Sonny Beck named NAMA's...

Agribusiness Leader of the Year

The National Agri-Marketing Association has announced that Sonny Beck, president of Atlanta-based Beck's Hybrids, is the group's 2014 Agribusiness Leader of the Year.

NAMA announced this on its blog, NAMAblog.org, on Tuesday. The award is NAMA's highest honor and will be presented at the Opening General Session of the 2014 Agri-Marketing Conference, "A Fresh Perspective," April 10 in Jacksonville, Fla. NAMA said the award honors outstanding leaders in agribusiness, education, government service or other agribusiness related

areas who exemplify excellence in agribusiness by their significant contributions to the industry.

Beck's is the largest family-owned seed company in the United States and the sixth largest seed company in the U.S. Under Sonny Beck's leadership, the company has experienced a 20 percent increase in sales each year for the last 20 years, doubling in size every four years.

Beck joined the family operation in 1964 after graduating from Purdue University. He immediately launched a couple of customer events that are now long-standing

traditions and that same year, started what is now called the Practical Farm Research (PFR)® program. Focused on farmer's needs, hundreds of studies are completed at five Beck's locations in an effort to look at how different management practices perform in different environments. The participants in this year's primary election are now known. Some face contests May 6 while others "have it made" without opposition. The campaign has begun, but won't be highly visible until after Spring Break and the close of the current legislative session.

At this stage candidates involved in contests are trying to line up supporters to help them and making decisions on campaign material and in some cases raising money to cover expenses. Advertising and door-to-door work will begin in early to mid-April.

Now, about that session of the legislature. I'm betting there are some Republicans who will wish there hadn't been a session this year. For one things, they're not sure where the majority of Hoosiers stand on gay marriage and they don't want to be on the wrong side of history on this one.

Then the governor stirred a hornet's nest with his plan to eliminate business personal property taxes without saying where lost revenue could be made up. This brought protest from local governments including Noblesville. Now the administration indicates state funds will somehow be provided to soften the blow.

I suspect the Chamber of Commerce got the governor into this one saying the business tax was discouraging new business. Actually Indiana has a friendly tax environment for business, and it's the local governments including schools that are discouraged by the tax laws.

Mass transit legislation seems to be on the road to some kind of resolution this year, but if local residents find themselves paying more mon-

Open house for residents March 25...

Fishers ready for train site plans

Now that the proposed redevelopment of Fishers' downtown train station site has been cleared, the town is asking its residents: What do you want to see there?

Fishers announced on its town Web site that a public open house has been set for 6 to 8 p.m. Tuesday, March 25 at the Town Hall Auditorium, 1 Municipal Drive. Residents will

get the chance to learn more about the project, and also get to offer their suggestions for how the space should be utilized.

"The residents of Fishers have asked for a vibrant, walkable downtown and we have made great strides towards developing the Nickel Plate District," Scott Fadness, Fishers town manager, was quoted as saying on the

Web site's press release about the public forum. "The train station plaza is an important piece of the puzzle, and we look forward to hearing from the residents what they would like to see in the new space."

The \$28 million project will include an enhanced train platform and pedestrian plaza.

Build a roundabout...

Help the environment?

One of the incentives behind Carmel's embracing of roundabouts has been the safety factor. Studies have shown that roundabouts significantly reduce collisions, injuries and worse at intersections.

But can roundabouts help the environment? Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard thinks so, as the City's Web site announced that Brainard finished up the second regional outreach gathering of the President's Task Force on Climate

Preparedness and Resiliency, which took place recently in Los Angeles.

"Carmel has emerged as a leader among cities for its aggressive installation of more time-saving and gas-saving roundabouts than any city in the United States, one of many environmentally-friendly measures the city has taken," the city said in a press release on the Web site.

The release noted that Brainard received recognition from Los Angeles Mayor Eric

Garcetti when he was interviewed on ABC's "This Week with George Stephanopolous."

"So, we're Americans, we adapt, we innovate, we're good at doing those sorts of things," Garcetti said. "But, you know, whether it's Mayor Brainard in Carmel, Indiana changing out stop intersections and making them roundabouts to take global warming, CO2 emissions out of the air, or Mayor Becker

Cold weather next week...

