Cicero without a “Cookie”

For the first time in a long time, the Town of Cicero soon will be running out of “Cookies.”

Jerry Cook, an eight-year member of the Cicero Town Board, is not running for re-election. That will mark the end, officially, for now, for a member of the

Cook family not being a public servant in the northern Hamilton County community.

“My Dad (Gus) was Cicero Town Marshall from 1942-1961,” Cook told The Reporter in an exclusive interview earlier this week.

Jerry Cook has done it all, seen it all as Cicero has grown. In his earlier years he served as the Town Marshall, a job Cook said also meant handling the duties as the

“unofficial” Fire Chief for a period of time. That was in 1964-67 and then again in 1970-98. Jerry left for three years to work for the Hamilton County Sheriff Department.

“Our base station was our home, and my wife was the dispatcher,” Cook said about his first service as Town Marshall.

The Cook family, arguably, has been the No. 1 family in law enforcement in Hamilton County. Brother Larry was the


Cicero Town Marshall from 1961-64 after his Dad’s death and the Hamilton County Sheriff from 1971 to 1979. Brother Gary, who currently serves in the Hamilton County probation department and also does drug testing for the county, was the Town Marshall 1998 to 2010.

8th-Logan intersection reopens

The intersection of 8th and Logan streets reopened to traffic Tuesday afternoon, after being closed for several days due to the railroad track replacement project.

However, construction isn't finished yet in the downtown area. 8th Street will remain closed until the end of the day Thursday in two places: 1) in front of the Hamilton County Judicial Center and 2) just north of Logan Street.

Also on Thursday, the section of 8th Street from Maple Avenue to just south of Conner Street will be closed from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. so that the railroad signals can be reinstalled and tested. The entire portion of 8th Street that has been affected by the railroad track replacement project is projected to be open for good by the end of the day on Thursday.

The City of Noblesville truly appreciates the patience of the public during this construction project.

“This time I’m done,” Jerry said in a manner in which he appeared to be trying to convince himself.

“There is no term limit for being on the Town Board, but I came to this positions with my own limits. I told myself eight years would be enough. I limited myself to two terms. I believe in the two party system and I believe in term limits.”

Would he reconsider at a later date?

“Maybe,” Cook answered. “But, for now, I’m done.”

Cook is leaving behind many accomplishments.

“I guess the causeway currently under construction is the biggest thing which has happened in Cicero in my eight years on the board,” Cook said. “Heck, that’s a \$2.5 million project. It will connect the two sides of Morse Reservoir, and that’s something which is badly needed. It’s a 12-foot wide walkway (not connected to the bridge) on the south side of the bridge. There are 420 homes in Morse Landing (on the west) and many of those homes have young kids who use the bridge to cross the reservoir. That has been a dangerous situation.

“The road (State Road 47) should be open in June. (Currently, there is a stop-and-go traffic light on both sides of the bridge). After that, the road will be repaved from the cemetery to the east end of Jackson Street. Completion date is June.”

There will be no parking on the north side of the bridge and no fishing from the causeway.

The area on the west side of the bridge, Morse Landing, has been Cicero’s biggest growth area since the hosing section first opened in 1980.

“Drainage problems have been the biggest reason why Cicero hasn’t grown in other directions,” Cook said.

“We starting to grow a little on he south side. We have a new Dollar General Store and a CVS and a couple of new restaurants have opened in the downtown

“We need more businesses in order to grow,” Cook believes. “We need more retail. We could use a factory, too, but that is a dog eat dog battle with southern Hamilton County.”

The west side of Cicero certainly looks promising for growth, the area bounded by 231 Street and Tollgate, near Bear Slide Golf Course, There are about 50 homes I a subdivision, Vintage Woods.

Cook also is proud of the growth of park facilities and walking trails. Cicero Community Park, located near the library, has seen grown with leaps and bounds, especially with the number of new youth baseball and softball diamonds.

Cicero will continue to grow in the future. It may be the best kept secret in Hamilton County. Among others, Cicero can thank Jerry Cook for what it is today. And, don’t bet he is finished with what he helped start.

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Mountain bike trails, sledding hill among the amenities...

Fishers Town Council breaks ground on future destination park

Town of Fishers’ officials broke ground on a new, year-round park located near 101st St. and Cyntheanne Rd. today. The facility will bring new amenities to the Fishers Parks system such as mountain bike trails and a 50 ft. sledding hill, and includes the reforestation of up to 20 acres.

“Fishers Parks and Recreation is currently growing to meet the needs of our community,” said Town Manager Scott Fadness. “Our parks help preserve the lauded quality of life here in Fishers’ and the offerings in this park will bring something new, and inclusive, to our community.”

