Pondering make-up days

Due to the staff day and six student days missed due to severe weather this winter, Noblesville Schools is pondering alternatives to the five days that have to be made up June 2-6 which are designated as flex days in the 2013-14 adopted calendar.

At this time, we have not received a waiver for more than one of the student days, but we have applied for additional waiver days.

State requirements are:

- An elementary school make-up day must equal five hours or 300 minutes of instructional time. (This time cannot include recess or lunch.)

A make-up day for grades 6-12 must equal six hours or 360 minutes of instructional time. (This time cannot include lunch.)

The school board must approve any changes, and board members are currently considering feasible alternatives.

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Cheated at the gas pump...

Someone is watching

Ever have good reason to think you were shortchanged at the gas pump or the grocery meat counter? There are people in Hamilton County who can check on these weights and measures for you.

Although it gets little publicity, the county Department of Weights and Measures exists to see that consumers get accurate amounts of product for their money. Inaccurate weighing or measuring is one of the easiest ways for buyers to get cheated.

In Hamilton County all the devices that determine weight and proper measure are inspected at least once a year. Inspection stickers should be visible for consumers to easily view. Discrepancies have not been found in large numbers, but they can occur. Generally faulty weighing or measuring are not intentional, and they can actually hurt the merchant as often as the customer.

The county inspector is Cary Woodward, and while the State Board of Health is ultimately responsible for protecting the consumer, the responsibility for checking scales, pumps, etc. is delegated to the counties. Woodward's reports indicate problems found here are among the fewest

If, however, a consumer finds or strongly suspects a problem, he or she has the right to contact Woodward and ask for a specific device to be checked. The office is located at 1717 E. Pleasant St. in Noblesville and can reached by phone at 776-8407. Complaints are few. It's hard to tell whether this is because few folks have concerns or because few people know who to call.

The Weights and Measures inspectors check at nearly 600 sites in the county with a total of over 9,000 devices. (There are over 600 gas pumps among those thousands of devices.) In grocery stores, the scales at meat counters, deli counters and produce location are checked.

Among the other inspections are hospital and pharmacy scales, grain elevators, concrete and asphalt plants, propane gas dealers, livestock dealers, and even the scales a county high schools. It's a big job that's getting bigger as more stores open in our rapidly growing county.

If violations are found, the improperly operating device is sealed and the owner is advised there will be a re-inspection after repairs are made.

The watchdog agency is one of those rarely noticed arms of local government, but an important one because just a few improper measurements going on month after month could cost customers significant money.



An small fire at Lantern Woods Apartments Friday night limited its damage to an exterior storage closet in an apartment's common hallway.



Fishers Fire and Emergency Services were dispatched to 10843 Lantern View Drive, Apt. 306, at Lantern Woods Apartments, for a report of an apartment fire. Upon arrival, crew found smoke in the third floor, open common hallway. Fire crews quickly assessed the fire was out due to the automatic activation of the sprinkler head. Firefighters shut off the sprinkler immediately.

Investigators are on the scene to determine the cause of the fire in the exterior storage closet located in the apartment's common hallway. Fire damage was contained to just a few contents of the closet with no extension into the structure. Apartment residents were home at the time of the incident.

Battalion Chief Derek Gable was in command. Estimated damage is not available at this time. Apartment complex representatives were on scene to determine what if any water damage occurred. No injuries were reported.

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

It was a fast Friday night at the IHSAA boys state swimming preliminaries, with Hamilton County teams right in the middle of it all.

Local swim squads combined to have 30 swims in today's finals, with eight going to the championship round and 22 more into the consolation heat. Hamilton Southeastern has the most championship swims with four, while Carmel has the most overall swims with 13 (three championship, 10 consolation).

The Royals have eight swims overall going into the finals. Luke Johnson and Joseph Young account for all four championship spots, with Johnson qualifying in the 200 and 100 freestyles, and Young advancing in the individual medley and backstroke. Young finished the latter event in 30.10, putting him in third-place, the highest place for a county individual on Friday night.

The Greyhounds had two second-place relays on Friday: The 200 free team of Troy Li, Benjamin Burdick, Alex Stacy and Mitch Cooper clocked in at 1:25.20, while the 400 free relay group of Burdick, Spencer Satz, Reilly Garman and Cooper finished in 3:06.88. 