River expected to crest today

As expected, the White River at Noblesville burst above flood stage on Friday. The River's gage at Conner Street jumped over the minor flood level of 14 feet Friday morning, rising around eight feet in a 24-hour period. The massive snow melt was mostly to blame, although storms that blew through Central Indiana Thursday evening also had some part in the elevated water.

The river level's rise slowed down during Friday, but the water is still expected to rise until this morning, when the National Weather Service forecasts the White River at Noblesville to crest at 16.7 feet. After that, the river will slowly drop, and is expected to fall below flood stage Sunday afternoon.

There is a 50 percent chance of snow Saturday night and Sunday morning, but no huge accumulations are expected. It is hoped that the water will recede before the weekend, as next week's temperatures are forecast to be cold, again. Highs will be in the 20s all week, with lows dropping into the single digits later in the week. Bundle up for temperatures of 9 on Wednesday night and 7 on Thursday night.

in Salt Lake City making sure his buildings are built in a green way. Mayors, tribal leaders, governors are really taking action now because we can't afford to deal with the consequences."

Carmel has around 60 roundabouts in the city limits. Since roundabouts allow for quicker movement through intersections, there is less idling time than there would be at a stoplight - which means cars are giving out less exhaust when driving through the city. Roundabouts also take out the need for electric stoplights, saving energy that way.

"In December, the city of Carmel hosted the first meeting of the panel outside of Washington, in part due to the city's reputation nationally as a city that adheres to smart growth principles," the release said. "(Mayor Brainard) is using his seat on the Task Force to continue sharing his ideas on environmental stewardship combined with creating jobs and improving the quality of life. He will also continue to advocate for sensible federal policies and programs that not only combat global warming but also protect cities and the economy from too much government overreach."

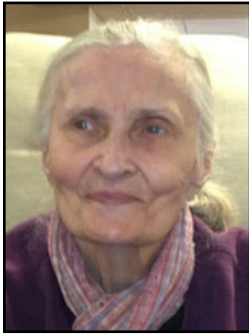
February 8, 1928 - February 15, 2014

Ingeburg H. Hathaway, 86, Noblesville

Born February 8, 1928 in Gera, Germany our Mom passed February 15, 2014 and oh how we are going to miss her.

Growing up in Germany with her parents and two older brothers, who all spoiled her terribly; she studied to be a kindergarten teacher and childcare nurse. She had a flare for fashion and color and loved to copy the dresses worn by famous people that resulted in a love hate relationship with the sewing machine. She was until the day she passed naturally beautiful with high cheek bones, flawless skin and soft and gentle eyes. Outwardly she was beautiful but inwardly she was a thousand times more so.

As a young woman wanting for a better life, Mom left her family and escaped occupied Germany. She had experienced bombings and air raid shelters, helping those in need to run faster for their survival. It was a hard life during and after the war but Mom and her parents worked tirelessly to provide for themselves and to help those less fortunate with food and anything they could spare. This explained why our Mother scraped every drop of oil from the wax paper packaging the butter. Mom lost her brother Hans in the war and she forever wondered if he was still alive. Uncle Kurt wore an eye patch after the war as shrapnel took his sight in one eye. Mom lost her last living relative in Germany about five years ago.



After the war in West Germany, Mom met the most handsome American soldier, Richard Hathaway. Dad remained the love of her life...no matter what that man did to challenge her devotion. A day doesn't go by that we don't miss him too. He passed in 2007. Being a career serviceman we traveled to many interesting places around the world and Mom was in charge of packing our home and then recreating another cozy atmosphere. She was a master at making ends meet. She could make a delicious meal out of few ingredients and she kept us in the latest styles with that awful sewing machine. When times were hard and bills piled up Mom found a way to once again make us debt free. She was amazing.

Mom was a homemaker always but she did devote 33 years as a furrier for Davidson Fur Company in Indianapolis. She insisted that a fur was practical in that it would keep you warmer than any other coat. As kids, when we were sick, we slept on the coat she made for herself. She would sit on the couch, lay the fur under us and then softly rub our heads on her lap. She was the proud grandmother of Ashley, Christopher and David. She was especially close to Ashley since they lived next door to one another and having her to care for enriched Mom's life and certainly Ashley's as well.

