After filing deadline passes...

Primary stage is set

The stage is now set for the 2014 primary election. The deadline for candidates to file for public office in this year's election cycle passed at noon Friday.

Voters will have choices in several of the May 6 Republican primary races. Both Republicans and Democrats will have a choice in the race for their party's nomination for U.S. Congress.

For Congress in the GOP primary, incumbent Rep. Susan Brooks is challenged by David Stockdale for the 5th District seat.

The district includes a half-dozen counties in north central Indiana.

Democratic voters will choose between Allen Davidson, Shawn Denney and David Ford.

In purely Hamilton County contests there will be competition for the Superior Court 3 bench now held by William Hughes. He is opposed by Brian Poindexter.

Incumbent judges in three other courts will be nominated unopposed. The are: Paul Felix of Circuit Court, Richard Campbell in Superior Court 4 and Wayne Sturtevant in Superior 5.

For County Clerk, former clerk and a current deputy clerk, Tammy Baitz is challenged by another clerk's office employee, Rhonda Gary. They seek to succeed retiring Clerk Peggy Beaver.

Former County Recorder Jennifer Hayden is running to re-take the position and faces Ray Ade. A third candidate, Robert Bragg, withdrew Friday. Incumbent Mary Clark is not running for re-election.

And in a rather unusual contest for County Coroner where there is rarely competition, Roger Conn and John Chalfin are seeking to succeed retiring Coroner Thurl Cecil.

There is one County Council race shaping up in District 1 where Andrew Dollard and Fred Glynn face off for the GOP nod.

Home free in their search for new four-year terms are Prosecutor Lee Buckingham, Sheriff Mark Bowen, County Commissioner Christine Altman and County Assessor Robin Ward.

In purely local, in-county state legislative races, Rep. Kathy Richardson is unopposed.

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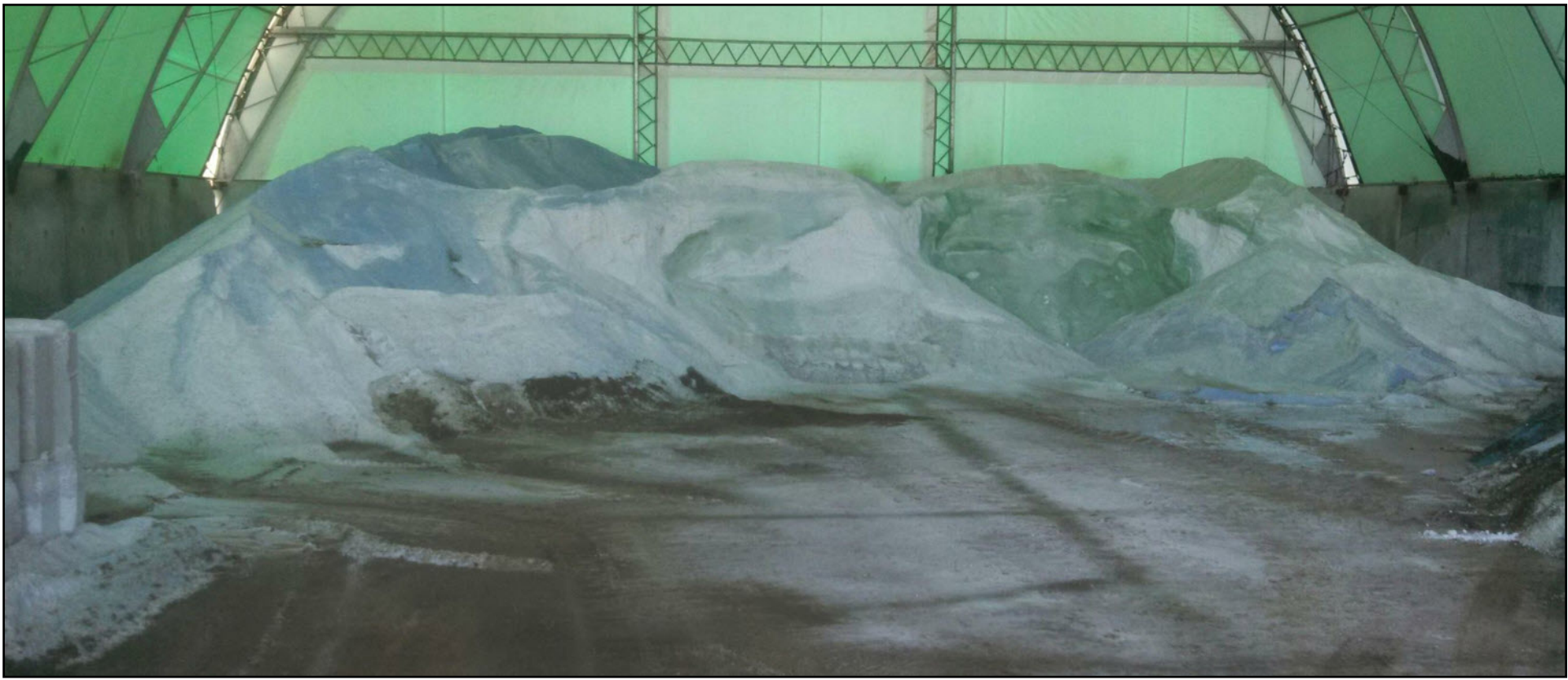

