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Ten officials will be unopposed in Tuesday's election

Ten Republican county officials will be re-nominated without opposition in the May 6 primary election. And, thus far none has opposition for the November general election.

Circuit Judge Paul Felix and Superior Court judges Richard Campbell and Wayne Sturtevant will all win re-nomination for new terms.

County Prosecutor Lee Buckingham, winner in a tight race four years ago, is poised to win a second term.

Sheriff Mark Bowen will be re-nominated for a second term as County Sheriff.

County Commissioner Christine Altman appears headed for a third term without opposition.

County Assessor Robin Ward is certain of nomination to a second term as no one else filed for the position.

And three incumbent County Council members are certain of wins: They are: Amy Massillamany in Dist. 2, Steve Schwartz in Dist. 3, and Paul Ayers in Dist. 4.

Five of the county's township trustees are also headed for re-nomination without opposition. John Patrick in Adams, Doug Callahan in Clay, Debbie Driskell in Delaware, and Chris Miller in Jackson are all incumbents, while Danielle Carey will win her first election unopposed in Washington Twp.

Enrollment open for Noblesville Parks Summer camps

The Noblesville Parks Department is continuing to accept registrations for their award-winning summer day camps. Open to children ages 4 through 10 (with limited sessions offered to ages 2 ½ - 4 and up to age 12), these half day camps are loads of fun as well as wonderful opportunities to learn. For grandparents with visiting grandchildren, these half-day camps are a great way to provide grandkids with a few hours of outdoor fun each day along with a chance for them to make new friends. Camp programs are inclusive and serve children with and without special needs. Two locations for camps are offered again this summer:

- Traditional Day Camp: Forest Park Day Camps are nature-focused day camps with daily fun outdoor activities. An emphasis on games, songs, animals, and becoming comfortable in outdoor surroundings is a fundamental part of the program. The day camps are based out of the Lodge at Forest Park and one day each week, campers may meet at the Hague Road Nature Havens Park site (located at the southeast corner of Hague Road and State Road 32) in order to hike, wade, and explore the aquatic life in Hinkle Creek and its surroundings. Camp topics will include Superheroes, Backyard Games, Into the Wild, Model Aeronautics, Bizarre Animals, Hiding Right Before Your Eyes, and Splish Splash!
- Sports and Games Day Camp: The Noblesville Parks Sports and Games Day

Camps have a children's sports focus but still retain the characteristics of typical day camp with games, activities, nature, and all sorts of fun. These camps are an introduction to the sports focus of the week. They are not sports clinics. During the first four weeks, camp will be held at the events pavilion on the east side of Dillon Park (off of Cherry Tree Road). During the last two weeks of camp, camp will be held at Forest Park's Shelter 3. Session topics will include Sports Sampler, Cheerleading, Soccer, Flag Football, Camp Olympics, Golf, and Amazing Race.

Camps are staffed by teachers as well as college and high school students. All staffers are trained (including certification in CPR and First Aid) and reference checked.

The Forest Park and Dillon Park Day Camp programs run half day, one week sessions, beginning Monday, June 9 and running through Friday, July 25. Morning sessions are \$60 per camper/\$70 for non-residents. Afternoon sessions are \$55 per camper/\$65 for non-residents. Please note that children are not allowed to attend morning and afternoon sessions in the same week. Half scholarships are available by contacting Susie Davis, the Parks Recreation Director. Record 12,000 votes 50 years ago

It was a different election, different from the 2014 primary, when Hamilton County voters went to the polls 50 years ago.

It was a federal election year, and that helped bring the local vote count to a record 12,000 voters.

Also, there were some heavily contested races here in Hamilton County.

One was the Republican (all were Republican) race for treasurer. Noblesville Trustee Robert Davis got 1,913 votes to nose out former teacher Irle Bridge (1856) and real estate agent Sam Pursel (1,881).

Hamilton County Commissioner Floyd Carson (4,286 votes) won election for a second term, beating Jack Clark of Noblesville (4,221). Carson was from Westfield. In another Commissioner race, Calvin Hiatt Jr. gathered 4,488 votes to beat Ray Noble, who had 4,091,

Margaret York became the first woman ever elected to the Carmel School Board. She drew 1,124 votes. In a five-person race, Ward Holm was second with a count of 712.

Noblesville held its first school board election. Incumbents Simon Dorman (1,244), George Gwinn (1,170), Sam Campbell (1,560) and Stanley Craig (1,248) were returned to the board, this time by the voters.. New man to the board was Howard Young with 1,252 votes. Young, Dorman and Gwinn represented the city and Campbell and Craig the township.

Some of the vote-counting took until 3:15 a.m.

Along with the election, there was other big news in Hamilton County that week.

