Turner cleared of breaking rules, makes statement

An Indiana House Ethics Committee cleared Rep. Eric Turner (R-Cicero) of breaking any rules after he lobbied against a bill that would have harmed his family's nursing home business.

Turner released the following statement:

"I'm very appreciative of the House Ethics Committee's decision and clearing my record of service in the Indiana House of Representatives. The Ethics Committee

voted unanimously that my brief comments regarding my expertise on the nursing home moratorium issue during the 2014 Legislative Session were consistent with House Rules and the House Code of Ethics.

"I fully support the recommendation from the House Ethics Committee to further examine disclosure requirements in the coming months. In fact, I willingly provided

greater transparency in my answers to the Committee's interrogatories.

"I always believed I acted clearly within the House rules and the House Code of Ethics while offering my expertise on a particular issue. A core function of a citizen legislature is for members to bring their expertise to share with other members of the General Assembly. I offered my expertise on the nursing home moratorium in

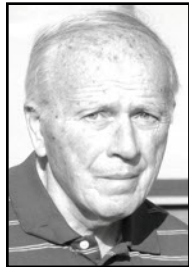
caucus because I have been involved in the industry as a passive investor in senior care real estate for many years.

"For 24 years, it has been an honor to serve the residents of House District 32 and I look forward to continuing to represent constituents and communities throughout my district in the next session of the Indiana General Assembly."

Guard gets land; Schools get armory

Both groups looked as pleased as punch.



There were smiles on both sides of the table on the second floor of the Noblesville Schools Administration Building Wednesday afternoon for a historic meeting. Historic, let me tell you, because never before had the Indiana National Guard and Noblesville Schools met for a big land trade.

Noblesville Schools transferred land north of the City (on State Road 31), approximately 50 acres valued at nearly \$1 million, and in exchange got a piece of property the Schools had sought for years. The armory, on Field Drive west of the high school, has stood as kind of an island surrounded by school property.

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Libbie Conner told the Reporter a couple of weeks ago that at the next school board meeting she will revealed plans for that area.

It was a good exchange, for both sides. The National Guard doesn't have funds to purchase land like they received from Noblesville Schools and Noblesville Schools doesn't have funds to purchase the armory.

The citizen soldiers are expected to clear the building by May 31. Conner, at the school board meeting, likely will announce when Noblesville Schools will move in, and with what.

The National Guard hopes to come up with funding to build what likely will be a huge armory, which is what the state and national governments do with new armories today. Noblesville Schools, some believe, may announce, plans for a new football stadium on armory land, once they sell their current football field to Ivy Tech for more parking at a regional campus which will open this coming fall.

Noblesville Schools responds...

Student charges bullying

Noblesville Schools, in the form of a press release email, gave a quick, firm and strong answer to charges from a Noblesville parent that bullying had been involved in a fight at East Middle School

The parent, Steven Patton, was quoted on an Indianapolis TV station (Channel 6) that his seventh grade son was bullied for more than a year.

The student's parents told TV-6 that taunts, racial slurs and indifference from school administrators ended violently and publicly when a video of a fight at Noblesville East Middle School was posed on several social media sites

The two boys fighting, Channel 6 reported, were suspended, but the father of one of the teens, Patton, said the video shows the culmination of nearly two years of bullying and threats.

Noblesville Schools responded to the charges.

"We are very disappointed that the news article about an altercation among some students at East Middle School last week had various inaccuracies in the report regarding the incident, surrounding circumstances and our policies and procedures regarding bullying," Noblesville school answered in its press release.

"Noblesville Schools wants to assure parents that our staff takes all reported threats to students very seriously, investigates them thoroughly and handles them at a zero tolerance status. Student safety is always our number one priority," Noblesville Schools said.

The Reporter attempted to reach Patton and could not do so before press deadline.

Patton, on the TV web-site, said his son was defending himself after another student threatened to stab him last week. He said other students blocked the bathroom entrance where the fight took place.

Patton said he told teachers that he was being harassed and subjected to racial slurs.

He said he also went to an assistant principal and warned that students were planning to attack him and nothing was done.

Noblesville Schools contends that nothing had been reported.

"Noblesville Schools requires our staff members to participate in anti-bullying training that includes definitions identification and reporting procedures for incidents of bullying," the School District said in its press release. "We have always encouraged and provided a means for students and families to anonymously or in person report any concerns to their teacher, to the office, or to make a confidential report."

Patton reportedly told TV-6 that his son received a five-day suspension during ISEP testing. He said his son kept the bullying from him until recently. He said his son's grades have suffered and he's become fearful and depressed.

Greenfield Avenue accident injures four

On April 30th, 2014 at approximately 2:17 p.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the 1600 block of Greenfield Avenue (Noblesville) in reference to a report of a two-car motor vehicle crash. A short time

later, officers arrived on the scene and located two vehicles and five occupants involved in the crash.