Salt supplies are low, but departments are making do

The snowfall totals are making history this winter season in Central Indiana.

And as the snow goes up, the salt supplies are going down. Hamilton County's street departments are dealing with that problem, although some of the departments are getting creative in how they conserve salt.

Take the Westfield Street Department. Erin Verplank, the city's communications director, said that Westfield is using calcium-treated sand "to expend the salt supply."

Westfield has a couple hundred tons of salt left, but does have a shipment of 1800 tons coming in from Cargill, the salt supplier for Westfield, Hamilton County and Noblesville, to name a few.

Patty Johnson, Noblesville's street commissioner, said that her city's "salt supply is pretty good," although she acknowledged, "it's probably not where we like it to be."

"We'll be fine if we get a little more snow this weekend, and we should be getting a little more salt," said Johnson, who is among the many people who hope winter is coming to an end soon.

Hamilton County also should be fine with its salt supply. Brad Davis, the county highway department director, said that the street department has about 800-900 tons in inventory, with approximately 1500 tons "currently on order with our supplier." The department is mixing its salt with sand as well.

"We feel like we're okay for the very near term," said Davis.

Indiana Sheriffs' Association scholarships available

Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen announced today that the Indiana Sheriffs' Association will again be awarding college scholarships to qualified high school seniors and college students who are pursuing a degree in criminal justice studies. There will approximately 40 scholarships, each in the amount of \$500, awarded to qualifying students throughout the state.

The Indiana Sheriffs' Association Scholarship Fund was established for the purposes of receiving, investing, and dispensing funds to provide college scholarships to qualified students who are committed to pursuing an education and career in the law enforcement field.

To qualify for one of these scholarships, the applicant must be an Indiana resident, be a current member of the Indiana Sheriffs' Association or a dependent or grandchild of a current member, attend an Indiana college or university, major in a law enforcement field, and enroll as a fulltime student. Longer days at Westfield

Westfield Schools are working on a plan to make up four days (24 hours) of missed classroom time, caused by bad weather. The plan may call for making up the time by extending the school day.

"On Jan. 28, I requested permission from the Indiana Department of Education (IDOE) to extend school days in order to make up non-waivered school cancellations," wrote Superintendent Mark Keen to parents and staff members.

On Feb. 6, local news outlets reported that permission to extend days will be granted by IDOE.

"We are working on a strategy to make up the time and will release the plan no later than Feb. 14," Keen said.

"While this may cause some adjustments to non-school schedules, the instructional benefit for students is enormous," Keen continued. "Making up hours instead of days will allow us to cover more material prior to

ISTEP+ and end of course assessments. Plus, we will be able to better prepare students who are taking Advanced Placement exams for college credit.

"Currently, we have four days (24 hours) to make up," said the Superintendent. "We would like to make this time up so that the last day for students will still be May 29. This will allow the high school administrators to check all senior grades and verify eligibility for graduation."

Elections office looking for polling places

As the filing for offices for the May 6 primary election closed on Friday, the Hamilton County Elections Office's attention now turns to the preparations for primary day.

One of the areas the office is working on in Hamilton County is the need to find polling places.

This year, there are several previous locations that are no longer able to host elections, and there are new locations needed for new precincts that have been created due to the county's continued growth.

The Elections Office is looking for locations in Carmel, Fishers, Westfield and Noblesville.

Things the office is looking for in a location include:

The building, parking lot and voting area need to be handicapped accessible.

The area needs to be able to be secured for the day of the election from 5:00 a.m. until after the polls are closed at 6:00 pm and the Precinct workers have concluded their certification of the election results.

There needs to parking available for the voters.

Space to set up the voting machines, along with a few tables and chairs for the precinct workers.

The Precinct workers need to get into the location and set up on the Monday before the election.

Places that work well are churches, businesses with meeting rooms, large entry ways or banquet type rooms.

Boys & girls romp to wins...

Fans get double treat in The Mill

Noblesville basketball fans were given a double treat Friday evening in The Mill as first the Lady Millers gunned down Harrison, 63-38, and then in the nightcap; Noblesville's boys smashed the Raiders, 73-42.

