Alternatives at jail site?

Council will decide

Hamilton County government is not opposed to plans for a center which would house battered women and their children on a temporary basis.

But, the plan isn't a done deal. Maybe far from a done deal.

Alternatives, a group out of Anderson which has housed battered women and their children from Hamilton County since 1978, would like to build a facility in Hamilton County. They would like for the facility to be built on land owned by Hamilton County near the County Jail.

The land is located to the east and to the south of the fenced jail facility, immediately to the east of a bonding office and outside the fenced jail area.

"They, Hamilton County leaders, came to us," Alternatives CEO Mary Jo Lee told The Reporter. "We've been working on this for over a year. We have a 45-member task force, which includes government officials and local business people and it also includes the Sheriff (Mark Bowen)."

"I think we have six (of seven) Council votes," Lee said.

"(Councilman) Brad Beaver and I talked with the people from Alternatives," said Councilwoman Amy Massillamany. "I'm in favor of them using the land, but I can't vote on something I haven't seen and as yet we haven't seen anything from the Commissioners. It seems like a good location, with Ivy Tech and the library and other businesses nearby. But, where is the funding coming from? There is a lot I need to learn about the project."

Oct. 28 Commissioners meeting minutes show that a vote was taken for a "women's shelter" for up to 30 years. The name Alternatives is not mentioned in the minutes. The vote in favor leasing land for the shelter was 2-1, with Commissioners Christine Altman and Mark Heirbrandt voting in favor and Steve Dillinger voting no.

"I am not against helping Alternatives," Dillinger told The Reporter, "but I do not believe the space for it is on our Correction site."

"It doesn't make much sense to me to put the victims right next door to the perpetrators, especially with kids involved. "To my knowledge there hasn't been a vote (by the County Council) to approve this move, and I'm not sure they (Alternatives) can get the four votes needed to pass it."

"Alternatives came in and talked with us," Beaver said, "but we haven't received anything from the Commissioners. I know Christy (Altman) thinks this is the best location. I don't know if I agree. Everything is vague right now. That's a piece of valuable land. We purchased it for over \$300,000."

Altman, when interviewed by The Reporter, said she is totally in agreement that the three-acre location is a good one for such a facility. A good deal both for Alternatives and Hamilton County.

"We want to take down the old jail," Altman said. "It's being used for storage and also to house our 10 detectives. It's costing us a lot of money to maintain that building."

The "old jail" was the first building on what now is a huge jail complex.

Andy Kremer becomes an assistant principal at Guerin Catholic

Did you know that Andy Kremer is now an assistant principal at Guerin Catholic High School?

Don't be embarrassed if you weren't aware. It just happened within the last 48 hours. Kremer, who had been serving as Guerin Catholic's Dean of Students and the head football coach for the Golden Eagles, was promoted to the new position "effective immediately." Kremer's first day on the new job was Wednesday.

"It's always nice to be recognized for some of the things you're doing at school," said Kremer, who is looking towards an administrative license. "It's

going to be a great opportunity for me to learn and grow as an administrator."

Guerin Catholic principal James McNeany created the position for Kremer, giving the school a second assistant principal. Kremer joins Peg Dispenzieri, also the school's director of academics, who has been GCHS' assistant principal since 2009.

Kremer's job duties as Dean of Students involved such areas as school discipline, attendance and school safety, along with other odd jobs. Kremer said he would still focus on those three subjects, but would also received more administrative opportunities as well.

"Andy is a man of tremendous character and faith and has embraced the mission of our school as head football coach," said McNeany. "Those qualities that made him a successful coach will serve him well as he expands his role at Guerin Catholic to Assistant Principal."

Kremer resigned his football coaching duties yesterday to focus his time on his new role at Guerin Catholic. The announcement was made to the staff around 3:30 p.m Tuesday, after which Kremer told the Golden Eagles' players.

