## A west side jewel for the city

The City of Noblesville had an opportunity last evening to put on display plans for what will be West Side Park. The facility will be located between Conner Street on the north and Logan Street on the south.

“We tried for seven years to make the land a tax paying development, and that didn’t work,” said Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear.

Although plans haven’t as yet been completely finished, pictures on page 1 and page 3 of today’s Reporter will give readers an opportunity to see the expected highlights.

On the west side of White River a walking bridge will be constructed from the county’s government center and park to Highway 19.

A courtyard and performing stage for concerts, plays and other events is centered in the middle of the park.

On the east side is a multi-purpose area with a shooting water facility, which also will be used for temporary tents for a new farmers market. Also, in keeping with the goal of the park being a year-round facility, an ice skating rink could also be a part of this section of land.

A total cost has not yet been finalized, but Ditslear told the audience that the park is a go.

Construction bids are expected to be received this fall and work may start by the end of the year. It is protected that two-thirds of the park could be finished by 2016.

No kidding, college baseball will be played in Westfield at the new Grand Park facility this weekend, starting Friday with Manchester taking on Heidelberg at 6:45 p.m.

The Grand Park folks are suggesting that local baseball fans should forget about all the winter weather. They are equipped to “plow” any unwanted snow off the diamonds.

Five college programs will bring their shows to Westfield. They are Manchester, Hanover and DePauw from here in Indiana, along with out-of-state clubs Heidelberg and Concordia.

The “home team,” if you’re looking for someone to cheer for, could easily be DePauw University. Seven players from Hamilton County are on the Tigers roster.

Baseball will be played at Grand Park throughout the weekend. Four games are on the Saturday schedule and two more on Sunday will wrap-up the weekend.

Hamilton County folks on the DePauw roster are Zach Starr, a senior infielder from Hamilton Southeastern; Marko Adams, a freshman catcher from Carmel who played high baseball at Park Tudor; Robbie Stein, a senior outfielder from Southeastern; Taylor Hackett, a sophomore pitcher from Southeastern; Nick Horvath, a freshman pitcher from Carmel; Jack Thompson, a freshman outfielder from Carmel, and

## State, Forum approve extended days for Noblesville Schools

The Indiana Department of Education and the Noblesville Teachers Forum have approved Noblesville Schools’ plan to make up two days of school by extending the school day. The extended days will begin Monday, March 17, and continue through the end of the school year.

The middle school and high school day for students (grades 6-12) will be extended by 17 minutes (7 minutes in the morning and 10 minutes in the afternoon). The day for these schools will begin at 7:28 a.m. and end at 2:45 p.m. Middle school and high school students who ride the bus should expect the bus 7 minutes earlier each morning and expect to arrive home 10 minutes later each afternoon.

The elementary school day (Early Childhood through grade 5) for students will be extended by 14 minutes (4 minutes in the morning and 10 minutes in the afternoon). The day for these schools will begin at 8:36 a.m. and end at 3:35. Elementary students who ride the bus should expect the bus 4 minutes earlier each morning and expect to arrive home 10 minutes later each afternoon.

On Early Release Days, students will be released 30 minutes early: at 2:15 for middle school and high school students, and at 3:05 for elementary students.

With the adjustment in the 2013-14 calendar, the student school year will end on Wednesday, June 4, for grades K-8 and on Friday, May 30, for grades 9-12.

To date, Noblesville Schools has missed six student days because of bad weather.

With a waiver granted by the DOE for the day missed on Tuesday, January 7, the school district is required to make up five days. The extended day plan will take care of two of those days. The Flex Days scheduled for June 2-4 will be used for grades K-8 to make up the additional three days that are required. The high school is making up missed days through eLearning in March and April.



# Arrest made in Michigan Road Speedway robbery

On Tuesday, March 11, the Carmel Police Department Criminal Investigations Division arrested Todd T. Tinsley, 42, for robbery, a Class C Felony, and for being a habitual offender.