After Dad passed we spent more time with Mom and noticed her memory was severely declining. The real proof that Mom had an issue was when everything was not spotless and in its place. Mom was in the beginning stages of Alzheimer's. We were all in denial, with again Mom leading the charge in this effort, but we and she soon came to silently accept this would be Mom's journey. Mom moved to Prairie Lakes Health Campus in Noblesville where a group of caregiving angels worked with us to provide Mom the best of care for three years. Mom never changed and remained the kind, giving and gentle soul she will forever be. She did not suffer as pneumonia took her last ounce of strength.

As Mom aged she certainly didn't look her age. Just recently a new nurse and a family member of a resident were commenting on her beauty. Throughout her life Mom was embarrassed but secretly loving all the compliments. We think her favorite compliment was when she was asked "are you sisters" and she said "oh no....(trying to hold back a huge grin).... I'm her mother". We would find ways to repeat compliments to her because it made her light up with a happiness that she deserved. She was delightful, insightful - always one step ahead of us kids, and she was forgiving. We are looking forward to the day when the tears stop and the memories bring us the strength and the smiles we could always count on as a result of our Mom. The town press release said that it will "include ticket windows, public restrooms and better Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessibility."

"Residents can also expect plaza seating and bike racks, while the platform will accommodate future mass transit needs. In addition to incorporating Fishers' rail history, Town officials are planning other historical references and will seek ideas from residents," the press release continued.

"Town officials, project developers and involved community organizations will be on hand to discuss the project, answer resident questions and collect feedback. Public input has been vital to the development of the Nickel Plate District master plan introduced in Dec. 2012, and will continue to play a role as the Town of Fishers puts the finishing touches on the public spaces."

With an obscure party rule, they have divided up Hamilton County into delegate districts from which state party convention delegates will be elected. The county elections office has always done this in the past.

And the new division does not provide equal representation for all parts of the county. In the past each township elected a number of delegates proportionate to the number of votes cast in a township in the last election.

Why the change? Could be a fear that the Tea Party has filed numerous candidates for delegates in certain areas, and the "realignment" will reduce their influence in the state party convention in June. (There have been a record number of filings for delegate this year.)

US 31 restrictions upcoming in Carmel

The Indiana Department of Transportation announced the following restrictions and closure related to the impending U.S. 31 construction in Carmel:

Restriction on eastbound I-465 this weekend, Feb. 21-24

Crews have planned to temporarily restrict the right and center lanes on eastbound I-465 near US 31 for pavement repair on the bridge over US 31. This start-

ed Friday evening. Both lanes are expected to reopen by 6 a.m. on Monday, Feb. 24. The exit ramp from eastbound I-465 to US 31 will remain open during the lane restrictions.

Lane restrictions continue on 103rd Street near US 31

Up to two lanes on westbound 103rd Street east of US 31 will remain restricted for the next couple of weeks while crews

continue to work on a nearby water main. All lanes of westbound 103rd Street east of US 31 will not be fully closed as indicated in the previous newsletter.

Closure on 131st Street/Main Street to begin on or after March 10

Beginning on or after March 10, crews expect to close 131st Street/Main Street on

either side of US 31. This closure will stretch to Illinois Street to the west and Pennsylvania Street to the east and will allow crews to prepare for future construction of an interchange over US 31. This closure is expected to remain in place through the fall. During this time, motorists will not have access to US 31 via 131st Street/Main Street.