Twenty-three Noblesville teenagers were arrested and charged with a series of robberies.

Police Chief Joe Love said those arrested were from middle to upper class homes.

R.D. Smith, president of the local Firestone plant, announced that local workers the previous year had been paid \$10 million, up from \$9.4 million from the previous year.



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Noblesville Schools, armory make land trade

Both groups looked as pleased as punch. There were smiles on both sides of the table on the second floor of the Noblesville Schools Administration Building Wednesday afternoon for a historic meeting. Historic, let me tell you, because never before had the Indiana National Guard and Noblesville Schools met for a big land trade.

Noblesville Schools transferred land north of the City (on State Road 31), approximately 50 acres valued at nearly \$1 million, and in exchange got a piece of property the Schools had sought for years. The armory, on Field Drive west of the high school, has stood as kind of an island surrounded by school property.

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Libbie Conner told the Reporter a couple of weeks ago that at the next school board meeting she will revealed plans for that area.

It was a good exchange, for both sides. The National Guard doesn't have funds to purchase land like they received from Noblesville Schools and Noblesville Schools doesn't have funds to purchase the armory.

The citizen soldiers are expected to clear the building by May 31. Conner, at the school board meeting, likely will announce when Noblesville Schools will move in, and with what.

The National Guard hopes to come up with funding to build what likely will be a huge armory, which is what the state and national governments do with new armories today. Noblesville Schools, some believe, may announce, plans for a new football stadium on armory land, once they sell their current football field to Ivy Tech for more parking at a regional campus which will open this coming fall.

Neither group, likely, will act immediately. The Schools, yes, soon, if they sell what now is called Hare Chevrolet Stadium and Swanson Field. The National Guard is talking about building in 5 to 7 years.

When the Guard leaves the Field Drive site, it will be the first time in a very long time that there hasn't been an armory in Noblesville. The local unit already has taken up home at the Anderson Armory.

Currently, there are 83 Guardsmen in the local unit. About half, said LTC Cathy Van Bree, Director of Public Affairs, are from the Noblesville area.

I had to smile when National Guard folks at the Wednesday meeting talked about the local armory being too small. None, who I questioned, could remember the old, old

armory on Logan Street, just beside White River.

I say with pride that I was a National Guardsman back in those days.

The old armory was a big part of Noblesville and of the Hamilton County towns and cities. Noblesville High played its home basketball games there. So did most of the Hamilton County schools, when the court was vacant and scheduling could be arranged. Sheridan did not. Principal, athletic director and coach Larry Hobbs had his own little basketball castle in which most of the sectionals of that time were played.

It's going to be fun, I hope, to see what Noblesville Schools will do with the armory. Like with the National Guard gaining land it wanted, the land at the armory may be more valuable to Noblesville Schools than the armory itself.

Mix together cream cheese, sour cream, sugar & vanilla.

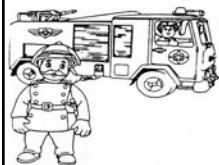
Pour dressing over grapes.

3 T. Brown Sugar & 3 T. Chopped Pecans

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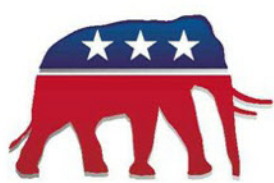
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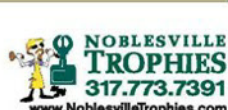

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Miller track and field team wins Invitational

Someday, perhaps someday soon, local track and field teams will need to start paying attention to Coach Kent Graham’s Noblesville team. The Millers are beginning to look more and more like a player in the picture.

Last week, Noblesville defeated Carmel. Last night, at Hare Chevrolet Field, the Millers beat Hamilton Southeastern. This NHS victory came in the Miller Invitational, a meet which normally produces a dual battle between the Millers and Royals, beating up on the rest of the small school field.

It was that way again last evening. Noblesville powered its way to 199 points, followed by Southeastern 125, Greenfield Central 73, Frankfort 62, Delta 19 and Muncie South 14.

Noblesville had lots of strong performances, none better than in the 110 hurdles. Senior Max Milkey, in 14.93, edged Southeastern senior Jacob Wright, in 14.97. Milkey also won the 300 hurdles with a time of 40.10.

Another double event winner for Noblesville was junior Jake Owens, who won the 400 dash in 51.90. In second place

was sophomore teammate Joel Taylor. Owens came back to win the 200 in 22.50, edging out Southeastern senior Khalid Fuller, whose time was 22.52.

Noblesville scored two wins in the field events, senior Seth Grossman clearing 12-6 in the pole vault and senior Hayden Camp leaping 20-9.25 in the long jump.

