Construction at 8th and SR 32/38 starts around March 29...

Watch out for detour signs - then the detours

Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) contractors plan to close the intersection of State Road 32/38 and Eighth Street on or after Saturday, March 29.

Crews will be reconstructing the railroad crossing at the intersection of State Road 32/38 and Eighth Street during the closure, which is expected to take about two weeks and re-open by Sunday, April 13.

Although the Indiana Department of Transportation has designated detour routes which include U.S. 31, Keystone Parkway, I-465, I-69 and State Road 37, Noblesville officials have established local routes that follow Cherry Street, Tenth Street and Logan Street.

Area residents and motorists are encouraged to subscribe to highway construction email updates by clicking the red GovDelivery envelope icon found on any INDOT web page. Updates will also be provided on the Indiana Department of Transportation East Central Facebook page and on Twitter @INDOT_ECentral.

My mother has never been one to say a bad word about anyone. If she did not like what someone said or if they were mean to her, she just said "well they are just funny turned."

She taught me that you will never really regret not saying something but you just may regret saying something when it is said in anger or impatience. After all, you can't unring a bell nor can you erase a spoken word. Better to be silent than sorry.

She would also say "well just consider the source". Why did they say what they said? Why did they feel it necessary to say it? It just says a lot about the other person, not about you.

Mom also taught me to count to ten before I spoke in anger. Sometimes I've had to count to ten, twice. And sometimes I've simply bit my tongue, smiled and chose not to react. After all, sometimes all they want is a reaction. No reaction is my satisfaction.

Golden Eagles' season ends in Richmond

Defending state champs take down '12 state champs

For close to 26 minutes of Saturday's 3A IHSAA Boys Basketball Semi-State, Guerin Catholic was the better of the two teams that had each captured the state championship the past two seasons. But the final two minutes in the second quarter and the last four minutes of the game was all Greensburg who defeated the Golden Eagles in a well-played basketball game 74-67 at the Tiernan Center at Richmond High School.

In front of a crowd in excess of the official 8,100 capacity, Coach Pete Smith's squad jumped to a 20-10 first quarter advantage. Behind six points each from Aaron Brennan and sophomore Christian Munson, GCHS made 9 out of 12 shots in the stanza. The second quarter started out golden too for the Eagles, building their lead to 27-12 with just under three minutes in the half.

Greensburg (27-1) outscored Guerin 12-2 in the final minutes of the second quarter to get themselves close at halftime 29-24. In the first half the Pirates were 42.9 percent from the field while the Golden Eagles connected on 54.2 percent. "We should have been ahead more," Smith said after the game. "But only two fouls were called on them and we never shot a free throw in the half, which would have helped. That's usually one of our team's strengths. I mean for the season we shot 178 more free throws than our opponents in our games. We just couldn't draw any, so we had to depend on making shots. But our offensive efficiency was not good down the stretch before halftime, and we also had some bad breaks"

It was a fast-paced, thrilling third quarter as Matt Holba scored 11 points and

Munson added three more 3-pt. field goals as Guerin charged out from the locker room and stretched the lead to 57-50 heading into the fourth quarter.

However, Greensburg shot lights-out in the final eight minutes while Guerin committed three costly turnovers and missed three shots on six consecutive possessions. Suddenly, Greensburg was ahead 63-61 with 3:11 left in the game and never made a field goal after that. They didn't need to, as they drained 11-12 free throws to ice the contest.

The inability to get to the foul line continued in the second half for Smith's squad. The Pirates shot 26 free throws in the contest to Guerin's six half attempts. Guerin shot 54.9 percent in the second half from the field but the Pirates were a sizzling 73.7 percent, connecting on 14-19 shots.

Holba ended his junior season with a game-high of 23 points. Munson connected on a school-tying six 3-pt. shots for 18 points, and Brennan ended his outstanding career with a double-double of 12 points and a team-high 10 rebounds. Whit Rapp, who was limited all week in practice to an injured hip in the regional, played in his coaches' words, "about 75 percent" and distributed four assists, grabbing three rebounds, and scored six second half points. "He truly played on heart and guts tonight," Smith said, "he was amazing. As late as the bus trip over we were not sure he could stay on the floor for more than a few minutes with the pain he was experiencing all week with his hip pointer."