Based on preliminary information, it appears that a 2007 Pontiac G6 was traveling west bound on Greenfield Avenue when

for some unknown reason the vehicle crossed left of center and collided head on with a 2006 Hyundai Accent that was traveling east bound.

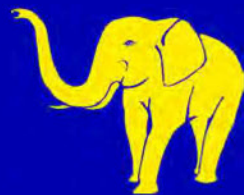

Hi. I want to discuss the Democratic Candidates Congressional debate that was held on Wednesday April 23rd at the American Legion Post in Carmel. There was a good crowd and extra chairs had to be brought out to seat all of the attendees (I know because I had to set them up).
All three candidates were present including: Shawn Denney, a school teacher, Allen Davidson, an engineer, and David Ford, a former weatherman with the military. [Note: David Ford is not related to JD Ford, the unopposed Democratic District 29 State Senate Candidate, who is running for the seat now held by Mike Delph.] The Congressional candidates are vying for the 5th District Congressional seat, currently held by Susan Brooks. The debate moderator, Mike Boland, a former Illinois legislator, did an excellent job of keeping the debate moving and

covering numerous topics. Fifteen questions were asked ranging from the Affordable Care Act (ACA), environmental issues, right to work issues, educational issues, among others.
There was not a lot of difference in Denney's and Davidson's views on the issues. Denney was vocal on reducing the cost of education and noted that Tennessee is taking steps to provide no-cost education at two-year community colleges. He questioned why Indiana was not considering this step. Denney also was supportive of the ACA. Davidson hoped that the ACA would eventually become a single-payer system. He also voiced concern with the proposed Keystone Pipeline.
Ford had a quite different view on the issues, which put him at odds with the other two challengers and, as the evening wore on, raised concerns with many members of

the audience. Ford seemingly dodged expressing views on several issues such as those related to the ACA, abortion rights, equal pay legislation, and regulatory agencies, labeling those issues as "irrelevant." He wanted to give states the authority on regulatory issues, criticized a single-payer healthcare option and emphasized the need for Democrats to reach out to disgruntled Republicans to build a coalition to beat Susan Brooks. Both Davidson and Denney essentially stated that they saw little, if any common ground between the Tea Party and the Democratic Party.
Based on this debate, I am personally backing Shawn Denney in this race. I feel he is an excellent communicator and will be the toughest opponent against Susan Brooks or Tea Party Republican David Stockdale, who is opposing her.

The driver of the Pontiac was transported to Riverview Health (Noblesville) and was treated and released. The driver and passenger of the Hyundai were transported by ambulance to I.U. Health Methodist Hospital (Indianapolis). One juvenile passenger in the Hyundai was transported by ambulance to Riverview Health and later to Riley Hospital for Children at Indiana University Health (Indianapolis). Another juvenile passenger was present in the Hyundai but did not sustain any injuries. None of the injuries appeared to be life-threatening at the time of this release.
Accident re-constructionists from the Noblesville Police Department are investigating the crash. Greenfield Avenue was temporary closed as investigators collected information and evidence pertaining to the crash. The cause of the crash is still under investigation. Identification of the drivers and passengers will be released after family notifications have been confirmed.

Neither group, likely, will act immediately. The Schools, yes, soon, if they sell what now is called Hare Chevrolet Stadium and Swanson Field. The National Guard is talking about building in 5 to 7 years.
When the Guard leaves the Field Drive site, it will be the first time in a very long time that there hasn't been an armory in Noblesville. The local unit already has taken up home at the Anderson Armory.
Currently, there are 83 Guardsmen in the local unit. About half, said LTC Cathy Van Bree, Director of Public Affairs, are from the Noblesville area.
I had to smile when National Guard folks at the Wednesday meeting talked about the local armory being too small. None, who I questioned, could remember the old, old

armory on Logan Street, just beside White River.
I say with pride that I was a National Guardsman back in those days.
The old armory was a big part of Noblesville and of the Hamilton County towns and cities. Noblesville High played its home basketball games there. So did most of the Hamilton County schools, when the court was vacant and scheduling could be arranged. Sheridan did not. Principal, athletic director and coach Larry Hobbs had his own little basketball castle in which most of the sectionals of that time were played.
It's going to be fun, I hope, to see what Noblesville Schools will do with the armory. Like with the National Guard gaining land it wanted, the land at the armory may be more valuable to Noblesville Schools than the armory itself.

The Huskies trailed 6-5 after six innings before going on their seventh-inning tear. After that, they held off the Kings to seal the win.



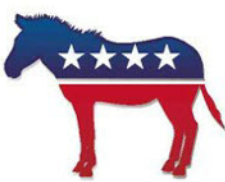
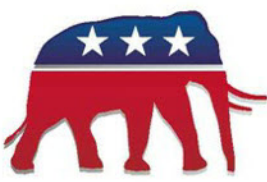
