## Haffner weighs in on McCollough firing

Like most people in town, former Noblesville High hoops star Scott Haffner confesses to having very little to no insight into the recent, controversial firing of the Millers’ basketball coach. But when asked about the future of the program he describes what he hopes to one day see with the same passion that he once played the game.

“I like Coach (Dave) McCollough,” Haffner spoke of the man who was unceremoniously ousted after 20 seasons and 308 wins with the Millers, “and I certainly respect his record of success. I don’t know of anything that might have happened behind the scenes or why changes were needed because I am not involved in that.

“It’s interesting to me because Coach McCollough has a really good record. I don’t know the reasons why they did what they did other than it looks like the people who make those decisions wanted to go a different direction to create more of a kind of culture they envision.

McCollough was suspended a couple of games this past season for striking a player during practice with a basketball. Haffner thinks there’s more to the situation than that.

“I think there are things that we just don’t know, or there have been ongoing discussions by people that make decisions for change. I think there’s just more to it

than an incident or two. I’m just not privy to that information.”

He has a grand vision of the school’s basketball future, though.

“What I want Noblesville basketball to reestablish is the enthusiasm and passion so when young people walk into that gym and look out on the floor – they want to be at every game – and want to be the next Jake Mills or Larry Simmons or Mike Chesser or Tom Coverdale,” he said with a glint in his eyes, speaking of just a few former NHS hardwood greats, excluding himself, arguably one of Noblesville’s best of all time.

“I know there are more distractions today because of social media and other things going on, but establishing a culture of enthusiasm and passion for Noblesville basketball again along with excellence would become infectious in the community. And kids would want to be at a high level, the highest level, and Noblesville basketball would mean something extra special to them. The whole community would feel it.”

Haffner played during such an era, when the Millers won three Carmel Sectionals (1981-82, 84) in his four seasons.

“Carmel used to dominate the sectional,” he pointed out. “My dad would take me to those games when I was younger along

And, please, please don’t give me this stuff that one minor incident brought down Coach Mac. I wasn’t born yesterday. It was a hatchet job from within, and as we learn more and more about what happened, the within from the highest sources. If today we really know who are, indeed, the highest sources in Noblesville Schools.

There are times when not firing has proved to have much more benefits than firing. Sheridan football coach Bud Wright often tells the story about how he once was one vote away from behind fired, before, of course, he went on to a Hall of Fame career, with more victories than any coach in the game.

My first coach’s firing came when I was a senior at Noblesville High School. I didn’t play basketball, but I loved coach Corey LeCount. We talked a lot about coaching. The pros and the cons. LeCount told me what it was like to be a coach. He, much like McCollough, was a great role model.

Sometimes firings work out well. That one, eventually, did. LeCount went on to become high school principal and Noblesville got Glen Harper as its new basketball coach.

But, I have never forgotten the pain of Corey losing his job. My dream was to become a coach, until that mess. Never gave it a second thought.

How will the McCollough situation develop? Dave, if he wants, will remain a successful coach at another school. Noblesville will hire a new coach, who might

succeed, or, might not. It’s a roll of the dice when selecting a new coach. Noblesville Schools folks don’t appear to be good rollers. Instead of putting the ball in the hands of experienced people, Noblesville seems to be putting its hopes into the hands of those who never has experienced a situation like this on the big stage. Noblesville, it appears, will not, as most schools do, select a search committee, often made up of players, students, other teachers, basketball fans, athletic directors, etc. The School people seem to have all the answers.

Sometimes schools get lucky. Noblesville hasn’t enjoyed lots of such luck in recent years.

My challenge to Noblesville Schools is to tell why; tell why Dave McCollough was fired. The community needs to know. Those outside the community need to know. Noblesville should not hide behind what they are calling a “personnel situation.”

One school board member at a nearby school said to me, “If we were to fire a coach over throwing a basketball, we would have to fire half of our staff.”

Folks outside of Noblesville don’t believe what they are being told. Neither do folks in Noblesville. It’s another example of Noblesville Schools making a decision not supported by a majority of the community. The way Noblesville Schools have handled this situation once again calls for better leadership.

with other people and every year we would get tired of hearing that cheer C-C-C-A-R-M-M-M-E-L. We told ourselves we were going to change that and it was important for us to do it.

“What happened at Noblesville, people aligned with a vision and were willing to change and be excellent,” Haffner said.

Excellence epitomizes Scott Haffner’s prep career. He became one of Noblesville’s most exciting players, scoring 1,380 points in his career, and he had a single-game high of 43 points. He once owned the school record for assists. His senior season the Millers were undefeated

until losing a heartbreaker against Troy Lewis and Anderson in the regional round of the single-class IHSAA State Basketball Tournament.

