Hasn't included Firestone...

Ditslear talks about Brownfield progress

Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear says that money from a large grant given to three Hamilton County cities and towns is being put to good use.

In 2012, a coalition consisting of the City of Noblesville along with the Towns of Sheridan and Arcadia partnered with Soil and Materials Engineers, Inc. (SME) to apply for a \$400,000 United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Brownfield Redevelopment Assessment grant. The grant was approved and the coalition and SME are now in the second

year of implementation. The purpose of this grant funding has been and is to provide for assessments of brownfield areas. The EPA defines “brownfield” as real property—the expansion, redevelopment, or reuse of which may be complicated by the presence or potential presence of a hazardous substance, pollutant, or contaminant. Knowledge of any such environmental issues helps facilitate future redevelopment or reuse of an affected area.

Mayor Ditslear told The Reporter that none of the money has been used for any of the Firestone property located on the east side of Noblesville. The plant was torn

down a few years ago, leaving a cement “slap” to cover the former building, and the soil under that former building.

“The Brownfield funds have not been used for any Firestone property,” the Mayor responded to email questions by The Reporter. “This particular grant is for \$400,000, but we can apply for additional funding for the future. This is something we’ll evaluate and consider doing once this funding cycle is complete.”

Under SME’s management, the following are redevelopment projects that have taken place in the coalition communities in

the past two years thanks to the funding from the grant:

- Assessment of the former Noblesville Foundry building
- Two new proposed housing projects with the Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development (HAND) in Noblesville
- Assessment of properties at the future West Gateway Park in Noblesville
- Assessment of property to expand Biddle Park in Sheridan
- Assessment of property for the Boys and Girls Club of Noblesville

Westfield, Hamilton County Tourism help launch Super Service

Heartland Growers to host Algaeon’s algae-producing devices

A Westfield nursery will see some new plants soon that may not be as pretty as the flowers that are there, but they will be very useful for nutrition and health.

Heartland Growers in Westfield will host an acre of greenhouse space for Algaeon, Inc., an Indianapolis biotech firm. A report in the Indianapolis Business Journal said that Algaeon will invest \$2.75 million, which it received through new funding, to start commercially producing its nutritional supplements. The company will install 800 bio-reactors, which are algae-producing devices, according to the IBJ.

On its Web site, Algaeon said that it is “successfully growing a variety of algae species to produce high-value products for leading companies in the Nutraceutical and Animal / Fish Feed markets. Algaeon has

developed a patent-pending industrial scale algae cultivation technology. Algaeon is building commercial scale production capacity and will be licensing our technology to “grow partners.”

Heartland Growers, located at 2621 E. 186th St., was started in 1976 by Neil VanWingerden and was purchased by James Gapinski and Richard VanWingerden in 1984. It offers a variety of flowers in 30 total acres of growing space.

The IBJ reported that Algaeon will start selling two new products this year: Astaxanthin, which helps prevent degeneration of the eyes, heart and brain, and Beta glucan, which boosts the immune system and will be a replacement for antibiotics that are used in animal feed.

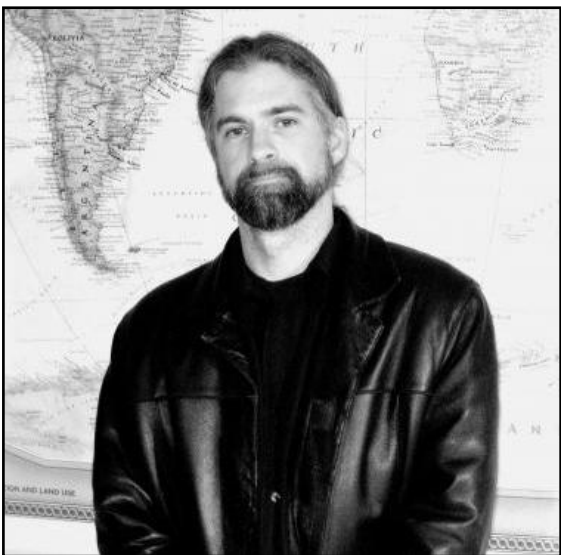

County. Participants who complete the training will become part of a team of Hamilton County Ambassadors for Tourism.

