When it comes to innovative education, Noblesville Schools is leading the way.

On Tuesday evening, March 12, the Noblesville community will have an opportunity to venture into the life of students and teachers and see what sets the Noblesville's learning community apart from others. That's when the school district will host its first Learning Showcase featuring nearly 200 students and 85 teachers.

Students and teachers from each school in the district will showcase projects and exhibits that reflect 21st century learning skills, inquiry based learning, student-centered learning, and an interdisciplinary approach to learning – and exemplify Noblesville Schools' vision and mission..

The Learning Showcase takes place from 6-8 p.m. on Wednesday, March 12, at Noblesville High School. Doors open at 5:30. The NHS Music Department will perform from 5:30-6. The event is free and open to the community.

INDOT prepares for U.S. 31 construction...

Carmel road closures begin Monday

Contractors for the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) plan to close 131st/Main Street on each side of U.S. 31 beginning Monday, March 10.

The closure of 131st/Main Street will stretch to Illinois Street to the west and Pennsylvania Street to the east and will allow crews to prepare for construction of an interchange over the future U.S. 31 freeway. Access to and from U.S. 31 at 131st Street will be restricted through the fall.

The intersection of Pennsylvania and Main Street will remain open, but is expected to close this spring for construction of a roundabout. An exact date will be announced as construction schedules progress.

Closure of U.S. 31 between Old Meridian and 136th streets is scheduled to begin on or after Friday, April 4. Traffic will have access to cross U.S. 31 via Carmel Drive/126th Street during the closures of U.S. 31 and 131st Street. After 131st Street

reopens to traffic, 126th Street is expected to close for construction of an overpass.

Frontage Road Closure This Weekend

Frontage Road is scheduled to close this weekend between Carmel Drive/126th Street and Old Meridian. The closure will begin tonight after 9 p.m. and the road is expected to reopen Monday morning. A signed detour will be in place directing traffic to Illinois Street.

Grants available to community projects in Noblesville

Indiana American Water now accepting applications for 2014 environmental grant program

Indiana American Water, a subsidiary of American Water (NYSE: AWK), announced today that it is accepting applications for its 2014 Environmental Grant Program. Established in 2005, the program offers funds to eligible groups for innovative, community-based environmental projects that improve, restore or protect the watersheds, surface water and/or groundwater supplies through partnerships.

blesville was the scene of a conflict between loyal Union supporters and Southern sympathizers. It took the form of a riot right in downtown Noblesville.

It's hard for us to visualize today, but civil war of any kind stirs deep emotions in the general population especially when friends or family members are being killed or wounded. It was therefore not surprising to find local residents angered by a band of Copperheads arriving in town voicing opposition to the Union war effort. (Copperheads was the name generally given to Southern sympathizers.)

Accounts of the ensuing conflict are sketchy, but apparently the "invaders" were civilians from Fall Creek Township and neighboring Hancock County. One of the band made a speech at the county fairgrounds, at that time located along North 10th just south of Monument Street. The speaker verbally attacked local support of the war and the soldiers fighting in it.

Methodist Pastor Safety Layton rallied residents who supported the war. He spoke from atop a wagon parked on the courthouse square. The Copperheads and

any supporters they may have had then moved to the Square and apparently confronted the crowd headed by Rev. Layton.

Fighting broke out. The local militia company was called out to break up the melee. Someone pulled a gun and shot a man on horseback identified only as Trittippo. Another shot hit the horse. The horse died, Trittippo survived. Eventually the mob was disbursed without further bloodshed.

Later it was reported that the "invaders" had more devious plans when they rode into town. They were looking for three Noblesville residents: Joe Gray, Jake Loehr and D.C. Chipman who had advocated a tax to finance a bounty on Southern sympathizers. Burning the homes of the three men was the plan.

So, the invasion of Noblesville was a failure, but in a sense it brought the war home to a community that thought of itself as far removed from battlefields.

Mundy issues update on high school water damage

Sheridan Superintendent Dr. David Mundy on Friday published a letter to update the community on the status of water damage that occurred on February 6 when a water line broke inside Sheridan High School.

Dr. Mundy’s Letter:

Mundy

As most of the community is aware on February 6, 2014 Sheridan High School suffered major water damage from a water pipe leak. This incident was not the result of a frozen pipe. The water started leaking in the main hallway connecting the gymnasium and athletic area with the rest of the school. The leak started

at approximately 1:15 a.m. and ran until it was discovered a little before 6:00 a.m. The water traveled all the way from the "girls swim locker room" all the way to the concession stand located at the far end of the gym. Along the way, the water ran into, the cafeteria, band room, all the locker rooms, the snack shack, athletic director's office, storage rooms, the bathrooms on the north and south end of the facilities, and a large portion of the gym floor. The water even found its way out into the parking lot covering parts in a large sheet of ice.