Brooks faces challenge in first re-election bid

Two years ago Susan Brooks won the Republican nomination for U.S. Congress in a crowded primary election field of more than a half-dozen candidates. She went on to easily win in the November general election, thus succeeding the retiring Rep. Dan Burton.

Now, in her first bid for re-election, she is challenged by David Stockdale, a political newcomer supported by Tea Party conservatives within the GOP. He will try to end Rep. Brooks' two-year tenure in the May 6 primary.

Stockdale who like Brooks is a Carmel area resident, was born in Indianapolis, graduated from Carmel High School and Indiana University's Kelly School of Business and then received a masters degree in International Relations. For 10 years he worked in the banking industry.

In recent years he has been an independent broker in health and life insurance. The candidate and his wife, Jacqueline, have one daughter.

Stockdale is basing his election campaign on the theme Restore Your Liberty. He says if elected he will work for limited government, fiscal conservatism and individual liberties.

Brooks also stresses fiscal conservatism in government. She has avoided stressing social issues in her term in Congress where she serves on the committees for Education and Workforce Development, Homeland Security and Ethics.

The incumbent is an attorney, having graduated from Indiana University School of Law after receiving an

undergraduate degree from Miami University of Ohio. She worked for the Indianapolis law firm of Ice Miller.

Brooks served as U.S. Attorney for the southern district of Indiana, deputy mayor of Indianapolis in the Goldsmith administration and more recently headed workforce development at IVY Tech University.

She and her husband, David, are parents of two grown children.

A third candidate in the GOP race for 5th District Congressional representative is David Campbell of Cambridge City, IN. He is not a resident of the 5th District, and although unusual, a candidate for Congress is not required to live in the district from which he runs.

Campbell has not made information on his background available to the Reporter.

Democrats' lone primary race is for 5th District

Voters who choose to ask for a Democratic ballot in the May 6 primary will find only one contest in which to make a decision.

There are three candidates seeking the party nomination for Congress in the 5th District which includes Hamilton County and is a heavily Republican district currently represented by Rep. Susan Brooks.

Shawn Denney, a high school history teacher living in Lawrence, is a native of New Castle. He holds a BA degree from University of Indianapolis and a master degree in education. Denny has two sons and a step-son, and is now engaged to Amber Sterns.

He feels education and job creation would be top priorities if elected. "the voices

of the majority are not being heard in Washington," Denney says. He promises to be their voice in Washington if successful in the election.

Allen Davidson, an engineer with the Indiana Department of Transportation, is a resident of Fishers. He is a graduate of Texas Tech University. He and wife, Tanisha, have two children.

David Ford, resident of Westfield is a U.S. Air Force veteran. In service he was a weather forecast specialist. He and his wife, Marcie, have one son.

The candidates all indicate general agreement with Democratic positions on Obamacare, abortion choice and immigration reform, but maintain that if elected they will consider issues on their merits.

Familiar names are found on Noblesville Township Trustee ballot

Two candidates with familiar Noblesville names oppose each other May 6 for the office of Noblesville Township Trustee. Tom Kenley and Theresa Caldwell are seeking the Republican nomination for the office as incumbent Billie Caldwell retires.

Noblesville Township is one of four townships in the county where contests are set for the May 6 primary with the Noblesville probably having the most spirited of these. Fall Creek, Wayne and White River also have competition for trustee.

With Billie Caldwell stepping down, her daughter-in-law, Theresa Caldwell seeks to succeed her. The candidate is an 11

year employee of the office, a Purdue University graduate, married and mother of one daughter.

Candidate Caldwell is administrative assistant in the office and says if elected she will continue to build relationships and programs to benefit the needy and protect the taxpayers.

Kenley, brother of State Sen. Luke Kenley, graduated from Noblesville High School, attended Indiana University and then worked for 25 years as a store manager in Kenley Supermarkets.

He is now in real estate with the Ayer's Real Estate agency. He is the father of two

daughters and has two grandchildren. Kenley is president of the township board and says he goal if elected will be to "improve daily operations and increase efficiency in the trustee's office without reducing services for the needy.

The three other townships where voters face choices include Wayne Township where two term incumbent Diane Crim is challenged by Otto Berlin who claims the township needs new leadership.

Crim says she is qualified to continue with the major issue being good fire and ambulance service without a large tax increase, something she is working on. She

and her husband, Roger, are parents of two daughters, and have three grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Berlin is retired after a working career at Chevrolet, Unisys and AT&T. He and wife, Liz, are parents of two daughters and have four grandchildren. He is a graduate of Indiana State University and an elder at Clarksville Christian Church.

The GOP primary race for trustee in Fall Creek Township features a contest between Doug Allman and incumbent Jeff Hern.

And in White River Township another incumbent, Jamie Rulon, has a primary challenger, Edmund Fouse.

