

The State Fair Commission also honored agriculture with this renovation by keeping multiple animal entry/exit points to the arena floor and by rebuilding the 9 ft. wall that surrounds it. Multiple entry/exit points allow shows to keep a swift pace, and Draft Horse exhibitors around North America laud the wall for its gradual curve that helps guide teams of horses naturally around the arena. In addition, visitors of all Coliseum events will see a special one-minute video message detailing the importance of contemporary agriculture and the key role that Indiana plays in feeding the world.

The renovation did little to change the outside appearance of the Coliseum, but the inside has been completely transformed and now boasts several amenities that include:

- A spacious lobby with elevators to carry guests up to the main concourse
- More than 70 wall-mounted flatscreen TV monitors throughout the build-
 - Full ADA accessibility
- A double-tiered seating bowl with great sight lines from every seat
- An overhead LED video scoreboard and a video ribbon board that goes around the seating bowl


