Eyesore soon to be gone

Foundry is back

The old Noblesville Foundry on South Eighth Street is back.

Actually, what may be a surprise to Noblesville residents who drive South Eighth, the foundry never went away.

ID Castings LLC officials have told the City of Noblesville that it will invest \$51.4 million to overhaul a business which once stood just a notch under Firestone as being the leading industry in the city.

But, plant manager Jack Kruse Tuesday evening told the Noblesville Common Council the foundry has been operating with

a limited staff, and that the foundry has not been closed.

“Only for about three months, in 1989, was the plant closed,” Kruse told the Hamilton County Reporter.

That – the foundry being a working foundry – was the main reason ID Castings

choice Noblesville for its new facility, Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear said.

Landing the foundry in Noblesville is a big “home run” for the Ditslear administration as the Mayor has led a challenge of restoring old Eighth Street and

Fishers policeman saves boy's life...

Community Hospital ER Doctor Aids Rescue

Fishers Police Department has issued a news release indicating on Saturday, February 22nd, a Fishers police officer saved the life of a 12 year old boy after he collapsed during a basketball game at Fishers Junior High School.

Sergeant Troy Fettingter was conducting a security check at the Fishers Junior High School during

a recreational league basketball game when he observed a 12 year old boy collapse while playing basketball.

Sergeant Fettingter immediately ra-

died for medics and additional police officers. Fettingter rushed onto the court and found the boy was unresponsive and not breathing.

Also at the game was Doctor Jason Hollingsworth, an emergency room physician for Community Hospital. Hollingsworth also works at Community's Heart and Vascular Hospital.

Hollingsworth's son was playing

on the opposing team.

Hollingsworth said, 'It was about five minutes into the game when Joel Tsetse collapsed. Initially I noticed some

seizure type activity and he wasn't breathing properly then we lost his pulse and we started CPR.' That is when Fishers police officer Troy Fettingter ran to his police vehicle, retrieved his Automated External Defibrillator (AED), and returned to the boy.

The Fishers Police Department's news release indi-

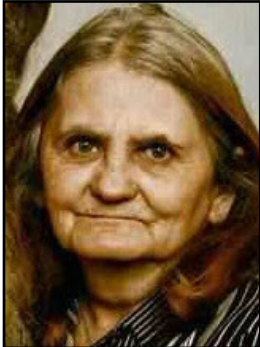

the beautification of an area which long has been an eyesore to the south side of Noblesville.

ID Casting has been given a three-year abatement on personal property taxes, tied to a \$1 million in manufacturing equipment it plans to install.

The abatement will save the company approximately \$1.3 million in taxes.

“That’s one reason why they decided to come here,” Mayor Ditslear told The Reporter. “Another reason is that we spent \$71,000 from a federal grant on an environment study of soil and groundwater on the site. That saved ID Casting more money.

“But,” said Ditslear, “the main reason is they wanted a working foundry.”

“That was important,” Kruse said. “That is a much better financial move than having to go out and build a new facility.”

Some of the old facility will be demolished. The company plans to tear down three of the buildings located on the 14-acre site.

The company has 27 workers at the site and it plans to add another 25 with an average salary of \$35,000.

“The property has been an eyesore for years,” said Noblesville Economic Development Director Judi Johnson.

The foundry dates back to the 1800s, and originally was housed in downtown Noblesville before being moved to the Eighth Street location.

“There was a time when many young men graduating from Noblesville High

School went either to Firestone or the foundry,” Ditslear said.

One of those young men was Steve Wood, who as a member of the Common Council last evening listened to first Johnson and then Kruse speak.

“I had a college degree and a family to support, and I had no job at that time,” Wood said. “It was a great place to work.”

A check of the ID Castings web-site by the Reporter revealed the following:

“From the plant’s beginning crafting cast iron bathtubs by hand to today’s high precise automated melt and molding equipment, the plant and it people have always satisfied our customer’s desire for price, value and performance.