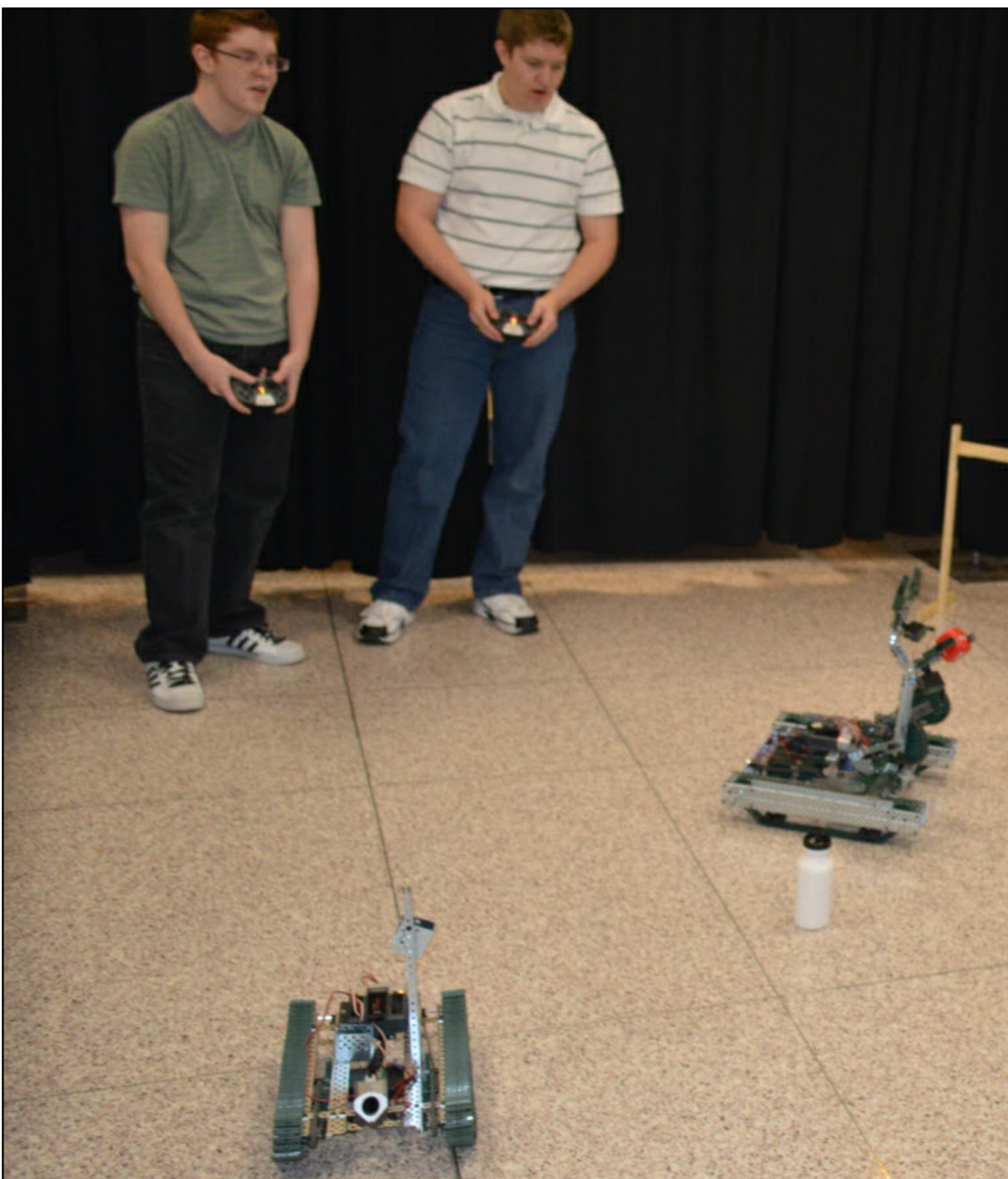

# Brown, Hochstedler named to First Team

Fifteen seniors and 15 underclass girls basketball players have earned IBCA/Subway first-team All-State honors for 2013-14, it was announced Wednesday (March 12).

Also, 120 additional players were selected as honorable mention IBCA/Subway Senior All-State and 120 additional juniors, sophomores and freshmen were recognized as honorable mention IBCA/Subway Underclass All-State in a process organized by the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association and presented by Subway Restaurants of Indiana.

Standouts Whitney Jennings of Logansport and Maura Muensterman of Evansville Mater Dei, considered by many observers to be the front-runners for the 2014 Indiana Miss Basketball Award, are among those picked to the IBCA/Subway Senior First Team. They are joined by Ashley Campbell of Class A state champion Oregon-Davis on the 15-player unit.

Completing that list are Kayla Brown of Westfield, Sydney Buck of Homestead, Caroline Buhr of Penn, Kindell Fincher of Fort Wayne Canterbury, Tayler Goodall of Columbus North, Alex Hochstedler of Fishers, Kellie Kirkhoff of Roncalli, Erica Moore of Mt. Vernon (Fortville), Morgan Olson of NorthWood, Ana Owens of Lawrence North, Caroline Puntillo of Chesterton and Lauren Whitlatch of Bloomington South.

The IBCA/Subway Underclass First Team features juniors Jenna Allen, Alexa Bailey and Dominique McBryde of Class 4A state champion Bedford North Lawrence as well as sophomore Tyasha Harris of Class 2A state champion Heritage Christian.

