indiana Senate on Tuesday voted to pass a mass transit bill allowing Marion County and surrounding counties to pursue mass transportation programs if they chose to do so.

Hamilton County is one of the counties which will be given that option. Other counties are

Marion, Madison, Delaware, Hancock and Johnson.

The fiscal body for a county that wants to join would have to adopt an ordinance.

"It will go to the voters as a referendum where they could approve it or vote it down," Noblesville R-Senator Luke Kenley said during an interview with The Reporter late Tuesday evening. "The Hamilton County Council would be the group to send the referendum to the voters."

"It was a close vote (28-20)," Kenley said. "It takes 26 votes for a bill to pass the Senate."

Kenley said he isn't overly optimistic that the mass transit idea will work.

"Indianapolis is so spread out," the Senator said. "I think technology will shove aside mass transit in 20 years. Development today of new, small cars and cars which drive themselves will be the future of transporting people into and out of the Indianapolis area."

Under the Senate Bill 176, those using the transportation would pay 25 percent of the costs through their ticket. Another 10 percent would come from taxes on larger companies, and the remaining 65 percent from local income taxes.

Kenley said he thinks the 25/75 proposal is fair.

"The average percent paid in other states for using mass transit is 16 percent," he said.

Not everyone is happy with Bill 176.

"The Indiana Senate just opened the door to the possibility of \$125 million in new taxes for many Central Indiana residents," said Chase Dowham, Indiana State Director of the Americans for Prosperity, a group which has fought against mass transit.

"Although this is a setback, we never expected this to be an easy fight," Dowham said. "We will continue as we have always to stand up for Hoosier taxpayers and job creators."

More snow for county, which is under Travel watch

Yet another round of snow socked it to Hamilton County on Tuesday.

Central Indiana was placed under a Winter Storm Warning Monday afternoon, and this latest storm proved itself worthy of the warning. By 10:05 p.m., six inches of snow had fallen in two locations in Carmel; at 126th St. and Hazel Dell Road and at the Monon Community Center (on 111th St. between College Ave. and Westfield Blvd. An amateur radio operator reported 5.9 inches of snow at 146th St. and Cumberland Road at 10:12 p.m., with the Fishers South Substation (near 116th St. and I-69) also reaching five inches by 9:42 p.m.

As the evening went on, all public schools had canceled classes for Wednesday. Guerin Catholic and University high schools, along with St. Louis de Monfort Schools also will be closed Wednesday.

At 6:39 p.m. Tuesday evening, the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office announced that roads in the unincorporated areas of Hamilton County were now under an orange Travel Watch. A Travel Watch means that conditions are threatening to the safety of the public. Only essential travel, such as to and from work or in emergency situations, is recommended and emergency action plans should be implemented by

businesses, schools, government agencies, and other organizations.

Road conditions quickly deteriorated as snowfall has accumulated rapidly since it began shortly before 3 p.m. this afternoon. Most travel in the county is slow going at best. Blowing and drifting will create further problems as gusty winds pick up the powdery snow. Only essential traffic should be attempted in the county until conditions improve.

The winter storm warning is valid through 1 p.m. today. Anywhere from 6 to 13 inches is expected in Hamilton County when the storm is finally over.

Residents encouraged to report potholes

During this time of year, potholes develop on roads due to winter weather. While the Noblesville Street Department monitors roads daily, they are also asking for the public's help in reporting potholes. Residents who see large potholes are encouraged to report them so that the holes can be repaired.

For State Roads 19, 32, 37, and 38, residents must report potholes to the Indiana Department of Transportation

(INDOT) at (317) 462-7751. As a reminder, the Noblesville Street Department is not allowed to maintain roads that fall under INDOT's jurisdiction—this includes plowing snow and repairing potholes.

For potholes on city streets, residents may report them through any of the following methods:

first of his party to file for that office in years.

This is the final week of filing for the all-important local primary where most county and township officials are actually selected. The November election is historically a GOP sweep of most local offices. Filing closes at noon Friday.

On Tuesday, two more candidates have joined the crowded race for the GOP nomination for mayor of Fishers.

Renee Cox and Elaine Viskant both filed Tuesday wanting to be elected the first mayor of the new city of Fishers.

Don Meier has declared his candidacy for State Representative in Dist. 39. He will

challenge incumbent Jerry Torr in the May 6 Republican primary.

Pam Zagar dropped out of the race for Fishers city clerk. She then filed for Fall Creek Township Board.

Connie Marten also filed Tuesday for the Fall Creek Board.

