## Public transit law bears watching

A new law providing for a method of funding inter-county public transportation has been signed by Gov. Mike Pence and will soon go into effect. It provides that if voters in Hamilton County (or other central Indiana counties) pass a referendum to tax individual income, the money will go to finance a regional bus system.

Originally this writer opposed the legislation, not because I was opposed to a public bus system, but because I suspected Indianapolis would get hold of Hamilton County's money and spend it first and perhaps entirely on subsidizing the city's financially troubled Indygo bus system.

I think that still bears watching, but thanks to changes in the original proposed legislation, Hamilton County will be able to enter an official agreement with other counties providing that bus routes and service will be included for our county before releasing locally collected tax funds.

Sen. Luke Kenley is largely responsible for this important change in the language of the new law.

County voters will still have to decide if they want to increase their local income taxes from the present one percent to 1.3 percent, an increase of 30 percent in the County Option Income Tax. If approved by voters, the addi-

## Pence signs mass transit bill

The Indiana General Assembly made the first move, kicking the can down the road to the governor.

Governor Mike Pence signed the bill, Senate Bill 176, giving the people of Central Indiana the opportunity to decide on the future of mass transit in the greater Indianapolis area.

Now, mass transit is in the hands of the voters.

Lots of things still must happen. Lots of questions are on the table. Many government leaders have smiles on their faces.

But, how will the voters decide? The voters here in Central Indiana who during the last few years have decided for or against

so many school referendums. A voting public which soon may need to decide yes or no on another bill, Senate Bill I, which would drop a property tax on business equipment and send everyone scrambling for ways to raise replacement funds to run cities, towns, schools and libraries, or lose millions of dollars in

which will be needed to run local government.

"Our capital city is a world class destination and needs a world class transit system," said Pence when signing a bill which now will allow the voters to decide the final outcome.

"While I still have reservations about the sustainability of expanded mass transit services, I signed this bill because the General Assembly made significant

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## Flashing Yellow Arrow Joining Temporary Signal on U.S. 31

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) plans to install a new left-turn signal on U.S. 31 at 196th Street that provides a flashing yellow arrow. This type of turn signal allows left-turning traffic to yield the right-of-way to oncoming traffic and pedestrians and turn when a suitable gap is available.

A temporary traffic signal at 196th Street was recently activated to help regulate traffic flow through the work zone during the upgrade of U.S. 31 to freeway standards. In early April, traffic will be shifted so that one lane of traffic in each direction will share the northbound half of the highway. Adding the flashing yellow

arrow to the temporary signal is intended to allow more vehicles to make left turns during each signal cycle.

The new signal improves efficiency by using cross-traffic gaps for more left turns. When waiting in a dedicated left-turn lane, traffic may first see a flashing yellow arrow, depending upon signal phasing. Should there not be suitable gaps in oncoming through traffic and sensors embedded in the left turn lane detect cars waiting, the flashing yellow arrow could change to a steady green arrow. This would stop oncoming traffic, allowing a "lagging" protected left turn at the end of the signal cycle.

National research has shown that the flashing yellow signal is more intuitive for drivers, results in fewer crashes and moves traffic more efficiently at an intersection. The signals are being introduced nationwide and have been adopted by most states. INDOT installed the first flashing yellow arrow signals in Indiana last year and plans to replace most of its five-section or "doghouse" left-turn signals with the new four-section signals featuring a flashing yellow arrow.

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improvements during the legislative process, bringing to closure years of debate on this issue," Pence added.

While nearly all government leaders in Hamilton County favored the bill, what they didn't favor was a water-down version which struck out the possibility of light rail.

"The final version contains no new, local corporate tax, which would have reduced our state's overall competitiveness, and it contains no light rail," Pence decided.

Busses will be used to transport passengers throughout the areas of Hamilton, Marion, Delaware, Hancock, Johnson, Madison counties.

"We are very happy the Governor and the Legislator are giving the counties the opportunity to try to solve our own transportation problems," said Hamilton County Commissioner Steve Dillinger. "While the need for mass transit in Hamilton County may not be as apparent today as it will be in the near future, we need to start putting the plans in place.

"I believe we are being very proactive by pursuing these options now," Dillinger added.

Dillinger, asked by The Reporter to predict what voters might do, said he couldn't.

"Not really," answered the Commissioner from Noblesville. "I've heard people who are all for it and others that are very much against it."

Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear, while also applauding the Governor's action, said he was disappointed that the bill does not allow for light rail as an option.

"I was glad to see that Governor Pence signed the bill regarding mass transit," Ditslear told The Reporter. "While I'm disappointed it does not allow for light rail as an option, it is a step in the right direction.

"I am especially pleased that the issue provides the option for local referendums," Ditslear said. "Issues of this significance should be voted on by the people who will be affected by them. In other words, local issues like this should be determined by local residents and leaders."

tional tax will amount to about \$10 million each year.

The public transit law that finally passed does not include any provision for financing a light rail system from Noblesville to Indianapolis. While some in Hamilton County wanted this option included, most agreed it would have been extremely expensive and probably a long time coming.

The entire idea may become reality only if federal transportation funds can be secured because the tax increase and rider charges are not seen as sufficient to pay the entire cost involved in equipment purchases, on-going operation and maintenance.

