

Cedar Cove fire causes around \$150,000 in damage

The Fishers Fire Department responded to a condominium fire at 9609 Highgate Circle in the Cedar Cove neighborhood of Fishers on Tuesday.

The fire was believed to have started in the attached garage of the unit, and extended into the wall of the condo. The cause is undetermined at this time, and the fire caused an estimated \$150,000 in damage. The homeowner, Max Williams, was out of town when the fire occurred.

Fishers Fire was assisted by the Carmel and Indianapolis fire departments, as well as the Fishers Police Department and Duke Energy. A total of 13 apparatus were dispatched and two attack lines were used. The first arriving engine was at the blaze three minutes after dispatch, and the fire was under control in 34 minutes. One firefighter was taken to the hospital for a medical evaluation.