I cannot thank everyone enough who has offered in one way or another to help with the issues we have endured. The number of individuals who showed up to lend a hand on the morning of the water issue and how quickly everyone responded as word spread is but one example of what makes this such a GREAT community. We had numerous teachers, community members

and leaders, the police and fire departments all show up to see if there was anything that could be done to assist. It is humbling to witness the offerings of assistance and the continued offerings of support we are receiving. Sheridan is a FANTASTIC place, and this collaboration of assistance to help with our emergency is just one of a million examples why.

We are working on several issues that need to be addressed such as getting the locker rooms cleared for our spring athletic teams, where these teams will hold fundraisers and practices during inclement weather, how will restoration affect traffic/safety issues, and probably most importantly, will we be back in the gymnasium before graduation. We have cleaned the gym locker rooms and there is a process in plan to fix the Terrazzo flooring. While I realize everyone would like answers to these questions especially graduation, we

are not 100% sure of what the answers are at this point. As we get confirmation, however, I will be making sure we get the answers out immediately, but there are still too many unknowns at this point to answer with certainty. What I am sure of, and the main purpose of the letter, is to express the appreciation I have for all the assistance and cooperation I have from the entire community.

A lot of thanks go to several members of our district leaders and members of the faculty and staff who have continued to be creative in the ways to overcome the obstacles presented to us. This situation has again showed the overall resolve and positive attitudes of everyone involved with our school district and the belief that there is nothing we cannot overcome for the benefit of our students and community.

HSE's bench outscores NHS's bench big time...

Davidson, depth too much for NHS

It was a game of swings and Hamilton Southeastern got in the last punch as the Royals defeated Hoosier Crossroads Conference neighbor Noblesville, 61-51, in the semi-final round of the Noblesville Sectional in The Mill Friday evening.

The victory pushed the state's No. 3 ranked Royals into a championship game showdown with No. 1 ranked Carmel this evening at 7:30 p.m. Southeastern will enter the title tilt with a 21-3 record. The Royals lost to Carmel, 55-54, back on Feb. 13.

The battle between the Millers and Royals had all the makings of a down-to-the-wire finish before HSE broke away by outscoring Noblesville 19-10 in the fourth quarter.

Southeastern led 15-7 after one; 30-25 at halftime and 42-41 entering the fourth quarter. Noblesville had a 39-33 advantage with a little more than three minutes remaining in the third quarter. Southeastern led by 11 points early in the game.

"I felt good about weathering their big run to start the game," said Noblesville coach Dave McCollough. "We wanted to

come out and not foul and to try to slow them down. So, what did we do? We fouled.

"I thought we did a great job coming back," McCollough continued. "And when we got the six-point lead I felt pretty good about things."

Southeastern, leading by one entering the fourth quarter, scored the first nine points of the period and took over the basketball game with a 51-42 advantage.

"After gaining the 11-point lead early we had some turnovers and bad possessions," said Southeastern coach Brian Satterfield. "When Noblesville gained the lead, we kind of got out of sorts."

Two things won the game for Southeastern:

*Senior Eric Davidson had another great game for the Royals, scoring 22 points. The only other Royal in double figures was freshman Zach Gunn with 10 points.

*Southeastern simply killed Noblesville with its depth. Not counting a nine-point contribution of "sixth man" Jake Mills, Noblesville got just four points from its bench. Southeastern scored 21 points, with Grant Leach getting eight, Chris Ford seven and Ty Scholl six.

"Eric Davidson is our leader," Satterfield said.

"Davidson is so good," McCollough agreed. "He can take you off the dribble or he can hit the 3."

On this night, Davidson did both. He was 6-of-9 from the floor, including a 3-for-4 night from 3-point range. And, as usual, he was automatic at the line, canning 7-of-8 free throws.

"Our depth has been the key to our success all year," Satterfield said. "I guess tomorrow (in the championship game), we'll see just how deep we really are."

Noblesville had scoring depth, too, but not enough of it. Jack Trittipio was the only Miller in double figures. He scored 12 points. Then came Mills, Sean Wilson, and Justin Pegues with nine points each and John Kiser with eight.

The sophomore Kiser pulled 10 of Noblesville's 25 rebounds. Trittipio had six boards. Brendan Burns had eight rebounds to lead the Royals.

Noblesville got hot midway through the third quarter, taking a 34-33 lead on a shot by Wilson. Mills connected on a 3-pointer and Trittipio canned two charity shots and Noblesville sat on its largest lead of the night at 39-33.

Southeastern scored the next nine points on a bucket and two free throws from Gunn and a shot by Davidson tied the game at 39-39. Leach hit a field goal and a free throw to give HSE a 42-39 advantage Trittipio stopped the Millers' bleeding with a bucket and Noblesville went to the fourth quarter trailing by one, 42-41.