“Today, molds are produced using world-standard disamatic high speed

molding machines that create castings of fine derail quickly and economically. The staff at ID Castings is well experienced utilizing disamatic machines to produce iron castings commonly used in the automotive, construction and heavy equipment industries.

“Unlike many foundries with such equipment, ID Castings encourages prospective customers that require smaller quantities, prototype production runs or service part supplies. While our facility is fully capable of producing more than 1,000,000 or more individual castings per year for each of our customers, we also understand the needs of builders and manufacturers that may need as few as 500 pieces at a time.”

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US 31 to close between Old Meridian, 136th streets

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) today announced plans to accelerate construction that will remove stoplights from the U.S. 31 commute in Hamilton County.

Early utility relocations and cleared right-of-way will allow the previously planned closure of U.S. 31 between Old Meridian Street and 136th Street in Carmel to begin on or after Friday, April 4, 2014. U.S. 31 will reopen to traffic before Thanksgiving 2014 as construction on the corridor continues through the end of 2015.

Closing U.S. 31 in 2014 for construction provides benefits for motorists and construction crews that are anticipated to outweigh the inconveniences, including:

- Improving work zone safety while elevation changes are made for new bridges at 126th Street/Carmel Drive, 131st Street/Main Street and 136th Street
- Shortening the closure duration to eight months, compared to approximately ten months if the closure were to happen during 2015

Balancing traffic impacts of overpass and interchange construction across 2014 and 2015

Removing traffic signals from 8 miles of U.S. 31 through Carmel and Westfield by the end of 2014

Allowing INDOT to honor its commitment to open the New U.S. 31 Hamilton County freeway to traffic by the end of 2015

There will be two open houses, first on March 18 at the Carmel High School freshman cafeteria. Enter through door 13.

On March 19, the second open house takes place at the Westfield Middle School cafeteria. Use the north main entrance.

Both open houses last from 5:30 to 8 p.m., with the presentations at 6 p.m.

US 31 frontage road closed March 7-10

Beginning at 6 p.m. on Friday, March 7, the Frontage Road on the west side of US-31 south of Carmel Drive will be closed at a point just north of the Ritz Charles by the Meridian Medical Plaza for the installation of a new storm sewer. The road will be open to traffic by 6 a.m. on Monday, March 10.

This work is weather dependent. Detour routes will be posted in advance of the closure.

Access to the properties south of the closure will be provided from Illinois Street.

Hamilton Heights sets 2014-15 school calendar

Hamilton Heights School Corporation has set its school calendar for the 2014-15 year. The calendar, approved by the Hamilton Heights School Board at its February 20, 2014 meeting, sets the first day of school for students at August 4, 2014 and the last day at June 3, 2015.

“The recommended revisions to next year’s calendar were made to accommodate the third grade I-Read Test which had problematic dates this year,” explained Dr. Derek Arrowood, Superintendent, Hamilton Heights School Corporation. “In addition, the revised calendar makes Martin Luther King Day a Flex Day, adjusts the March

Personnel Development Day (PDD), allows for May ISTEP administration, and helps keep Heights’ spring break dates in line with other Hamilton County.

Schools, students and faculty will still have the extended fall and spring breaks. There are three days built into the calendar to allow for inclement weather. Any additional lost days will be added to the end of the calendar and made up in June 2015.

“These enhancements, recommended by our leadership team after careful review and input, will enable us to continue to investigate the positive aspects of a balanced calendar continuity one of which

allows for no more than six weeks of classes without a break for students and teachers,” noted Dr. Arrowood.

Dr. Arrowood also said that in the fall of 2014 a committee made up of parents, teachers, and administrators will use data gathered from the 2013-2014 school year to create a calendar for 2015-2016 school year. This committee will thoroughly investigate both the positive and negative aspects of the balanced calendar with the goal of creating the best possible calendar for our students.”

