



On May 4, 2014 at 3 p.m. near the south entrance of Forest Park in Noblesville, a special dedication will take place for the Angel of Hope memorial. After years of "hope" and dedication, a group of people, the Park Board and many contributors will officially open a place for everyone who wishes to have a quiet moment to reflect on a child or loved one who is no longer with

their family. Everyone is welcome to the dedication.

The angel is bronze with the face of a child, arms raised out as a child wanting to be lifted. In her wings is HOPE. The angel represents all children who have passed away regardless of age. The first Angel of Hope was dedicated December 6, 1994 in Salt Lake City. Since then 115 of the monuments have been created and placed in

special memorial gardens around the country.

Hochstedler takes Best of Show at Heights' Rube Goldberg competition

Hawkins Hochstedler, an eighth grader from Hamilton Heights Middle School, won Best of Show for the 2014 Rube Goldberg contest. Hochstedler, who titled his machine "Fore!," used 18 steps to pour cereal into a bowl, and as a bonus, also added milk.

Other winners for this year's event included Kaleb Rulon (1st place), Kylie Rose, Jenna McGrew and Chance Jozsa (tie for 2nd place) and Stewart Hulen, Madilyn Hasler and Ana Collar (tie for 3rd place). Honorable mention went to several other teams with outstanding projects.

The annual competition, now in its 14th year, is a rite of passage for Heights' eighth-grade students. Students work together in teams to design the most complex method of performing a simple task. This year's assignment involved developing a process to put cereal into a bowl using at least 12 steps. The contest is conducted each spring and pays homage to the late cartoonist Rube Goldberg, whose drawings displayed whimsical machines with complex mechanisms to perform simple tasks.

"This year, there were 102 machines submitted and many creative themes ranging from the supernatural, zombies, sports, movies and a little bit of everything else in between," said Terry Reed, Middle School Science Teacher and project coordinator for this eighth grade specialty contest. The brainchild of Reed and retired Hamilton Heights Science Teacher, Janet Weber, the Rube Goldberg Machine Contest has evolved into one of the best activities to promote teamwork, problem solving and creative thought among Heights Middle School students.

"It is a challenging project that engages students with amazing results of creativity in terms of the items they utilize to perform a complex objective, continued Reed. "The caliber of projects submitted for this year's Rube Goldberg Machine Design contest this year was fantastic."

High school physics class students like Melanie Magdun, Sydney Gruntler and Lukas Sipe who themselves, participated in the contest when they were in eighth grade, served as judges. They worked in pairs to evaluate each project based on a specific set of criteria to determine the top place finishers. "There were some pretty cool projects this year," said Sydney Gruntler. "Every single project was different."

"It was interesting to judge the project that we had to create when we were in eighth grade," added Melanie Magdun.

Lukas Sipe said it was great to come back four years later to see the hard work and creativity this eighth grade class put into their projects this year.

Dear Editor:
I appeal to the Hamilton County voter conscience to support Brian Poindexter for Hamilton County Superior Court 3 Judge. All of Hamilton County public safety supports him, and for good reason. Incumbent Judge William Hughes was arrested in North Carolina for driving while intoxicated. As most of you will know, Hamilton County is tough on DUIs. If you happen to be arrested for drunk driving, you will spend a night in jail, have your vehicle impounded, lose your license, pay a fine, and be required to attend a driving class. If you are in a position of authority, such as a teacher or coach, you will immediately lose your job. This is justifiable by our laws because of the terrible injuries, loss of life, and property damage caused by drunk driving. Judge Hughes did not suffer these consequences for his DUI. Even though his blood alcohol content was .13, almost twice the legal limit for North Carolina, (and Indiana) his charge was changed to a reckless driving charge. I have no personal vendetta with Judge Hughes; I just think the law and consequences for breaking it are there for all of us equally.

Fishers celebrates Tree City membership for sixth consecutive year

This year marks the sixth consecutive year that the Town of Fishers has been an active member in Tree City USA, an organization that seeks to improve forestry management and encourages community awareness, education and involvement in forestation efforts.

"Our membership in Tree City USA is something we are very proud of," said Town Manager Scott Fadness. INDOT gives city \$4.2 million for Main Street project

The Indiana Department of Transportation joined Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard and Vincennes Mayor Joe Yochum to announce local transportation projects that will be advanced using state funds under recent legislation. Carmel will use \$4.2 million in state funds to expand Main Street near U.S. 31 and Vincennes will use \$2.3 million to rebuild sections of 2nd Street.

"INDOT sets aside a portion of its federal highway funding each year for local transportation projects," said INDOT Chief of Staff Troy Woodruff. "But over the years, federal laws and regulations have increased the time and tax dollars needed to improve Indiana's economy and transportation safety."