Southeastern began to put away Noblesville early in the fourth quarter, starting with a field goal and a 3-pointer from Leach.

Noblesville closed out its season with a 14-7 record.

This Greyhound team does not rattle...

Carmel snaps 41-41 tie; wins 63-52

Calm, cool and collected.

That’s what winning two consecutive state championship will do for a team trying to win a third straight. That was Carmel’s answer to North Central’s challenge in the semi-final round of the Noblesville Sectional in The Mill Friday evening.

With the score tied at 41-41, Carmel scored nine consecutive points and went on to a 63-52 win over their MIC Conference opponent. It was the second time this season Carmel’s conference champion Greyhounds handled North Central.

This win, Carmel’s 21st in 22 games, was, of course, the big one. The victory sends Coach Scott Heady’s Greyhounds into the sectional championship game tonight (7:30 p.m.) against a Hamilton Southeastern team Carmel defeated by a point back on Feb. 13 at HSE.

Carmel is ranked No. 1 in the state; Southeastern is ranked No. 3.

With the score deadlocked, Heady got points from his “money men,” senior Zach McRoberts and junior Ryan Cline, and he also got a huge surprise and a huge lift from Neil Lampe. Cline and McRoberts started the surge, each with two free throws. Cline scored from the field and then with 4:28 remaining Lampe fired up a 3-pointer to put Carmel in charge of the battle at 50-41.

It was all over but the shouting for the Greyhounds.

Heady liked the result of Lampe’s shot more than the coach liked the shot.

“I liked the rebound Lampe got at the other end,” Heady smiled. “We probably would have needed to talk about the shot had he missed it.”

But, Lampe didn’t miss and the shot was a back-breaker for Coach Doug Mitchell’s Panthers.

“We were in foul trouble (Keegan Culp and Michael Bruns each with four to start the fourth quarter). Lampe didn’t have lots of minutes this season but he and Preston Flamion came in and did a good job tonight,” Heady said.

Carmel put the ball into the hands of its senior veteran, McRoberts, with the game on the line. He scored 11 points in the fourth quarter and finished with a game-high 23 points. He also finished with a double-double by pulling 11 rebounds.

“McRoberts was really great,” said Heady. “He’s a big-time player. He does it every night.

“North Central came in here playing well, with 11 consecutive victories,” Heady continued. “They were quick. We wanted to keep in front of them and force jump shots. We didn’t do a very good job on the offensive boards.”

North Central was 3-of-22 from 3-point range. Despite McRoberts’ domination on the boards, NC allowed the Greyhounds just six offensive rebounds.

Carmel’s hot shooting, however, made up for all of that. The Greyhounds were 21-of-35 from the field and 18-of-24 from the charity line.

In typical Carmel style, the Greyhounds were 4-of-5 from the field and 13-of-15 at the line in the fourth quarter.

McRoberts got lots of help in the scoring department. Bruns finished with 16 points and Cline added 13. Cline also dished out five assists.

North Central was led in scoring by a freshman, 6-5 Kris Wilkes with 13 points. He also led the Panthers on the boards with seven rebounds.

The Panthers finished their season with a 16-7 record.

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Heartbreak at Muncie...

Bearcats stun No. 10 Huskies

There were no eyewitnesses. And it probably did not happen this way. But the way Hamilton Heights shot the basketball in the fourth quarter one almost had to wonder if someone during that short time span between the third and fourth quarters placed a cover over the Huskies' bucket.

In that crucial fourth quarter they missed 13 of 15 shots from the field, including all six from three-point range, and 5 of 9 from the free throw line, which spelled disaster, as the state's 10th-ranked school in Class 3A dropped a, 53-47, heartbreaker to Muncie Central.

The loss snapped Heights' 13-game winning streak and closed the book on an 18-4 season.

"We didn't have a quarter like that all season," said Heights mentor Chad Ballenger. "It came down to they made plays and we didn't. They made shots and we didn't. We missed some free throws that were big and we turned the ball over at critical times. Those are just things that we didn't do this year."

The Bearcats, who got a first-round bye, entered Friday night's Sectional 35 semi-final round battle with an 8-11 record. Ballenger called that mark deceiving.

"Central is a good basketball team," he said. "They've got a really good big kid (6-foot-8 Tyler Arens) and I thought we did a good job on him, although he has been injured and is still not 100 percent. But I thought we did a good job on the boards against him."

The Huskies entered the fourth quarter in front, 39-36, but Phillip Corthen, who paced Central in scoring for the game with 18 points, drained a long three a few seconds in to tie the score.

Grant Weatherford answered right away with a jumper, got fouled, and converted the freebie to put Heights ahead, 42-39. The Bearcats were whistled for traveling moments later and Heights went up by four when Bo O'Laughlin made one of two free throws.

