

Saturday voting is available from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Voter registration ends next Monday, April 7. There are April 26 and May 3. On May 5, the day before Primary Day, voting will be available from 8 a.m. to noon. Those who use absentee voting have until April 28 to apply for a ballot to be mailed.

> Confined voting is available for those who are homebound, in a hospital or living in a facility such as a nursing oversees the confined voting, will visit each facility on May 1, 2 and 5. The board will deliver the ballots to the facilities, ensure each person will be able to vote, then return the ballots to the Government and Judicial Center. All voters will be able to cast their vote in private.

Inspector training will take place on three days. New day, May 1, and on Saturday, May 3 at 10 a.m. and 1 p.m.





U.S. 31 construction update

Traffic shift in Westfield on or after Monday, April 7

expect to begin shifting all lanes of US 31 to the east side of the roadway between 169th Street and SR 38. Once this traffic shift is complete, crews will begin construction on the west side of US 31 through the remainder of 2014, and the following restrictions will be in place:

- Southbound US 31 reduced to one lane between SR 38 and SR 32

- Northbound US 31 reduced to one lane between 181st Street and SR 38

- Access to/from 203rd Street at US 31 permanently removed

Once the traffic shift between 169th Street and SR 38 begins, left turns to/from US 31 will only be permitted at the following cross-streets:

- 181st Street/Hoover Street
- 196th Street
- SR 32
- 169th Street

Barrier wall, tubular markers and signage will be in place to deter motorists from


On or after Monday, April 7, crews making left turns at other locations between 169th Street and SR 38.

Flashing yellow left-turn arrow to be added to the 196th Street signal on or after April 7

As part of the traffic shift on or after April 7, INDOT plans to install a new flashing yellow left-turn signal on US 31 at the temporary traffic signal at 196th Street. An illustration of the stages of a flashing yellow left-turn arrow is below.

This type of turn signal allows left-turning traffic to yield the right-of-way to oncoming traffic and pedestrians and turn when a suitable gap is available.

National research has shown that the flashing yellow signal is more intuitive for drivers, resulting in fewer crashes and the more efficient movement of traffic at an intersection. The signals are being introduced nationwide and have been adopted by most states.

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
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NHS opens big week with big win

Carmel off to great 2-game start

What more could a coach ask for in the opening two games of the baseball season. Two shutouts by the pitchers. Seventeen runs and 20 hits by the offense. Only one error by the defense.

That's what Carmel coach Dan Roman has received from his Greyhounds, along with, oh, yes, a pair of victories. Carmel opened the season on Monday with a 10-0, 6-inning victory over Hamilton Heights. The Greyhounds came back on Tuesday to defeat sectional-area foe Zionsville 7-0.

Senior Matt Rearick and junior Nick Maier shared the two-hit win over Heights. Rearick went the first five innings, allowing two hits, walking one and striking out five.

Senior Evan Nixon had a standout game at the plate, going 4-for-4, scoring two runs, smashing a double and a triple and driving home five runs. Senior Riley Smith drove home three Carmel runs.

It was more of the same against Zionsville.

This time senior ace Ryan Campbell went six innings on the mound and allowed just four hits. Junior Dylan Schildknecht finished up in the seventh, allowing just one hit and fanning two.

Nixon collected two more hits, as did Thomas Baldwin, Tony Giannini and freshman Parker Massman. Baldwin blasted a home run and Gianinni and Massman each cracked a double.

Carmel (2-0) now is idle until after spring break, returning on April 14 to host another sectional-area team, Hamilton Southeastern.

Heights coach Rick Hawley wasn't all that much upset with his team losing to Class 4A Carmel in the season opener for Heights' 3A Huskies.

"The loss is easy to explain," said Hawley. "Carmel is a better team than us. Our key focus is ourselves, continuing to improve to be the best team we can be. This is a great group of kids, so I have a lot of confidence that they will keep getting better as the season unfolds."

Heights collected just two hits, singles by Ian Nicholson and Sam Reel.

"Sometimes improvement doesn't show up in the score," Haughey continued. "Tonight, we did nothing in the first trip through the batting order, with four strikeouts and nary a really well hit ball. Our last trip plus (13 at bats) we had only one strikeout and several hard hits."

Bowen steps down as CHS girls basketball coach

Scott Bowen, the veteran coach that led the Carmel girls basketball team to the 2008 Class 4A state championship, resigned his head coaching position on Tuesday.

Carmel High School athletic director made the announcement on Twitter Tuesday afternoon. Bowen, himself a CHS graduate, compiled a 160-72 record as a 10-year coach of the Grey-

In the 2007-08 season, Carmel earned a 23-4 mark on its way to the state trophy. Along the way, the 'Hounds upended top-ranked Ben Davis 56-54 in a memorable regional championship game. Carmel beat South Bend Washington (a team which included eventual Notre Dame star and current WNBA player Skylar Diggins) 84-72 to win state; that was the Greyhounds' 100th state champi-

Under Bowen, Carmel also won sectional titles in 2009 and 2011, and beat Ben Davis for the regional again in 2011. Ironically, that had been the Giants' first loss since the 2008 regional defeat - Ben Davis won 81 straight games and two state championships in between.