Others on the Underclass first 15 are juniors Lamina Cooper of Lawrence North, Victoria Gaines of Merrillville, Michal Miller of Michigan City, Ali Patberg of Columbus North, Nakeya Penny of Logansport and Tori Schickel of Evansville Mater

Dei; sophomores Lindsey Corsaro of Roncalli, Jayla Scaife of Muncie Central and Sydney Shelton of Mt. Vernon (Fortville) and Jackie Young of Princeton; and freshman Dana Evans of Gary West.

The IBCA all-state teams are selected in a process where all IBCA-member head coaches have the opportunity to nominate top players from schools in the traditional regional structure of the non-class tournament format. Representatives from each of those 16 regional areas, plus six at-large representatives (two each from IHSAA Districts 1, 2 and 3), then meet to review those nominations, vote and finalize the selections.

Hamilton Heights' Haley Cook was named to the Senior All-State Honorable Mention. Fishers' Kara Gerka was named to the Underclass Honorable Mention list, along with two Hamilton Southeastern players, Madi Taylor and Megan Walton.

# Royals face once-beaten North

Arguably, the Noblesville Sectional was the toughest sectional basketball tourney in the state. So, Hamilton Southeastern, which won that tourney by beating No. 1 ranked Carmel in the championship game, should be well prepared for what, arguably, will be the toughest regional in the state.

At Marion on Saturday, Kokomo (16-7) will face Homestead (18-7) in the 10 a.m. opener, followed by a matchup between Fort Wayne North (24-1) and Southeastern (22-3).

Southeastern ended the regular season ranked No. 3 in Class 4A, behind Carmel and Tech. Fort Wayne North was No. 4.

Southeastern has lost three games by a total margin of four points. The Royals were beaten in a holiday tourney by Marion 83-81 and Mooresville 71-70 in by Carmel, 55-54, late in the season

Fort Wayne North’s only loss was a 59-54, Jan. 4, holiday tourney defeat dished out by Columbus North. The Redskins have won 15 straight since that loss, including sectional romps over Fort Wayne Snider 58-46, East Noble 85-44 and Carroll 63-40.

“Fort Wayne North is a team that has a lot of weapons,” Coach Brian Satterfield looked at HSE’s next foe. “They pressure you all over the court and cause havoc with their defense to get easy baskets in transition. All seven players that play will shoot the 3-pointer.

Two Redskins scored in double figures when North beat Carroll by 23 points in the sectional championship game. Tre-Vion Crews poured in 20 points and Sean McGee added 18.

“Crews is a very quick guard who has great anticipation on defense,” said Satterfield. “Then, they rotate three 6-5 players who play in the post who can step out and knock down the perimeter shot.

“We will have to continue to play great team defense and rebound if we want to advance to the evening game. And, we will need to take care of the basketball. North feeds off the turnovers they make their opponents commit. We have to make sure we make good reads and come meet passes to help us at the offensive end,” Satterfield added.

Satterfield praised his Royals for their play in the sectional.

“I have to give credit to our team defense and execution in the fourth quarter of games while earning the sectional championship,” said the coach. “I thought our defense in all three games was tremendous. We defended differently in every game and our players were up to the challenge and were locked into what we wanted to take away from each opponent. If we can continue to do that, we will have a chance in every game we play.”

Southeastern will face a Fort Wayne North team which is averaging 72.2 points and has scored over 100 points in two games this season.

Southeastern and North didn’t play a common opponent this season.

“The way our team played in the fourth quarter of all three sectional games was a great example of the maturity of our players,” Satterfield said. “They realized what was working on offense and didn’t stray from it. They knocked down free throws to hold on to the leads we built.

“The leadership of Eric Davidson and Tyler Jenkins has been tremendous throughout the year, but went to another level last week. Eric was unbelievable at the offensive end while Tyler was incredible at the defensive end. I’ve talked all year about our depth has been a huge factor. We had some major injuries to deal with for the first time this season. In each game there was someone not able to play or at full strength. We had different guys who stepped up at different times to give us big lifts. This has been the case all year long and a big reason for our success this year.”

Satterfield said that a victory over North won’t be a tourney championship win.

“The other teams team are quality opponents, as well,” said the coach. “Kokomo is a little underrated as their best player, Persons, was out most of the year with a torn ACL. Since his return they have been playing great basketball. Homestead has two 6-8 players in the middle, one of which is being recruited by Big 10 schools. We got a chance to see them play in the holiday tourney we played in and they dominated games we saw.

“If we are fortunate to advance, we will have another tough challenge,” Satterfield said.

That’s life in the big time for Hamilton Southeastern.

North’s sectional championship was its first since 2010 and 25th overall.

## Basketball Hall of Fame inducts 53rd class March 26

- The Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame welcomes their 53rd class of inductees and honors other Indiana boys high school basketball legends on March 26 in ceremonies to be held at Primo Banquet Hall in Indianapolis.

Highlighting the evening’s ceremony, 14 men will be inducted into the Hall, recognized with the highest honor bestowed in Indiana high school basketball.

