# Business tax cut

The battle over whether or not to discontinue Indiana's taxes on small businesses continued in Indianapolis today, first with a press conference this morning sponsored by the Indiana Association of Cities and Towns and then with a meeting between the IACT and Gov. Mike Pence.

Pence, who supported House Bill 1001 and a separate bill by the State Senate to allow counties to decide whether or not to kill the business tax, appeared to shift gears.

The concern of the cities and towns is wherel replacement funds

will come should the business tax be eliminated.

Gov. Pence now is saying that he will ask lawmakers to use "state money" to replace the losses local governments would face under the House and Senate bills.

He hasn't said where the state money would come. Losses

throughout the state are estimated at \$54 million.

Mayors and school and town officials are saying without the tax revenue they can not operate.

Losses would be heavy in Hamilton County and in city and towns and schools throughout the county. The loss revenue to Hamilton County Government would be more than \$2.6 million. Noblesville Schools would lose \$1.6 million. Even the small towns would be hurt. For example, Atlanta would lose \$1,700.

Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear attended the IACT press conference this morning and later the Mayor's Office released the

following statement to The Reporter.

"Like representatives from all of Indiana's municipalities, school systems and public libraries, Mayor Ditslear is concerned with the effects that each of these groups will face if there is no plan to replace the potential loss in revenue. These groups collectively faced millions of dollars in revenue reductions after property tax caps went into effect. It is very important to make Indiana attractive to new businesses, yet, at the same time if cities, schools and libraries lose millions in revenue due to the elimination of the business tax which then would have to be addressed by a more

large budget cuts, what will that do for quality of life in Indiana communities?"

Yesterday afternoon the governor met with several local officials and agreed to replace the revenue they would lose under Senate Bill 1 and House bill 1001.

"After listening to local communities across our state, I have informed legislative leaders that I am open to full state replacement revenue for local governments to cover the cost of eliminating the business personal property tax on small businesses with less than \$25,00 in equipment," Gov. Pence said.

## Game of the Century at HSE

Although Carmel fans like to talk about their battles in the always-loaded MIC Conference and Southeastern the same in the Hoosier Conference, there may be no better rivalry in the state, in recent years, than the Hamilton County backyard showdowns between the Greyhounds and Royals.

In the last five regular season games, three won by Southeastern, a total of 20 points have separated the two teams. In the last 10 years, including tourney games, Carmel leads the series 11 wins to Southeastern's eight.

Carmel and Southeastern usually, nearly every season in the last 10, have faced each other two times, the regular season and the sectional. One time, eight years ago, the two clubs squared off during the regular season, the county tourney and the sectional.

Can't get any better than that, don't you think?

Wrong.

It should get even better Thursday when Hamilton Southeastern hosts the "Game of the Century" here in Hamilton County.

In this week's state class rankings, Carmel (the two-time defending state champion) is ranked No. 1 and Southeastern is No. 2. In the state's overall poll, including all classes, Carmel is No. 1, Tech No. 2 and Southeastern No. 3, even though it was HSE which knocked Tech out of the No. 1 spot on Feb. 1 with a 77-71 win over the Titans, at Tech.

Carmel is 14-1 and has won six straight since losing to Cathedral, 45-41. Carmel has a second game this week when on Saturday the MIC leading Greyhounds travel to Terre Haute North for a conference game. Southeastern is 15-2 and has won seven straight since losing back to back games to Marion 83-81 and Mooresville 71-70 in a holiday tourney on Dec. 28. Carmel is Southeastern's only foe this week.

A combined seven points keep Carmel and Southeastern

NFD rescues horse from frozen pond

Rescuers from the Noblesville Fire Department were able to save a horse after it fell through the ice into a frozen pond at 16230 Seminole Road.

At 6:13 p.m. on Sunday, the Noblesville Fire Department was dispatched on an Animal Rescue. Homeowners Thomas and Linda Branum called 9-1-1 needing assistance because one of their horses had fallen through an ice covered pond and could not get out. It was unknown how the long the horse was stuck in the icy water prior to NFD arriving.

Fire personnel from Engine 76, Lieutenant Eric Housman and Firefighters Phil Miller and Eric Giegerich were the first to arrive. They informed dispatch that the horse was submerged in pond water up to its neck, and additional units would be needed to extract the horse from the frozen pond. Personnel from NFD Station 1 responded, Battalion Chief Chris Gellinger, Division Chief Brandon Marcum, Firefighters Dan Milligan, Gary Pitcock, Joe Scheumann, and Ryan Emmerson assisted with the extrication.