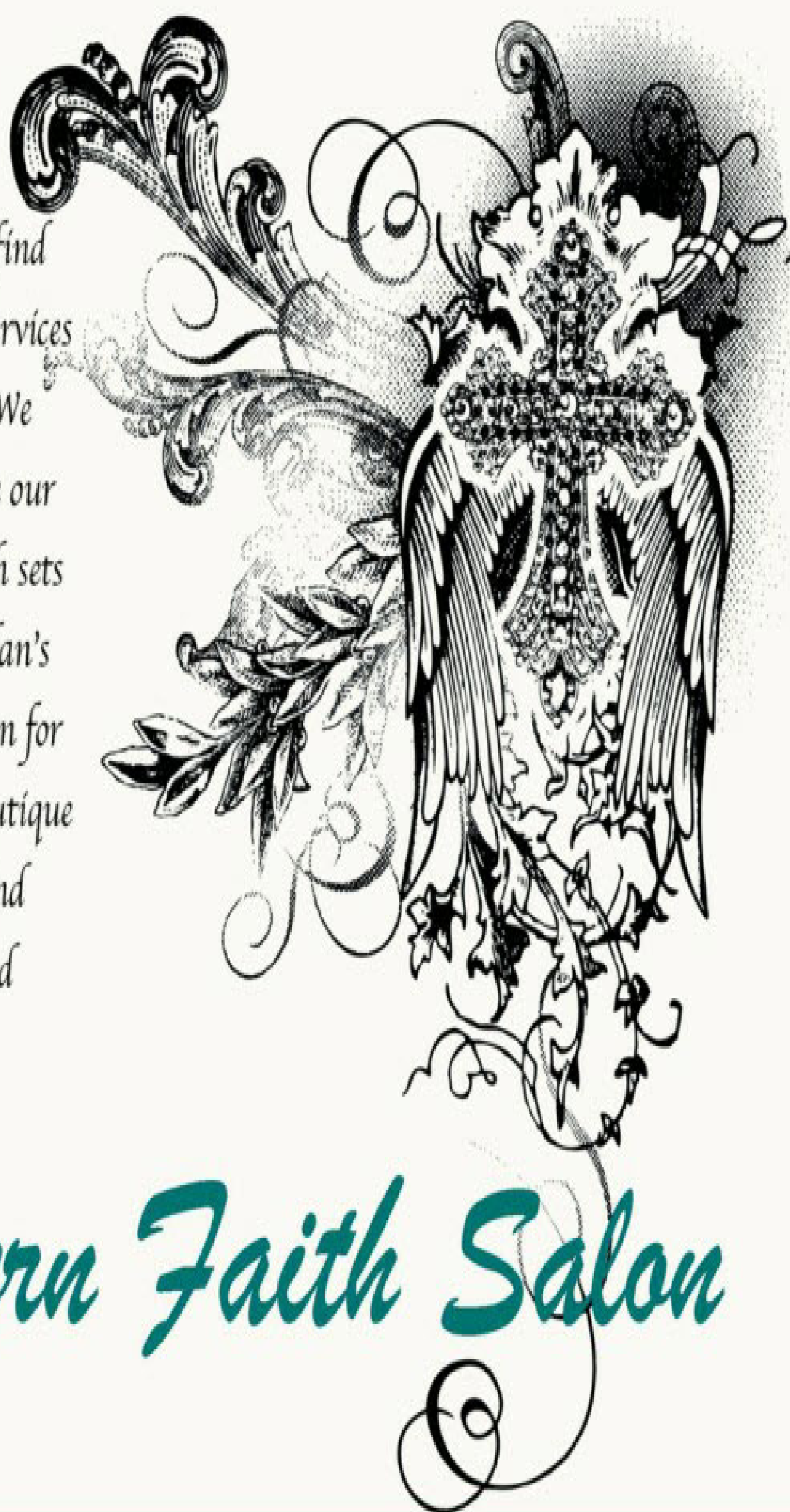

Yes, the Millers did win

High school basketball, in losses and in wins, can drive folks nuts. Folks being people like coaches; people like fans. One never knows what a group of teenagers wearing short pants might do on any given night.

Take, for example, Noblesville’s 58-54 Hoosier Crossroads Conference victory Friday evening at Fishers.

*After hitting 21-of-39 shots from the field in the first three quarters, the Millers went 0-5 shooting the pill in the final frame.

*After committing zero turnovers in the first half, Noblesville had nine in the final two periods. Two nearly cost Noblesville the game when, on one, the Millers couldn’t get the ball across the 10-second line in time, and on the other they couldn’t toss the ball in-bounds within the allotted five seconds.

*With leading scorer Jake Mills sitting out a suspension, Jordan Saal got the start and led the team in scoring with 17 points. He had scored only 43 points through Noblesville’s first 18 games.

