Mundy issues letter to Sheridan community...

1 Hour To Be Added To School Days

On Monday Sheridan Community School Superintendent Dr. David Mundy issued a letter to the Sheridan Community.

The letter’s purpose was to inform the community of Sheridan Community School’s plan to make up school days canceled due to weather concerns.

In the letter Mundy indicated Sheridan has been forced to cancel school seven days due to weather and one day due to flooding of the high school / middle school due to

a broken water line that flooded the school.

Mundy said, “The way the schedule stands currently we are able to make up all of our days prior to high school graduation, with the exception of one day.

Last week the Indiana Department of Education granted permission for school districts to extend scheduled days in order to make up non-waivered school cancellations. Mundy indicated the rule is six hours of extended time is equivalent to one lost school day. “As a district we have analyzed and discussed the usefulness of taking advantage of this opportunity,” stated Mundy.

Beginning Friday, February 28 through Friday March 7th Sheridan Schools will be adding a total of one hour a day for six straight days. Mundy indicated in the let-

ter Sheridan Schools will add 15 minutes to the start of the school day and 45 minutes to the end of each day. Sheridan High School / Middle School will begin at 7:45 a.m. and dismiss at 3:40 p.m. Sheridan Elementary School will begin at 7:40 a.m. and dismiss at 3:35 (car riders), 3:50 p.m. first buses and 3:57 p.m. late buses.

The school district announced buses will pick up students exactly 15 minutes earlier than the existing assigned time.

“We would like to use this opportunity to reclaim some of lost to cover important material for the ISTEP+, IRead, and ECA testing, as well as, general classroom curriculum.

The extension of the school day will only satisfy the make up one day missed. Sheridan will use the Flex Days that were built into

this year’s schedule along with the addition of one day and take advantage of two days that were waived from the D.O.E.

Sheridan received waivers from the D.O.E. for the weather related school cancellation on January 7th and the February 6th cancellation due to the broken water line.

Mundy said, “We realize this is going to be a change of schedule which for some will bring a few

difficult circumstances. Please know we will work to help lessen these scheduling issues as they are presented.” Mundy continued to state, “We are working to rearrange practice schedules, as well as, other programs that will need to be adjusted during the week. We have a great teaching staff and an excellent administrative team who are already putting plans in place to make this time meaningful, beneficial, and useful.”

While fulfilling his duty, “Kilo exemplified bravery and heroism which is why IVMA is pleased to offer the Purple Paw

Award to Kilo this year,” stated Lisa Perius, the executive director of IVMA. Trooper Nathan Abbott was present to accept the award in recognition of Kilo’s work in the line of duty protecting the citizens of Indiana.

Thinking long-term...

Save for today, invest for tomorrow

It's a good thing to have some savings.



When you put the money in a low-risk account, you can be pretty sure it will be readily available when you need it. Nonetheless, "saving" is not "investing" — and knowing the difference could pay off for you far into the future.

Think about it this way: Saving is for today, while investing is for tomorrow.

You need your savings to pay for your daily expenses, such as groceries, and your monthly bills — mortgage, utilities, and so on. In fact, you might even want your savings to include an emergency fund containing six to 12 months' worth of living expenses to pay for unexpected costs, such as a new furnace or a major car repair.

These are all "here and now" expenses — and you could use your savings to pay for them. But in thinking of your long-term goals, such as college for your children and a comfortable retirement for yourself, most individuals typically can't simply rely on their savings — they'll need to invest. Why? Because, quite simply, investments can grow — and you will need this growth potential to help achieve your objectives.

To illustrate the difference between saving and investing, let's do a quick comparison. Suppose you put \$200 per month into a savings account that paid hypothetical 3% interest (which is actually higher than the rates typically being paid today). After 30 years, you would have accumulated about \$106,000, assuming you were in the 25% federal tax bracket. Now, suppose you put that same \$200 per month in a tax-deferred investment that hypothetically earned 7% a year. At the end of 30 years, you would end

up with about \$243,000. (Keep in mind that you would have to pay taxes on withdrawals. Hypotheticals do not include any transaction costs or fees.)

This enormous disparity between the amounts accumulated in the two accounts clearly shows the difference between "saving" and "investing." Still, you might be thinking that investing is risky, while savings accounts carry much less risk. And it is certainly true that investing does involve risks — investments can lose value, and there's no guarantee that losses will be recovered.

Nonetheless, if you put all your money in savings, you're actually incurring an even bigger risk — the risk of not achieving your financial goals. In fact, a low-rate savings account might not even keep up with inflation, which means that, over time, you will lose purchasing power.

Ultimately, the question isn't whether you should save or invest — you need to do both. But you do need to decide how much of your financial resources to devote toward savings and how much toward investments. By paying close attention to your cash flow, you should be able to get a good idea of the best savings and investment mix for your particular situation. For example, if you find yourself constantly dipping into your long-term investments to pay for short-term needs, you probably don't have enough money in savings. On the other hand, if you consistently find yourself with large sums in your savings account even after you've paid all your bills, you might be "sitting" on too much cash — which means you should consider moving some of this money into investments with growth potential.

Saving and investing — that's a winning combination.

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Huskies chew up Northwestern...

