



All parties have agreed to substantive terms of a five-year lease for the space at 22 N. Range Line Rd. and expect to sign a lease soon. Pending lease signing, the new gallery could open May 1.





That's why Fishers opened the Hoosier Crossroad Conference season with 5-1 victory over visiting Noblesville on a cold and windy Wednesday afternoon.

Fishers did everything better than Noblesville.

The Tigers outhit the Miller, 10-6. Noblesville had a pair of three-hit innings, but the Millers ran themselves out of scoring bid.

Noblesville, flatout, did a terrible job on the bases. Two of the first four Millers to reach base were nailed on the base paths.

"We made lots of silly errors on the bases," Keever said.

Fishers pitcher Nathaniel Rhodes hurled a heck of a game, allowing just six hits and fanning eight. Noblesville only run came in a three-hit inning, the seventh, after Fishers had broken open the contest with three runs in the bottom of the sixth.

Rhodes didn't give Noblesville a hit or a base runner until Zack St. Pierre singled with one out in the fourth. Vinny Essig and Trevor Salmon each singled. Still, Noblesville couldn't score.

Offensively, eight of the nine Tigers contributed a hit.

The victory moved Fishers to 9-0-1 on the year. Noblesville fell to 6-3. The same two teams were to battle again in a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game tonight at The Dunk in Noblesville.
