31 named 4 Star schools

Indiana Superintendent of Public Instruction Glenda Ritz has announced Indiana's 4 Star schools.

Thirty-one Hamilton County schools are on the list. In order to achieve this designation a school must be in

the top 25th percentile of schools in three ISTEP-based categories. A total of 311 schools throughout the state received the award.

Hamilton Southeastern School District led Hamilton County with 12 schools named to the list, followed by Carmel with 11, Westfield with 5 and Noblesville with 3.

The way folks in Hamilton County cast their election votes may be much different in the future.

Instead of the 212 precincts, housed at 150 different locations, as will be the situation when voters go to the polls next month, in the future there could be only 20-plus "voting centers" for Hamilton County voters to use. Those casting ballots could do so at any of the centers, no matter were they live throughout the county.

Hamilton County's three Commissioners (Steve Dillinger, Mark Heirbrandt, Christine Altman) ended their latest meeting kicking around the new idea.

Actually, it's not a new idea. The "voting centers" already are being used in other nearby counties.

"I talked to a commissioner in Hancock County," Dillinger said. "That's what they're doing and it seems to be going over well."

"It's a good idea, but it would be costly to set up," said Kathy Richardson, Election Administrator in Hamilton County, when approached by The Reporter. "The way it would work,







Crews installing barrier wall to finish new I-69 lanes

tion (INDOT) have installed temporary barrier wall this week to resume final work on the Operation Indy Commute I-69 project to add lanes between 116th Street and I-465.

Rieth-Riley Construction, INDOT's contractor for the \$11 million project, will be adding auxiliary lanes along southbound I-69 to connect between ramps at 116th Street and 96th Street as well as 96th Street and 82nd Street.

Contractors restricted the right lane on southbound I-69 between 116th and 82nd streets Monday night and Tuesday morning to install temporary concrete barrier wall along the right shoulder. Weather permitting, crews will repeat the nightly right lane restrictions and complete this preliminary work in about one week. Once the barrier wall is

Contractors for the Indiana Department of Transporta- installed, contractors will begin removing the existing eling from one interchange ramp to the next to avoid shoulder and building the new lanes.

> All four lanes of southbound I-69 were shifted away from the shoulder last week and will remain open during peak traffic times. All lane restrictions will be scheduled for weeknights and weekends. Weeknight lane restrictions are expected to end before 6 a.m., and the new auxiliary lanes are expected to open to traffic in June.

> Last year, Rieth-Riley constructed a new southbound travel lane between 116th Street and I-465 to add capacity and improve traffic flow. The contractor also built northbound auxiliary lanes connecting interchange ramps at 82nd, 96th and 116th streets. The auxiliary lanes are intended to improve traffic flow and strategically alleviate recurring commuting bottlenecks by allowing traffic trav-

unnecessarily merging with mainline interstate traffic.

A separate \$18 million contract made capacity and configuration improvements to the I-69 Exit 205 interchange at State Road 37 and 116th Street that are now open to traffic.