*After hitting just 1-3 free throws in the first three quarters, Noblesville was 10-of-13 in the fourth period

Get the picture?
Still, a win is a win is a win, and Noblesville’s win last evening wrapped up for the Millers a third place finish in the conference.

It wasn’t easy for Noblesville, but you’ve got to give Coach Joe Leonard’s Tigers some of the credit for making the final minutes a nightmare for the visitors. The Tigers trailed by 15, 33-18, at halftime. They trailed by 10, 48-38, after three periods. Then, with less than a minute to play, Fishers missed a shot which would have tied the game.

And, you’ve got to give Noblesville credit for pulling out the win. As Coach Dave McCollough said, “We made the defensive stops when we had to. We hit 10-of-13 free throws in the fourth quarter.

Saal, a 5-11 senior guard, was the story of the night for Noblesville. The Millers would not have won without his performance, highlight by 6-of-7 shooting from the field and 3-of-3 popping from 3-point land.

“Saal had a really nice game,” said McCollough. “He’s one of these guys who everyday comes to work ready to play.”

McCollough had to be smiling a mile wide at halftime after watching his team play errorless ball in the first half. All of that changed in the second half.

“We had no turnovers in the first half,” McCollough said. “In the second half we made three or four passes we never should have thrown. There was no need to throw those passes.”

Noblesville didn’t score in the second half until Justin Pegues canned a free throw with 4:57 left, giving his team a 49-42 lead at the time.

Fishers pulled to within two points on a four-point play by Devin Chaudion with 4:10 left.

Two free throws by Saal put Noblesville up 52-48. A 3-point shot by Keegan Kollmeyer got the Tigers within one, 52-51, with 58 seconds on the clock.

In the final minute Pegues hit three free throws and in the final 26 seconds John Kiser drilled three charity shots, and Noblesville walked out of the building with a win.

Pegues scored 13 points and Kiser added 12 to join Saal in double figures. Jack Trittipio had a strong game with nine points and 10 rebounds. Kiser collected six boards.

After a slow start, Chaudion had another outstanding night for Fishers with 21 points. Cam Wolter notched 12; Lance Dollison 11 and Kollmeyer 10.

A key to Noblesville’s win was a 29-20 advantage on the boards.

The Millers closed their conference season with a 7-2 mark, having lost only to state-ranked (No. 3) Hamilton Southeastern and No.5 rated Brownsburg. Overall Noblesville is 13-6 on the year and will take that mark to a regular season finale with Lebanon at The Mill next Friday.

Fishers fell to 7-12 overall. The Tigers will close at home against Harrison on Friday.

Eagles finish unbeaten at home

Senior point guard Whit Rapp hit a 3-point field goal to start the game and Guerin Catholic Boys Basketball never trailed, defeating Pendleton Heights 47-32. It marks the first time in school history Coach Pete Smith's Guerin Catholic team has finished undefeated at home in a regular season in the eight years of playing varsity basketball.

Before a standing-room only crowd on Senior Night in the Eagles Nest Friday night, the Golden Eagles (17-3) led 14-9 at the first quarter break and 21-13 at halftime. "It was a good team effort tonight. They (Pendleton) are so good with their motion offense and ball screens. I thought we did a real nice job," said GC's Smith. "I thought we were disciplined at both ends of the floor tonight."

Aaron Brennan was a force to be reckoned with all night. The 6'6" senior had a dozen points and led an overwhelming 30-13 rebounding advantage with one less that the entire Pendleton Heights team with 12. Two other Golden Eagles were in double figures in scoring , as junior Matt Holba scored 13 points and sophomore sharpshooter Munson finished with 11. To no surprise Rapp took only the two shots to start each half to score five points while passing out seven assists. Cris Burrough had a solid performance with a half-dozen points and a half-dozen rebounds.

Sophomore Kenton Dunham scored 15 of the other 16 points the Arabians had besides McDermott's 16.

The Golden Eagles will finish the regular season Tuesday night as they travel to play Ft. Wayne Bishop Luers (9-9).

Wrestling state finals...

