Golden Eagles fly back to semi-state

It's a little plaque that says "Regional Champions."

For the Guerin Catholic boys basketball team, it marks a big accomplishment. The Golden Eagles won the school's second regional title on Saturday, sailing through the Saturday Class 3A event at Greencastle. Guerin beat Edgewood 64-33 in the evening championship game, improving its record to 21-3 and advancing to a much-anticipated semi-state game with Greensburg, Indiana's defending 3A champion.

The second-ranked Golden Eagles won regionals two years ago on their way to the school's first-ever state championship in any sport, but were beaten last year by top-ranked Mount Vernon in the sectional.

"Last year it took No. 1 to knock us out in the sectional," said GCHS coach Pete Smith. "We felt last year we had a good team, but this year's team has really stepped it up."

In the semi-finals, both Guerin Catholic and Edgewood had to beat teams from the Sagamore Conference - one of the more underrated conferences in the state - to reach the championship. The Golden Eagles took care of Tri-West 74-58 (see story on Page 4), while the Mustangs got past Crawfordsville 54-48.

Guerin skipped out to a 7-0 lead in the first couple minutes of the game, forcing an early Edgewood time-out at the 5:32 mark. Christian Munson hit a 3-pointer to begin the scoring, and Aaron Brennan added a couple baskets; the first of which was a putback.

That would be a first-quarter trend for GC, as it had four rebound baskets in the period. Cris Burrough made two of them, the second one while being fouled. Burrough then made the free-throw attempt. Matt Labus ended the quarter with a putback, giving Guerin Catholic an 18-12 lead.

"Our mindset going in was pounding it in the paint, get every rebound, and just get stops on defense, and that's what we tried to do throughout the game," said Burrough.

"I thought we established our inside game good at the start," said Smith.

Edgewood's Clayton Settle scored 10 points in that first quarter, with three 3-pointers. He made his last triple while being fouled, so he converted the rare four-point play with a free throw.

Matt Holba got some big baskets in the beginning of the second quarter, making a three-point play, then giving Guerin another putback to put his team ahead 23-14. Edgewood answered, with Settle's back-to-back baskets getting the Mustangs to within 23-18 at the 4:23.

After taking a 30-second timeout, Guerin got itself back together. The Golden Eagles scored the next 10 points unanswered; Burrough started the run with a '3.'

Matthew Godfrey's jumper made the score 33-18, and the crowd would get to see more of him in the second half. The freshman scored 10 more points in the second half, a 16-minute period where Guerin outscored the Mustangs 31-12.

Godfrey came in and played significant minutes for Whit Rapp, who had to leave the game due to a hip injury.

"He doesn't get a lot of reps in practice with the first group, he usually plays with the second group," said Smith. "But he's always listening and paying attention and he made the most of his opportunity tonight. So he was ready. That says a lot for a freshman."

"Hopefully this will help me in the next three years to come, as a reminder that I can do it in the regionals, and our team can do it, more especially."

Godfrey made a 3-pointer at the end of the third period to put the Golden Eagles ahead 49-29. Guerin then outscored Edgewood 15-4 in the fourth quarter, with Labus opening the period with a '3' of his own.

Holba made a layin, and then Guerin Catholic went with free throws for the remainder of the game. Godfrey made all four of his fourth-quarter attempts.

Brennan scored 14 points, while Burrough and Holba each had double-doubles: Burrough scored 12, Holba 11,

and both grabbed 10 rebounds. Holba also blocked three Edgewood shots.

Guerin's next foe is defending champs

The "cream of the crop," the top three ranked teams, will next Saturday gather for Class 3A semi-state championships and the right to advance the following week to the State Finals at Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis.

In the semi-states, it will be Guerin Catholic taking on Greensburg in the southern tourney and Bowman Academy meeting Fort Wayne Bishop Dwenger in the northern tourney.

The IHSAA will announce the sites on Monday. As of now, the

southern site will be either at Richmond or Seymour and the northern site either at Huntington North or Lafayette Jeff.

Based on driving mileage, as of tonight The Reporter is predicting Guerin and Greensburg will play at Richmond.

In the last regular season poll, Greensburg was ranked No. 1, Guerin Catholic No. 2 and Bowman Academy No. 3. Fort Wayne Bishop Dwenger was not ranked.

Greensburg is the defending state champion. Guerin Catholic won the state two years ago.

Guerin Catholic rolled over Tri-West 74-58 and Edgewood 64-33 in the regional, the Golden Eagles moving to 22-3 on the year. They have lost only to 4A Bloomington South by four points in overtime; to 3A New Haven by three points and to Kentucky powerhouse Louisville Ballard by six points.

Greensburg is 26-1, having lost only to 3A Madison 89-87 in overtime. The Pirates won their regional with a 70-60 win over Silver Creek and a 73-50 pounding of Evansville Memorial.

Bowman Academy won the regional by knocking off Andean

65-56 and South Bend St. Joseph 82-63. The Eagles are 21-4 for the year, having lost only by three points in overtime to Simeon out of Chicago, 81-71 to 4A Ben Davis, 74-52 to 4A Carmel and 69-56 to 4A Kokomo.