This year’s race for coroner is competitive

For the first time in recent history there is competition for the office of County Coroner, usually not an office that attracts many office-seekers. This year there will be a primary election contest between Roger Conn and John Chalfin. They seek to succeed Thurl Cecil, two term incumbent. The office has a two term limit.

Both candidates stress the importance of a coroner with qualifications and experience in death investigation. As the county population increases, the number of coroner cases has grown substantially.

Roger Conn is a former Carmel Police Chief who retired from the department in 2002, then served for seven years as business administrator for the Carmel Methodist Church and now works in the retirement benefits industry.

Conn, a 31 year resident of the county, and his wife Mary Jane Coffing are the parents of five children. He is an Eagle Scout, a Rotarian and member of the Methodist Church. Conn is an FBI Academy graduate.

He became a deputy coroner in 1985 and was the first in Hamilton County to be a certified death investigator. Claiming qualifications "to work with first responders to gather evidence and present it in a factual manner to tell an accurate story," Conn says is of great importance."I feel even the deceased need someone to speak for them."

John Chalfin, the other coroner candidate, has been a Noblesville resident for 30 years. He and his wife, Ellen, are the parents of two sons. He is a Vietnam War veteran. A deputy coroner for the past seven years, Chalfin has also

served as a paramedic/firefighter and EMT for Cicero and Lawrence Township, Marion County.

The candidate is Program Chairman of Paramedic Science at IVY Tech College. The paramedic program has been recognized several times locally and statewide. Chalfin has also received awards for his "professional and compassionate care" during his service at Cicero and Lawrence.

Chalfin graduated from Indiana University and various programs in the paramedic field since. He served in the U.S. Navy and later held administrative positions at Chrysler Corporation before beginning his current career. He is a member of the Noblesville Masonic Lodge.

The clerk's office is also the elections center for all elective offices in the county. The clerk is responsible for keeping all court records.

Both candidates point out that the most important issue involved is keeping current on state laws, administrative rules, trial rules and local court rules in order to perform the clerk's functions acceptably.

Turner’s investigation gives Gillim District 32 opening

Two months ago conventional wisdom said State Rep. Eric Turner (R-Cicero) was an overwhelming favorite to win re-nomination as representative from Dist. 32, but then came news coverage of an ethics investigation of Turner's actions in the State House.

Now challenger, Parvin Gillim, is working to make the May 6 primary race a real contest. Gillim appears to have a chance of winning after a number of unsuccessful tries in past elections. Winner of the Repub-

lican primary in Dist. 32 will be the odds-on favorite in the November general election.

The district includes Adams, Jackson and parts of Washington and White River townships in Hamilton County along with portions of Madison, Grant, Howard and Tipton counties.

Turner has served in the House for 20 years. He serves on House committees for Ways and Means, Public Health, and the Commission on Tax and Finance. In private life Turner is president of T-3 Investments Corp. He is a graduate of Taylor University

and member of the College Wesleyan Church.

The longtime representative denies any wrongdoing in the current ethics investigation into allegations that he lobbied fellow legislators to defeat legislation that would impose a moratorium on construction of new nursing homes. His company is involved in nursing home operations.

Gillim, a resident of the Sheridan area, has been a candidate for local office previously, but never for state legislature. He has

distributed little information on his background, but says that if elected he "will serve you with unfaltering honesty and sincerity. I will be your voice in Indiana government and always strive to be available and accessible to listen to your concerns.

Issues on which Gillim said he places highest importance include agriculture, small town economics and community development, historic preservation, education and vocational training, small business initiatives, limiting large government and home rule.

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

Superior Court 3 race may be the closest of all

Thus far the most vigorously contested race in the May 6 primary campaign is that which features judge vs. judge for the Superior Court 3 bench.

Current Judge William Hughes is running for re-election. Challenging him for the position is Brian Poindexter, the Carmel city judge.

Hughes, a longtime Noblesville resident, has the longest record of service on the bench among local judges. Prior to going on the bench he was a partner in the Campbell, Kyle and Proffitt law firm. He is a graduate of Evansville University and IU School of Law.

Hughes says, "In my role as judge I have tried to be a part of ensuring that our citizens are protected, civil liberties are preserved and the people of Hamilton County have a place to resolve their disputes where the rule of law meets compassion to find justice."

The candidate has two grown sons and two grandchildren. He is an active member of Noblesville's First United Methodist Church along with several professional organizations.

Brian Poindexter, running against Hughes in the upcoming primary, is currently judge of the Carmel City Court, a position to which he was appointed by Gov. Mitch Daniels in 2009. The judge resides in Carmel. He and his wife, Anne Hensley Poindexter, are parents the three children.