"Boy, the guys played hard, and just could not finish either half the way we like

to, and normally have done the past several years," Smith continued. "Greensburg would not get discouraged when he had nice leads. They are as good as any team as we've played since starting our program, including any 4A school. The last four minutes of the game they (Greensburg) were literally impossible to stop. They made every shot in the first five minutes of the quarter and then got to the free throw line." Guerin Catholic finishes 22-4 on the season, the second-most wins in their eight-year varsity school history. This was only the second time all season they had given up over 70 points. The other was to Louisville Ballard, who Smith said along with the Pirates were the two best teams they faced all season.

Chininis vaults well at state gymnastics meet

It's been a great ride for Noblesville's Katherine Chininis, who gets to end her high school gymnastics career as a state qualifier.

Actually, make that a two-time state qualifier. Chininis competed in the vault event at the IHSAA state meet Saturday, which took place at Ball State University's Worthen Arena. Chininis scored a 9.325 in the vault, giving her a 19th place finish out of 49 gymnasts - a good performance considering how strong the state meet was.

"They were pretty good," Chininis said of her vaults. "I crunched the (first) one, but my second one was a lot better. And I've only been working layouts for a week, so I'm pretty proud of myself."

Chininis had to wait until late in the afternoon to perform her vault, since she was 45th on the list. It was kind of a mixed bag, since she said it got "a little tiring" to wait. But, Chininis said she was glad she went towards the end: If she had to did her vault early in the competition, then she would have to wait to see how the other vaulters did.

The winner of the vault was Richmond's Chasity Wampler, who scored a 9.85 after performing an astoundingly daring somersault vault. The only reason her score was so *low* was because she took a step on her landing, but she was rewarded for the difficulty of her vault.

Chininis knows about tough competition, as she had to work her way through the Valparaiso regional just to qualify for state. She qualified last year in the all-around with her twin sister, Constance, who unfortunately was injured during warm-ups at last weekend's regional and had to pull out of the competition. That gave Katherine extra incentive to want to do well.

"We all wanted to do good for her," said Katherine.

And of the chance to compete at state for a second year in a row?

"I'm proud," said Katherine. "This doesn't happen to that many people, espe-

cially from Noblesville. So it's pretty cool just to be able to say I've come here twice." Millers coach Jody Ramey agrees.

"We have to work hard to get to state no matter what angle you look at it," said Ramey. "To be able to get here is an accom-

plishment, and even being re-districted the way we were, to come out of our regional was an accomplishment. I'm so proud of her and her sister and her whole team for how we have done this season."

Both Katherine and Constance Chininis hope to continue with gymnastics in college, having narrowed their choices down to either Ball State or Purdue.

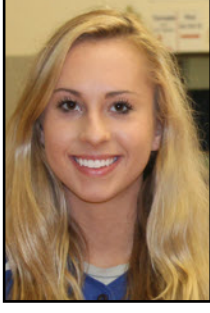

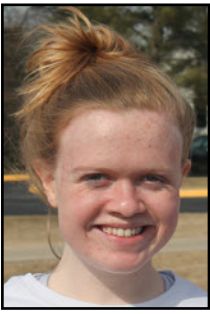

The finish of the girls Hoosier State Relays was a thrilling one, thanks to Hamilton Southeastern.

The Lady Royals won the large school team championship at the annual event Saturday at Indiana Wesleyan University, which is considered a de facto state meet for the indoor track and field season. Southeastern won in a nail-biter, scoring 64 points to Warren Central's 60 and Carmel's 58. Noblesville also landed in the top five with 34 points.