Among the four finalists remaining, Fort Wayne Dwenger had the toughest time in the regional, beating NorthWood 50-44 and Muncie Central 50-47 in overtime. The Saints are 17-8 entering the semi-state.

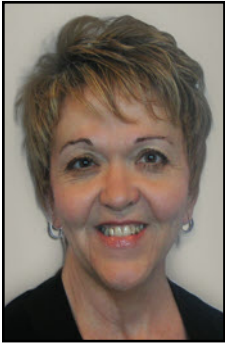

Direct
Physical: hitting, kicking, pushing, stealing, hiding or ruining someone's things.

Making someone do something they don't want to do.

Verbal: name calling, teasing, insulting, threats.

Indirect
Relationship bullying: gossiping, spreading rumors and lies about someone.

Making someone feel left out or rejected.

Bullying can be
One person making fun of another. One person trying to beat up another. A group of people ganging up against others.

Eagles hold off Tri-West to reach championship

It was easy to tell that Guerin Catholic couldn't wait to be back at the regional round.

The Golden Eagles opened play at Greencastle Saturday morning by jumping out to an 11-0 lead on Tri-West. That fast start carried Guerin through to a 74-58 win over the Bruins, and advanced GC to the regional championship, which it won easily over Edgewood 64-33 later that night (see story Page 1).

The Golden Eagles only needed a little over three minutes of game time to get those first 11 points, reaching the mark with 4:39 left. Matt Holba ended the run with a three-point play, giving him a total of five points at that mark.

Tri-West begin to chip away, though, cutting the lead to 17-11 by the end of the first quarter, and getting a basket to start the second. But Guerin Catholic got its defense going, and didn't allow the Bruins anymore points until late in the period.

In the meantime, the Golden Eagles scored nine of their own. That included a 3-pointer by Cris Burrough to make the score 26-13. Another '3,' by Christian Munson, pushed Guerin's lead to 31-17 at half-time.

The third quarter was even better, with GCHS adding 20 points. Six different Golden Eagles scored, with Whit Rapp getting five points in that period. Rapp would end up with a career high 25 points at the final buzzer.

"As soon as we left the hotel today, Whit was ready to play, and I thought he really played great," said Guerin Catholic coach Pete Smith. "Whit's been focused all week. You can tell the senior leadership, he's been focused all week."

Burrough opened the fourth period with a basket to get Guerin ahead 53-30, but the Bruins used an 18-5 run to cut GC's lead to 58-48 with 4:15 left. The Golden Eagles were able to get themselves together after that, again helping themselves out with a solid performance from the free throw line. Rapp made 7-of-8 attempts in the final three minutes.

In addition to his 25 points, Rapp handed out nine assists. Holba reached double-double status with 22 points and 15 rebounds, while Aaron Brennan scored 11 points.

"I thought Aaron Brennan played great," said Smith. "This week he didn't practice because of his knee, and we tried to limit his minutes tonight."

Royals edged by Homestead

Hamilton Southeastern coach Brian Satterfield following a 59-55 victory over Fort Wayne North in the opening round of the Marion Regional, talked about the Royals' ability to come from behind.

Southeastern had trailed North 13-3 in the first quarter. The two teams were tied at 21-21 at halftime and 35-35 after the third quarter before the Royals took charge down the stretch to move into the championship game.

"It has been this way throughout the season," Satterfield said. "We had to come from behind in the sectional last week in games with Noblesville and Carmel."

Saturday evening at Marion, Southeastern time-after-time fought from behind.

"These kids just don't give up; they keep fighting," said Satterfield.

But, on this Saturday evening in Marion, Homestead didn't quit, either.

Down 46-41 with four minutes left, the Spartans rallied for a 59-57 regional championship victory.

It was a great game, with Southeastern falling just a little short. The Royals had a couple of pops to tie it, but missed.

In the afternoon game, the score was tie at 52-52 with 26 seconds left. Following a Southeastern time out, Tyler Jenkins broke loose under and Eric Davidson hit him with a pass. Jenkins connected, and was fouled. He made the free throw for a 55-52 lead and Southeastern protected that margin for a victory.

Davidson canned two free throws with 11.9 seconds left and Chris Ford hit a pair with three seconds remaining to nail down the victory.

Fort Wayne North's Jeremy Jones hit a three-quarter-length of the floor shot at the gun, but it was too little too late for the Archers.

"Ft. Wayne North is a great team," Satterfield said. "They got off to a great start, but we settled down and came back."

"Tyler's field goal was a big one. They had been dogging him throughout the game," Satterfield added.

Another big shot was hit by Zach Gunn, the outstanding Southeastern freshman. In foul trouble throughout the game, Gunn came back on the court in the fourth quarter and connected on a 3-pointer to at that time tie the battle at 49-49.

Southeastern won the game like the Royals won many games this season, with free throw shooting. While North was 8-of-11 at the line, HSE canned 18-of-23 charity shots, with "Mr. Automatic," Davidson going 6-of-6.

Davidson finished with 22 points, tying Ft. Wayne's Davis for game-high honors. Jenkins added 18 points for the Royals.

Southeastern beat North badly on the boards, 32-19. Brendan Burns led the way with seven rebounds and Jenkins had five.
