# Learning about government

Four Noblesville residents had the opportunity to see the state legislature up close by participating in the Adult Page Day program hosted by State Representative Kathy Kream Richardson (R-Noblesville).

The Adult Page Day program, now in its 22nd year, provides Hamilton County residents over the age of 18 with the opportunity to tour the Statehouse, meet public officials and see the legislative process up close. This year's pages were also able to sit in on a House Veterans Affairs and Public Safety Committee meeting, meet with Indiana Secretary of State Connie Lawson and have lunch with Rep. Richardson.

"I host this program every year, so more people can participate in the legislative process. I think it's great for students to participate as pages, but it's also important for adults who missed out on the action the first time around to have an opportunity to be on the House floor for session and see the legislative process in action," said Rep. Richardson. "It offers them the opportunity of seeing everything in person and getting a firmer grasp on what really happens here."

Noblesville natives Steve Dickover and his wife Tori have participated in the program multiple times. They said their interest in the legislative process and keeping up with political issues keeps them coming back.

"It's nice to see the process up close instead of just watching from the public gallery or following it through the news," said Steve. "It's really interesting to see how the legislative process actually works, and I was very surprised at how easy the legislators are to talk to."

Diane Flak, a teacher in Westfield, said she, too, was surprised by the manner of the representatives.


"I really enjoyed meeting Representative Richardson and being able to discuss things in a casual manner," Flak said. "The representatives are people just like us trying to do the best they can for Indiana."

Lisa Ramsey said she was most surprised by how much the representatives depend on each other when it comes to discussing legislation.

The time has come, probably come and gone, that something needs to be done about east/west traffic through Noblesville.

I've been driving these streets for many years (don't ask) and never have I seen Connor Street, Logan Street and Clinton Street in such poor condition.

## Greg Murray: He's the new board chairman

Greg Murray, like so many Americans today, is concerned about the ever-changing health care program.

In other words, Obama Care.

Murray is closer to the situation than most of us. He is the new Chairman of the Board at Riverview Hospital.

A Hamilton County owned Hospital, Riverview is located in Noblesville, and located in the heart of Hamilton County. While owned by the county, Riverview does not receive tax dollars for operating expenses. Board members are appointed by the Hamilton County Commissioners.

Murray, a nine-year member of

the Board of Trustees, replaces Ike Batalis as Chairman. Batalis, before recently retiring, served on the Board for more than 24 years. Murray is a retired banker who spent some time at old Wainwright Bank in Noblesville and worked 42 years for Metro Bank in Carmel. He resided in Noblesville for 23 years before seven years ago moving to Carmel.

The new Chairman has been elected for a one-year term. Murray says he's not out to set records.

"I'm not going to try and break Ike's record," he said.

The new health care laws will affect Riverview.

"Health care is changing," said Murray. "We just don't know what will happen."

"But," he added, "Riverview is well-positioned with our staff, facilities and location."

Riverview Hospital and its clinics serve anyone and everyone, regardless, on occasions, whether or not the patient can pay the bill.

"What may change," suggested Murray, "is now everyone will have their own insurance."

In his nine years as a board member the new women's pavilion has been Riverview's greatest accomplishment.

He doesn't see lots of expansion in the future, but Murray does see Riverview adding more and difference services.

Currently, the hospital has 21 satellite locations. Riverview has a clinic in Tipton and here in

Hamilton County is located in Sheridan, Westfield, Cicero, Noblesville Fishers and Carmel.

"I don't see us expanding at the main campus. I think our expansion will come in the form of clinics and what services we can offer," Murray said.

"We're looking more at Westfield and north towards Sheridan," he said.

The Riverview Hospital Foundation offers great support to the hospital, financially and in other ways.

The Foundation recently gave Riverview \$500,000 for its heart unit.

As one of the largest employers in Hamilton County, Riverview employs nearly 1,200 people.

The Indianapolis District of the Indiana State Police has a new commander.

Jeff Payne was promoted from the rank of First Sergeant to Lieutenant for the district, which is comprised of Marion, Shelby, Boone, Hamilton, Johnson, Hendricks and Hancock counties. State Police Superintendent Douglas Carter promoted Lt. Payne on Sunday; he was selected after competing in a stringent written and oral interview process.

Lt. Payne is a native of Morgan County and a 1984 graduate of Eminence High School. He attended Vincennes University and graduated with an associate’s degree in 1986.

Lt. Payne began his law enforcement career in 1988 upon graduation from the 46th Indiana State Police Academy. He was assigned to the Putnamville Post and patrolled Morgan County until receiving a promotion to Corporal in 2004. In 2005, he was promoted to Sergeant to serve as a District Squad leader in Marion County at the Indianapolis District and in 2011 he was promoted to First Sergeant to serve as assistant commander at the Indianapolis Post.



Lt. Payne will be the District Commander at the Indiana State Police Indianapolis District 52 Post and will be responsible for 85 employees, both enforcement and civilian. He resides with his wife Mischa and three children in Morgan County.

I know, I know, I’ve been told by many of you. The bricks give Logan Street and Clinton Street the mark of a historical area. I don’t believe that. Never believed that. It’s simply a matter of some folks not wanting traffic flowing through their neighborhoods. Don’t we all.

As I look at the historical areas of Noblesville, it appears to me that we have as many homes on Connor and on Maple as we do on Logan and Clinton. I don’t hear residents on Connor and Maple complaining about their historical advantages being lost by traffic, although, I admit, that might be the case to a point.

