# McCollough fired

**“A small town principal in a large school pond.”**

That was the best, and probably the most kind tweet I saw on the various Twitter sites last evening concerning the firing of Noblesville High basketball coach Dave McCollough in one of the most embarrassing moves (among many of late) in the history of Noblesville athletics.

The only comment from the school came from athletic director Mike Hasch, who was left hanging on a limb as the Noblesville High administration went off and hid.

**“Dave McCollough will not be offered a contract to coach the Noblesville basketball team next season,” Hasch told The Reporter late last evening.**

Repeated telephone calls by this writer to principal Jeff Bryant were unanswered. Nothing. Not a press release. Not even a tweet.

Bryant, who was the person, The Reporter was told, who made the decision, could not be reached after firing a man who served the Noblesville community for 21 years.

No press conference. No press release. No face to face reason given by the principal to the press.

“He (Bryant) didn’t need approval, anything official from the school board,” a source close to the situation told The Reporter.

Nothing came out of Tuesday’s school board meeting. Not even a hint from Superintendent Dr. Libbie Conner when interviewed for nearly a half-hour, on a different subject, by this writer Wednesday.

Following a recent school board meeting Bryant had commented to this writer concerning

McCollough, “I’ve said to him that he needs to toughen his schedule.”

If that’s grounds for firing, nearly every coach at Noblesville has his neck on the chopping block.

The Noblesville athletic program in recent years has become, at best, mediocre. Fifty-fifty records have been treated as victorious seasons.

Dave McCollough never fit into that mold. Seldom, if ever, did McCollough enter a Miller basketball game “without a chance to win.”

He won more games (308) than any coach in the history of Noblesville High School basketball, coming in 21 seasons. In 32 seasons overall, he has won 465 games, 13<sup>th</sup> best among all of the state’s active coaches.

## Hoosier Salon to open gallery in Carmel's Arts and Design District

Hoosier Salon, a not-for-profit organization with nearly 1,000 Indiana artist members, will relocate its main gallery to the Carmel Arts & Design District.

All parties have agreed to substantive terms of a five-year lease for the space at 22 N. Range Line Rd. and expect to sign a lease soon. Pending lease signing, the new gallery could open May 1.

"We are deeply appreciative of the support the City of Carmel has given us as we considered this move," said Donnae Dole, executive director. "Mayor James Brainard, the Carmel City Center Community Development Corporation and the Mayor's staff have been enthusiastic, helpful and patient as we worked through details."

"The Carmel Arts & Design District is an excellent location for us to help fulfill our mission through showcasing and selling works by Indiana artists. We opened a pop-up gallery during the September Art Walk and the Carmel International Arts Festival. Our sales and the volume of visitors during the trial runs convinced us the Carmel Arts & Design District is the place to be to reach art customers. The marketing support and energy created by being alongside other art destinations made the move extremely attractive."

The Hoosier Salon gallery will be the first not-for-profit gallery in the Carmel Arts & Design District. Dole believes it will bring a different and missing element to the Carmel arts scene, offering events and classes to engage artists and art lovers.

"We have been working hard to come to an agreement to bring Hoosier Salon to Carmel, and I think it's been well worth the effort," said Ron Carter, a member of the Carmel City Center Community Development Corporation. "It is our mission to help our redevelopment areas thrive and we



think Hoosier Salon will help us achieve that goal."

Hoosier Salon initially considered moving its main gallery from Broad Ripple to Carmel last fall, but the move was not financially feasible at that time.

"Our financial position has improved since October, and that caused our board to reconsider," said Emily West, board chairperson. "Two long-time supporters who shared our vision of what this gallery could mean for our artists stepped forward with generous financial support to help us make the transition to a new location."

Mayor Brainard welcomed the news as a positive step for the arts in central Indiana. "This is good news for Carmel, but it is also good news for the Indianapolis area whenever we can help sustain or grow the arts for all to experience," said Brainard. "This will be one more, significant, attraction for the Arts & Design District."

Founded in 1924, Hoosier Salon is one of Indiana's oldest and most respected visual arts organizations. Hoosier Salon has a gallery in New Harmony and has an administrative office in Indianapolis.

"This year Hoosier Salon is celebrating the 90th anniversary of its first annual exhibition," said Dole. "It is an exciting time to see our organization move forward, creating additional visibility, recognition and marketing opportunities for Indiana artists."

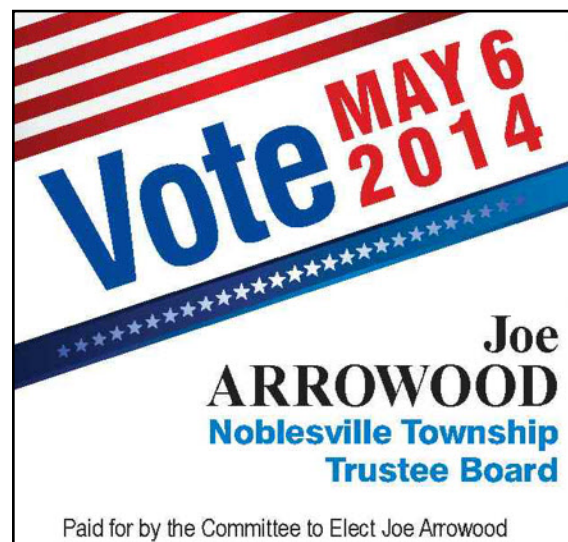

# Tigers good; Millers are not

Baseball is a pretty simple game. “We weren’t very good out there tonight,” said Noblesville mentor Justin Kever.