Haffner was selected to the 1984 Indiana All-Star Team. He also realized his life-long dream of playing in the Big Ten, as he accepted an offer upon graduation to play at Illinois.

His stay in Champaign soured quickly, though, and Haffner would soon find himself at The University of Evansville where three seasons with the Purple Aces resulted in the school retiring his number.

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Hamilton County Boys Meet...

It's a Roberts-Harris show

It may be worth the price of admission tonight at Carmel Stadium just to watch the 100 meter dash event. If Carmel's Austin Roberts and Fishers' J-Shun Harris decide to cut loose, this dash for glory will be something special.

Record shattering? Perhaps.

One of the oldest records on the county's books is the 10.8 mark in the 100, set back in 1982 by Carmel's Bill Davis. Roberts' best zip so far this season is a 10.86. Harris has been 11.00. In a blink of the eye, Davis record may be history.

While the Davis-Harris matchup could be the highlight, challenging for that label will be Southeastern's hurdler Jacob Wright. He is one of only two athletes in the boys competition to enter the meet with a pair of season bests. The other is Roberts, who also has the best time in the 200 dash, just three-tenths of a second

faster than Noblesville's Jake Owens. Wright has been 14.23 in the 110 hurdles and 36.00 in the 300 hurdles. Jacob Wright older brother, Jeremiah, set the 110 hurdles record of 14.32 in 2010. Another former Southeastern hurdler, Zach Reitzug, broke the 300 hurdles record with a 37.02 clocking in 2013.

Although the depth of teams likely will decide the team championship, based on county bests alone, Carmel is looking good. In the 16 events, Carmel enters have seven season bests. Southeastern has four; Noblesville and Westfield two each and Guerin Catholic one.

Don't expect any new records in the field events. Arguably, the most impressive season best in the field events entering the meet is a 182-6 heave by Southeastern's Austin Hogan in the discus. The meet record in this event is a 191-8 toss by Carmel's Langston Newton in 2012.

Bad weather:  
no rescheduling

If the weather interferes tonight and the Hamilton County Boys & Girls Track & Field Meet is not completed, forget it. The meet will not be rescheduled.

That has never happened in a meet first held in 1908.

Once the showcase of the local track and field world, the County Meet takes a back seat to conference meets coming up next week. Coaches do not want anything to interfere with conference meets.

In past years, if the County Meet was rained out on Friday, it was held on Saturday. Once, a few years ago, county officials were unable to finish the pole vault. Pole vaulters returned on a Saturday morning and Noblesville left Carmel with the championship trophy only to learn later that the score was wrong and Carmel actually won.

But, never a complete cancellation, because of weather, in the 96-year history of the county meet.

Action, boys and girls, will start tonight with the field events at 5:30 p.m. The 3200 relay will begin at 5:45. Running trials are scheduled for 6:15 and official running events (girls first in each event) will begin at 7:15 p.m.

Eight places will be scored in all events: 10, 8, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1.

Team trophies will be awarded and an individual trophy will be given to the high point scorer, both boys and girls.

Admission is \$5. Pre-school children will be admitted free.

# Carmel, Guerin, Heights are Thursday tennis winners, while... Royals squeeze past Tigers for Mudsock Trophy

Believe it or not, Thursday's Mudsock girls tennis meet was not the longest ever.

A couple years ago, the annual battle between Hamilton Southeastern and Fishers stretched to four hours. This year, it "only" went about three hours and 20 minutes, with the No. 20-ranked Royals getting past the No. 30 Tigers 3-2.

Kelsey Hay clinched HSE's final point, winning a back-and-forth No. 1 singles match 6-4 in the third set over Fishers' Jessica Lorenz. The Tigers had climbed back to tie the meet at 2-2 just minutes before, as the No. 1 doubles team of Kay Jacob and Krissy Kokjohn held off a roaring comeback by the Royals' Kelsey Cahlamer and Andrea Updike. The Southeastern team was down 4-1 and fought off seven match points before the Tigers finally won 7-5 in the third set.

"I knew the match was going to be close," said HSE coach Kirk Webber. "I didn't know it was going to be this close. So proud of the girls for pulling it out."

In other Thursday tennis action, No. 1-ranked Carmel beat Noblesville 5-0. The Greyhounds got a first-ever varsity win from Jessica Tao, who won 6-0, 6-2 at No. 3 singles.