Pave Logan. Pave Clinton. Add some beautiful, historical looking street lights and those of you who live there, in my opinion, would have a better looking neighborhood, and at the same time reduce your bills on car repair.

Of course, those are short-term answers for what should be long-term planning. The City of Noblesville should join with Hamilton County with plans to build a bypass around the city. That’s the only real answer. It has been the only real answer for years.

And, even if planning started today, it will be years before a bypass can be built.

I don’t believe that a bypass around Noblesville will hurt shopping in the downtown. Might even help. I believe that it is traffic, not parking, that is Noblesville’s biggest problem. Open the downtown to a better traffic flow, I believe, will bring more shoppers to the downtown.

I love the downtown, just as you folks do. I was the first newspaper writer (and still the only) to shout “bloody murder” when Hamilton County hinted it might move its courthouse offices out of the downtown. That would have hurt Noblesville.

But, not so with a bypass. Not so when today Conner Street looks like some of our gravel roads back in the 1950s. Not so when during high traffic periods cars are backed up from Riverview Hospital to Jim Dandy.

That’s long range. It has been long range in my lifetime in Noblesville.

Short term, come on State and come on City, you’ve got to do something about the poor conditions of our east/west streets.

Now. Please.

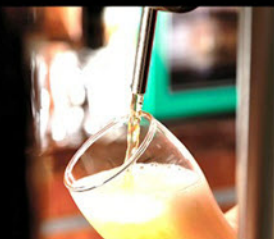

# Guerin's Rapp, Holba

Some high schools, following basketball games, will pick a Player of the Game. That would have been a tough assignment Wednesday evening in the Eagles Nest as Coach Pete Smith's Guerin Catholic crew defeated a fired-up Scecina team, 73-61.

How about Matt Holba, the 6-6 junior, a forward who in this game turned into a Rick Mount? Holba hit 6-of-8 shots from 3-point range, including four straight in the third quarter and including a shot from the other end of the court to end the quarter. For the night, Holba finished with 26 points. His six 3-pointers tied a school record.

Or, how about Whit Rapp, the best assist player in the state? Rapp dished out 18 assists, four more than what had been his own school single game record.

"Holba has been working on his shooting," Smith said after the game. "Last

season (at Chesterton) he was more of a guy who played with his back to the basket.

"Rapp is a player who looks pass first and then for a shot," Smith added.

Holba, who didn't shoot a 3-pointer in the first half and scored only six points in the opening two periods, was on fire the final two frames.

Rapp got all but four of Guerin's 22 assists. The night before, in a game at Terre Haute South, the Eagles tied a single game school team record with 28 assists.

Don't go away, basketball fans. There is more.

Holba finished with a double-double by collecting 14 rebounds. Rapp, who didn't score in the first three quarters, poured in nine points in the fourth quarter when Guerin Catholic still was battling for its life. He hit 7-of-8 free throws in the period.

Guerin, playing down the stretch with a slim lead, wanted to get Rapp to the line. He's hitting 90 percent of his free throws.

Smith was happy with his team's 17-of-23 performance at the line.

"Two games we lost this season we lost at the line," he said.

But, even with Rapp and Holba doing great things and Cris Burrough (16) and Aaron Brennan (12) also scoring in double figures, this wasn't an easy win for the now 16-3 Golden Eagles. Far from it.

Scecina led 23-22 at halftime. That was before Guerin Catholic scored 51 points in the second half.

"We struggled a little around the basket," Smith said. "We struggled with finishing. And, I was a little frustrated with some of our decision making.

"It was a tough match-up for us," Smith continued. "Scecina was quick. We did have good energy, despite getting home late last evening after a game in Terre Haute.

"Now, we've got a third game Friday against a good Pendleton Heights team. It's

our last home game and Senior Night. This placed with be packed. Packed and rocking," Smith said.

# Boys swim tourney starts tonight

The boys swimming post-season begins tonight with the sectional preliminaries.

One team that's definitely excited for the tournament to begin is Hamilton Southeastern. The Royals are ranked No. 2 in the state, and are ready to prove that they are a state championship contender - which they are. Southeastern hosts sectionals this year, and Fishers will also be there.

The Royals are top-seeded in every event at sectional for the prelims. In the individual races, Luke Johnson has the first seed in the 200 and 100 freestyles, Joseph Young leads the heat sheets in the individual medley and backstroke, while Jackson Russell is first on the lists for the butterfly and breaststroke. Quinn Teague is the 50 free's top seed, and Nick Pfanstiel is seeded first in the 500 free. Southeastern is also the top seed in all three relays.

As for diving, Cody Coldren is the returning state runner-up. Coldren scored a school-record 393.60 points in a SIX-DIVE event on Jan. 21, which automatically made him a state contender. The diving prelims are on Saturday morning.

Fishers has three second seeds: Brad Jacobs in the 200 free and butterfly, and Luke Ingram in the IM. The Tigers are ranked 21st in the state.

Noblesville will host its sectional this year, with Carmel, Hamilton Heights and Westfield also there. The Greyhounds are ranked sixth in the state and are always a threat at the state meet.

Carmel has seven top seeds, with Reilly Garman leading the lists of the 200 and 500 freestyles. Benjamin Burdick is the 100 free's top seed, Cole Highum is ranked first in the breaststroke and the 'Hounds also own the top seeds in all three relays.

The 20th-ranked Shamrocks will make some noise as well. Westfield's top seeds are Nathan-
