Westfield Police adopt Nextdoor, which is a...

Virtual Neighborhood Watch

The Westfield Police Department announced today a partnership with Nextdoor (www.nextdoor.com), the private social network for neighborhoods, to build stronger, safer communities with the help of residents.

This integration with Nextdoor will enable the Westfield Police Department to communicate online with Westfield neighborhoods. Residents and police will be able to work together to improve safety and strengthen neighborhood watch efforts.

"We are honored to be able to provide a platform that will help enhance communication on both the neighborhood and city levels," said Nirav Tolia, Co-Founder and CEO of Nextdoor. "By adopting Nextdoor, cities now have the ability to quickly and effectively share localized, pertinent information to residents to keep neighborhoods across the area safe and well-informed."

Already Nextdoor has proven to be an essential and well-adopted tool for Westfield residents. So far, 24 Westfield neighborhoods have started Nextdoor websites.

With Nextdoor, Westfield residents can join private neighborhood websites to share information, including neighborhood public safety issues, community events and activities, local services, and even lost pets.

"One of the key features that sold me was the ability to send real-time notifications that are sent in an email or mobile text message to neighbors who have a Nextdoor account. This feature has been one of the most useful for our neighborhood watch," said Aaron Sherrick, Lead Block Captain for Countryside. "Countryside has been using Nextdoor for about 16 months. Our neighbors use it to notify other neighbors of lost/missing pets, recommendations about local businesses, and the list goes on. Nextdoor.com also has a mobile app for Android and iPhone so you can share info even while walking on the neighborhood paths or checking on the neighborhood when you are away."

The Westfield Police Department will utilize Nextdoor as another tool to help us communicate with our residents and for our residents to be able to communicate with us.

The Police Department will be able to post information, such as safety tips and crime alerts, to Nextdoor websites within the city and will be able to target specific neighborhoods as needed with relevant information.

Nextdoor is free for residents and the Police Department. Each Westfield neighborhood has its own private Nextdoor neighborhood website, accessible only to residents who verify that they live in the neighborhood. Neighborhoods establish and self-manage their own Nextdoor websites and the Police Department will not be able to access residents' websites, contact information, or content. Information shared on Nextdoor is password protected and cannot be accessed by search engines.

Hamilton County hosts forum on teen social media

If children are vulnerable to predators online, there's only one way to stop it – parents need to be regularly reviewing and be knowledgeable about the social media their children use on any kind of mobile device. To that end, Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen invites area residents and concerned citizens to attend a public education forum on Teen Social Media to be held on Monday, March 10, 7:00PM-8:00PM at the Hamilton County 4H Fairgrounds. The session will be facilitated by Detectives Alex Petty and Kija Ireland along with Technology Specialist Zach SeRine.

Hamilton County Detective Alex Petty, a father of four and a lead investigator for the Sheriff's Office on social media crimes, knows the challenges busy parents face but check his kids on Twitter, Instagram and Facebook routinely. He said parents are often fearful of

reporting inappropriate or questionable contacts made online over social media to a child, but should be a parent's first consideration. "Children are often trapped in these social media networks and vulnerable. They want to be liked. When I get a report, we want to find out who it is, who they are and where the live."

Social media crimes have increased to more than 100 reported cases annually in Hamilton County alone. Cyberbullying, sexting, child identity theft, cyberstalking, sextortion and other offenses are all increasing. Almost daily there are news headlines concerning some type of crime involving social media and technology. Petty said that the habits younger children learn are critically important for putting behavior in check as they get older. "One in 10 college admissions officers check social media pages and 38 percent

found information that reflected poorly on students," he said. He also said 35 percent of children ages 13 to 18 have received a sext message. "Parents need to just really look and listen. You need to be in the places where they go. And don't be caught off guard." More and more schools are issuing laptops and other technology as part of a student's routine materials but even this school technology can be misused.

"Parents have a tough time keeping up with technology as busy as we are, but they forget that they pay the bills for all of these devices – and own them," stressed Petty.

The Teen Social Media forum will help parents focus on identifying misuse of social media, from ways to prevent abuse to dealing

400 jobs coming to Carmel...

Stonegate Mortgage expands into North Haven office park

An Indianapolis-based mortgage company is expanding its headquarters, and that expansion will be situated in Hamilton County.

A press release from the Indiana Economic Development Corporation announced that Stonegate Mortgage will expand its headquarters in central Indiana, creating up to 400 new jobs by 2017.

