U.S. 31 lane restrictions take place this week

Right lane restricted on westbound I-465 May 2-4

Beginning at 9 p.m. Friday, crews began to restrict the right lane of westbound I-465 near US 31. This lane restriction is expected to end by 6 a.m. on Sunday, May 4.

Lane restriction and short-term stoppages on southbound US 31 in Westfield May 5

Beginning at 9 p.m. on Monday, May 5, crews plan to close the right lane of southbound US 31 between 161st and 151st streets while overhead signage is installed. After midnight, intermittent

traffic stoppages should be expected for up to 20 minutes at a time on southbound US 31. These restrictions are expected to be complete by 6 a.m. on Tuesday, May 6.

Overnight lane restrictions in Westfield May 7 and 8

Beginning at 9 p.m. on Wednesday, May 7, crews plan to restrict southbound US 31 to one lane between SR 32 and 146th Street. Northbound US 31 will also be reduced to one lane between 146th and 161st streets while crews set concrete barrier walls. These lane restrictions are expected to end by 6 a.m. the following morning and will repeat on Thursday night, May 8.



Other Southeastern victories came from the 400 dash, Lindsey Schuler in the 300 hurdles, Samantha Zuber in the 800 run, Schuer again in the high jump, Lindsay Walton in the shot put and Alyssa McDougal in the discus.

Southeastern finished 1-2 in the 400 dash, the 3200 run, the high jump and the discus.

In a contest which featured some of the state's best, it wasn't a bad night for Coach Andrew Belloli's Fishers team. The Tigers were led by Paris Carver, who won both the 100 and 200.

Lexi Smith shattered her own school record in the long jump. Abby Horn broke a pair of school records while finishing second in he 1600 and the 800. Emily Fletchall won the pole vault and Abbi Bartholomew captured the 100 hurdles. Fishers also won the 1600 relay with the foursome of Carver, Molly Gorgol, Adrianna Murphy and Bre White.




