I hope those of you who read my Libbie Conner Wednesday morning, concerning Conner retiring as Noblesville S c h o o l sSuperintendent, kind of slipped past my

latest blunder.

My story said Dr. Conner's salary was \$1,660,000.

Conner might have done work of a \$1 million plus school leader, but she wasn't paid that much. Her salary is about 660,000.

Talk about egg on my face.

I feel badly that I would make such a mistake in a story about a very special lady who has led Noblesville Schools through a very exciting period of time. Conner has left her mark on the community.

As I listened and watched Conner answer questions Tuesday evening in the board room, she talked about all the great things which have happened during her career as boss of the schools. She didn't mention the one I think of as her No. 1

She came here from Carmel at a time when I thought this town was about to explode over the one school, two school issue. Should Noblesville, as the city continued to grow, split and go to two schools, as the Hamilton Southeastern district did, or should Noblesville remain one high school and arguably someday become a huge high school, just, as they say, like Carmel.

Conner never allowed that type of fight to ever begin here. She got lots of people involved and she moved Noblesville into making what I believe was the right decision. Instead of adding a second high school building with a matching staff and matching facilities of old Noblesville High School, the community decided to add on to what it had.

Considering what has happened and is happening at other school districts, such as Kokomo, Anderson and Muncie, Noblesville remaining one high school was, I believe, huge. Kokomo tried a second school, Haworth, and failed. Anderson lost Madison Heights. Now, next year Muncie South will become a part of Muncie Central.

Conner accomplished lots of other things during her leadership role here. She should have, considering that million dollar salary I tried to give her.

Kidding aside, she just recently engineered the sale of old East Middle School to Hamilton County, thus triggering Ivy Tech's planned move to Noblesville with a regional campus.

And, in the building in which we all were seated Tuesday evening, Conner led the charge from Field Drive to River Road for new Central Administrative offices. Big deal, you say? Noblesville Schools

City announces one-time spring loose leaf pickup program

The Noblesville Street Department nor- leaf machines are able to be used, weather mally conducts pickup of loose leaves only in the autumn. Due to the fact that many leaves still remain on the ground, the Street Department will make one complete circuit of the city with leaf machines in order to remove any remaining loose leaves. This special pickup will begin on Monday, March 24, 2014 and should take approximately three weeks to complete.

Residents who still have leaves in their yard who would like to take advantage of this special pickup must rake the loose leaves as close to the edge of the street as possible without placing leaves in the street. Loose leaves with brush, grass, litter, and/or other debris will not be picked up, as this will damage equipment. Please note that leaves will not be picked up in alleys.

Because of the variables involved with this special pick-up including how many conditions, and how many residents take advantage of this program, it will be difficult to predict which neighborhoods will have their leaves picked up on which days. Due to this, residents who would like to be included in this pick-up should have their leaves raked and placed close to the street by next Monday, March 24. Residents who miss this special one-time pickup will need to bag their leaves in free, biodegradable bags and call the Street Department at 776-6348 to schedule a pickup. The biodegradable bags are available for free to Noblesville residents and may be picked up at the Street Department (1575 Pleasant Street) or City Hall (16 S. 10th Street).



The indoor track and field season will conduct its "state meet" on Saturday, with the Hoosier State Relays taking place at Indiana Wesleyan University in Marion.

Hamilton County will have many athletes at the event, including a handful of top seeds. Carmel's Stacy Morozov is the first qualifier in the large school women's 3200 meter run, and the Greyhounds are first in the 4x800 relay.

Meanwhile, Fishers earned the top seed in the women's 4x400 relay, with Hamilton Southeastern rated first in the distance medley relay. The large schools are those that are in football classes 4A, 5A, and 6A.