And, even if county officials decide to put the matter on a referendum ballot, and voters approve the added tax, it will be some time before we see buses criss-crossing the county because numerous questions of additional funding, purchasing of the vehicles, establishing of routes and charges for riders will have to be worked out.

But, the law does now have a safeguard for Hamilton County taxpayers' money, and that may prove to be the most important aspect of all because it not only lets us keep control of our money, but also can help make certain the buses will come to the county on routes our officials deem important to serve our people.

## Illinois Street closed Saturday, U.S. 31 closure starts April 4

Contractors for the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) plan to temporarily close a section of Illinois Street Saturday for paving. Illinois Street between 116th Street and 126th Street/Carmel Drive will close after 6 a.m. this Saturday, March 29 and is expected to reopen Saturday evening after work is complete.

U.S. 31 will close between Old Meridian and 136th Street on or after Friday, April 4. The closure will accelerate construction that will remove stoplights from 8 miles of U.S. 31 in Hamilton County by the end of 2014. U.S. 31 will reopen to traffic before Thanksgiving 2014 as construction on the corridor between I-465 and State Road 38 in Westfield continues through the end of 2015.

Keystone Parkway and I-465 will serve as the official signed detour while Carmel city streets will provide access to businesses on either side of U.S. 31.

Throughout his prolific 40-year-career, Hagar's solo and group albums have globally amassed 25 Platinum certifications on sales surpassing 40 million.

In 2013, Hagar teamed with a seminal array of his legendary rock and country artist friends for his first-ever rock collaborations album, "Sammy Hagar and Friends." The album scored Hagar the 11th

Billboard Top 25 album of his career and featured rock collaborations with Kid Rock, Nancy Wilson (Heart), Ronnie Dunn (Brooks & Dunn), Neal Schon (Journey, HSAS), Chad Smith, (Red Hot Chili Peppers, Chickenfoot), Michael Anthony (Chickenfoot, Van Halen), Joe Satriani (Chickenfoot), Bill Church & Denny Carmassi (Montrose), The Wabos and more on an epic collection of 10 new songs and unexpected covers.

In 2009, Hagar formed the supergroup Chickenfoot with bassist Michael Anthony (ex-Van Halen), guitarist Joe Satriani and drummer Chad Smith (Red Hot Chili Peppers). The band's self-titled debut album was certified gold and their subsequent tours were lauded by both fans and critics. In 2011, with the release of his critically acclaimed autobiography, "Red: My Uncensored Life In Rock," he became a No. 1 New York Times Best Selling Author. Hagar is also a successful restaurateur and pioneer in the now popular celebrity spirit trend.

Formed in 1988 by bass player Eric Wilson and front man Bradley Nowell in Long Beach, Calif., Sublime delivers an irresistible blend of ska, reggae, punk, surf rock and hip hop. Over the course of its three albums - 1992's double-platinum "40oz. to Freedom," 1994's gold "Robbin' the Hood," and 1996's six-time platinum self-titled major-label debut - the band has sold more than 17 million albums worldwide. Nowell died of a heroin overdose two months prior to the release of "Sublime," which reached No. 13 on the Billboard Top 200, sold six million copies and spawned such hits as "What I Got," "Santeria" and "Wrong Way," which remain radio staples across the country. Profoundly affected by Nowell's death, Wilson never considered performing the group's music live without his partner until he met Rome Ramirez, a then 23-year-old gifted songwriter and musician.

Growing up in the San Francisco Bay Area, Rome was introduced to Sublime's music by his uncle, and credits the band with inspiring him to first pick up a guitar and learn to play at age 11. Rome began singing and writing songs as a teenager and was playing solo gigs around the Bay Area

when he met Wilson while the two were recording at the same studio.

An instant friendship and musical bond was formed and their first big show as Sublime with Rome came in October 2009 at Cypress Hill's annual Smokeout Festival. A sold-out tour in March 2010 followed with spontaneous sing-alongs and mosh pits at every stop. That fall, Sublime with Rome entered the studio to begin recording their debut album.

The result was "Yours Truly," released in the summer of 2011. The album, produced by Paul Leary, both picks up where Sublime left off and builds on what they've accomplished, thanks to the fresh infusion of energy from Rome, who brought in lyrics, melodies and chords he'd written over the past few years. Songs like first single "Panic" (a top-five modern rock hit), "Take It Or Leave," and "You Better Listen" are reminiscent of vintage Sublime, while songs like "Lover's Rock" and "Murdera" pick up on the reggae dancehall style the

band had begun exploring in 1996. "Paper Cuts" has a distinct punk flavor, while "PCH" and "Spun" have more of a rock-pop feel.

Joined by celebrated drummer and long-time friend Josh Freese, Sublime with Rome tours the world in treating fans to both new songs as well as Sublime favorites that many never had a chance to previously hear live.

The Coors Light Carb Day Concert featuring The Red Rocker Sammy Hagar and The Wabos and Sublime With Rome will be the finale of an action-packed day at IMS. Also scheduled are the final practice for the 33 starters in the 98th Indianapolis 500 Mile Race, the Indy Lights Freedom 100 race and the popular Indy 500 Pit Stop Challenge.

The 2014 Indianapolis 500 is scheduled for noon Sunday, May 25.

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