Passed by the Indiana General Assembly in 2013, House Enrolled Act 1067 allows INDOT to swap \$1 in federal funds with 75 cents in state funds.

"When local units receive federal funding for transportation, there are often many strings attached," said State Rep. Bob Cherry (R-Greenfield), who authored HEA 1067. "Under the federal exchange program, local units will be able to fund more road and bridge projects. This puts another tool in the toolbox for local government. It's a win-win for both state and local units."

The local government will bid projects approved for the program and project costs will be reimbursed by INDOT. The local government is responsible for paying at least 10 percent of the overall project cost, down from the 20 percent match required for federal-aid contracts.

"The city of Carmel has shown what can be accomplished when local and state governments work together on its own projects, and this will continue with our Main Street project," said Mayor Jim Brainard.

In 2007, INDOT turned over five miles of what is now known as Keystone Parkway so the city could transform the corridor by building six roundabout interchanges. Carmel used all city funds, including those gained from the road transfer, to accelerate the construction schedule and minimize land impacts.

As INDOT currently builds new roundabout interchanges along the U.S. 31 corridor, Carmel plans to expand and rebuild Main Street on either side to accommodate the increased traffic. The city's Main Street project calls for new utility lines, curbs, gutters, storm sewers and sidewalks. The Main Street roundabouts that serve Illinois and Old Meridian streets will also be expanded to accommodate two lanes of traffic. The city may make improvements between Old Meridian and Guilford Road as funding allows.

Carmel will use the state funds to expedite the project, allowing it to be completed during U.S. 31 construction. INDOT will continue to be responsible for the U.S. 31 interchange, including the Main Street overpass between the ramps. Weather permitting, the city's construction would begin this fall and conclude in the spring of 2015.

Police Department honors employees, citizens at dinner

On Thursday, March 13, Carmel Police Department held its annual State of the Department and Awards Recognition Dinner. This formal event recognizes not only employees of the police department for outstanding service but also citizens for heroic deeds. This year Carmel Police Department recognized 22 employees for outstanding service during the 2013 year. These awards ranged from highly credible acts of service to outstanding acts of bravery. Distinguished guests included City of Carmel Mayor James Brainard and Chief Tim Green.

The Carmel Police Department also honored four citizens for their outstanding initiative and bravery during adverse conditions. David Landborg, Jason O'Neil and David Selmer were recognized for rescuing two people from a sinking vehicle that had crashed into a retention pond. This event occurred on April 26th, 2013 in the area of 126th/Hazel Dell Parkway. In recognition of their quick thinking and actions, they were awarded a Certificate of Commendation.

A 13-year-old male was recognized for assisting the Carmel Police Department in apprehending a burglary suspect on July 1st, 2013. The 13-year-old and his 6-year-old sister were home alone when an intruder entered their residence. The 13-year-old called 911 and alerted police to the intruder. He quickly got his sister and the family dog and exited the home. In recognition of his quick action and bravery while an intruder was inside his home, the 13-year-old was awarded a Certificate of Commendation.

Carmel Police Department would also like to thank the Carmel Fraternal Order of Police, Lodge #185 for helping sponsor the event.

City completes purchase of Brookshire Swim Pool

The City of Carmel has completed the purchase of the Brookshire Swim Pool. The pool property is now reunited with the golf course property and under complete city ownership. The property was purchased from Brookshire Swim Club Inc. for a price of \$70,000 after two appraisals where completed by the City indicating an average value of \$100,000 for the property.

The pool will now be managed by the Brookshire Homeowner's Association.

"Approximate 15 years ago, Charles Weinkauff, who is now deceased, Debbie Eckstein, Jobea Trefny, Kim TeKolste and I joined together and formed Brookshire Swim Club Inc. to operate the swimming pool for the benefit of the Brookshire and surrounding neighborhoods so that families would have a safe and convenient

place for family swimming fun," said Leo Dierckman, current President of Brookshire Swim Club. "I would like to thank all of our board members and their families for the countless hours of dedicated service that they gave to help this vision be a reality for so many years. We also thank all of our pool members over the years for their support."

Mayor Jim Brainard also thanked the board for its hard work and dedication.

"Today's announcement is a good example of government empowering neighborhoods to take ownership and responsibility for amenities that benefit their close community. Such an effort is a continuation of a long tradition of the City working with its many great neighborhoods in Carmel," said Mayor Brainard.





Westfield has two event leaders with Colin Rinne in the 3200 run and with its 3200 relay team of Alex Hartman, Johnny Crawford, Ethan Worthington and Eric Gonzalez.