Once complete, the new park will offer a 50 foot sledding hill, more than a mile of trails for walking, a two-mile progressive mountain bike course, a fishing pond, tree houses for nature play and 59 acres of green space. The tree houses and sledding hill are Americans with Disabilities Act compliant and accessible to all ability levels. The progressive mountain bike course is expected to attract mountain bike enthusiasts from the region.

“The Town of Fishers recognizes the importance of parks and greenspaces in our community,” said Town Council President, John Weingardt. “Not only do improvement projects like this one increase property values and attract residents, it also brings visitors into Fishers and can have a positive economic impact on our community.”

Fishers Parks & Recreation plans to dedicate up to 20 acres of the 60-acre park to reforestation efforts. Reforestation areas will be located near the entrance of the park, as well as throughout the progressive bike trails, and will protect local habitat.

The Fishers Department of Public Works (DPW) is slated to begin construction this spring. Currently, DPW is working with local partners to bring fill-dirt to the location for the construction of the sledding hill. The park is expected to open to the public late this fall.

Fishers residents will be asked to participate in the naming of the new facility this summer.

Brainard headlines Earth Day program...

Carmel mayor speaks at Drake University climate panel

Mayor Jim Brainard headlined a special Earth Day program Tuesday on climate change, sponsored by The New Republic Magazine at Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa – a special event that included Thomas J. Vilsack, the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture and Frank Cownie, mayor of Des Moines.

The event focused on climate change action at the local level and the role climate change initiatives will play in future political campaigns. The interviews and panel discussion took place before an audience of 150 students, faculty, policy experts, industry leaders, and media. The event was partially underwritten by the League of Women Voters.

“It was a true honor to join this distinguished panel to discuss climate change and issues that I and many others feel are of supreme importance to our nation and our cities. I believe it is important to share some of our success stories in Carmel at events such as this, while learning about others as well,” said Mayor Brainard.

The event also coincided with Tuesday’s release by the U.S. Conference of Mayors of a new climate survey showing that cities with a mayoral pledge or formal city council action to curb carbon emissions are making progress on their goals, with two-thirds reporting quantifiable reductions in emissions from city operations and one-third for citywide emissions.

Bridgeport, CT Mayor Bill Finch and Mayor Brainard presented the survey findings during a national press conference call to highlight U.S. mayors’ climate efforts, which were based on responses from 282 mayors representing cities of all population sizes and from all regions. Entitled Climate Mitigation and Adaptation Actions in America’s Cities, the survey is the latest of three reports on successful city-led efforts to curb greenhouse gas emissions and prepare for climatic events, adding to previously-released findings on city energy efficiency and technology initiatives and how cities invested federal stimulus funds to reduce energy use, deploy new energy technologies and curb harmful energy emissions.

Last December, Mayor Brainard was a keynote speaker and panelist at a special climate change event hosted by The New Republic at the Freedom Forum in Washington. Mayor Brainard is a member of the White House Task Force on Climate Preparedness and Resilience and hosted one of its first meetings at the Monon Community Center in Carmel.

Kinthead won’t speak at Atlanta Council Sheridan Town Council president withdraws request

A spokesperson for the Town of Atlanta indicated Sheridan Town Council President David Kinthead withdrew his request to appear before the Atlanta Town Council.

The Hamilton County Reporter earlier reported Kinthead had requested to discuss with the Atlanta Town Board the transition of law enforcement duties from Atlanta to the sheriff’s department.

Last week several Sheridan residents and business owners expressed concern Sheridan might be considering disbanding its police department and contracting out law enforcement duties to the sheriff.

been hit with the rash of telephone calls, emails, letters, and from conversation on the streets than I’ve had concerning this story.

Seldom did I get a telephone call; seldom did I read an email that the question wasn’t always the same.

Why was Dave McCollough fired and who pulled the trigger?

Just before beginning this column, the last telephone caller I had pleaded, “Don, just tell us why. Tell us who and tell us why.”

I can’t; I simply do not know. I’ve heard the rumors. All of the rumors, But, believe me, I do not know. It makes no sense to me.

How can a 20-year service to a community and a high school so suddenly end?

I’ve received calls and emails from men who have coached with McCollough; from players (now adults) who have played for McCollough; from parents who had sons who played for McCollough. They all ask the same question: why, and who made the decision?

The best email I received came from a NHS graduate, who wrote: “Dave McCollough is a great youth leader. Dave McCollough is a great basketball coach. Dave McCollough is a great family man and parent. Dave McCollough has represented this community and our high school so well for so many years. Why has this happened?”

