Governor Pence Launches 'Major Moves 2020' Construction

Governor Mike Pence today directed the State Budget Agency to release funding for the "Major Moves 2020" highway construction program. Pence joined House Speaker Brian Bosma to announce initial plans for investing up to \$400 million in the next generation of highway expansion.

"Roads mean jobs, and Major Moves 2020 will improve Indiana's transportation infrastructure to enhance our position as the Crossroads of America," said Governor Pence. "Major Moves 2020 will put Hoo-

siers to work now and reinforce Indiana's position as a national transportation hub and a global distribution powerhouse. It is one of the reasons Indiana continues to be recognized as a great place to do business."

"Transferring up to \$400M to improve and expand major infrastructure in our state translates into thousands of jobs for Hoosiers. Approving this transfer could allow us to leverage federal funding. I am pleased we were able to deliver on our promise to improve Indiana's transportation system

this session while remaining fiscally responsible. Indiana is the Crossroads of America, and we made strides this session to maintain that prestigious reputation," said Speaker Bosma.

Last week, Governor Pence signed HEA 1002 into law. The legislation invests \$200 million in projects immediately and allows Indiana to expand heavily-traveled sections of four-lane interstates – two lanes in each direction – that are now approach-

ing 50 years of age. Initial design-build contracts will be bid later this year for:

- I-65 between State Road 44 near Franklin and Southport Road in Indianapolis

- I-65 in the Lafayette area from State Road 38 to State Road 26

Following December's revenue forecast and Budget Committee review, the new law




Yes, it's another election season. The primary is May 6 and for all practical purposes that's the real election for local offices in Hamilton County.

allows the state to release \$200 million for additional interstate expansion projects:

- I-65 in the Lafayette area from State Road 26 to State Road 25

- I-69 from State Road 37 in Fishers to State Road 13 in Madison County

- I-65 from Sellersburg (Exit 9) to Memphis (Exit 16) in Clark County

Total funding of \$400 million invested within one year is expected to support more than 9,800 jobs for Hoosiers. Last year Governor Pence also dedicated hundreds of millions in additional dollars for Indiana's roads and bridges. Since 2013, under the

governor's leadership, the state has made a total of \$800 million in new money available for roads and bridges, including \$200 million for local governments.

Governor Pence also marked the ceremonial start to highway construction season by proclaiming April 7-11 as Work Zone Awareness Week in Indiana. Drivers are urged to join the Indiana Department of Transportation and its contractors in improving highway work zone safety.

In any event, the primary is coming up fast. New residents can get registered at the county elections office or at any auto license branch. It might be a good idea to put May 6 on one's calendar because you can pretty well be certain your next state legislator, county officials and township leaders will be elected at that time.

“Forever Marilyn” makes stop in Carmel Sunday

A 26-foot J. Seward Johnson sculpture of Marilyn Monroe with her billowing white skirt floating upwards, created by American artist, J. Seward Johnson titled “Forever Marilyn” will stop in Carmel this Sunday while on a cross country journey from California to New Jersey.

The towering sculpture is traveling in pieces on an open flat bed truck – allowing for surprise encounters with others on the highways or hotel and coffee shop stops. “Forever Marilyn” will be prominently parked in the PNC Bank parking lot located at Main Street and Range Line Road between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. on Sunday, April 6, among 13 other J. Seward Johnson life-like sculptures scattered throughout the sidewalks of the Carmel Arts & Design District. Follow the City on Facebook and Twitter to receive updates on the arrival of “Forever Marilyn” in Carmel. Links can be found on the City’s homepage at www.Carmel.in.gov.

The 34,000-pound statue is scheduled to make several brief stops in 10 other major cities along the way, including Philadelphia, Phoenix and Chicago, where “Forever Marilyn” was first placed in 2011. “Forever Marilyn” has been in Palm Springs since 2012 and will find its new home as the centerpiece of the 42-acre Grounds for Sculpture, a public sculpture garden and museum in Hamilton, New Jersey, founded by J. Seward Johnson in 1992.

The dramatic sculpture Forever Marilyn is a portrait inspired by the photograph taken by *Bernard of Hollywood*. The captivating work of art is extremely realistic – especially in the skin tones. Her unique patina involves 10 layers of hues with a matte finish, with the exceptions of the glossy elements of her lips, toenails and the pearlized surface of her earrings. A passion for detail and an uncanny realism of pose are qualities often associated with the works of sculptor Seward Johnson. Well-known for recreating life in our times in vivid realism, with this work the artist explores in three-dimensions why some visual images so captivate us that they become larger than life. These subjects outlive their own time periods and come to stand for something metaphoric and grand. Such is this most recent release from the hands of artist Seward Johnson. The monumental-scale Marilyn, which initially debuted in 2011 on Chicago’s Michigan Avenue, was then placed on exhibition in downtown Palm Springs for 22 months.

Forever Marilyn belongs to Johnson’s series entitled, *ICONS REVISITED*, which also includes the familiar images of the Times Square kissing sailor and nurse and the Mona Lisa – all with significant transformations from their inspirational sources of both style and content.

The towering Marilyn sculpture is en route across the US on an open flat bed truck – allowing for the surprise encounters with others on the highways or hotel and coffee shop stops. Forever Marilyn is traveling to Hamilton, New Jersey’s spectacular 42-acre Grounds For Sculpture art park. The sculpture park is mounting the largest exhibition in its history, a celebration of artist Seward Johnson’s lifetime as an artist in the public realm. Johnson is 84 this year, and still prolifically producing new works.