West Gateway Park plan to be unveiled Wednesday

The City of Noblesville will be hosting a public meeting on Wednesday, March 12 at 7 p.m. to unveil the design and master plan for West Gateway Park. The public meeting will be held at Noblesville City Hall (16 S. 10th Street) on the second floor in conference rooms A213 and A214. The format will consist of a presentation starting at 7 p.m. given by city personnel and the project consultant and will then be followed by a question and answer time.

As a reminder, West Gateway Park will be located just west of the White River in the area bordered by State Road 19; Conner Street/State Road 32; Nixon Street; and Logan Street. The city solicited feedback from the public and from key stakeholders last autumn which the consultant used to assist in creating the design for the new park. Construction on the park is scheduled to begin in the spring of 2015 and will be completed in phases.

"I wanted to talk to them personally, I wanted them to hear that from me," said Kremer.

Kremer had coached the GC football team since 2009. The team has had remarkable success, winning three sectionals (2010, 2011, 2013) and back-to-back regionals in 2010-11.

Guerin Catholic athletic director Chris Buhler said that Kremer "was an outstanding football coach" for the school.

"I think he was the perfect man for the job," said Buhler. He also said that the school is "forever indebted" to Kremer for taking the program he inherited and "elevating it to a whole different plateau."

The search for a new football coach is already underway. Kremer admits that it will be difficult to not be out at practices when football time rolls around next August.

"I've coached football for 14 years and it's going to be very challenging to head

into this summer and not be out on the football field as much," said Kremer.

Kremer said that the football program has been about much more than wins and losses.

"To me, it's more about what we're teaching our kids off the field, what kind of men we're helping them become," he said. That includes helping them along with their faith, becoming "closer to God, "doing things the right way," and "fitting into the mission of what our school really wants."

Even though the program is still young - next year will be its 10th anniversary - its impact is already being felt. Two of Kremer's former players will soon be graduating from Ball State University and are looking to go into teaching and coaching. Another two players are involved in EMT training at the University of Dayton.

"It's been real great to see what kind of great young men that those guys have become," said Kremer.

If there is a facility built for Alternatives, Altman suggested that it could be used to house the county’s detectives.

Altman also said that Hamilton County would lease the land to Alternatives for \$1 a year. It would be a 30-year lease, but the county could buy out the agreement after 20 years.

“Who would own the building if that happens in 20 years?,” asked Beaver.

The Reporter has learned that there is no record of the Commissioners following up to actually signing since the 2-1 vote was taken in the Commissioners meeting four months ago.

“I feel strongly that we have an obligation to provide reasonable accommodations for Alternatives here in Hamilton County,” said Councilman Paul Ayers.

“Alternatives now houses our abused citizens in Madison County. So to me it’s a no brainer. I have no problem with a development on county property near the Sheriff’s office. I cannot say no matter what the cost, the terms of the lease or the architecture that I would be in favor. However, from what I have heard thus far from the people giving us the presentations they seemed to be reasonable and prudent. Therefore, I’m optimistic. I have not heard when this may come before the Council,” Ayers added.

Councilman Rick McKinney said he is waiting to see more information.

“In order to finalize a lease of county owned land the County Council needs to receive an inter-local agreement first approved by the County Commissioner and involved parties,” said McKinney.

“As for funding the project in Hamilton County, I first learned of it and the particulars last week. I believe it is a warranted project and I would support the county’s financial participation in it as long as there is reciprocal or matching contribution from other government entities, such as township trustees and cities and town councils.

“The timing is hard for me to predict because the proverbial ball is on the County Commissioners’ court. They need to negotiate/prepare the inter-local funding agreements and then present them to the County Council for review,” McKinney said.

Councilman Steve Schwartz is concerned that the land in question will be needed by the county.

“A few years ago we expanded the jail and now there is another 100,000 people in Hamilton County. I think there might be other locations which would be better, such as one on the south side of Arcadia.

“Placing this facility next to the jail would be foolish, like placing an adult book store next to a school.”


Schwartz also is concerned about the proposed lease and wonders what might happen to the building and the facility should the county need to reclaim the land in 20 years.

“Asking them (Alternatives) to move at that point might be like shooting Santa Claus,” Schwartz added.

