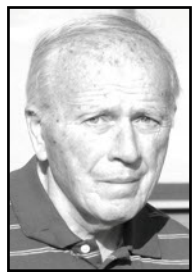

Personally, I think that is important being in the newspaper business. After spending most of my career with the locally owned Noblesville Ledger, my last 15 years or so were with, you might say, outsiders.



While we had some folks who weren't happy with the newspaper climax in the county step forward to help us get started, financially this always has been our baby. Although some like to not think of us as a newspaper, I disagree. We have a print edition on Tuesdays and an email edition Wednesdays through Sundays. We are the only locally owned daily newspaper publishing in Hamilton County.

Others may try to be "local" by a connection here and there, the bottom line for the Hamilton County Reporter is that it is locally owned by Jeff Jellison, who has spent all his life in Hamilton County.

All "connected" with the Reporter also live in Hamilton County and, actually, many have spent most of their lives in this area.

And, you may have noticed, nearly all of our advertisers are locally owned businesses. That's something I am very proud of. You've got to impress the home folks and lots of home folks are advertising their products in the Reporter. You can't kid your neighbors.

We try to support Hamilton County merchants. We have never attempted to attract advertising coming outside of Hamilton County.

Why am I bringing up all this "be local" type of thing? I'm glad you asked.

What could be more local than an election? It is, of course, primary election time, your chance to cast a vote for those running for office.

We want to help you do that.

In our regular email edition this Sunday, we will make our first attempt at publishing a special election section. It will be loaded with outlooks of all the races, plus lots of other extra things.

Carmel's Days of Remembrance Ceremony is at noon today

The City of Carmel will commemorate the Holocaust with the *Days of Remembrance Ceremony 2014*, which takes place at noon Friday, May 2 at the Tarkington Center, 3 Center Green.

The program will include a keynote address by Mr. Phil Lande, a Second Generation Survivor. Mr. Lande's father, Alexander Lande, was the sole survivor of his family who lived in Transylvania, Romania. His father was in Auschwitz, then sent to a work camp and finally to Dachau where he escaped with the help of a German soldier.

Mayor Jim Brainard will read a Civic Proclamation and offer remarks. Rabbi Benjamin Sendrow of Congregation Shaarey Tefilla will act as Master of Ceremonies. Rabbi Stanley Halpern of Congregation Beth Shalom will lead the Mourner's Kaddish. Michael Wallack representing the Mayor's Advisory Commission on Human Relations will share remarks. The program will provide a musical performance by soprano Arnie Lewin, Shaarey Tefilla member and Cantor. Carmel United Methodist Church Bell Choir will perform as well as the University High School Choir.

The public is invited and encouraged to attend this free program. The ceremony will last approximately an hour and a half, and a light lunch will be served afterwards.

The Carmel commemoration is part of Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day), an international holiday for remembering the victims of the Holocaust. It reminds us, as Americans, of what can happen to civilized people when bigotry, hatred and indifference reign.

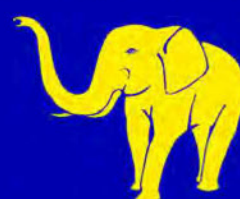

The driver of the Federal Express truck, Cynthia Marks, was checked by medics and released at the scene. The driver of the flatbed truck, Corey Lewis, was transported to the hospital for a complaint of pain to his head.

Online petition started to bring back McCollough

An online petition has started to re-instate Dave McCollough as the head coach of the Noblesville boys basketball team.

The petition, which can be viewed at <http://www.ipetitions.com/petition/bring-back-coach-mac>, began earlier this week. As of midnight Friday, it had 390 signatures.

It was announced on April 16 that McCollough would not be offered a contract to continue as coach of the Millers. McCollough led the team for 21 years, winning more games (308) than any other coach in Noblesville history. He coached the Millers to three sectional championships (1996, 1997, 2010), plus a regional title in 1997.

Carmel Redevelopment's 2nd bond sale brings total savings to nearly \$8 million

On Wednesday, the Performing Arts Center refunding bonds for the Carmel Redevelopment Authority were priced to yield about \$3.48 million in savings to the city of Carmel, selling at a rate of 3.75 percent – a savings that, when added to the \$4.4 million saved in Tuesday's refinancing, brings the total savings to just under \$8 million.

Like Tuesday's sale of COIT bonds, the PAC bonds refinancing exceeded the conservative projections made by the city, which had forecast a savings of \$2.2 million. This strategic refinancing is part of the city's ongoing fiscal management of its assets – recognized by bond rating agencies who have affirmed Carmel's AA+ bond rating.

"When we brought these proposed bond refinancing options to the City Council, we knew there was a good possibility of savings for the City," said Loren Matthes of H. J. Umbaugh & Associates. "We had been watching these potential

refundings and saw that rates were coming down. We were able to hit the market at a low point; the lowest rates have been in a year."

Carmel Redevelopment Commission executive director Corrie Meyer applauded the results of the bond sale, which helps ensure the city's many redevelopment projects remain fiscally sound and provide Carmel residents with an excellent return on investment.

"It's easy to see the beautiful public gathering spaces that have been created in our redevelopment areas, such as City Center and the Arts & Design District," said Meyer. "With today's news, the public also gets to see a little bit of the hard work that is not as visible. Our ability to create a city of distinction that continues to attract new businesses, major employers and more corporate headquarters, is a result of the city's redevelopment efforts and high quality of life."

Millers again drill Lafayette

Lafayette Jeff and Noblesville have played many great baseball games since the two teams first entered the Hoosier Crossroads Conference. The Bronchos, who are headed back to the North Central Conference next school year, got their last HCC look at Noblesville last evening at Don Dunker Field.

It wasn't a pretty look for the Lafayette club. After losing to Noblesville by 10 runs earlier in the week at Lafayette, Jeff last evening was outmuscled by Coach Justin Keever's Millers, 10-2.

This one, like the earlier game, was all-Noblesville. The Millers came close to again ending the contest on the 10-run rule

in the fifth, scoring three times but falling one marker short.

Following the game, Keever was more open to talking about the look his Millers presented than the look Lafayette Jeff took away from The Dunk.

"In our first trip through the batting order tonight," Keever said, "we had eight or nine quality at-bats. That's impressive."

"We're playing well. We've had good approaches at the plate. We're pitching well."

That's why this well-oiled Noblesville team is leading the HCC.

Noblesville had a very strong night at the plate, pounding out 11 hits. It was an attack led by Vinny Essig, who was 3-for-3 with a home run, triple and single. He scored three runs and knocked home one.

Zack St. Pierre, Trevor Salmon and Bret Rundle each collected two hits. St. Pierre, Rundle and Connor Christman each banded out a double. Rundle, the No. 9 man in the batting order, drove home four runs. Connor Christman, No. 8 in the order, had three RBIs.

Keever used three Millers on the mound. Salmon went five innings, allowed two hits and one run and got the victory. Cory Conway and Garrett Christman came on in relief. Lafayette Jeff got just three hits and fanned 11 times against the trio.

Noblesville will return to The Dunk on Saturday, playing Frankfort at 7 p.m. on a non-conference game before two huge conference series next week against McCutcheon and Avon.

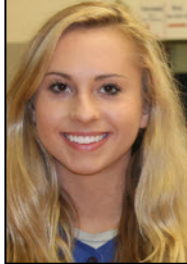


