The "other" senior sparks comeback...

Davis is huge in Westfield win

On this night in the semi-final round of the girls basketball sectional at North Central, it was the "other senior" who sparked a fourth quarter comeback by Westfield as the Lady Shamrocks moved on with a 44-40 victory over a gutty Hamilton Southeastern team.

Westfield has two seniors, potential all-star Kayla Brown and good-shooting guard Taylor Davis. Brown has gotten most of the headlines this season. In the sectional game last evening, with Brown held to a career low of eight points, it was Davis who grabbed the spotlight.

"We would not have won tonight without the play of Davis," said Westfield coach Shane Sumpter. "She was huge, stepping up like she did. Taylor has grown up so much."

With Westfield trailing by as many as 12 points in the third quarter and still down 33-25 entering the final period, Davis drilled a pair of 3-pointers and scored eight points as the Lady Shamrocks outscored Southeastern 19-7 in the fourth quarter to pull out the victory.

Westfield, 17-3 on the year, will take on Fishers, 19-4, in the sectional championship game tonight at 7 p.m. Back on Jan. 18, ended Westfield's 11-game Fishers

Businesses moving on

Marty and Judy Revis opened J'Anns on Logan St. almost 8 years ago. Today was their last day in Noblesville. They are moving the store to Zionsville and are hoping to open by March 1 at 33 E. Pine St. under the name Bou-

The imminent sale of their building was the deciding factor in their move. Their lease came up and, as is often the case when you are renting, a possible sale brings too much uncertainty. It's unsettling not knowing what is going to happen with your building. They actually considered closing, but, Judy says, "What would I do? I love this. This is what I want to do." So, they started looking for new locations.

Judy loves being downtown and couldn't stand the thought of relocating to a strip mall. They originally picked Noblesville (they lived in Kokomo when they first opened) because they liked the downtown environment. They would have liked to stay and even considered buying their building but couldn't come to terms with the owner. Plus they don't like the

running water. They have always worked around that, making deals with their neighbors for use of their restroom, but long term the building needs plumbing, and that's a pricey proposition.

And, there simply wasn't another downtown location that suited their needs, so they were forced to look elsewhere. They decided on Zionsville, which is a twelve mile commute from their home (now in Westfield), just like Noblesville. They are dropping their bridal line and are adding home décor items like lamps, pillows, throws, etc. and will continue to appeal to women over 35, which has been their target demo all along. It's a tough loss for downtown because you don't find many entrepreneurs willing to take the risk on an independent boutique clothing store. J'Ann's was a rare breed and they will be missed.

Sweet Home Cupcakes

Across the street, Sweet Home Cupcakes is also at risk. Owner Ruth Stinnett says traffic started dropping off last August and hasn't picked up since. They have been seeking a buyer to take it over but unless one surfaces soon they will likely close by mid-

fact that the building doesn't have March. It's Noblesville's only morning and smelled smoke. She cupcake shop. The next closest one north is in Cicero and you don't hit one going south until 116th St. in Fishers, so it's not like there's too much competition. Grocery stores sell them, of course, but these are special cupcakes. You've seen them: the large ones with a mountain of frosting on top. They're premium priced but also premium sized.

Perhaps the cupcake trend has peaked, or, as Ruth says, maybe we're a little too health-conscious for a cupcake shop here in Noblesville. She insists she doesn't want to get into regular cakes. She likes the cupcake business, but, as Judy Revis did, when lease renewal time comes around, it's time to take stock and reevaluate.

Tabby Tree Weaver

Tabby Tree Weaver in Arcadia opens again on Wednesday after being closed for ten weeks because of a fire. Owner Linda Adamson says she knows God was watching over her the morning of December 9th. It was a Monday, when she's normally closed and seldom goes to the shop. But she had to prepare for a class so she was in the store that Monday

went upstairs to check out the furnace and it was so smoky she couldn't see anything. She hustled back down the stairs, called the fire department and got out of

Turns out the heat exchanger on the furnace had cracked, causing wiring to short circuit, which tripped the circuit breaker, preventing a larger fire. The firefighters didn't need to use water, which likely would have ruined her weaving machines. But the smoke damage was done. Linda's store is full of colorful yarns and fibers and they were all damaged. Fortunately, the looms were not affected by the smoke, but just had to be cleaned. The entire upstairs had to be repainted and all the yarn and fiber replaced.