The best comment I’ve heard from a telephone caller came from a senior parent of a Noblesville basketball player. She didn’t want to be identified because, “My son still has six more weeks at that high school.” She said she believes that school officials never made a fair investigation of the incident which, they say, led to the firing. That came in a late-season practice when a basketball was thrown at McCollough and the coach threw back the ball and hit the player. “They didn’t interview my son, even though he was a senior leader on the team,” the parent said. “Coach Mac took my son as a freshman boy and made him a man. He pushed him; he motivated him; Coach Mac made a man of him. They didn’t want to talk to my son, but instead listened to a group of junior players who complained about being pushed too hard.”

Did the juniors complain? I don’t know. Did school officials listen to one class of basketball players who in another year will no longer be playing at Noblesville High School? Did those who made the call to fire Coach Mac talk with former players?

“I hated some of his practices; they were hard,” one former player told me. “Really, I didn’t like the coach when I played for him. But, now that I’m an adult, I understand how much of a role he played in helping me become an adult. You’ll find many of those who played for Coach Mac feel the same way. I just wish there was something we could do to help him.”

Why?

I thought I would get the answers from the Coach. In a conversation with him Tuesday evening, McCollough wasn’t placing blame.

“It has been a good run, here at Noblesville,” McCollough told me. “It was a good 20 years, working with lots of good players and coaches. I’ve worked with lots of quality people. I’ve enjoyed it. (The late and former principal) Jack Ford told me a long time ago that Noblesville is a great place to raise a family. He was right.”

McCollough gave no answer as to why.

“They did not offer me an opportunity to resign,” he said. “They brought me in and said I would not be offered a contract for next year. I thought the (ball throwing) incident was over long ago.”

Sad thing, for Noblesville basketball fans and for the school, Dave McCollough isn’t the first great basketball coach to not survive a witch hunt, which this was. Nor, unless this community wakes up and establishes high goals and expects that from their school leader, McCollough won’t be the last.

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Dilley hired as Guerin football head coach

It didn't take long for Guerin Catholic athletic director Chris Buhler to figure out that Tom Dilley was the perfect choice to be the Golden Eagles' next head football coach.

At a meeting Tuesday evening at the Eagles' Nest to introduce Dilley, Buhler said he had three different conversations - one of them with legendary coach Dick Dullaghan - and when Dilley's name came up, the general consensus was "Hire him!"

It's easy to see why. Dilley has been a coach since graduating from Ball State University in 1989. After a year at Penn, where he was an assistant coach, he came down to Indianapolis and became a Bishop Chatard Trojan.

Dilley served as Chatard's assistant coach from 1990-98, then as the head coach from 1999-2002. In 2001 and 2002, the Trojans won back-to-back state championships, finishing the 2002 season a perfect 15-0. Dilley was on the North-South All-Star coaching staff in 2001-02, and named the Nike Indiana Coach of the Year in 2001.

After his highly successful tenure at Chatard, Dilley went to Lawrence North, coaching there from 2003-12. This past season, Dilley was an assistant coach for Butler University, helping the team to a 9-4 record and an appearance in the NCAA Division I Football Championship.

"Everything you've done in the past is part of what you've become," said Dilley. "I think all of us bring all of our past experiences with us. I've learned something everywhere I've been and I feel like I do have a pretty good, extensive and diverse background of experience to draw on."

Dilley will become the coach of a team that is still very young history-wise, but has also accomplished quite a bit in just a few years. Guerin Catholic won back-to-back regional championships in 2010-11, and shrugged off a tough schedule last season to win sectionals. All those titles came under Andy Kremer, who left the position to become an assistant principal at GCHS.

"It's a great place and I've heard nothing but great things," said Dilley. "They have had great experiences with people who are either here now or have been here in the past, and everybody's impression of this community has been wonderful."

The Golden Eagles, of course, are excited to have a coach of Dilley's caliber on their team.

"Tom Dilley is a man of great faith, and a proven winner," said Buhler in a statement released by the school prior to the meeting. "I truly believe that Tom is one of the finest high school football coaches in the state of Indiana and we are very excited to welcome him to the Guerin Catholic family."

In that same statement, Guerin Catholic Principal James McNeany added, "We had many candidates with proven success on the football field. What made Coach Dilley stand out was that everybody we talked to spoke of his high character and ability to be a role model for young men while modeling his Christian faith. He is a great fit for our school."

After Dilley addressed the crowd and took a few questions, he met a group of Golden Eagle athletes, all of whom lined up to shake his hand. So Dilley is off to a good start in making a difference in the lives of his students.

"We're here to help all of them reach their full potential," said Dilley. "A by-product of that, I'm hopeful, will be a lot of success on the scoreboard and success on the field. Our goal will always be to attain the highest level of success possible. But first and foremost is the development of our participants."
