## Balloon crashes near Pleasant Street

Saturday night at approximately 8:28 p.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the 1500 block of Pleasant Street in reference to a report of an aircraft crash involving an air balloon.

Officers, along with firefighters from the Noblesville Fire Department, arrived on the scene shortly after the dispatched call. The crash scene was located south of Pleasant Street just west of the Noblesville Street Department. A small fire was reported at the scene and was quickly extinguished.

Preliminary information suggests that the air balloon was in the process of descending when it collided with power lines in the area. After the collision, the balloon subsequently fell to the ground in an open field.

It was determined that the balloon was owned by Midwest Balloon Rides of Fishers, IN. The balloon departed from Harbour Shores Church located at 8011 E. 216th St., Noblesville, and was carrying six passengers and a pilot. It's unknown at this time if the crash scene was the intended site of final destination or if another site was anticipated.

There were two reports of minor injuries and those individuals were treated at the scene.

There were a number of households and businesses that sustained a loss of power as a result of the collision with the power lines. Representatives from Duke Energy responded quickly to the scene and were able to restore power within an hour.

The investigation has been turned over to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and any further information regarding the crash will be disseminated through their office.

# Patty Swank: One of the Very Best

If you went to Noblesville High School during the 60's, 70's, 80's, 90s and up to Wednesday of last week, you know teacher Patty Swank. She taught for 56 years and was more than a teacher, she actually touched the lives of her students and their families. Patty was an innovator at the high school. Besides being the Home Economics Department Chairperson for decades and besides leading a host of extracurricular activities, Patty created the concept of a class focused on Family Living. Long before it was vogue, Patty designed a class to cover all aspects of a person's life from birth, childhood, marriage and death. Everyone remembers their egg babies! And yes, she was also an innovator in sex education, years before the schools. She taught her students the things they needed to know to go through life including how to open a bank account to how to write thank you letters. She touched the lives of her students through how they went about their daily living. A fellow teacher wrote this week, "She taught me so much about teaching and about life. I have so many stories about her that made me a much better teacher. She always defined herself as a teacher and that's the way so many of us at NHS will remember her - one of the very best."

In addition to the Family Living courses, Patty taught all of the foods classes at the high school, from the basic to

advanced cooking. Some of her students have gone on to be professional gourmet chefs, others competed in national competitions such as those sponsored by Betty Crocker. At the school, no one could compete with Patty regarding school spirit. Always on game day she was dressed in black and gold and usually decorated the school in the same colors. Sometimes she decorated the town during sectional times. She prepared Basketball and Football banquets with food and decorations for the teams and families. Future Homemakers of American and Miller Maids were her passion along with the greatest cheer block of all time in the 1960's, coaching the cheer leaders and promoting school spirit as a necessity. She made breakfast for all the teaching staff on a regular basis and everyone was there early to enjoy the treats.

The community as a whole benefited from Patty's spirit of giving to others. She taught people to read, helped and lead service organizations, gathered clothes for students to wear for a job interview, sponsored and worked with the kids to build many proms in the gym so everyone could attend, organized dances and cooked the food so everyone could have a great high school experience and on and on. She even hosted a local television cooking class that aired for several years.

Patty graduated from Noblesville High School in 1954 and returned 4 years later to begin a career in her hometown. Ball State prepared her to be that great teacher as she earned her Bachelor of Science and Masters Degree in

education. The Department of Family and Consumer Services of Ball State honored her with an Alumni Award of Distinction for her years of dedication to her school, students and community. Many more community awards and recognitions were given to her through the years.

Noblesville as a community and Noblesville High School is a better place because of Patty Swank. Patty Swank passed away on April 1, 2014. Her husband Jack passed away on September 29, 2013. Her sons are A. E. Swank and Drew A. Swank and her sister is Mary Sue Rowland. Written instructions were left behind that she wanted no notice in the paper of her passing and a small gathering for her service. It would be just like Patty to make the end as simple as possible to make it easy on her family. So friends, know how much she cared about you and your friendship as she just slipped out of reach for awhile.

Saying she will be missed is not even close to compare to her contribution to the Noblesville community and the world. The thousands of students that learned life from this most extraordinary teacher, mentor and friend are scattered around the world and are using every day what Mrs. Swank taught them.

When someone did something really really well, Patty would write them a note and give them an A+ for their effort or achievement. "Patty, your card is filled with nothing but A + and we thank you for all you gave to all of us."

## U.S. 31 closure in Carmel begins

It will be a most unusual sight for the next few months - no cars, trucks or SUVs on U.S. 31 between Old Meridian and 136th streets in Carmel.

The only vehicles on the highway will be bulldozers and construction equipment, working to build new interchanges at Main and 136th streets, and an overpass at 126th Street/Carmel Drive. The closing of U.S. 31 will accelerate those construction projects, enabling crews to get them completed by Thanksgiving.

While it will be a great long-term gain, drivers should be prepared to find some new routes in the short term. INDOT has designated Keystone Parkway as the official detour route; that will be used for trucks and thru traffic. Local motorists can use Old Meridian, Illinois and Pennsylvania streets to access the stores and business in that area.

Here are some things to keep in mind as you drive through the area:

If you're traveling northbound on U.S. 31, there are presently lane restrictions past 116th Street. All traffic is being directed off of 31 onto Old Meridian, which curves northeast to Pennsylvania Street. If you are

traveling southbound on Old Meridian, you are allowed to access southbound U.S. 31, but be careful of the lane restrictions.