There will now be a race for township trustee in Fall Creek as Doug Allman filed to oppose Jeff Hern.

And, Phil Belcher has filed for Wayne Township Board.

All those filing Tuesday are Republicans.

The bill now moves to the House, where, likely, a completely different bill will emerge. Senate Bill 176 would replace a mass transit bill introduced in the House by Rep. Jerry Torr, R-Carmel. But, Torr says the bill wasn't necessarily meant to pass.

“The bill I filed in the House, we didn’t plan to move,” said Torr. “I filed it as a symbolic gesture.”

Torr’s \$1.3 billion plan included the possibility of light rail lines.

“Rails would never work,” Kenley said.

“I know some of the mayors like (Noblesville) John Distlear and (Westfield) Andy Cook are excited about mass transit,” Kenley said. “They’ve talked to me about it.”

Sen. Pat Miller, R-Indianapolis, authored Senate Bill 176.

“I think our mass transit is woefully inadequate for being the capital city of Indiana,” Miller said. “We have bad routes and we don’t have the high quality new type of buses that are available.”

Miller said the fiscal body for a county that wants to join would have to adopt an ordinance. The ordinance would then go to the voters as a referendum where they could approve it or vote it down. The voters would also get to choose how much of a tax increase they would be willing to pay. Miller said the scale could go from a 0.1 percent increase all the way up to 0.25 percent.

The Senate bill is expected to have a great deal of opposition from the House, which is expected to open discussions on the subject early next week.

The high school bowling post-season is in full swing, and as usual, Noblesville is in the middle of it.

The Noblesville girls team has swept the sectional and regional so far. The team first won the White River Valley I sectional, which took place at Wells Lanes, Elwood and Norwood Bowl in Alexandria on Jan. 25-26. Noblesville finished second behind Alexandria in the qualifier round, but turned the tables in the stepladder round, defeating Alexandria 382-359. Both teams advanced to the Richmond Regional.

In the singles round, Noblesville's Emily Forkner (second, 572) and Olivia DeSalvo (eighth, 499) and Hamilton Heights' Aubree Trexler (third, 557) advanced to the regionals. Forkner and Trexler also competed in the stepladder round, with Trexler placing fourth and Forkner third.

The Richmond regional took place Saturday, Feb. 1 at the Richmond 40 Bowl, and Noblesville won again. This time, Noblesville was first in the qualifier round, finishing ahead of Alexandria and Richmond. All three teams thus advanced to the Indianapolis semi-state. In the stepladder round, Noblesville received a bye into the final by virtue of its top finish in the qualifier, and defeated Alexandria 375-288 to win the regional.

Noblesville's boys team also is in the semi-state. The boys qualified second in the sectional, behind Alexandria. Anderson was the No. 3 team and Pendleton Heights fourth. In the stepladder, Noblesville got a bye into the semi-final round, but lost to Pendleton Heights.

Four Noblesville boys qualified for regionals as individuals, with Kris Strong placing second and getting the opportunity to bowl in the stepladder. Travis Holpuch finished sixth in the qualifier, with Jason Hoffman eighth and Alex Everman 15th. Strong finished third in the stepladder.

At the regional, Noblesville's boys were again the second qualifier behind Alexandria, with Muncie Southside third and New Castle fourth. Muncie Southside beat Noblesville in the stepladder semi-final. In the singles, Everman finished seventh and Strong ninth in the qualifier, thus advancing to semi-state.

The Indianapolis semi-state will take place this coming Saturday, Feb. 8 at Western Bowl, 6441 W. Washington St. Action begins at 9 a.m.

Carmel and Hamilton Southeastern's team competed in the Indianapolis North sectional Jan. 25 at Woodland Bowl. Carmel's boys qualified for regionals behind Warren Central; Warren also beat Carmel 411-320 in the stepladder round. Carmel's Grant Oehler was the first-place qualifier in the singles, behind HSE's Devin Hussey. Both competed in the stepladder round, with Oehler placing second and Hussey third. Carmel's Quentin Fox also advanced to regionals, placing sixth.

In the girls tournament, Southeastern's Abigail Rost won an-all HSE stepladder final. Abigail beat Chelsea Rost 214-154 in the championship. Abigail finished first in the qualifier, while Chelsea was fourth.

Lady Royals close to full share of...

8th conference championship

Something strange is happening in this the final week of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference battle for the girls basketball championship.

Barring a gigantic upset, Hamilton Southeastern will be crowned champion. That's not unusual. The Lady Royals are the two-time defending champions. They've won the trophy seven times in the conference's 13 years.

