# Changing landscape

Noblesville's near east side and the city's near north/east side will experience huge changes the next few years. Some will come almost immediately. Others will take time to develop.

Triggering the changes will be: education, recreation and athletics.

Here is what an investigation by The Reporter has found. \*Old Conner School will be sold to the City. That move was made possible when the Noblesville School Board earlier this week approved the sale.

The City then will turn over Conner School and the land between Conner and the Noblesville Boys & Girls Club

### Westfield non-waivered graduation rate best in Central Indiana

Westfield High School has posted the highest non-waivered graduation rate in Central Indiana. The Indiana Department of Education released the high school graduation rates for the class of 2013 on April 16 and Westfield High School had a non-waivered (students passing the end of course assessments) graduation rate of 96.6 percent; the highest of any high school in Central Indiana.

When waivered students were included, the graduation rate increased to 98.4 percent, five percentage points higher than the previous year. These results, once again, reflect the quality of our administrators and teachers, the work ethic of the students, and the support from parents and the community. Everyone should be very proud of this achievement.

Walden stated the estimated billing period occured during the extremely cold weather, a time when many residents used more water by keeping their water running to avoid freezing pipes.



# Fire in Carmel destroys barn

Each April, Safe Digging Month serves as a reminder to Hoosiers to call 811 before digging to learn the approximate location of underground utilities. This FREE service will prevent the inconvenient service outages and tragic incidents that can occur when an underground gas, electric, communications, water or sewer line is hit during dig-

There are nearly 20 million miles of underground utility lines in the United States. These buried facilities, including gas, water, sewer, cable TV, high-speed Internet, landline telephone and electric, neighbors, and costly repairs. provide the services Americans depend on for their basic everyday needs.

If you are planning a job that involves digging, even if you plan to hire a professional, a call to 811 is required at least two

where in the country to the appropriate local one-call center, which in this area is Indiana

Indiana 811 will then alert the affected underground facility owners so they can dispatch locators to mark the approximate location of their lines with paint or flags.

Every six minutes an underground utility line is damaged because someone decided to dig without first calling 811. Also, according to a recent Common Ground Alliance survey, 45 percent of people who plan to dig this year will not call 811 first, despite there being 100 billion feet of utility lines buried underground in the United States. Unintentionally striking a line can result in inconvenient outages for entire neighborhoods, harm to yourself or your

Every digging project, no matter how large or small, warrants a call to 811. Installing a mailbox, building a deck and planting a tree are all examples of digging projects that should only begin after you full working days before you begin. 811 is have waited at least two full working days a free, FCC-designated national one-call after calling and confirmed that all facility

Here's how it works:

- 1. One free, simple phone call to 811 makes it easy for Indiana 811 to notify all appropriate utility companies of your intent to dig.
- 2. Call two full working days prior to digging to ensure enough time for utility lines to be marked accurately.
- 3. When you call 811, a representative from Indiana 811 will ask for the location and description of your digging project.
- 4. Indiana 811 will notify affected utility companies, which will then send professional locators to the proposed dig site to mark the approximate location of your lines.
- 5. Once lines have been accurately marked, roll up those sleeves and carefully dig around the marked areas.

### **Four Hamilton County students** among Lilly **Endowment Scholars**

Thirteen students from Marion and Hamilton counties have been named recipients of four-year, full-tuition scholarships as the Central Indiana Community Foundation (CICF) 2014 Lilly Endowment Community Schol-

A total of 99 central Indiana students were interviewed for the scholarships, which stipulated that recipients must: plan to pursue a fulltime baccalaureate course of study beginning in the fall of 2014 at a public or private college or university in Indiana; demonstrate an un-weighted GPA of at least 2.5 (3.0 for students in Hamilton County); demonstrate financial need; demonstrate leadership or initiative in their school or community; and promise to, upon graduation, give back to the com-

Thirty Hamilton County students were interviewed by the Hamilton County Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship Selection Committee for the scholarships following nominations by their school counselors. The following four were selected as scholarship recipients: Michael Boyer, Sheridan High School; Lucas Miller, Fishers High School; Stephen (Pete) Freeman, Noblesville High School; and Christopher White, Herron High School.

Sixty-nine Marion County students were interviewed by the Marion County Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship Selection Committee for the scholarships following nominations by their school counselors. The following nine were selected as as scholarship recipients: Keenan Rhodes, Park Tudor High School; Jesus Bazan, Lawrence Central High School; Maddison Schiller, Cardinal Ritter High School; Nupe Vinton, Franklin Central High School; Caleb Guerrero, Key Learning Community; Elsa Posada, Ben Davis University High School; Syretha Shirley, Pike High School; Ana Sainz, Cardinal Ritter High School; and Katie Thien, Lawrence North High School. Chastity Li of Ben Davis High School was originally awarded a scholarship but declined in order to accept an offer of admission to an out-of-state university.

Each nominee was nominated by his/her guidance counselor before being invited to complete an application and then interview through The Indianapolis Foundation, a CICF affiliate serving Marion County or Legacy Fund, a CICF affiliate serving Hamilton County. Any accredited high school could nominate up to two students in each county. Following the application and interview process, the finalists' names were submitted to Independent Colleges of Indiana, Inc. (ICI) for final approval.

The scholarships are the result of a statewide Lilly Endowment initiative to help Hoosier students reach higher levels of education. Indiana ranks among the lowest states in the percentage of residents over the age of 25 with a bachelor's degree. A total of 143 scholarships were awarded statewide.





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