Among individuals to be inducted are three Indiana All-Stars, William “Bill” Russell (1963, Columbus), Ron Smith (1974, Elkhart Memorial) and David Gadis (1980, Pike).

2014 inductee Tom DeBaets coached South Bend Clay to a 1994 state championship victory.

Small school heroes included in this year’s class are Tom Chilton (1956 Austin), Les Habegger (1943 Berne), and Paul Weekley (deceased) coached 28 seasons as head coach at Shelburn and North Central (Farmersburg) high schools.

Others include Orsten Artis (1962 Gary Froebel), Jack Cross (1951 Rushville), William “Bill” Harmon (1973 Jennings County), Art Musselman (1956 Huntington) and Jack Waters (1957 Madison).

The recipient of this year’s Centennial Award to recognize contributions to Indiana high school basketball from 100 years ago is Lowell “Pug” Dale (1914 Lebanon) who is inducted posthumously. Dale scored 42 points in the final two games of

the 1912 state finals for state champion Tigers, a record that held for 34 years.

Indiana Pacers 2014 Silver Medal Award recipient, Paul Patterson played at Hammond Morton and Hanover College. Patterson was head coach at Taylor University for 34 years accomplishing 734 wins, 28 winning seasons, 15 conference championships, 14 NAIA National Tournament appearances and National Coach of the Year.

Three men – Michael Bohan, Jerry Petro and the late Lloyd “Whip” Whipple – will be recognized with the Center Circle Officials Award.

18 men will be recognized as members of the 2014 Silver Anniversary Team – acknowledging their spot as one of the top senior basketball players in Indiana 25 years ago.

The 1964 Lafayette Jefferson team will be recognized for their 50<sup>th</sup> state championship anniversary along with the 1989 Lawrence North team, respectively, of winning an IHSAA state crown 25 years ago.

Seats remain for the event, which will draw a crowd of over 1,000. Cost for the event, including a 6:00 PM dinner, is \$50 for adults. Reservations may be made by calling (765) 529-1891.

A reception – open to the public and free of charge – will take place at the Hall of Fame museum in New Castle between 11:00 AM (ET) and 1:00 PM on March 26.

# Miller gymnasts ready for loaded regional

With four of the top five ranked teams competing at the Valparaiso regional on Friday, the Noblesville gymnastics team is aware that it will be an underdog.

But that doesn't mean the Millers are going into the meet with a defeatist attitude. Noblesville has confidence from a successful Lafayette Jeff sectional, where it placed second only to fifth-ranked Logansport. Also, the Millers have been practicing some new skills that they are ready to throw into a competitive setting.

"We go in to this regional as underdogs, just as we went into state (last year)," said NHS coach Jody Ramey. She coached senior twins Constance and Katherine Chininis to state last March. Ramey said that if her gymnasts can pull off those new skills, then they're doing something that gives them a chance - "we're competing with the girls at the level that we should be."

That is one of the biggest thing helping the Millers: They won't be going to Valpo wide-eyed. The Chininis twins only gained valuable experience from their competing at state last year. And of course, senior Jenny Coy was there to cheer her teammates on, so she got to see that level as well.

"They know what they're up against," said Ramey. "They're planning for that."

There will be six teams at the regional, three each from the Lafayette Jeff and Chesterton sectionals. Logansport, Noblesville and Harrison all came out of Lafayette, with No. 1 Valpo, No. 3 Portage (the defending state champion) and No. 4 Merrillville advancing from Chesterton.

The Vikings won their sectional with a score of 111.550, followed by Merrillville's 109.80 and Portage's 109.725. Portage senior Danielle Solis won the all-around with a remarkable score of 38.075. Solis also won the vault with 9.85, the floor exercise with 9.70, and the balance beam with 9.50. Morgan Township sophomore Kylee Maxwell was first in the uneven bars with 9.625.

The top three teams, top six all-around individuals and top six in each event qualify for state. But - and this is important - any gymnast who gets a qualifying score also gets a ticket to Ball State. The automatic qualifying scores are the sixth-place scores from last year's state meet: 9.40 for bars, 9.225 for beam, 9.70 for vault, 9.425 for floor and 37.15 for the all-around.

Some of the Millers are close to those automatic scores. Coy scored a 9.325 in the floor exercise at sectionals, and Katherine

Chininis has scored 9.50 on vault. The gymnasts are well aware of those automatic qualifying numbers.

"They know what the scores are," said Ramey at the sectional. "I know Jenny on

the way home from a competition a few weeks ago was like, 'Now, what do I have to do to get exactly that?' She's been gearing for that."

The Millers will depart Noblesville at 12:30 p.m. Friday for the competition. Action at Valparaiso begins at 6 p.m. Central Time, which is 7 p.m. in Noblesville. "It'll be an exciting day," said Ramey.