On the other side of the coin, Coach Matthew Cherry’s Fishers Tigers were very good.

That’s why Fishers opened the Hoosier Crossroad Conference season with 5-1 victory over visiting Noblesville on a cold and windy Wednesday afternoon.

Fishers did everything better than Noblesville.

The Tigers out-hit the Miller, 10-6. Noblesville had a pair of three-hit innings, but the Millers ran themselves out of scoring bid.

Noblesville, flat-out, did a terrible job on the bases. Two of the first four Millers to reach base were nailed on the base paths.

“We made lots of silly errors on the bases,” Kever said.

Fishers pitcher Nathaniel Rhodes hurled a heck of a game, allowing just six hits and fanning eight. Noblesville only run came in a three-hit inning, the seventh, after Fishers had broken open the contest with three runs in the bottom of the sixth.

“Rhodes had a bad game on the mound against Columbus North, but he really came back strong tonight,” said Cherry.

“We left some runners on early in the game, but I thought we were aggressive out there tonight,” Cherry continued. “Taylor Canter had a big two-run double in the sixth.”

Also doubling for the Tigers was Nicholas Podlogar. Brandon Yoho and Griffin Hulecki each collected two hits.

Rhodes didn’t give Noblesville a hit or a base runner until Zack St. Pierre singled with one out in the fourth. Vinny Essig and Trevor Salmon each singled. Still, Noblesville couldn’t score.

Offensively, eight of the nine Tigers contributed a hit.

The victory moved Fishers to 9-0-1 on the year. Noblesville fell to 6-3. The same two teams were to battle again in a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game tonight at The Dunk in Noblesville.



## Lineup set for 2014 IBCA spring clinic on April 25-26

A Coaches' Roundtable with three outstanding retired coaches and a group of outstanding speakers headlined by Marian University men's coach Todd Lickliter, Indiana State men's coach Greg Lansing and Indiana Fever assistant Stephanie White highlight the agenda for the 2014 Indiana Basketball Coaches Association annual clinic.

Lickliter, Lansing and White will be joined by Rose-Hulman men's coach Jim Shaw, Indiana Wesleyan men's coach Greg Tonagel and Indianapolis Tech boys' coach Jason Delaney as featured speakers at the two-day gathering that is set for April 25-26 at Lawrence North High School in Indianapolis. (Information about each of them is below.)

Sessions begin at 11:45 a.m. Friday, April 25 and run through 10:20 p.m. that evening. Sessions resume at 8:30 a.m. Saturday, April 26 and conclude at 12:30 p.m.

Cost to attend the clinic is \$50 for current IBCA members and \$100 for non-members.

The Coaches' Roundtable tips off the Clinic agenda and will feature retired coaches Sam Alford (former New Castle coach), Jim Irwin (former coach at Eastbrook) and Donna Sullivan (former coach at Seymour) on a panel moderated by Indiana SportsTalk host Bob Lovell. Questions from coaches in attendance will be encouraged.

The three coaches will discuss steps that they took to make their programs successful for the long run. Alford compiled a 452-245 record in 29 seasons as a high school head coach at Monroe City, South Knox, Martinsville and New Castle. Irwin was a head coach for 18 seasons -- five years at Bluffton, five years at Southern Wells, two years at Salem and six years at Eastbrook. Sullivan amassed a 344-241 record in 31 seasons as the girls' coach at Seymour. Alford and Sullivan are Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame inductees.

Another special item this year will be a session from Shoot-A-Way Basketball that will focus on game-like shooting drills. Shoot-A-Way representative Shane Adams,

a former high school and college coach in Colorado and Ohio, will make that presentation.

Also, 10 high school coaches, all selected as 2014 IBCA district Coaches of the Year, will speak during the weekend. They include boys' coaches Kent Chezem of Covington, Brent Keck of Perry Meridian, Jamie Kolkmeier of Corydon Central, Al Rhodes of Penn and Aaron Wolfe of NorthWood. Girls' coaches who will present are Chris Giffin of Lawrence North, Steve Goans of Evansville Mater Dei, Kristi Kaniewski Ulrich of Penn, Gretchen Miles of Washington and Rich Schelsky of Western Boone.

White is entering her fourth season as an assistant coach for the Indiana Fever.

The 2012 WNBA title held special meaning for White, who was one of the original Fever players in 2000 and a member of the Fever's All-Decade Team announced in 2009. She retired from playing in the WNBA following the 2004 season, and she has coached in the college or pro ranks since 2003.

White's hiring in 2011 marked the first time the Fever has hired an assistant coach with pro playing experience. White was reunited with Fever head coach Lin Dunn, the former Purdue coach who recruited White to the West Lafayette campus.

Prior to joining the Fever, White spent four seasons as an assistant coach with the Chicago Sky after previous stints as a college assistant at Ball State, Kansas State and Toledo.

White also has parlayed her playing and coaching into a prominent broadcasting career with the Big Ten Network and ESPN. She appears regularly on the BTN women's basketball studio show and provides game analysis for both networks.

After leading Purdue to a national championship in 1999 and being drafted by the Charlotte Sting, White was acquired by the Fever in a draft-day trade in December 1999 to lead her hometown team into its first season of existence. A former Indiana Miss Basketball and a Purdue All-American, White played four seasons with the Fever and five pro seasons overall.
