Heartland Growers to host Algaeon's algae-producing devices

Heartland Growers in Westfield will host an acre of greenhouse space for Algaeon, Inc., an Indianapolis biotech firm. A report in the Indianapolis Business Journal said that Algaeon will invest \$2.75 million, which it received through new funding, to start commercially producing its nutritional supplements. The company will install 800 bio-reactors, which are algae-producing devices, according to the IBJ.

On its Web site, Algaeon said that it is " successfully growing a variety of algae species to produce high-value products for leading companies in the Nutraceutical and Animal / Fish Feed markets. Algaeon has