“Hamilton Heights School Corporation’s 2013-2014 calendar had

enough built in make-up days that adding additional time to the school day is not necessary to have students complete the academic calendar prior to the June 7, 2014 graduation date,” he continued. However, if future cancellations are necessary during the 2013-2014 school year HHSC will investigate adding time to the school day to make up days lost because of cancellations. There are no plans to move the 2013-2014 graduation date.”

Sheriff’s Office Hosts Information on Social Media Issues

Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen invites area residents and concerned citizens to a public education forum on Teen Social Media. The meeting will be held at the Hamilton County 4H Fairgrounds on Monday, March 10, from 7:00-8:00PM. Detective Alex Petty and Detective Kija Ireland will be the main facilitators in bringing this important topic to a clearer view and presenting ideas on protecting area families. Options for parental control, restrictions, and tracking software will also be explored during the session.

From a relatively small number of incidents in past years, social media crimes have risen to over 100 reported cases annually in Hamilton County alone. Social media has become part of the daily life of most teens but also leads to a source of anxiety as well as crime. Cyberbullying, sexting, identity theft, stalking, questionable games, inappropriate photos, and other offenses are all increasing due to the explosion of technological advances. Teens are using a multitude of sites and programs, including Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, YouTube, and Kik, and the variety of choices increases almost daily. Even school issued technology or Xbox and PlayStation lend themselves to abuse and misconduct if used inappropriately. Many parents are overwhelmed with the difficulties in managing technology, learning the language teens use, and keeping up to date with rapid advances.

The Teen Social Media forum will help parents focus on identifying misuse of social media, from ways to prevent abuse to dealing with the aftermath of an incident. While the primary target is families with teens, information provided will be applicable to everyone. Parents with younger children who are concerned about the future as well as adults who may have to deal with social media issues will come away with valuable recommendations. Parents are encouraged to bring middle school age children and older. Free child care will be provided for preschool and elementary age children. Representatives from Verizon Wireless, Prevail Victim Assistance, the Hamilton County Prosecutor’s Office, and the Hamilton County Council on Alcohol and Other Drugs will be in attendance as will several organizations that sponsor youth activities in Hamilton County.

Operation Pull Over begins February 28

Just as basketball is stirring up a great deal of activity this March, more than 250 Indiana law enforcement agencies are planning to launch action of their own as part of Operation Pull Over. Beginning Friday, February 28 and running through Sunday, March 23, the Indiana State Police will be among those agencies and will initiate a major enforcement effort to crack down on impaired and dangerous driving. The enforcement effort will include saturation patrols and sobriety checkpoints throughout the entire state.

“We will have a strong and visible police presence aimed at deterring dangerous driving and getting impaired drivers off Hoosier highways,” said Doug Carter, ISP Superintendent. “If you plan to drink alcohol - don’t drive. Designate a sober driver.”

During the same February 28 through March 23 time period in 2013, there were a total of 388 crashes

on Hoosier roadways where alcohol and/or illegal drugs were considered a contributing circumstance in the crash. Of those, 114 involved injury with 158 persons injured and four crashes involved fatalities killing four.

Superintendent Carter recommends these easy steps for a safe March and St. Patrick’s Day:

- Plan a safe way home before the festivities begin.
- Before drinking, designate a sober driver and leave your car keys at home.
- If you’re impaired, use a taxi, call a sober friend or family member, or use public transportation.
- If available, use your community’s sober ride program.
- If you see a drunk driver on the road, contact local police.
- If you know someone who is about to drive while impaired, take the keys and help them make safe travel arrangements.

Carmel Police arrest Arby’s armed robbery suspect

On Friday, February 21st, 2014, Carmel Police Department Criminal Investigations Division arrested Emanuel J. England, a black male, 23 years old for Armed Robbery (IC 35-42-5-1(1) / B-Felony. This arrest stemmed from an armed robbery that occurred on September 17th, 2013 at the Arby’s restaurant located at 1224 South Rangeline Road in Carmel, IN. Through an extensive investigation, England was linked to the crime through DNA confirmation and other related evidence. England was arrested at 1028 Clubhouse Court (Apt. #6) in Carmel, IN. England was later transported to the Hamilton County Jail and bond was set at \$25,000.

cated Sergeant Fettinger placed the AED pads on the boy and a shock was advised by the instrument. One shock was delivered. Paramedics, from Fishers Department of Fire and EMS, arrived and transported the boy to IU Health at Saxony Hospital.

