# Beck's announces major expansions

Beck's Hybrids, the largest family owned seed company in the nation, announced Wednesday that it will make another investment in its company and another investment in Hamilton County.

Beck's, led by company president Sonny Beck, is located in Atlanta in northern Hamilton County. The company was founded in 1937 by Lawrence Beck and his son, Francis.

Lieutenant Governor Sue Ellspermann joined executives from Beck's to announce the company's plans to expand its headquarters, production, research and distribution operations at the Atlanta facility, creating up to 100 new jobs by 2017.

The homegrown Hoosier company will invest \$60 million to renovate and equip its current one million square foot headquarters. The expansion, Sonny Beck said, will ease the company's continued growth, which has been advancing by nearly 20 percent annual for the last 40 years. The expansion, which will begin this summer, will take approximately three to four years to compete. The expansion will include research labs, greenhouses, seed processing facilities and equipment, as well as office space designed to better serve farmers.

The company has grown tremendously since 1937 when the Becks planted hybrid parent seed corn developed by the botany department at Purdue University. Today, the business provides farmers with high-yielding corn, soybean, wheat and forage products. Serving farmers across the Midwest, Beck's Hybrids operates additional Indiana facilities with operations also in Illinois, Kentucky, Ohio and Iowa.

# No serious injuries after Noblesville balloon accident

Saturday night at approximately 8:28 p.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the 1500 block of Pleasant Street in reference to a report of an aircraft crash involving an air balloon.

Officers, along with firefighters from the Noblesville Fire Department, arrived on the scene shortly after the dispatched call. The crash scene was located south of Pleasant Street just west of the Noblesville Street Department. A small fire was reported at the scene and was quickly extinguished.

Preliminary information suggests that the air balloon was in the process of descending when it collided with power lines in the area. After the collision, the balloon subsequently fell to the ground in an open field.

It was determined that the balloon was owned by Midwest Balloon Rides of Fishers, IN. The balloon departed from Harbour Shores Church located at 8011 E. 216th St., Noblesville, and was carrying six passengers and a pilot. It's unknown at this time if the crash scene was the intended site of final destination or if another site was anticipated.

She taught for 56 years and was more than a teacher, she actually touched the lives of her students and their families. Patty was an innovator at the high school. Besides being the Home Economics Department Chairper-

of extracurricular activities, Patty created the concept of a class focused on Family Living. Long before it was vogue, Patty designed a class to cover all aspects of a person's life from birth, childhood, marriage and death. Everyone remembers their egg babies! And yes, she was also an innovator in sex education, years before the schools. She taught her students the things they needed to know to go through life including how to open a bank account to how to write thank you letters. She touched the lives of her students through how they went about their daily living. A fellow teacher wrote this week, "She taught me so much about teaching and about life. I have so many stories about her that made me a much better teacher. She always defined herself as a teacher and that's the way so many of us at NHS will remember her – one of the very best."

In addition to the Family Living courses, Patty taught all of the foods classes at the high school, from the basic to

advanced cooking. Some of her students have gone on to education. The Department of Family and Consumer Serbe professional gourmet chefs, others competed in national competitions such as those sponsored by Betty Crocker. At the school, no one could compete with Patty regarding school spirit. Always on game day she was dressed in black and gold and usually decorated the school in the same colors. Sometimes she decorated the town during sectional times. She prepared Basketball and Football banquets with food and decorations for the teams and families. 


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


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# Comfort vs. Style: The **Great Furniture Debate**

Inspectors are required by state law to attend a training session before Election Day and to pick up Election Day supplies on the Saturday before the election. Inspectors, along with the Democratic judges, will also return the election results to the Judicial Center. Inspectors receive \$150 plus \$20 for meals.

In addition to their work on Election Day, the Democratic judge must accompany the inspector to set up the polling place on Monday night and return to the Judicial Center after the polls close on election night. They receive \$100 plus \$20 for meals.





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
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