The two wins were Hoosier Crossroads Conference victories.

Coach Donna Keck's Lady Millers completed their conference season with a 7-2 mark, tied for second place with Westfield and Fishers and one game back of Southeastern's 8-1 championship; run. It also was Noblesville's final game of the regular season. NHS, which drew a bye, will take a 16-4 record into next week's North Central Sectional, on Friday evening playing the winner of a first round tilt between Fishers and Zionsville. Noblesville lost only to No. 1 ranked Lawrence North in its final nine games.

Coach Dave McCollough's Millers now are 5-2 in the conference and 10-5 overall. They will play again tonight at Mt. Vernon (Fortville).

Neither game last evening was close, as Noblesville teams leaped away early and never looked back.

The boys led Harrison 22-9 after one quarter and 46-24 at halftime.

At halftime there were two scores of interest. Noblesville's reserves outscored the Harrison team 36-24. Jake Mills, a member of that group, nearly alone outscored Harrison, Mills finishing the half with 17 points.

"It is nice to have a gun slinger like Mills to come in and light it up," said McCullough "Jake is that type of player."

On this night, lots of Millers got into the action. Twelve different Noblesville players scored, including Tyler Scott, the 6-5 senior who saw his first action of the season. Scott, in less than six minutes on the court, scored seven points, including canning one of his famous monster jams to end the game.

"Tyler has been working hard doing what he has been asked to do, and he is being embraced by his teammates," said McCollough. "He got his feet wet tonight. Good for him.

"We got lots out of several players," McCollough continued. "I thought Max Meehan (two points and nine rebounds) played his best game of the season. Jordan Saal came in and really played well."

Noblesville came out smoking, hitting five 3-pointers while scoring 22 points in the first quarter. Mills had two boomers and John Kiser, Sean Wilson and Zach Parker

Hamilton Heights moved to 3-0 in the Mid-Indiana Conference Friday evening with a 59-44 home court victory over Maconaquah.

Coach Chad Ballenger’s club will take an overall record of 9-3 and a four-game winning streak to Westfield tonight for a non-conference game with the host Shamrocks.

Heights leaped to a 16-8 first quarter lead over Maconaquah, but led just 27-23 at halftime before then going on a 32-21 second half run.

The Huskies were 20-of-52 from the field and had a 12-of-15 successful night at the charity line.

Three Huskies scored in double figures. Hunter Crist and Kurry Miller led the way with 16 points each and Jadon White tossed in 11. Crist was a perfect 3-of-3 from the 3-point range.

Heights had balance on the boards with Bo O’Laughlin with eight rebounds and Garrett Paull, White and Miller with seven each.

'Hounds get 9 top seeds; Millers, Shamrocks also swim strong

The first step to another state championship was a good one for the Carmel girls swim team.

The Greyhounds qualified all 27 of their swim into the championship heat at Friday's sectional preliminaries. Carmel earned the top seed in all but two events, with many of its swimmers getting under the state cut time.

Junior Amy Bilquist finished first in two prelim events, the 50 and 100 freestyles. Also earning top seeds were junior Alex Clarke (individual medley), senior Hanna House (butterfly), sophomore Claire Adams (backstroke) and junior Haley Harris (breaststroke). The Greyhounds also were first in all three relays.

The other Hamilton County schools also did well. Noblesville and Westfield advanced all of their swimmers to today's finals, while Guerin Catholic and Hamilton Heights both qualified six.

The Millers got 24 into the championship heat and the other three into the consolations. Noblesville's highest seed is second in the 400 free relay, with the other two relays seeded third. Freshman Samantha Cripe (50 free) and junior Taylor Parrish (500 free) are Noblesville's highest individual seeds; both are fourth in their respective events.

The Shamrocks have 17 championship heat swimmers and the remaining 10 in the consolations. Junior Emily Verbrugge is seeded second in the breaststroke, as are the medley and 200 free relay teams.

The Golden Eagles got their medley and 400 free relay teams in the championship heat; both placed seventh in the prelims. The other four are in the consolation heat. Freshman Abigail Maroney has the top individual seed, 11th in the 500 free.

The Huskies have all six swims in the consolation heat, including all three relays. Sophomore Mariah Oxley is Heights' highest individual seed, placing 12th in the IM.

Championship Saturday begins with the diving preliminaries at 9 a.m. Among those expected to compete are Noblesville senior Meme Sharp, twice a state runner-up, and Carmel senior Laura Rokop. The finals in both swimming and diving begin at 1 p.m.

Positions 1-8 qualify for the championship heat, positions 9-16 qualify for the consolation heat, positions 17-18 are alternates.