The training modules, which can be completed in as little as 45 minutes, include:

Exceeding Expectations The first module focuses on key customer service principles and best practices to ensure each and every visitor feels welcome and leaves raving about Hamilton County as a hospitable destination.

All About Hamilton County This module provides an overview of things to do in Hamilton County, including family adventure, museums, art, outdoor activities and music. It also includes numerous links with more information on restaurants, shopping, hotels and sports venues across the county.

All About Westfield This section provides an overview of Westfield from the trail system to art, recreation to restaurants. A special section gives more information and links for the new Grand Junction and Grand Park.

Why Tourism Matters In this final section, participants will receive information about current projects funded through tourism in Hamilton County and learn more about how tourism supports the community and creates jobs.

Everyone who completes the training will receive a certificate of completion and a lapel pin that can be worn as a visual designation of being a Hamilton County Ambassador for Tourism.

“With the addition of Grand Park and its projected \$1.04 billion in economic impact

over the next five years, our county will experience quite a boon from tourists,” said Brenda Myers, Executive Director of Hamilton County Tourism. “Participating in the Super Service training will help area business owners, Grand Park staff, and volunteers from across Westfield better understand the positive impact tourism has on the community, and the positive impact they can have on tourism.”

Westfield’s Super Service program is the first in a series of comprehensive hospitality partnerships that Hamilton County Tourism has planned for the county. Future programs are being designed to meet the specific needs of individual communities, and may include training programs, group

services, signage programs or tourism certification programs.

Westfield’s program is based on Visit Indy’s successful Super Bowl XLVI hospitality training, which prepared more than 17,000 volunteers to welcome and assist guests to Indianapolis in 2012. This is the third version of the training program that has been customized specifically for cities. Kokomo and Madison, Ind., also use the program.

This is the second hospitality initiative that Westfield has launched since announcing Grand Park. In 2014, Westfield hired a hospitality coordinator to implement a culture of hospitality in the city.

The Town of Cicero recently joined the coalition of Noblesville, Sheridan, and Arcadia, and a Brownfield area within Cicero town limits is currently being assessed.

The success of the assessment conducted on the former Noblesville Foundry building is an excellent example of the ultimate goal for Brownfield redevelopment across the country. According to ID Castings, the new owner of the Foundry property, in addition to how well Noblesville’s Economic Development team and SME worked with them to meet their objectives, one of the reasons they chose the Noblesville Foundry property was the availability of Brownfield funding to assist them in evaluating the environmental conditions at the site. ID Castings has now committed to invest more than \$20 million in upgrades at the facility as well as retain more than 25 jobs and create future jobs in Noblesville.

“As an organization, our leadership and team members are committed to ecological and environmentally friendly practices in all endeavors. We are so pleased with and

encouraged by the support and cooperation of our local governmental agencies,” said John Kelley, Plant Engineer at ID Castings. “Mayor John Ditslear and the City of Noblesville serve as wonderful partners in our journey to build a world-class foundry on our community’s near southside.”

Mayor Ditslear added, “The importance of this Brownfield grant funding in helping to further advance redevelopment efforts in Noblesville, Sheridan, Arcadia, and Cicero cannot be stressed enough. Cooperation between our municipalities, combined with SME’s experience and guidance, is proving to be a very effective process for our communities.”

It wasn't a cakewalk, but the Hamilton Southeastern girls track and field team was able to win another Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship Tuesday at Lafayette Jeff.

The No. 3-ranked Royals scored 132.5 points, finishing comfortably ahead of Avon's 106. The 16th-ranked Orioles got ahead of No. 7 Fishers, which finished third, and sixth-ranked Noblesville, which finished fourth. Westfield was fifth. All four county schools got at least one individual win.

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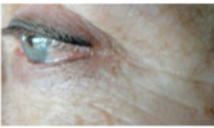
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Royals beat Anderson, lose to Harrison