"The homegrown-Hoosier company will invest \$6.2 million to lease, renovate and equip an additional 21,000 square feet of space in Carmel's North Haven office park, just north of its Indianapolis headquarters," said the press release. "Stonegate will maintain operations at its current 81,515 square-foot office at The Precedent office park in Indianapolis."

Indiana governor Mike Pence was on hand with Stonegate executives to make the announcement.

"After launching in Indiana and growing into a national company, Stonegate knows firsthand the benefits of doing business in a state that works," said Pence in the press release. "With hardworking Hoosiers forming the strongest business backbone in the country, Indiana companies earn a competitive advantage here that they frequently can't find elsewhere. Add in our central location and low-tax business environment, and it's easy to see why highly-successful companies continue to recognize Indiana as the destination of choice for new job-creating investment."

The release said that Stonegate employs more than 1100 associates, including more than 400 in Indiana. The company is continuing to hire for positions, those interested can visit www.stonegatemt看g.com/careers "When we founded the company in 2005,

our focus was on creating a profitable and sustainable business," said Jim Cutillo, founder and chief executive officer of Stonegate Mortgage, in the release. "In December of 2010, we announced the creation of 300 jobs in Indiana by 2015, with the help of the Indiana Economic Development Corporation. We are pleased to report that we have exceeded that target. Today, as a publicly traded company our focus remains the same and we are announcing the creation of another 400 jobs by 2017 here in Indiana, as we expand our corporate headquarters."

Stonegate is familiar with expansion. In 2010, the company said it would add 300 new jobs to central Indiana by 2015. It's already gone past that number, with 310 new jobs by the end of the year. In fact, Stonegate is licensed in 41 states and Washington, D.C., but plans to grow its services to 48 states during the next year.

The release said that "The Indiana Economic Development Corporation offered Stonegate Mortgage Corporation up to \$4,825,000 in conditional tax credits and up to \$161,250 in training grants based on the company's job creation plans. These incentives are performance-based, meaning until Hoosiers are hired, the company is not eligible to claim incentives."

Carmel mayor Jim Brainard is also on board with Stonegate's expansion.

"We are very excited to welcome Stonegate to Carmel's growing corporate family," said Brainard in the release. "This expansion reflects Stonegate's forward-thinking approach, which plays well with Carmel's goal to build a community that continues to attract good-paying jobs and new corporate partners."

Drive Now - TXT L8R

Instead of making a tragic mistake behind the wheel, Indiana high school and college students are being encouraged to put their smartphones to good use by urging others to "Drive Now. TXT L8R."

The Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Indiana Criminal Justice Institute, Indiana Department of Labor, Indiana Department of Transportation and Indiana State Police have partnered to award \$5,000 scholarships to students who compose the most creative and viral social media posts on Twitter, Instagram and Vine.

Keeping one's hands on the wheel and eyes on the road is not just a safe driving practice – it's the law. The majority of text message citations and warnings issued by Indiana State Police in 2013 have been for drivers under age 30.

Students may register their public Twitter accounts and read contest rules at www.txtl8r.in.gov. Entries must be posted during April, which is Distracted Driving Awareness Month, and use the hashtag #TXTL8RIN. Social media posts that are composed while driving will be disqualified.

High school and college entries will be awarded separately, and up to three students may work together on the same social media account. The state will deposit \$5,000 into the \$29 college savings plans for the winners of five categories:

1. Twitter – most tweets, retweets and favorites
2. Vine – most likes
3. Vine – most creative
4. Instagram – most likes
5. Instagram – most creative

Indiana House honors legislative interns

No. 3 Royals off and running...

Oh, what 1 play can do

What a difference one play can make in a high school basketball game. Especially so when two backyard, same school district rivals are knocking heads.

As Hamilton Southeastern and Fishers battled Tuesday in the opening game of the Class 4A sectional in The Mill at Noblesville, the pesky, upset-minded Tigers trailed Southeastern’s state-ranked No. 3 Royals by only five points, 30-25, with seconds remaining in the third quarter.

Then it happened.
Southeastern junior Tyler Janney stole the ball and scored. Fishers made another turnover and another Southeastern junior, Chris Ford, scored, was fouled on the play and hit a free throw.

Coach Brian Satterfield’s club took at 10 point, 35-25 lead to the fourth quarter.

There’s more. Southeastern opened the final period with a 3-pointer and a free throw from Grant Leach. The Royals scored the first seven points of the period. Fishers didn’t score from the field until Josh Lloyd hit a shot with 4:59 remaining.