Five advance to quarter-finals

Five Hamilton County wrestlers advanced to the quarter-finals at the IHSAA state wrestling meet Friday night at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

First up were two Hamilton Southeastern athletes. Sophomore 113-pounder Austin Holmes won his opener with a 6-3 decision over Bellmont's John Becker. A little later, junior Jack Chastain advanced in the 126-pound bracket, beating Fort Wayne Northrop's Logan Aldrich 7-3.

Another county wrestler moved on at 126, Westfield's AJ Belden. The senior got a decision victory over Elkhart Memorial's Anthony Vaughn, by the score of 6-1.

Fishers' 145-pound senior Jordan Lile won by pin, getting the call over Princeton's Korbin Karges at the 3:35 mark of his first round match. Finally, Westfield senior Michael Steele got a 152-pound win, edging Tylor Willms of Fremont 4-3.

All five winning wrestlers will compete in the quarter-finals, which begin at 9:30 a.m. today at Bankers Life. Semi-finals and wrestlebacks immediately follow those matches. The consolation matches for third, fifth and seventh places start at 5 p.m., then the championship matches take place under the lights beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Eight other county wrestlers competed at state, all falling in the first round. At 106, Carmel senior Karl Wilhelm lost to Mount Vernon Posey's Paul Konrath in a 24-10 major decision. Wilhelm finished his season at 33-7. Another Greyhound senior, Eli Carlson, fell to Kokomo's Chad Gaddis in a 10-6 152-pound decision. Carlson ended his year at 33-6.

Southeastern senior Edrece Stansberry dropped a 5-0 decision to East Noble's Connor Knapp, completing his year at 24-4. Two more Royals also fell on Friday night by pin: 220-pounder Georges Brantley lost in 2:53 to Lake Central's Gelen Robinson, while Chet Maxey lost a 285-pound match to Merrillville's Shawn Streck in 2:51. Brantley finished the year 26-10, while Maxey ended at 28-14.

Fishers senior Lance Syverson fell to Evansville Reitz' Joshua Davis at 132 pounds by major decision, 13-3. Syverson ended his year at 23-8. Westfield senior Dillon Eldred lost by tech fall to Lowell's Drew Hughes 16-0 at 138 pounds, finishing at 39-4. Noblesville senior Ben Elliott dropped a 7-0 match to Western's Corey Hinkle at 182 pounds, completing his year at 32-9.

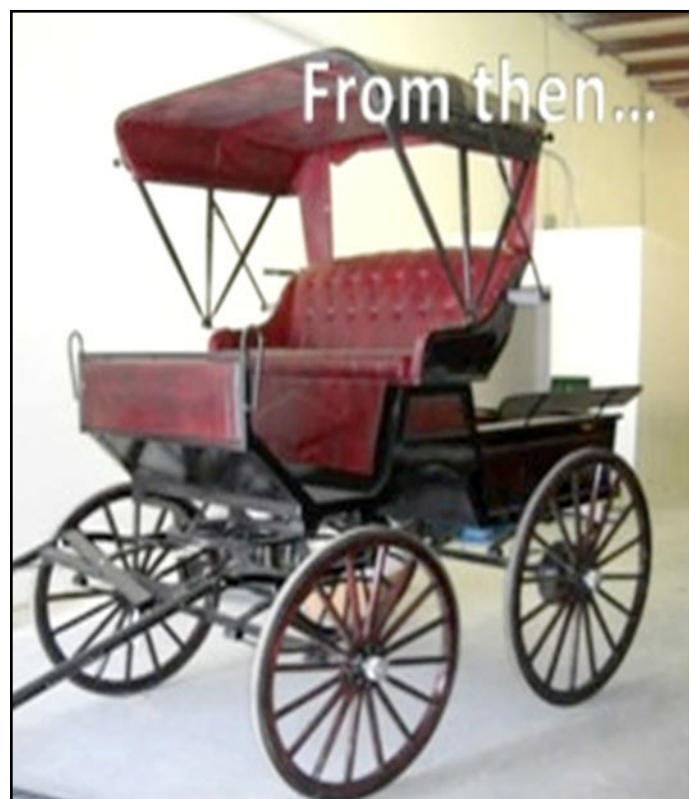