It's been quite an ordeal for Linda, who is eternally grateful that she just happened to go to work that Monday. Had she not caught the fire that early, she says, the entire building and even the whole downtown block might have been destroyed. She was covered by insurance and says she has a terrific landlord, so she's looking forward to opening the doors for business again this week.

undefeated string by beating the Shamrocks 53-36 at Fishers.

In the game last evening, Westfield led Southeastern 20-19 at halftime, but the Lady Royals came out smoking in the third period. Westfield turned over the ball four straight times to begin the period. Five consecutive points by junior guard Kalee Huppenthal, daughter of head coach Chris Huppenthal, sparked HSE to a 27-20 lead. Southeastern went on an 11-point run before Westfield finally scored in the quarter on a free throw by Allison VanDyke at the 2:30 mark.

But, Westfield didn't panic.

"I've never seen our girls get rattled, and they didn't tonight," Sumpter said. "We were down by 16 points in a game against Tipton at Bankers Life, and we didn't panic. We've been down before, 15 points in one game and 12 in another. Tonight, we just weren't hitting our shots."

All of that changed when Davis got hot in the fourth quarter.

After Southeastern opened the fourth on a bucket by Madi Taylor to push the Royals' lead to 10, it was Westfield's time to get hot. Westfield scored 12 straight points, taking a 37-35 lead on a 3-pointer by Davis at the 3:14 mark. Brown followed with two free throws and Abby Reeder hit two foul shots. With 40.6 seconds left, Westfield had a a 42-37 advantage and control of the game.

"This has been such a huge rivalry the last three or four years," said Sumpter. "The rivalry has grown into this tonight. These are two excellent basketball programs. I have the greatest respect for Chris Huppenthal and the program at Southeastern."

Davis finished the game as Westfield's leading scorer with 11 points and VanDyke also was in double figures with 10.

"I think KB (Brown) will tell you this wasn't her best game," said Sumpter when talking about Brown's first under double digits game of the season. "But, when Davis hit her 3-pointer to give us the lead, it was off a kick-out pass from Brown who had driven under the basket. Davis was hot with the 3-pointers, but the shot which most impressed me was her running floater."

Brown dished out seven assists and also pulled five rebounds in the game. Maddy Grennes led Westfield on the boards with six rebounds and Haliegh Reinoehl also added five boards.

Taylor led Southeastern in scoring with a dozen points and also in rebounds with eight.

Southeastern ended its season with a 12-10 record.

Fishers stuns Noblesville

Fishers hit Noblesville's defense with a nightmare-like performance from 3-point range and at the other end of the court shutdown NHS's offense while rolling to a stunning 58-43 victory over the Lady Millers on Friday evening in the semi-final round of the North Central Girls Basketball

Noblesville had defeated Fishers 48-46 at Fishers late in the season.

Nobody on the Noblesville team scored in double figures. Alexis Shannon, Erin Wood, Cori Cain and Kayleigh Herron each finished the game with eight points.

Meanwhile, the Noblesville defense took Hochstedler with 18 points and Kara Gerka with 17. Also scoring in double figures was Murphy with 11 points and Sugg with 10.

"We made the plays tonight and had people stepping up big," said Gaines. "That's what a team needs to do at state

From the time Fishers ended the first tourney time. We hit some big shots. We've Cori Cain quarter with a 12-9 lead, the Tigers never been doing those things and gaining confidence.

"We played good basketball tonight. We're in a three-week groove," the coach added.

Fishers, now 19-4 on the year, has won 15 of its last 16 games, losing only to Noblesville during that stretch.

The Tigers will take a seven-game win string into a 7 p.m. championship game tonight at North Central, playing Westfield. Earlier in the year, Fishers ended an 11game, season-opening win string by the Shamrocks when defeating Westfield 53-36.