What's different is that HSE is 7-1 in the conference and 3-8 outside the conference. Does this mean that the HCC is down this season?

"No," says Southeastern coach Chris Huppenthal.

"Our schedule has been ranked as the seventh toughest in the state," said the coach. "And, in some of the losses we were close. Some of the losses came early in the season while our young players were gaining experience."

Before Jan. 1, Southeastern lost to Valparaiso by three, Westfield by nine, Carmel by eight, Fort Wayne Luers by one and North Central by three.

The Royals will see Carmel again, having drawn the Lady Greyhounds in the North Central Sectional. The winner of that game will meet the winner of the Westfield-North Central game.

Southeastern broke a three-game losing string with a Monday win over Lafayette Jeff. The Royals had lost to Pike, Class 4A, No. 1 Lawrence North and Class 2A No. 1 Fort Wayne Canterbury.

Back to winning the conference, Southeastern took another huge step in that direction on Monday by blasting Lafayette Jeff, 72-34. That win iced at least a tie for first. While Southeastern is 7-1, Westfield and Fishers are 7-2 and finished with conference play and Noblesville is 6-2 with one game remaining.

Southeastern's last game is at Avon on Thursday. Avon is 1-17, its only win coming over Lafayette Jeff.

"We had only 6 percent of our scoring returning from last season, so inexperience was a problem when we started the year. We had to fill positions with players who hadn't played those positions and girls had to play more minutes than they had before," said Huppenthal.

"Kids had to step up big. It has been a rocky road and the girls have given a great effort. I'm as proud of this team as any team I've coached," the coach added.

Everyone played in the last home game of the season, the big victory over Lafayette Jeff. Everyone except Taylor Graham, who is sitting out with an injury. Huppenthal said he doesn't know if Graham will be ready by sectional time.

"Not having Taylor is a big blow," he said. "She is one of the best defenders in the state; yes, in the state."

Ten Royals scored in the Monday night win. Leading with 16 points was 5-10 junior Madi Taylor. Also in double figures was, off the bench, 6-0 sophomore Elaina Ededuwa with 12 points.

Girls basketball tourney teams top 400

The pairings for the 39th Annual IHSAA Girls Basketball State Tournament *presented by the Indiana Fever and Indiana Pacers* were filled Sunday afternoon with another record number of teams.

A total of 402 schools - three more than last year - and 5,480 student-athletes are set to participate in the tourney which begins in nine days. It's the first time 400 schools or more have entered the girls state tournament.

This is the first year that both of the state's professional basketball franchises have been presenting sponsors of both girls and boys state tournaments.

Sectional games are scheduled to begin Tuesday, Feb. 11, and run through Saturday, Feb. 15, with the regional round slated for Feb. 22 and semistates on March 1. The four state championship games that make up the state finals will be played at the Hulman Center in Terre Haute for the third consecutive year on Saturday, March 8.

Lawrence North is the top-ranked team in the Class 4A poll from the Indiana Coaches of Girls Sports Association as well as the single class poll from the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association. The Wildcats drew Indianapolis Cathedral in Sectional 10 at Indianapolis Arsenal Technical.

In Class 3A, No. 1 Princeton will play Gibson Southern in Sectional 32.

Class 2A No. 1 Heritage Christian takes on Indianapolis Shortridge in the Sectional 42 opener at Indianapolis Howe.

Oregon-Davis, the top team in Class A, begins its quest when it meets South Central (Union Mills) in the opening game of Sectional 51 at Triton.

Among the defending state champions, Bedford North Lawrence, ranked second in 4A, drew Floyd Central in Sectional 15 at Jennings County.

Mt. Vernon (Fortville), last year's 3A titlist, is now playing in the 4A tournament and will meet Greenfield-Central in Sectional 9 at Connersville.

Evansville Mater Dei, the winner of the last two 2A crowns and now ranked No. 2 in Class 3A, will take on Mt. Vernon in Sectional 32 at Boonville. A sectional championship game featuring top-ranked Princeton and No. 2 Mater Dei could happen if both teams prove themselves.

And after winning the last two Class A championships, Fort Wayne Canterbury has moved up a class and will face Adams Central in Sectional 36 at Bluffton. The Cavaliers are the second-ranked 2A club and have won 10 straight sectional titles, all in Class A. Northeast Dubois, another Class A squad, continues to lead the state with 11 consecutive sectional championships. The Jeeps will look to extend that streak beginning with a first round matchup against Cannelton in Sectional 64 at Wood Memorial.
