

Finding a school for special kids

In affluent Hamilton County

By DON JELLISON **Reporter Editor** As I sat and listened, there was a moment

in which I pinched myself, wondering if I



had fallen asleep and having а nightmare. Am I still in Hamilton County, I wondered. The Hamilton County I've known all of my life. I sat there and listened to emotional people, some in tears. I sat there and listened mad parents, to parents who were

scared, yes, scared, that their beloved Mosaics School was about to be lost.

Some two years ago Noblesville Schools, where Mosaics School is housed, announced that it would soon run out of

space. Mosaics would need to find another home.

Mosaics is a school for special needs students. It's a cooperative effort of Hamilton, Boone and Madison counties schools. It is governed by the superintendents of Noblesville, Sheridan, Hamilton Heights, Westfield and Lapel-Frankton school systems. Those school systems also finance Mosaics, each paying its fair share based on numbers of students from each of the districts. Carmel and Hamilton Southeastern Schools once were part of the co-op, but pulled out a few years ago and now operate their own schools for special needs students.

Leaving Noblesville Schools, there was a plan put in place, led by Noblesville Superintendent Dr. Libbie Conner. No one, I know of, has put any more work and effort into given special needs students a school of their own than Conner.

purchase the National Guard Armory. Located on Field Drive, the armory has kind of stood as an island surrounded by Noblesville Schools. For years, Noblesville Schools had attempted to buy the armory, not for the building itself but for the 10 acres

owned by the National Guard. It's prime land for Noblesville Schools in its planning for a new football field and perhaps even a new baseball diamond. With the recent now is Noblesville East Middle School, Noblesville Schools lost a baseball diamond on 16th Street and there is interest from Ivy Stadium land on which the football field sits.

Ivy Tech wants the land for parking. So far, so good. Ivy Tech gets its parking; Noblesville money from that sale to build a football field on land Noblesville

However, at the recent meeting of the Mosaics board, Conner had to announce that (following the purchase and following an inspection by architects hired by Noblesville Schools) the armory does not meet the codes for such a school and that over a million and a half dollars would be needed to turn the agreement for Ivy Tech to move into what armory into a school for special needs children.

Somebody dropped the ball. Big time.

While most of my columns here



will focus on aspects of nutrition and well-being, I digress this time to expound on another topic of personal interest to me – the importance of strength and resistance activity for women over

fifty. Resistance training can counteract the weakening effects of modern and sedentary living. Obviously most of us ladies in a particular age category want to look as fit as possible, which is a great goal but not the primary factor I will discuss today.

Sorry to do this but here are some sobering statistics: According to the CDC (Center for Disease Control & Prevention) the latest statistics show that approximately 5 million women over 50 suffer from osteoporosis and 80% of those who suffer from the disease in this country are women. The AAOS (American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons) estimates that 70% of those who suffer injuries from falls do not return to their pre-injury status.

While the tendency to suffer from bone density issues is often hereditary, there are activities which can stave off some of those issues. (There are also nutritional objectives which I will save for another time.) Addressing mobility, range of motion, functionality, all of these are critical to our health and well-being. Strength training can also benefit a reduction in blood pressure, lower back pain, arthritic pain - not to mention increasing the ability to lift household items, climb stairs, participate in golf, tennis, etc.

U.S. 31 construction update

Overnight lane restrictions between 146th and 169th streets

Motorists should expect various overnight lane restrictions on US 31 between 146th and 169th streets through the end of May while crews continue the remaining work on this contract. Overnight lane restrictions are expected between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m.

Temporary closure of Westfield Park Road near SR 32 on or after May 16

Beginning on or after May 16, crews plan to close Westfield Park Road near SR 32 for approximately 14 days while the drive is rebuilt just west of its current location. During the temporary closure, access to businesses on Westfield Park Road will be available via 169th Street.

Construction zone safety reminder Driving safely in construction zones, like the one along US 31 in Hamilton

County, requires undivided attention and patience.

- To operate safely in a construction zone, motorists should:
 - Be aware of changing conditions
- Pay attention to construction signage and flaggers
 - Prepare for frequent stops
 - Follow posted speed limits
 - Stay in their lane
- Avoid distractions, especially mobile devices
 - Remain calm
 - Plan for delays

Driving aggressively in work zones can cost you in several ways. Indiana's Work Zone Safety Law includes steep penalties for driving infractions in work zones. The minimum fee for speeding in a work zone is \$300, and that fine increases if you receive more than one ticket in three years. Drivers who injure or kill a highway worker could face fines up to \$10,000 and eight years in prison