Three NFD members, wearing cold water rescue suits, entered the pond. A rope was placed around the neck of the horse. A second rope was placed around the horse's mid-section. The three units in the water lifted and pushed the horse, while the remaining units, including the Branum, family pulled the horse out of the water. Once the horse was removed from the water, it was transported to a barn on the property. The homeowners had called their Veterinarian, who was on the scene, waiting to render assistance to the horse. The horse named Nya is doing well, and is expected to make a full recovery.

“This would ensure that any reform of this tax does not unduly burden local governments or shift the cost of this tax onto hardworking Hoosiers.”

The governor did not suggest where that state money would come and whether or not using that tax money would, indeed, be more taxing of working Hoosiers.”

The powerful Indiana State Chamber of Commerce is supporting House Bill 1001 and Senate Bill 1, speaking out for tax relief on business in Indiana.

Reached by The Reporter following a Noblesville Common Council meeting last night, Mayor Ditslear again spoke out concerning the burden that would be placed on local government if the tax money is lost.

“We talked about the sales tax, but the State has said that is their money,” Ditslear said. “Property tax can not be raised because of the cap.

“I’m not sure there is an option. But, we must have replacement money.”

from entering this matchup undefeated.

“This will be a great matchup,” predicts Southeastern coach Brian Satterfield. “Two teams that are very similar in some aspects. Both play solid defensively; have players who can knock down the perimeter shot, and both teams take care of the basketball pretty well.”

The differences? Southeastern is averaging 73.1 points and allowing 55.6 points a game. Carmel is scoring at a 58.6 clip and giving up just 41.4 points a game.

“Carmel is one of the best, if not the best, defensive team in the state,” Satterfield said. “Their players understand what Coach (Scott) Heady wants from them and execute it very well. Zach McRoberts probably is the best defensive player in the state. He can guard any position on the floor and takes pride in stopping people.”

“This is a good game to have at this time of the season,” said Heady.

Both teams have one of the state’s best shooters. Carmel’s Ryan Cline is averaging 15.9 points a game. He

is shooting 42 percent from 3-point range and 84 percent from the free throw line. Southeastern’s Eric Davidson is averaging 18.8 points a contest; is hitting 3-pointers at a 54 percent clip, and is canning 92 percent of his free throws.

“This game, along with the past couple and the next few, will be a good measuring stick for where we are right now and what we still need to work on before we get ready for the tournament,” Satterfield said.

“Southeastern is having another great season and playing very well lately,” Heady talked about the Royals. “They are an excellent shooting team, and have depth at all positions. It will be a challenge playing on the road in what for sure will be a tournament-like environment.”

But, on a Thursday night, will it be a tournament-like environment?

“At this point (Tuesday afternoon) we have hardly sold any pre-sale tickets,” said Southeastern assistant athletic

director Greg Habegger. “We have given Carmel 500 tickets to pre-sell.”

Because of construction, Southeastern has fewer parking spaces than normal.

“Fans are encouraged to utilize our athletic parking lot off 126<sup>th</sup> Street,” Habegger said. “It is a long walk to the building, but this is still the best way to the gymnasium.”

There is a music program the same evening at Southeastern, so parking on the south end of building also will be slim.

# Lady Tigers cruise in first round

It's time to get ready for a big girls basketball showdown between Fishers and Noblesville.

The Tigers opened the Class 4A North Central sectional with a 67-29 win over Zionsville. The victory advanced No. 14 Fishers to the semi-finals, where it will play the No. 15 Millers at 6 p.m. Friday. Noblesville received the bye in the seven-team sectional, but the Millers were there in the stands watching the game.

The Tigers are now 18-4 for the season. They were in control of the game from the beginning, scoring the first 11 points of the contest before the Eagles made a 3-point play with 3:46 left in the first quarter. Brooke Sugg and Alex Hochstedler were early sparks, scoring seven points each in that period.

Fishers led 19-3 after the first quarter, and 38-14 at halftime. Zionsville began to challenge the Tigers in the second period, but a quick 9-0 run moved Fishers ahead 34-10. The Tigers continued to extend their lead in the

second half, hitting three 3-pointers in the third quarter alone.

It was a quick game, with neither team getting many fouls: Zionsville ended up with eight fouls and the Tigers had seven.

"I thought it was a great team effort," said Tigers coach Michael Gaines. "Just real excited about where our kids are at right now mentally. They had a great combination tonight of being poised and being loose, but still being intense and energetic. I think that's a big part of what makes our group successful is when we kind of find that balance. That's when we put our best game out on the basketball court."