“It (AED) was the thing that saved his life,” said Hollingsworth.

Fishers police indicated Dr. Arora, IU Health at Saxony Emergency Room Doctor, downloaded and reviewed the information from the AED. The information confirmed that the boy went into a lethal heart rhythm known as ventricular fibrillation.

Dr. Hollingsworth stated, “No amount of CPR would have helped this kid. When a person experiences ventricular fibrillation if you don’t shock, the person dies.” Dr. Hollingsworth also stated, “It was also critical that Fettinger was on the scene and able to quickly access his AED. I didn’t realize the AED was located in the school’s hallway and not in the gym, and that Fettinger had to go outside to his car to retrieve his.”

Hollingsworth believes an AED should be inside every gym. “It is important to understand that anyone can use these devices. You don’t need to be a doctor, policeman or paramedic. These devices are simple to use and the

device instructs you on exactly what to do.”

Dr. Arora said, “Sergeant Fettinger’s actions of quickly retrieving his AED, applying it, and providing a life saving defibrillation shock undoubtedly saved the boy’s life.” The Fisher’s news release stated, when the boy’s mother arrived at the emergency room Dr. Arora introduced her to Sergeant Fettinger and stated “This officer saved your child’s life.

Chief of Police George Kehl and Fire Chief Steve Orusa both believe immediate intervention is critical in providing the best chance of survival in a sudden cardiac event. For the past several years the Fishers Police Department has provided each officer with an AED as a part of their standard issued equipment.

Fishers police report since this incident Sergeant Fettinger has kept in contact with the Tsetse Family and visited Joel in the hospital.

In an e-mail addressed to Chief Kehl, Mr. David Tsetse stated, in part, “It was the timely intervention and most importantly the professionalism of Officer Troy that saved his [Joel’s] life.” Mr. Tsetse also thanked the assisting police officers and the paramedics for their efforts.

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Amazing Greyhounds do it again...

Third straight MIC crown

With sectional week just around the corner, it's an amazing story as Carmel bids for a third consecutive state championship.

Nearly as amazing is another story involving Coach Scott Heady's Greyhounds and another string.

Carmel, in a rare Monday night game at the Eric Clark Activity Center, clinched a third straight Metropolitan Conference championship with a 72-53 victory over Center Grove.

There is more. For a second straight year the Greyhounds finished undefeated in the MIC, arguably the best high school basketball conference in the state.

There is more. The victory was Carmel's 17th straight in the conference. Carmel's last MIC defeat was to Warren Central, 43-2, on Feb. 14, 2012.

"That is pretty great, in this conference," Heady agreed. "From top to bottom, this is a strong conference. The Center Grove team we played tonight didn't win a conference game this season, but that's a pretty good team."

The win ran No. 1 Carmel's season record to 18-1. The Greyhounds will close the regular season on Friday, hosting Brebeuf.

Heady called the latest victory "our best balanced scoring game of the season." Four Greyhounds scored in double figures, led by Ryan Cline with 17 points. Zach McRoberts and Michael Bruns each netted 16 points and Keegan Culp chipped in with 13.

McRoberts came away with a double-double, yanking 10 rebounds. Culp and Cline each collected six rebounds as Carmel belted the Trojans 34-11 on the boards.

Carmel trailed 16-15 after one quarter but then led 34-26 at halftime. The Greyhounds held Center Grove to 27 points in the second half and pulled away with a 25-16 run in the fourth quarter.

"Our defense got a lot better in the second half," said Heady.

