## The County Line Legislature passed the buck

state legislature is over, and it's time to look at what was done for Hamilton County.

On two of the most important is-

sues for this county, one could say the legislature passed the buck to local government, giving voters and county officials the "opportunity" to increase taxes

For several years elected officials have been toying with a method for financing public transportation between Indianapolis and surrounding counties. Now they have something which will offer voters the option of increasing their local one percent income taxes by 30 percent to pay for bus service.

If county officials want to put the tax increase on a referendum ballot, the voters will get to increase their own taxes. Exactly what a typical Hamilton County resident will get in the way of bus service is not spelled out. But, the legislation may save the Indianapolis bus system which has been in financial trouble for years.

The other issue that had become so important to our county and its cities, towns and schools was the suggested elimination of the business personal property tax. About \$20 million from this tax goes to local units of government every year.

Local officials balked at the idea of doing away with this revenue, saying public services would suffer. Or, to make up the lost revenue, property taxpayers might find themselves taking up the slack.

As with the transportation tax, the legislature politely handed the matter to locals to decide if they'd like to give up some of their revenue from this tax on a complicated phase-out formula. The idea is to encour-

age new business to locate here. These are businesses that are supposedly discouraged by the current taxing of their machinery and equipment.

A joint council of local government representatives will get to vote on phasing out the business tax if they wish to take up the matter.

The state Chamber of Commerce pushed hard to get both these measures through the legislature. And, interestingly, on the public transportation issue they got the bill passed without any provision for a corporate tax contribution toward the funding.

Some of these matters are a bit complicated, and therefore likely to be ignored by many in the general population. But, the bottom line is: Hang on to your wallet.

On a more positive note, the legislature voted to devote another \$200 million to upgrade highways statewide. The trick here may be to find if our local legislators, mayors and county commissioners have the influence to get some of that money directed into Hamilton County.

Surely one highway that deserves to be considered should be Ind. 37 between Noblesville and I-69 where overpasses at cross streets have been recommended to avoid big rush hour backups.

Let's hope.

# There was a community history conversation

few, many people came to hear the story. In fact, more than one hundred community members came together to discuss the Roberts Settlement then and now from the four communities

The Roberts Settlement is located east of US 31 and 276th street in Jackson Township. In 1835, it was land and trees with opportunity for a new life for African American pioneers who came mostly from North Carolina and Virginia. These were free families looking for a place to settle where they could raise their children and have a successful life. The movement of many families took over 20 years as the word spread that there was greater freedom and opportunity in the north.

Many such settlements grew throughout the north nearly always where there was a Quaker or Wesleyan settlement of friends. It was a safe place and a good place to raise a family, build a homestead, establish a school and of course build a church. At the Roberts Settlement, the original church still stands today and every year since 1925, the families of the Settlement return to celebrate the strength and history that has continued through generations. The names that were part of the original settlement are the names that are in the area today. The Roberts, Waldens, Winburns, Rices and Gilliams were and still are the people who built their community and continue to help build the community today.


At the Community Conversation, the rooms were filled with decedents of the

early pioneers. They had a story to tell and the others in the room listened and watched a film called "Southern Seed, Northern Soil" featuring the story of how the settle-Fishers. 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

## Defending champs are next

The "cream of the crop," the top three ranked teams, will next Saturday gather for Class 3A semi-state championships and the right to advance the following week to the State Finals at Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis.

In the semi-states, it will be Guerin Catholic taking on Greensburg at Richmond in the southern tourney and Bowman Academy meeting Fort Wayne by knocking off Andrean 65-56 and South Bishop Dwenger at Huntington in the northern tourney.