"I was really happy for Jessica getting her first varsity win," said Carmel coach Mike Bostic. "She is a great kid and would be a starter at many schools. She has been a team player all season and very much deserved that varsity match. The team was really happy for her and it just shows the type of kids we have in our program."

Guerin Catholic, the ninth-ranked team, made some history of its own by beating No. 17 Zionsville 4-1. This was the first time in school history that the Golden Eagles beat Zionsville, which is a perennial sectional champion team.

Hamilton Heights picked up a 4-1 Mid-Indiana Conference win over Taylor. The Huskies are currently 3-1 in the league.

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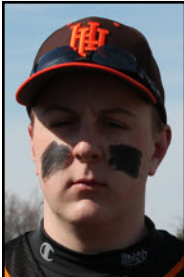




# Huskies hold off Taylor, are back even in MIC

Verizon IndyCar Series champion Scott Dixon paced the field at 124.606 mph with the fastest lap time of 1 minute, 10.4654 seconds on the 14-turn, 2.439 mile road course. Dixon, driving the No. 9 Target Chip Ganassi race car was less than 1 second ahead of 23 other drivers in Thursdays practice sessions.

Second on the track was Simon Pagenaud in the No. 77 Schmidt Peterson Hamilton Motorsports car with a lap time of 1 minute, 10.4845 seconds at 124.572 mph.

Friday morning will offer one more practice session then qualifications begin at 2:00 pm if, and that’s a big “IF”, the weather cooperates. Fridays forecast calls for rain and a chance for severe thunderstorms.

## Grammy winner LeAnn Rimes to perform National Anthem

One of the world's most successful country music entertainers with a career spanning more than 20 years, Rimes was the youngest person to ever win a Grammy Award and was the first country artist to win the Grammy for Best New Artist.

"To sing the national anthem at one of the most prestigious racing events is truly an honor," said Rimes. "The adrenaline at the Speedway is felt around the world and I know I am one of millions who is so excited to hear those six legendary words 'ladies and gentlemen, start your engines.' "

Since breaking into country music in 1996, Rimes has released 10 studio albums, three compilation albums and two greatest hits albums. Rimes has placed 40 singles on American and international charts with 13 Top-10 hits, and has sold more than 40 million records worldwide.

Rimes had her first national hit at age 13 with the 1996 release of "Blue," which remained at the No. 1 spot on Billboard's country albums chart for more than three months. Her version of "How Do I Live" is the second-longest charting song in the history of the Billboard Hot 100 chart, and her smash hit "Can't Fight the Moonlight" topped the charts in 11 countries.

"The pre-race pageantry of the Indianapolis 500 is one of the most exciting traditions in sports and a highlight of those activities is the singing of our national anthem," said J. Vehicles traveling west on 30th Street from Lafayette Road will be routed into Gate 10 until the area is full, then west-bound traffic will be diverted to Lot 1C (Coke Lot), west of Georgetown Road. Vehicles traveling east on 30th Street from Moller Road will be routed into Lot 1C.

Recreational vehicles and buses, with the exception of those with proper placards or credentials, will not be allowed inside IMS property. Sufficient parking is available for oversized vehicles in Lot 1C.

Follow these recommended routes for limited free parking via 30th Street (Lot 1C and Gate 10).

**From I-465:** Use Exit 17 (38th Street) and proceed east (turn right from northbound, turn left from southbound) on 38th Street, turn south (right) on Moller Road, turn east (left) on 30th Street, the Lot entrances are on the right.

**From Southbound I-65:** Use Exit 119 (38th Street) and proceed to the Kessler Boulevard North Drive exit, turn south

(right) on Kessler Boulevard North Drive, turn west (right) onto 30th Street, the North Tunnel Gate entrance is on the left.

**From Northbound I-65:** Use Exit 116 (29th/30th Street) and proceed straight past 29th Street, turn west (left) on 30th Street, the North Tunnel Gate entrance is on the left.

**From I-70 West of Indianapolis (Eastbound):** Use Exit 69 (I-465 North) and follow I-465 directions seen above.

**From I-70 East of Indianapolis (Westbound):** Use Exit 90 (I-465) and continue south on I-465 loop (turns into I-465 North), follow I-465 directions above.

Georgetown Road will be closed to all vehicular traffic for the Grand Prix of Indianapolis on Sunday, May 10, prior to the start of the race for all vehicular traffic between 16th Street on the south and 25th Street on the north. After Georgetown Road is closed, no vehicular traffic, including placarded traffic, will be allowed to access the road way.

In addition, Georgetown Road will be closed at 7 a.m. on Indianapolis 500 Race Day on Sunday, May 25, to all vehicular

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