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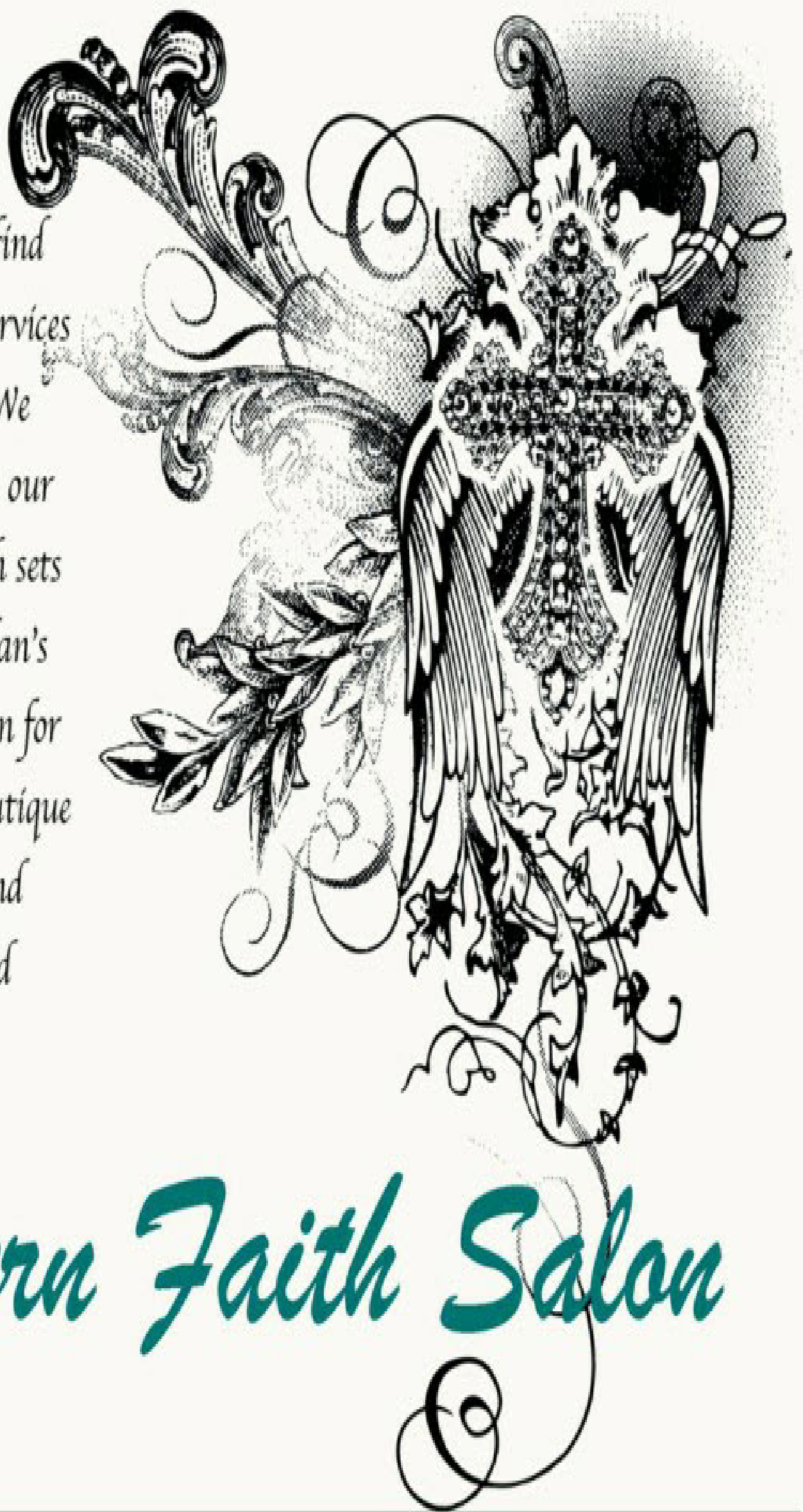
