In a press release on the Wall Street Journal Web site, Cabela's will open a store in the Saxony Campus development, which is situated at Interstate 69 and Campus Parkway near Hamilton Town Center. Construction will begin later this year, with the store scheduled to open in the fall of 2015.

Cabela's has 51 locations in the United States and Canada. This will be the second store in Indiana, as the company opened its first in Hammond in 2007. The Noblesville store will hire around 170 full-time and part-time employees.