At 126th Street/Carmel Drive, crews have closed cross-traffic access for this weekend, but are expected to re-open it on Monday. Motorists will be allowed to cross 31 through the fall.

Not surprisingly, there is no access either on to or off of U.S. 31 onto Main Street right now. Crews are keeping that intersection completely closed until the fall. At that time, motorists will be allowed to cross the highway on Main Street (something they haven't been able to do in over two decades), but access to 31 will not be allowed until the highway is re-opened.

Traffic will be allowed to cross 136th Street at all times during the construction, and access to St. Vincent Carmel Hospital will be available throughout the highway closure.

# Millers unload on Brebeuf

Noblesville baseball coach Justin Keever, after counting his team's dozen runs and 14 hits in a 12-2 victory over Brebeuf Saturday morning in the opening round of the Miller Invitational, suggested that things might not always be this way. This way, offensively.

"We're going to see better pitching when we get into Hoosier Crossroads Conference play in another week," Keever explained.

That's one reason why the coach was so pleased to see his team remain consistent in outstanding pitching and a strong defense.

The pitching and the defense was, once again, very good in the win over Brebeuf.

On the mound, Trevor Salmon worked five innings and allowed just one hit and one run. He fanned six and walked only two.

A walk and a hit batter in the third was the only damage Class 3A No. 9 Brebeuf did against Salmon, who picked up his second victory of this still young season. The Braves scored their second run in the fifth on a home run against reliever Cory Conway.

Noblesville, No. 7 in 4A, ended the game in the bottom of the sixth with the 10-run rule.

The Millers, again, were terrific hitting the ball. They scored 12 runs and still left 11 runners on base.

Salmon also was the leader of the pack at the plate. He collected three hits, including a double.

Brian McLean, Zack St. Pierre, Andrew Wilson, Dax McLochlin and Connor Christman all had two hits each. St. Pierre hit a home run. Bret Rundle, Wilson, Salmon and McLochlin each powered a double.

The game was never a contest as Noblesville scored four times in the first, once in the second and three times in the third. Noblesville scored at least one run in every inning.

The defense was sharp, too. McLean made a great catch in center and the Christman brothers, Garrett at short and Connor at third, each came up with an outstanding play.

# Tigers sweep Tennessee

Red-hot Fishers finished a four-game sweep of Tennessee teams when on Saturday clinching the Farragut Tourney championship with a 9-4 victory over Sequoyah and a 5-4 decision over Riverside.

Coach Matthew Cherry's Tigers have opened their season with five consecutive wins.

Sequoyah was undefeated as a Class AA (middle class) team and Riverside is ranked No. 15 in Class AAA (the largest class in Tennessee).

Junior Brad Burtron, in his first varsity mound start, allowed just three earned runs and five hits through five

innings to get the victory over Sequoyah. He fanned six batters.

At the plate, the Tigers pounded out 11 hits, including two-hit performances from Joe Michel, Brandon Yoho, Taylor Canter, and Joe Rura. Michel and Yoho each pounded a double.

Fishers scored five times in the bottom of the second to take an early 6-3 lead and then put away its opponent with three runs in the fifth.

In the 5-4 victory over Riverside, Fishers scored the winning run in the sixth, making reliever Chris Seymour the winning pitcher.

This time, Fishers unloaded nine hits, led by Christian Chapman and Mike Chakiry with two each. Chapman hit a triple and Joe Michel and Chakiry each hammered doubles.

Fishers now returns to Indiana where on Wednesday the Tigers will play at Mt. Vernon, Thursday at Columbus

# Shamrocks cruise to Midwest Classic title

Actually, considering how the Shamrocks performed at the Midwest Baseball Classic at Grand Park over the weekend, there probably wasn't a better way. Westfield played outstanding baseball in beating two tough out-of-state teams, then took care of Cathedral 3-0 to win the championship game on a bright Saturday afternoon.

Just like that, Westfield is 3-0 for the season.

The Irish are ranked No. 2 in baseball's Class 4A, while the Shamrocks are rated No. 3 in the same division. Talk about getting a quality win early.

The 'Rocks got all the runs they needed in the third inning. Alec Nelson drove in the first run with a single that sent Milo Beam home. After that, Chris Ayers stepped up and hit a big triple that scored Nelson and Matt Kinney.

Jacob Robinson pitched the complete game, which was a recurring theme for Westfield throughout the tournament. Robinson tossed five strikeouts and only gave up four hits.

"Innings three through seven, he really settled in and pitched really well," said WHS coach Ryan Bunnell. "The great thing about Jacob, too, is that he's just a competitor and he competed really hard out there."

On Friday night, Westfield beat Howell 7-1. Bunnell said earlier in the week that Howell could be a contender for a Michigan state championship.

Nelson had another nice night at the plate, hitting 3-for-4, including a double. Nelson batted in a run and scored one himself. Ayers hit a two-run home run, while Cole McCrary went 2-for-4 while driving in two runs.

Luke Dietz went the distance, striking out six and scattering five hits.

On Saturday morning, the 'Rocks defeated St. Laurence, a nationally ranked team from Illinois, also by a score of 7-1. St. Laurence scored the game's first run in the top of the fourth inning, but Westfield responded with three runs in the fourth, and four more in the fifth.

Ayers and Jake Dietz each had two hits, while Robinson cracked a triple to drive in two runs. Robinson himself later scored. Jake Dietz also batted in three runs and McCrary crossed the plate twice.

Ayers pitched the complete game, giving up just four hits against four strikeouts.

"Ayers was really good this morning," said Bunnell.