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Friday's Big 4: HSE, Noblesville, Carmel, North Central...

Eagles put scare into Carmel

Arguably, Ryan Cline is one of the best shooters in the state. The Carmel junior guard can light up the scoreboard any night, against any opponent. But, he can do a lot more.

With Coach Scott Heady's two-time defending state champion Greyhounds battling for their lives Wednesday evening at the Noblesville Sectional, Cline made two key plays to keep Carmel alive and defeat Zionsville, 47-43.

After another Carmel super star, Zach McRoberts, put the Greyhounds ahead at 42-40 with 1:07 left, Cline nailed two free throws with 41.4 seconds remaining and with 21 seconds left he fired a pass to Keegan Culp under the bucket and Culp scored to assure the Carmel victory.

It wasn't easy, not at all easy, for a Carmel team which in early February at Zionsville ran all over the Eagles, 43-26.

It was a different-looking Zionsville team and a different-looking Carmel team last night at The Mill.

"I have to give my kids credit," said Heady. "We've had some big games this season, but we hadn't been in that situation. We had to make some plays to win."

After Carmel took a 24-18 advantage to halftime, Zionsville outscored the Greyhounds 15-4 in the third quarter. Carmel got just seven shots in the period. McRoberts scored both Greyhound buckets. Carmel trailed 33-28 with eight minutes remaining.

The Greyhounds never caught up until Culp hit a 3-pointer to tie the game at 40-40 with 2:07 remaining.

Carmel's victory and a 90-64 North Central slam of Westfield in the second game set the stage for what should be a tremendous night of basketball in the semi-final round on Friday. Noblesville (14-6), which drew a first-round bye, will take on Hamilton Southeastern (20-3) in the 6 p.m. opener. Southeastern is coming off a 63-34 first-round pounding of Fishers. North Central (16-6) will take on Carmel (20-1) in the nightcap.

Carmel and North Central are from the Metropolitan Conference and Noblesville and Southeastern play in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference. Both games are repeats of earlier matchups. Carmel won at home over North Central, 63-51, back on Dec. 13. Southeastern won at home over Noblesville, 67-51, the same night.

Carmel has won 12 straight games; North Central 10 straight. Southeastern has won 12 of 13, losing during the stretch only to Carmel, 55-54. Noblesville has won six of its last seven and 10 of its last 12.

Carmel, last evening, nearly didn't make the party. The Greyhounds' defense, one of the best in the state, had trouble with Zionsville's 7-foot Derik Smits and with the 3-point shooting of Michael Sollman and Braden Hall. Heady had to use little-used 6-8 junior Liam Duncan to slow down Smits.

"Smits has 50 pounds on McRoberts," said Heady. "He was scoring and he was

hurting us passing the ball out to their 3-point shooters."

Smits scored 10 points. Hall was 4-of-5 from 3-point distance and scored 14 points and Sollman was 3-of-7 from long range and finished with 11 points.

"Zionsville plays a low-possession game," said Heady. "We had to make plays against it."

One of Zionsville's secrets was keeping a great Carmel free throw shooting team off the charity line. The Greyhounds were 9-of-10.

"We're trying to take things one game at a time," Heady added.

On a night Cline was just 2-of-7 from the field. McRoberts led Carmel's attack with 16 points and Culp finished with 11.

Osswald scores 26

The star of the game in the nightcap was Westfield's Ty Osswald, but even a 26-point night for the Westfield senior couldn't get the Shamrocks close against a North Central

which has caught fire the second half of the season. Osswald, coming off an injury, canned 9-of-16 shots and went 3-of-7 from 3-point range.

But, a young Westfield team never had a chance against the talented and deep Panthers. NC led 25-14 after one quarter and had the victory on ice with a 53-31 halftime advantage.

This has been a different type North Central team from the one which opened the season with four straight losses.

"We made some personnel changes," said NC coach Doug Mitchell. "We put Eron Gordon at the point, which helped him. We've gotten great senior leadership from Jeff Harris and Michael Loggan."

