Inspectors are required by state law to attend a training session before Election Day and to pick up Election Day supplies on the Saturday before the election. Inspectors,

along with the Democrat Judges, will also return the election results to the Judicial Center. Inspectors receive

In addition to their work on Election Day, the Democrat Judge must accompany the Inspector to set up the polling place on Monday night and returning to the Judicial Center after the polls close on Election night. They receive \$100.00 plus \$20.00 for meals.

Republican Judge and Clerk and the Democrat Clerk receive \$95.00 plus \$20.00 for meals.

#### Arcadia needs help...

### **Looking to** commissioners

Small towns standing up and battling for their rights. Happens all the time, although not so much today in Hamilton County, Indiana. One reason for that is that there aren't many small towns in this county.

However, Arcadia is a small town, located in northern Hamilton County. Arcadia has had it. Arcadia has too much water and, what Arcadia folks believe, not enough help from county government.

Flooding is Arcadia's problem. When heavy rains come, water from surrounding farm fields come rushing into Arcadia, with no place to go. The problem has gotten so bad that at the Arcadia Town Council meeting earlier this week three residents told the Council that they've had enough, they are moving, if, of course, they're able to sell that often-flooded homes.

"If this was Noblesville or Carmel, the problem would have been fixed a long time ago," said Council president Bill Cook shortly after calling the meeting to order. Fellow Councilmen Glen Shrock and Maurice St. Louis agreed.

Then, along came a fresh breath, a knight in shinning armor riding a white horse, coming for affluent southern Hamilton County.

Well, something like that. Actually, it was Hamilton County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt, driving in from Westfield

Heirbrandt listened to the Arcadia folks. He took notes. He formed a committee to help find a solution.

"I'll help," Heirbrandt promised. "But, I'm only one of three (commissioners)."

Heirbrandt represents a huge area, an area which has grown in recent years with the population growth of Westfield. And, with the growth of still-small, but growing, Cicero.

Cicero is Arcadia's "sister city." Back in the day, the territory was known as the "Tri-Towns," Cicero, Arcadia and Atlanta. Cicero, population-wise, is quickly outgrowing Arcadia and tiny Atlanta.

Cicero sits south of Arcadia, not all that far away from Noblesville (the county seat) and Westfield. Arcadia, and Atlanta are closer to Tipton in Tipton County, which hasn't grown like Noblesville and Westfield.

Cicero has Morse Reservoir, a big plus to growth. Arcadia has the schools, the high school, junior high, elementary. Morse has become a bigger attraction to Cicero than Huskyland schools have become to Arcadia.

# **Noblesville Police officers** arrest burglary suspect

At approximately 2:20 p.m. Thursday, Noblesville Police officers responded to the 400-block of Woodview Drive on a possible burglary in progress. Dispatch received a call from a concerned neighbor who observed a dark vehicle drop off a white male who went to their neighbor's front door. The neighbor was able to give a great description of the suspect and stayed on the line with 9-1-1 while officers were en-route to the location. The neighbor advised 9-1-1 that the suspect appeared to be looking for a hidden key and then disappeared to the rear of the neighbor's residence.

Moments later, Noblesville officers arrived on scene and observed the suspect coming through the yard towards Woodview Drive and were able to apprehend him. The suspect was identified as Luke Voorhees (32) of Noblesville, IN. Voorhees stated that he had a relapse on prescription medication abuse and knew the residence had prescriptions in it. Voorhees is being held at the Hamilton County Jail pending charges of Burglary (Class C Felony), Possession of a Controlled Substance (Class D Felony), and Possession of Paraphernalia (Class A Misdemeanor).