Ballenger later admitted he anticipated the Huskies going on a roll that never materialized.

"We kept waiting for that to happen," he said. "It's what we've done all year. Our goal every game is to go on a 10-0 run. We always talk about that and the kids expect to do it, but tonight we didn't get it done."

Both teams traded baskets early in the fourth and Heights maintained the advantage until Centrals' Darryl McKinney scored on a driving lay in to give his team a 46-45 lead with 3:46 left. The Bearcats built their cushion to five points, 50-45, on a steal and basket by Marcus Dukes at the one-minute mark that sealed the Huskies' fate.

Heights, last season's sectional champion at Muncie and winners of four straight games at the historic Muncie Fieldhouse over three seasons before tonight, got off to a good start Friday evening, taking an 11-6 lead after the first quarter behind Garrett Paull's seven points and five-rebound effort.

Paull, Hunter Crist and Weatherford combined for 12 points to lead the Huskies into halftime on top, 28-24.

Paull led Heights in scoring for the game with 15 points and grabbed 13 rebounds. Weatherford added 12 points and Crist finished with 10.

The 6-foot-3 O'Laughlin, one of two seniors to start the game, had big night guarding Central's Arens, forcing him into early foul trouble and making him a non-factor. O'Laughlin also pulled down 10 rebounds.

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Pumas stop University's sectional 3-peat bid

Junior guard Robbie Johnson scored 21 and dished out six assists but it wouldn't be enough as the Trailblazers' quest for a third-straight sectional title was stopped short Friday night, as they suffered a 68-59 defeat to Indianapolis Metropolitan.

Johnson scored 10 of University's (14-10) 16 first-quarter points but sat a majority of the second quarter after picking up his second foul with 1:11 to play in the first.

The 'Blazers led 16-14 at the quarter mark but by the time Johnson reentered the game with 2:31 to play in the half, the Pumas (8-15) had grabbed the lead—one they wouldn't surrender for the remainder of the game.

University trailed 32-26 at the half before the game entered an oscillating pattern during the last 16 minutes of the game. The Pumas stretched the lead to 11 to start the half before the Blazers cut it to a five-point

lead on two occasions in the third quarter and ended the quarter with five straight points from junior guard Tyler Diehl to put the game at 46-41 after three. Diehl would finish with 15 points and eight rebounds on the night.

The 'Blazers scored the first bucket of the fourth quarter to cut the Puma lead to three but less than a minute later, it was back to a seven point deficit. University got close again when Johnson knocked down two free throws with 2:20 to play to cut the Puma lead to 59-57 but once again, Metropolitan prevented the 'Blazers from taking the lead.

"Every time we really needed a rebound, we didn't get it," University head coach Brandon Lafferman said. "We missed a couple of layups that we really needed to have and all of those those led to buckets on the other end that were really all daggers for us."

The Blazers would score just once in the final two minutes—a Tyler Diehl bucket with 5 seconds to play—and suffered their first sectional defeat since a 2011 loss to the Pumas, the eventual state champion.

University was handicapped without two senior starters—Anthony Maranto and Anthony Murdock—that missed out due to injury and Lafferman said his team missed the duo.

"We definitely missed Mudock and Maranto a lot," Brandon Lafferman said. "Maranto's decision making would've helped us a lot tonight and obviously Murdock's toughness in rebounding but in the end I thought the effort was great, Metro was just a little better tonight. Their game plan was good and they did what they needed to to win."

The 'Blazers end the year on 14 wins and completed a winning season for the third year running.

In the second half, the Golden Eagles made three distinct scoring runs to keep themselves in control. Holba dominated, scoring 16 of his game-high 30 points in that half. Even though he gets the Guerin fans going with his dunks, Holba can do it all, scoring off catch-and-release jumpers,

easy layins and the occasional 3-pointer (he made three of them against Herron).

Holba wasn't aware he hit 30 points until after the game.

"It just kind of came with the offense," said Holba. "I was open, I finished it inside. As a team, we moved the ball really well."

Rapp had three downtown shots as well, and wound up with a double-double of 11 points and 13 assists. Cris Burrough added 10 points. Twelve players took to the floor for Guerin, and the fourth-quarter highlight for the fans was when senior Stuart Schultz scored on a perfect jump shot late in the game.

Rapp led the rebounds with six, followed by Holba and Aaron Brennan with five each. Matt Labus had four.

"I thought Labus did a great job on the boards," said Smith. "I know he didn't get a lot of rebounds, but boy, he blocked out as good as anybody all night."

The Golden Eagles are now 19-3 and play 3A No. 9 Brebeuf Jesuit at 7 p.m. tonight for the sectional championship. The