Gordon settled for just seven points last evening, but four different Panthers scored in double figures and 10 different players

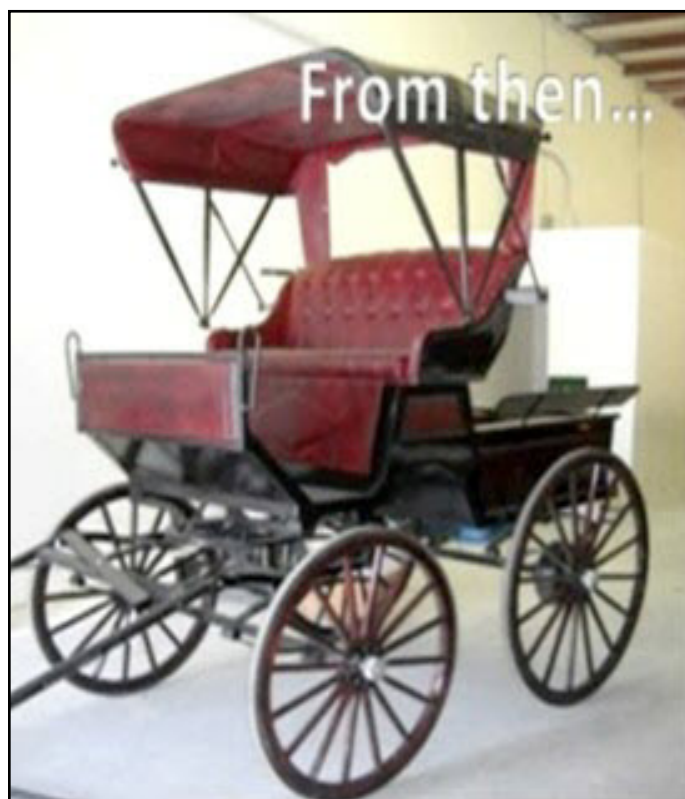

Eastern beats Sheridan...

Tough second half ends Blackhawks' season

Sheridan and Eastern (Greentown) struggled mightily during the regular basketball season, combining for a total of six wins. So both schools entered first-round sectional play seeking a fresh start.

For a half, the Blackhawks and Comets traded punches, each one looking to seize momentum in the ball game. They went into halftime even, 19-19, after five lead changes and three ties. The question was: Could anyone take control in the second half?

Eastern's Noah Cope drilled a three-point basket eight seconds into the second half, but Sheridan junior Brock Kitchel answered right away with a trey to knot the score, 22-all.

The Comets suddenly caught fire and answered with a 12-2 run that finally put someone in control. They outscored the 'Hawks, 24-6, in the third frame, and went on to post a 52-33 win in Class 2A, Sectional 39 at Alexandria-Monroe High School.

Eastern (4-17) advances to face Wednesday night's Madison-Grant-Elwood winner, while Sheridan, with its 15th-straight loss, finished 3-18 and suffered its second-straight first-round elimination in sectional play.

Cory Dunn, who closed the book on his eighth season as Sheridan's coach, had a difficult time accepting the game's outcome and his team's second-half performance, which included a frigid 2-of-15 shooting from the field during the pivotal third quarter.

"I hoped we would come out in the second half and play hard, and with intensity," Dunn said as he leaned against the hallway wall outside his team's locker room. "I thought we had figured out their trap (defense), but we didn't come out and do anything we had talked about. Mentally, we were terrible the second half."

He was mostly pleased with a first half in which the 'Hawks led twice by three points.

"I thought our intensity to start was pretty good," Dunn noted. "We still made some poor decisions, but our intensity was much better the first half."

Six-foot-three senior Cort Christy had 10 points in the first half and concluded his prep career with 18 points and 10 rebounds to lead Sheridan.

Cope powered the Comets with 15 points.

How disappointed was Dunn with the loss?

"I'm not even going to say," he responded. "We were optimistic as I'm sure Eastern was optimistic. On paper we were both the same type of teams. The first half it was an even game. I think both teams played to their potential. Just one team didn't come back out of the locker room in the second half."
