Is Gov. **Pence** kicking the can in our direction?

It is mind boggling to me



that Gov. Mike Indiana Senate and the Indiana House ever thought, from the beginning,

that they could eliminate the tax on small businesses without creating a storm of protest from cities, towns and school systems.

Already Isaddled with a cap on property taxes, how would government and the schools replace tax revenue lost from eliminating the business tax?

I understand, nearly everything government (federal, state and sometimes local) does today has hanging around its neck the thought of votes in the next election.

When Pence began his campaign to kill the tax on businesses, there were those who cheered his effort. Like, for example, struggling small businesses. Like, for a better example, the powerful Indiana Chamber of Commerce.

So, from the beginning, it was a move by Gov. Pence to earn some big time support, even if his effort never had a chance to succeed.

Pence simply kicked the can down the road, and next in line were the House and then the Senate. They, too, gained support of the business world by passing (different) bills which would kill the business tax. They, too, kicked the can by including in their bills (House Bill 1001 and Senate Bill 1) the right for counties to decide whether the bills were good or bad.

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Royals hold off tough Carmel

Basketball is sometimes a game of runs. There is no better example of this than Wednesday's Hamilton Southeastern-Carmel girls sectional game at North Central. The Royals started out with a run, the Greyhounds responded. Repeat that pattern a couple times, until Southeastern held off Carmel's final run to win 57-55.

"We hit our run early, they hit their run in the middle, we hit our run the third and fourth quarter and then they hit their run late," said HSE coach Chris Huppenthal. "Just a game of runs."

The Royals advance to Friday's semifinals to take on Westfield, a second-game winner over host North Central. The 'Hounds finished their season at 8-12 with a young team.

If this game had been an IndyCar race, Carmel would have almost made up a 13car length on HSE beginning at Turn 4 before the Royals took the checkered flag by about a half-second. Southeastern led 51-38 with about three minutes left to go, when the 'Hounds switched to a press de-

It worked, as Carmel quickly scored eight straight points. Emily Kmec made a couple free throws and then turned a steal into a basket during the run.

HSE's Madi Taylor stopped the run with a basket, then Carmel scored five more points to get within 53-51. Darie Kirschling got a big rebound for the Royals, and turned that into a 3-point play.

"Darie's been great all year," said Huppenthal. "She's kind of an unknown player, having not played the last two, three years because of a torn ACL. This is her first full season in four years."

Kirschling's play gave Southeastern a 56-51 lead, which Amanda Shaw trimmed to 56-54 after a 3-point basket. Both teams traded a free throw after that, which put the score at the final margin.

Southeastern jumped out to a 14-4 firstquarter lead, but Carmel zoomed back to score 11 unanswered points to hold 15-14 advantage at the end of the period. The Greyhounds then extended their lead to 29-20 late in the second quarter, before Taylor 's jumper made the halftime score

Carmel again moved ahead by nine, 31-22, after Kennedy Kantner hit a couple free throws just nine seconds into the second half. After that, HSE outscored the 'Hounds 9-2 in the remainder of the third quarter. Five different HSE players scored in the period.

Megan Walton got the Royals tied at 33-33 at the beginning of the fourth, and Taylor put HSE in front with a layin. Those two would be the Royals' leading scorers. with Walton pouring in 19 points and Taylor scoring 16. Walton also made four steals, and Taylor blocked two shots. Many other players helped out as well.

"Kendyll Williams comes out and just starts wreaking havoc all over them when she comes out and starts pressing. Madi Taylor, she was awesome tonight. Bree Llovd, you're not going to see anything splashy with her scoring or stats, but Bree did a great job running our offense."

Kmec led Carmel with 16 points, while Shaw had 13.

"I don't think I've ever been more proud of a group than I am now," said Carmel coach Scott Bowen on his team's effort. "Hats off to Hamilton Southeastern, they played a great game. I thought our kids did,

Heights travels to Tri-Central on Saturday for a 2:30 p.m. game.






NWMS 8th girls hoops win seventh in a row