Closer to another title

Four down and three to go.
Those are the magic numbers for Hamilton Heights as the Huskies search for a second straight (third in four years) Mid-Indiana Conference championship. Coach Chad Ballenger's club moved a step closer to the title last evening as the Huskies blasted Northwestern, 63-44, at the Husky Dome.

Heights now is 4-0 in the MIC, one game in front of Lewis Cass and Western, both with 5-1 records. Heights has defeated both of those teams.

The Huskies have four games remaining before the sectional, and three of those are conference games. They will play Taylor (4-10) and Peru (5-11) at home and travel to Eastern (2-12).

Northwestern was no match last evening for a Heights team which now stands 13-3 overall on the season and a team which has won eight straight.

"I thought it might be a closer game tonight," Ballenger said. "They have two real good shooters. Our defense did a nice job of slowing them. They worried me a little because they are good at making teams play their game. Our defense was really good tonight.

"We came into the game with a good mind-set," the coach added.

Heights, behind an eight-point quarter by Conley Hoover (a duce and two 3-pointers), took charge early, jumping out to a 15-8 first quarter advantage. The Huskies led 26-18 at halftime.

Northwestern made a little run in the third quarter, pulling to with three, 31-28. Hoover then canned two 3-pointers as the Huskies moved to a 44-35 advantage.

Heights outscored the Tigers 19-9 in the fourth frame.

Hoover poured in 22 points to lead the Huskies in scoring. Also in double figures were Jadon White with 14 points and Hunter Crist with 10.

Heights had a good night shooting the ball. The Huskies were 7-of-12 (Hoover was 5-of-8) from 3-point territory and 20-of-38 overall.

Garrett Paull led Heights on the boards with seven rebounds.

Hamilton Heights' next game is Friday against Taylor at home.

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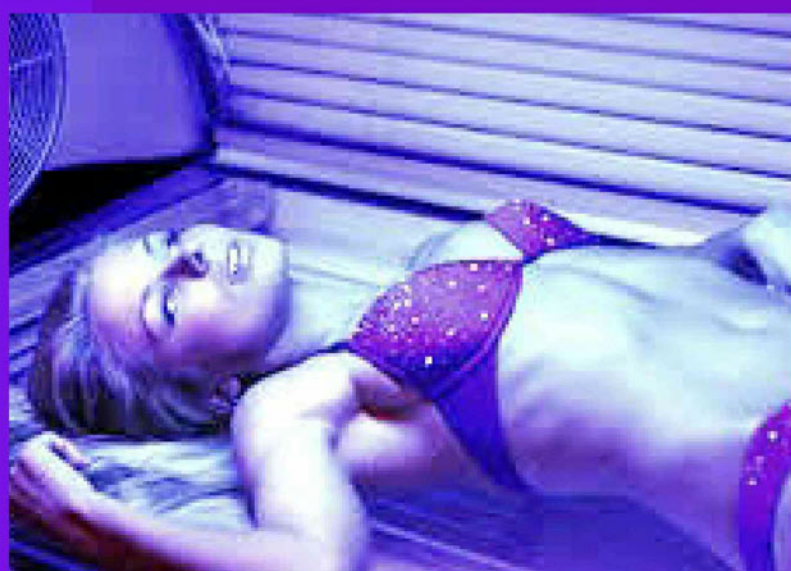
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Fishers up next for Noblesville...

Bearcats stop Millers' win streak

It was an up and down game of runs at The Mill on Tuesday, and the last run went to Lawrence Central.

The Bearcats ended Noblesville's four-game win streak by a score of 64-60. The Millers made a nice run themselves in the third quarter, but LC came back to jump ahead in the fourth period, and thus extend its current winning streak to four.

Noblesville led 15-14 late in the first quarter, then the Bearcats scored 11 straight points. That run gave Lawrence a 25-15 lead midway through the second period, which eventually became a 33-22 lead late

in the quarter. The Millers were able to close the gap to within 33-28 by halftime, with Jack Trittipio getting a couple of layins.

That was a sneak preview for the third period, where Noblesville outscored LC 21-8. Jake Mills scored 11 points, including a pair of 3-pointers, with Sean Wilson and Jordan

Saal each hitting a '3' of their own.

Mills' second '3' of the quarter pushed the Millers ahead 38-37, but LC scored four quick points to jump back ahead 41-38. Noblesville responded by running out the next 11 points; Wilson ended the quarter with an easy layin.

"We just did a fantastic job in the third quarter. We came out, hit some shots, got some stops. We built a nice lead, momentum had swung our way."

But the Bearcats got the momentum back in the fourth quarter, using a 10-2 run to tie the game at 51-51. A 3-pointer put Lawrence ahead 56-54, Wilson tied it back up with a layin. The Bearcats scored a layin of their own, and never trailed again.

"I thought we got a little tentative on offense in the fourth," said McCollough. "I think they said 'Hey, we're going to run.' And so they ran, and we didn't get back. And there was numerous times in the fourth quarter, they just got the ball all the way to the rim with very little resistance."

Mills scored 20 points, with Wilson adding another 13.

Noblesville is now 12-6 for the year, and travels to Fishers on Friday to close Hoosier Crossroads Conference play for the season.