Hochstedler scored 20 points, the first in a line of four double-figure Tigers. Adrianna Murphy added 14 points; she also made both of her 3-point attempts and handed out four assists. Sugg and Kara Gerka both scored 13 points.

First-round action continues tonight with a 6 p.m. tip-off between Carmel and Hamilton Southeastern. After that, Westfield will take on the sectional host Panthers.

Fishers' Chloe Jones took sixth (411.10) and Carmel's Laura Rokop was seventh (393.90).

The state diving begins on Saturday morning with the preliminaries at 9 a.m. and the semi-finals immediately afterwards. The diving finals are later that afternoon, during the state swim finals.

# Coach Smith not impressed

Guerin Catholic on Monday evening while playing in the Eagles Nest defeated Heritage Christian by 24 points (77-53), and guess what. The coach wasn't happy.

Yes, it's nearly tournament time, "We didn't play well tonight," said head mentor Pete Smith. "We've got to be more focus, more aggressive when we play in the tournament."

There were times when the Eagles were very good. There were times when they were not. There were times when Guerin Catholic didn't play like the No. 3 (Class 3A) team in the state, a team with a 14-3 record.

Perhaps, for good reason.

"We've played only two games in 27 days," Smith talked about the weather problem which postponed games and even postponed practices. "Our timing was off."

Now, the Eagles are idle the remainder of this week before playing three games next week...Tuesday at Terre Haute South, Wednesday at home against Scecina and Friday at home against Pendleton Heights.

"It's not good playing three games in one week at this point in the season," Smith said.

Still, Guerin Catholic defeated Heritage Christian by 24 points. The final outcome was never in doubt after the Eagles zipped off to a 22-4 advantage. Guerin led 22-7 after one; 34-22 at halftime, and 52-36 after three quarters.

The Eagles did that even when Aaron Brennan, Matt Holba and Christian Munson road the bench for nearly a quarter, each saddled with four fouls.

The foul situation did enable Smith to go deeper on his bench, and the Guerin bench is deeper as Nick Sahn and Alex

Mazanowski return from injuries. Also back from an injury is guard Matt Labus.

Even with the foul problems, Brennan and Holba put some big numbers on the board. Brennan scored 12 points and had a double-double with 11 rebounds. He also blocked three shots. Holba scored 14 points, pulled nine boards and blocked four shots.

Cris Burrough led Guerin with 18 points and Munson popped in three 3-pointers and notched 13 points.

Whit Rapp dished out nine assists.

"Cris (Burrough) did a good job running to the basket," Smith said.

Guerin's only losses have been to Class 4A Bloomington South and Kokomo and a powerhouse Ballard team out of Kentucky.

The Eagles in the Class 4A poll this week trail Greensburg and Bowman Academy. They are 12<sup>th</sup> in the poll which includes all classes.

# Huskies at Burris tonight

Hamilton Heights, 10-3 on the year, will try to extend a five-game winning streak with two games this week. Tonight, the Huskies will be in Muncie to take on Muncie Burris. Friday, Heights will play at Tri-Central.

Two of the three losses this season have come against 4A teams. Hamilton Heights is 3A. All three losses have come at home, losing to 4A Noblesville and Warsaw, and 3A's No. 3 team, Guerin Catholic.

The game tonight against Burris will be played at Ball Gymnasium on the Ball State University campus. The entrance to the gym is on the east side of the building. The building itself is off McKinley Street, between University and Riverside. Parking is limited. It is suggested that fans try and park at Burris High School, 2201 W. University, and walk across the road on either side of the tennis court.

"Both games are not normal routines for us and both are on the road," said Heights coach Chad Ballenger. "We must continue to play and get better."

"I do not think we played well last weekend," said the coach. "We need a 32 minute effort. We can achieve a few of our goals of winning the Mid-Indiana Conference and sectional championship, but we must continue to work hard, no matter who the opponent is or what their record is."

"Tri-Central has played well at times," said Ballenger. "I really like Cody Howell, Garrett Dick and Dillon Smith. Those three are capable of putting up some big numbers. Tri-Central has not shot the ball well, but their defense has

been solid and has kept them in games. They always seem to play to another level when they play us. Their coach was an assistant for me and we are very familiar with each others' style.

"I thought we got good play from Kurry Miller last weekend," Ballenger talked about his own team. He "gave us some nice offense off the bench. Ian Nicholson and Lukas Sipe gave us solid minutes against Westfield. Hunter Crist took over in the fourth quarter, which showed his leadership,. Garrett Paull was clutch from the line against Westfield, even though he played sick all weekend. Conley Hoover is shooting the ball real well right now and we need him to continue doing that."