The Royal girls were winners in the 4x400 relay, with the team of Ashley Mager, Erica Schmok, Breanna Hargrove and Brittany Goggans clocking in a school record time of 4:02.72. Southeastern's other three relays set new school records: The distance medley relay squad of Jessica King, Anna Ramsey, Sabrina Bippus and Rachel Nichwitz finished in 12:31.25, behind only Carmel's 12:11.26. The 4x800 relay team of King, Samantha Zuber, Ciara McAree and

Nichwitz also set a new HSE mark of 9:35.47 while placing second, and the 4x200 relay group of Kayla Seymour, Alexa Jenkins, Hargrove and Goggans finished third in a new school record of 1:44.43.

"It was a great day as all 4 of our relays placed in the top 3 and all 4 set indoor school records," said HSE coach Julie Alano. "The 4x400 pulled out the victory holding off Warren Central as we also did for the team championship."

Noblesville also got a champion, with Rachel Mather winning the high jump in 5-6. Mather also placed second in the pole vault. Fishers' best finish was third place in the 4x400, while Westfield was fourth in the 4x800.

In the boys meet, Carmel tied for fourth with North Central, making the Greyhounds the highest-placing county team. The Greyhounds got three third-place event finishes, with Robert Browning getting the bronze in the 3200 run, Vincent Laconi

taking third in the shot put, and the 4x400 relay team also placing third. Also getting third were the Fishers 4x200 relay team and the Westfield 4x800 relay team. Noblesville's 4x200 relay team of Quentin Swaim, Dontay Wells, Hayden Camp and Jake Owens set a new school record of 1:33.39. Seth Grossman was seventh in the pole vault.

In the small school division, Guerin Catholic placed second in both the boys and the girls' distance medley relay. Hamilton Heights' Sierra Brown took third in the girls' 60 meter hurdles. The Huskies' boys team got eighth-place finishes from its 4x400 and 4x800 relay teams.

Time, stand still

I had quite a rude awakening last week. My dad, who is normally a healthy, 68 year old guy with a sharp tongued sense of humor, ended up in the hospital with congestive heart failure. We knew he hadn't been feeling well for about a month or so, but none of us knew why, nor did we know just how serious it was. I guess nothing says "reality check" like mom having to call 911 in the wee hours of the morning. Part of my shock comes from the fact that my dad has always been the rock in our family. He's a tough old bird, and he has always managed to muscle through any kind of adversity. Seriously...the man survived Vietnam, malaria, colon cancer, and my brother's teenage years. He's pretty much invincible in my eyes. So when I saw my dad in that hospital bed struggling to breathe and talk, it hit me like a ton of bricks. It reminded me of something I read recently about how we get so busy growing up that we often forget that our parents are growing old. For the first time in my life, my dad looked old. And that hurt. Over the past 15 years, my dear mother has battled breast cancer three times, and my husband has had several serious surgeries that required lengthy hospital stays. Through all of that, my dad has always been my waiting room wingman, the one "constant" by my side. We have mastered the art of casual, snarky conversations while worrying about our loved ones together. He calms me down and makes me believe that everything will be okay, and even if it's not, that we'll find a way to get through it. And he's always been right. It's just that this time, I am suddenly aware that he isn't invincible, and I'm more aware than ever of how fast time slips by as you get older. Nothing illustrates this point better than a reading that was shared at my grandfather's funeral years ago. The reverend recited a poem by Henry Twells entitled *Time's Paces*. It is a bittersweet reminder of how when we're young, time seems to creep by so slowly, but as we age, it seems to fly by. Here is the amended excerpt that he read:
When I was a babe and wept and slept, Time crept.
When I was a boy and laughed and talked, Time walked.
Then when the years saw me a man, Time ran.
But as I older grew, Time flew.
Soon, as I journey on, I'll find time gone. As a 39 year old woman with a husband, a child, and a full-time job, it has been easy to get wrapped up in the hectic, day-to-day nonsense that plagues us all. But as days turn into weeks and weeks turn into years, it's easy to forget that time isn't standing still for our parents either. Before we know it the roles will reverse, and instead of them taking care of us, we will be taking care of them. It's sad and frightening, isn't it? But you know what I've come to realize? Above all else, it will be an honor.