Southeastern went on to win, 62-34, setting up a Friday meeting with host Noblesville in the semifinal round of the tourney. Fishers (8-13) finished the season the same way the Tigers began the year, losing to Southeastern (80-71). HSE now stands 20-3, the Royals’ third 20-plus win season in four years.

“The steal (by Janney) turned everything around,” Satterfield said. “Ford gave us a big lift off the bench.”

Ford finished the night with 16 points. “Ford has done that in lots of games this season,” Satterfield continued. “The key all year has been players coming off the bench. When things haven’t gone well, our bench has come in and made things happen.”

On a night when leading scorer Eric Davidson notched just five points (he is averaging 18.1), Tyler Jenkins and Leach joined Ford in double figures with 12 and 10 points, respectively.

“In our earlier game with them (the season opener) they hurt us rebounding and we didn’t put bodies on people,” said Satterfield. “We did a better job with both tonight.”

Senior Devin Chaudion for three quarters (until the turnaround) kept Fishers in the game. He finished with a game-high 22 points. But, with second-leading scorer Kortland Townsend no longer on the team, Fishers coach Joe Leonard didn’t have much firepower to join Chaudion in the attack. Chaudion scored 22 points and the remainder of the team scored 12.

“Chaudion is a very good player,” Satterfield said. “We tried to slow him down and we did a great job getting out on their 3-point shooters.”

Fishers hit just three 3-pointers, two by Chaudion.

Southeastern played without 6-6 senior forward Brendan Burns, sitting out the game with an injury.

“He could have played tonight if we needed him,” Satterfield said of Burns. “We’ll just have to wait and see how he is on Friday.”

“Noblesville is tough to beat in this place,” Satterfield looked ahead to Friday. “Coach (Dave) McCollough does a great job with them. We’ll have to be ready to play.”

Southeastern defeated Noblesville, 67-51, the fourth game of the season at HSE.

Tonight’s schedule at The Mill will feature two bottom bracket games, two-time defending state champion Carmel meeting Zionsville at 6 p.m. and Westfield and North Central in the second game.

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

Huskies fight back for win

Chad Ballenger admits he was not surprised his Hamilton Heights ball club trailed Muncie Southside at halftime, 32-29, despite the fact his Huskies had not lost a basketball game since Dec. 27, of last year, and the Rebels had not won one since Dec. 30, 2013.

And the veteran Heights coach of seven seasons was not surprised, either, that his team fought back Tuesday evening with a vengeance in the third period to regain the lead, stretch the lead in the fourth and hand Southside a 64-50 setback in first-round play of Class 3A, Sectional 24 at Muncie Central.

The Huskies are the defending champions at Muncie and advance in defense of their crown to Friday night's semi-final round again the Muncie Central Bearcats. Game time in the historic, 7635-seat Muncie Fieldhouse is 7:30 p.m.

"I told the kids earlier in the week I felt like we could be behind at halftime," Ballenger pointed out. "This is going to be the last time we are going to play them because they are consolidating with Central next year. We talked about how much fight they were going to have and would not go down easy."

"I wanted our kids to relax. It's a 32-minute game and I knew we were going to have a run in us. I thought our kids did a good job with that and didn't panic."

Shemor Isom, a feisty, 5-foot-8, senior guard for Southside, kept the Rebels in the contest with a 14-point second quarter and his three-point buzzer beater from way, way out on Bill Harrall Court had the Rebels thinking shocker.

But Heights came out blazing in the third. Junior Grant Weatherford drilled two from the foul line and super sophomore Hunter Crist drilled back-to-back threes, giving the lead back to the Huskies for good.

Crist, who had 17 points in the game, drilled a trio of treys in the third to help lift Heights on top 46-36, entering the fourth.

Junior Garrett Paull, who led Heights with 19 points and eight rebounds, had six points in the fourth and Weatherford had seven of his 13 points to help seal the deal.

Isom powered the Rebels with 26 points. They closed the book on their school's basketball history with a 2-18 mark and 10 straight losses.

The Huskies, 18-3 and winners of 13 straight, look forward to a repeat of last year's sectional championship game in which they drilled Central by 18 in the title game.

"Their record (8-11) is not that great, but this time of the year that doesn't matter," Ballenger said. "They've got their 6-foot-8 kid back (Tyler Arens) and with him they've only lost one game. We're going to have to do a better job on the boards against them. I thought we were horrible tonight. We're doing to have to do a better job blocking out."
